RUSSIANS MOVING ON WITH TERRIBLE FL

Invasion of Galicia and Prus Continues Along Wide Front

Crushing Defeat of Germans at Gumbinnen, Although They Had All The Advantage of Position and Numbers -A Case of The Best Man Winning -Another Great Battle Expected

RUSSIANS MOVING ON WITH TERRIBLE FORCE and the left wing entering Galicia, the Russian centre composed of the great bulk of the Russian army, is believed to be marching silently, but with ter-rible force on Posen.

London, Aug. 26—The Russian general staff asserts that their armies con-inue on the offensive in an official communication published today, and its ontents telegraphed to Reuter by its correspondent in St. Petersburg.

In East Prussia, the German army beat a retreat by forced marches. Part of this army is concentrating at the fortress of Konigsberg. 

There is also a British force near Givet on the River Meuse below Namur. The rigid censorship prevents us from getting any information on this point. We are told, however, on the authority of Lord Kitchener, that the British soldiers have been haved with the utmost gallantry, and that their position is satisfactory. They had been able, he said, to maintain their position in the face of fierce German attacks, although the German forces were superior in numbers. The fact stands out

tacks, although the German forces were superior in numbers. The fact stands out clear that the Germans have not yet been able to pierce through Belgium into France. That a determined effort is being made to drive through the French and British lines near the River Meuse is indicated by the official French announcement that territory occupied in Lorraine and Alsace has been abandoned for the present, because all available forces are required on the Meuse. One report says that the mass of the German forces appears to be concentrating upon the French centre at Verdun. Today's news is more encouraging to the friends of the allies than that of yesterday, and it shows that the Germans have still failed to gain any important strategic foothold upon French soil. The battle still rages along the whole line, and we can only hope that where the Germans make their most determined attack the allied forces will be there in sufficient force to hold them in check. It, is still a long road to Paris, and in the east the Russian armies are making steady if slow progress toward the heart of Germany.

The Russians are advancing in East methods for, self-sacrifice among both sexes and all classes with a view to guarding against panic, waste, unemployment, poverty, and distress.

CANADA'S GOOD POSITION.

(Montreal Mail.)

There are no good reasons for Canadian business men as a class to be unduly apprehensive of the consequences of the war upon commercial conditions in this country. The population of Canada is as large as it ever was. Its need of food, clothing and other necessaries is no smaller than usual. The demand for luxuries may lessen for the time, and financial speculation may cease, but, after all, the foundation of real business is too broad and firmly laid to be materially affected. Dislocation is confined chiefly to the super-strata of business. Happily the financial situation was clarified by the year of retrenchment following the Balkan War, and the Canadian banks are now in a strong position and pursuing a careful, conservative policy. Happily again, our exports are not chiefly of manufactures, but of food-stuffs and natural products. The upsetting of the import trade for a time at least may interfere with the drawing of some raw materials used in our manufacturing industries—such as the chemicals made almost exclusively by Germany—but our manufacturing has chiefly a home market. The prosperity of that home market is based mainly upon agricultural prosperity, and our position in that respect is bettered by the war. The paralyzing effect of war upon international finance must, of course, have the effect of tightening up money and credit in Canada, and of restricting business expansion for the time being. But assuredly a large part of the war scare depression is purely psychological, and will be lifted when the news from Europe is of a decisive victory by the allies. When the Kaiser's war machine is driven back, as it ultimately must be, the effect upon the public confidence will be immensely relieving. It may be that the present uncertainty marks the lowering of the darkest clouds on the horizon, and that the next week or two will bring the brightening rifts that pressage the silver dawn.
