



"A general infection of the system sometimes results from an abscess on a single tooth. These decayed cavities in teeth also form an ideal culture place for micro-organisms. There is no question but that there have been direct tuberculosis infections from this source.

"In the public schools of Chicago there was at one time an epidemic of scarlet fever. It occurred to the Commissioner of Health, Dr. Evans, that a child might carry the germs of scarlet fever indefinitely in the tonsils or in the cavities of decayed teeth. His first order was that no child who had suffered from scarlet fever should be permitted to return to school till all decayed teeth were filled and the mouth made hygenic. Immediately scarlet fever was stamped out of the Chicago schools."



TRADES AND LABOR CARNIVAL



"Beer bottles should be manufactured from reddish-brown glass, inasmuch as same will to a much higher degree than any other kind of glass, minimize the influence of the rays of light on the quality of beer, and will protect the latter against acquiring the disagreeable taste (Sonnengeschmack) due to the chemical action of light.

"In white and green glass bottles the beer is most affected by the action of the light. Such bottles are, therefore, absolutely inappropriate and should never be employed by brewers."






