Daily Hints For the Cook

LEMON PIE MADE WITH BREAD. Take one thick slice of bread, pour over one cup of cold water, let it stand 20 minutes. Beat smooth, add one cup of sugar, the rind and juice of one lemon, the yolks of two eggs and two tablespoons of melted butter. Mix well and bake in one crust. When done cover with a meringue made of the whites of the two eggs. Brown in the oven.

DELICIOUS CREAM PIE. One cup of sugar and 1/2 cup of butter creamed together; 2 eggs beaten very light; 1/2 cup of sweet milk, 2 cups of flour, and 1/2 pt. 1-1/2 teaspoons of baking powder or 1 teaspoon of soda. Bake in two rather deep, Washington pie pans.

BRITISH BYE-ELECTION

London, Nov. 27.—The bye-election at Bow and Bromley, brought about by the resignation of Lansbury, resulted as follows: Blair, Unionist, 4,012; Lansbury, suffragist, 3,291; Unionist majority, 721.

The figures at the last general election were: Lansbury, Labor, 4,315; Amery, Unionist, 3,422; labor majority, 893.

The Liberal party ran no candidate, advising their adherents to abstain from voting. The suffragettes worked hard for their candidate throughout the campaign. Lansbury resigned because he wanted a straight fight on the question of woman suffrage, but owing to many other issues which were introduced into the election, the result cannot be accepted as a reliable criterion of the views of the constituency regarding votes for women.

PLAN BIGGEST STORE IN CANADA

Montreal, Nov. 27.—Plans for what is said by its owners will be the largest store in Canada, were given out this morning by Scroggie Limited. The new establishment will cover eight acres of floor space, the site which cost \$1,500,000. It is on the corner of Beary and St. Catherine streets. There will be five miles of aisles in the building, which will be six stories in height. Work on the building will be begun at once and will not stop night or day until the building is completed on September 1, 1913.

MONEY WAS AT NINE PER CENT IN WALL STREET TODAY

New York, Nov. 27.—Gold shipments amounting to \$400,000 to Canada and San Francisco through the local subtreasury and direct shipments of currency to interior banks tended to stiffen the money market again today.

The opening rate was 8 per cent against yesterday closing at 3 per cent. The rate then fell to 8, but speedily went back to 9.

Clearing house banks have lost fully \$8,500,000 to the subtreasury on the week's movement. This drain may be offset in part by receipts from the interior, but nothing in the known movement of cash for the week justifies this inference.

TO ENTERTAIN CANADIANS

The members of the various boards of trade who will go to Europe on the Canadian trade mission early in the new year, are likely to have an enjoyable as well as a profitable trip. Arrangements are already being made for their entertainment on the other side and several intimations of festivities in their honor have been received.

A. M. Beck, editor-in-chief of the Canadian News, London, Eng., has written asking for the privilege of entertaining the delegates at a banquet which they are in London. The International Commercial Intelligence Bureau of Amsterdam has also written offering the use of its offices in various parts of Europe and promising co-operation. Lord Strathcona, through his secretary, has asked for further information regarding the time they will be in England, in order that he may make his plans accordingly.

Woman Cripple Gets Fortune

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., Nov. 27.—Miss Marion L. Covert, a cripple, will next Saturday receive \$150,000 left her by Gerald Thurston, a Chicago piano manufacturer, as the result of attention shown him more than twenty years ago, when she was six years old.

A CANADIAN PROBLEM

An extraordinary case that has come to the attention of the Associated Charities of Winnipeg shows in a very clear light some of the difficulties which are met with in assimilating the varied elements brought into Canada by immigration from the old world.

The Winnipeg Tribune tells the story of this particular case, showing that very few standards of morality exist among some of the immigrants, and that a radical change must be made before they are converted into desirable citizens. From a Ruthenian village in Galicia a man who had a wife and two children eloped to Canada with a woman who had a husband and one child. The pair came to Winnipeg eight years ago and lived as man and wife. They now have three children. Five years ago the woman's real husband left his little boy in charge of his grandparents and followed his wife to Winnipeg. Finding that she was still living with the other man he went away, and his whereabouts are unknown. Two years ago the eloping husband decided that he ought to do something for his wife and children in Galicia. He therefore sent them money and they came to Winnipeg. He took them to his own home and for nine months he and the two women and the children of both lived together in the same house. One day he deserted both families. His legal wife, who had come to Canada hoping to be reunited to her husband, was forced to put her two children in the Children's Home and go to work to support herself. Gradually she saved the sum of \$80. Meanwhile the man had come back to the other woman, to find that she was in most destitute circumstances. He had no money and went to his legal wife. Finding that she had \$80 saved he pretended that he wanted to furnish another home and borrowed the money. Instead of furnishing the home, however, he paid the debts of the other woman. Later he went to live on a farm near the city, leaving both women returning one day to the city to meet the eldest son of his Galician family, who had recently left the Home for the Friends, and took him, together with the eldest of the children born in Winnipeg, back to the farm. The woman who had originally eloped with him followed him to the farm, but later returned to the city, taking with her both children. Then the father returned. In the meantime his legal wife had become very ill. She is being looked after by the Associated Charities and the children of the other woman are in the Children's Home. The man has again disappeared.

On reading such a story as this we are perhaps prompted to speak somewhat harshly concerning these new Canadian citizens, but are they the only ones who deserve censure? Is it not a fact that in every city of Canada, even in St. John, there are little children who are not getting a fair start in life as these little Ruthenian children will get under the care of the Children's Aid Society of the city of Winnipeg? Of course this does not lessen the gravity of the problem of the immigrant. It ought to emphasize and bring very strongly home to the conscience of the Canadian people the necessity of setting up higher standards among our own people, in order that the newcomers may be more easily led to adopt the same standards and become good citizens.

SUGGESTION FROM ANTWERP

Rev. J. Hunter Boyd gave this paper an account yesterday of an interesting visit which he paid a few weeks ago to a moving picture house in Antwerp. He saw there 800 children from the schools spending the forenoon seeing a series of educational pictures thrown upon the screen. The school authorities of that city have contracted with the Cinematograph Company by which, twice a year, they put on a programme of this kind for the benefit of the children of the schools. Two days before the latter visit the picture house their teachers deal with the subjects which are to be treated in the pictures. The subjects are geographical, historical, or dealing with some other important branch of education and are of immense value to the children. Prizes are afterward given to the pupils who write the best essays on what they had seen. Thus the educational authorities of Antwerp, realizing that the moving picture house has come to stay, are doing their best to make it educational and of the most possible value. The moving picture machine is now used in some schools in the United States, and its use in that way is becoming more general.

A RADICAL PROPOSITION

The physicians of the state of Indiana are organizing for social betterment. They desire to secure a law which will practically make every physician a health officer, responsible to the authorities for the cleanliness of his district. School children, moreover, would be instructed under the proposed law as to things they should avoid to preserve mental and moral health, and the marriage of persons unsuited for that relation would be prevented. MRS. HETTY GREEN

Birthday Chat With the Richest Woman in the World

KNOWS NOT EXTENT OF WEALTH

Promises a Balancing of Books at New Year - Talks of Her Life, Her Religious Views and Women's Position

The New York Herald published an interview with Mrs. Hetty Green, "the world's richest woman," on her 75th birthday. In part the Herald said:

Colonel Edward H. R. Green, a strapping robust man in the prime of health, rode to his office yesterday in a high powered limousine automobile with soft cushions, while he let his poor, aged mother, Mrs. Hetty Green, walk. However, since a man who needed \$10,000 happened to select Mrs. Green as his mother-in-law, she has been a little skittish about "these new fangled things."

"You certainly are looking fine for a woman of seventy-seven years," said a reporter for the Herald who called upon her yesterday to inquire how she would celebrate the anniversary of her birthday.

"I'm not seventy-seven," quickly said that most remarkable woman, placing her hand on the reporter's arm, "I'll be seventy-eight to-morrow." She asked credit for overcoming a feminine frailty admitting her right age.

"Pardon this union I'm chewing," she continued, "but it's the finest thing in the world for health. Perhaps that's why I live so long. I had a big tenderloin steak for breakfast, with fried potatoes, a pot of tea and the top of a bottle of milk. I don't buy cream because it is twelve hours older than the milk. I just take off the top of the bottle of milk, set the rest in a cool place and use it for cooking."

"Is there anything besides onions that keeps you in such fine health?" "Well, I walk all I can. But, I was once poisoned up at the Chemical National Bank. Since then I haven't been where I was there at my office to collect three million nine hundred dollars that was due on a certain day, and there were a lot of papers to be signed, so I stayed to luncheon."

Thought She Was Going to Die "Well, there was about a dozen others at the table, set in the officers' room, and the funniest thing was that no one else but me was taken sick. I thought I was going to die. They called me here and he said I had no fever but a terrible inflammation, and he said I probably had ptomaine poisoning. But I collected the money all right, and since then I have not made my office at the Chemical National Bank."

"I just started this office down here to please Eddie. He's such a boy! He wanted to leave Texas and come to here and be with his dear old mother."

Mrs. Green was then referring to the office of the Westminster company, into which she had invited the Herald reporter. This company collects all the interest on Mrs. Green's vast holdings, and when she arrived there yesterday morning her chief clerk had a pile of bonds to be signed, a big desk, the contents of which required dipping. Alongside the bonds was a pair of long scissors, and in the corner a grindstone to keep the scissors sharp. It was explained that keen edges are required to continually cut coupons.

"Eddie has just come back from a trip," explained Mrs. Green, "and there is a lot of work to do. He's eyes indicate the pile of bonds. Just then 'Eddie' thrust his two hundred and sixty pounds into the room and said, perhaps petulantly: 'I'm in a hurry, Mom. You know we can't hinder the wheels of progress with interviews.'"

"How much are you worth now?" Mrs. Green asked. "I haven't the least idea," she said very frankly. She left little doubt as to the truth of her statement. "Can it be \$10,000,000, \$27,000,000 or \$100,000,000?" "I'm an old Quaker, and when I say I don't know what I am worth I mean that. You see, if I sell a piece of property in Chicago for \$200,000 I keep the money on deposit in the banks there. If I sell bonds in St. Louis for \$500,000 I keep the money with the bankers there. In that way the banks help me to dispose of what I don't want."

"Is there no way in which you can arrive at an approximate value of your wealth?" "Yes," I could take stock of what I have."

"Will you do that, or do you intend doing so?" "I had not intended doing so, but if you want me to I will. Mrs. Green's old dress was made with black silk lace, which she has worn many years, tottered

SENATE OF THE U. N. B.

Fredericton, N. Six hundred dollars was voted for instruments and equipment. The greater part of this amount is to be expended in the departments of civil, electrical and mechanical engineering. A committee composed of Judge Barry and Dr. W. C. Crockett of Fredericton, was appointed to consider the matter. The financial reports showed an expenditure of \$20,000 and a surplus of \$1,500 which will be more than taken up by salary increases. Dr. A. Pierre Crockett of St. John offered at least \$100 a year for five years to be completed for by the freshman class in Latin and Greek. The offer was accepted. Dr. Jones made his annual report and was authorized to secure the services of three outside lecturers to give lectures during the year before the engineering students.

"The order in council," he said, "was changed to synchronize with the election in Saskatchewan." "The action of the government was solely to influence the Saskatchewan election," said Hon. Frank Oliver.

"Does the member for Edmonton object to the action of the government in reducing the duty?" asked Mr. White.


"I object to the government restoring the duty in October after the election in Saskatchewan," said Mr. Oliver.

THE BANK MERGER

A Montreal despatch to J. M. Robinson & Sons quotes the Gazette of that city as saying today:—
"From present indications there will be no opposition to the plan of amalgamating with the Bank of Nova Scotia when the shareholders of the Bank of New Brunswick meet in St. John on December 11 to discuss the proposal. A few weeks ago there were reports that a considerable number of the New Brunswick shareholders were dissatisfied with the prospect of this bank losing its identity, and there was some speculation as to whether or not the proposed merger would secure the required seventy-five per cent. vote to make it law. Recent advices from St. John, however, state that this feeling, which was supposed to be mainly due to a misapprehension of the terms of amalgamation, had all blown over and that it was expected there would be no opposition to the proposal."

WINTERPORT NOTES

ALLEN TO THE PENITENTIARY

Two Years on Old Charge on Which Sentence Was Suspended

ALREADY IN JAIL

Reserved Case Asked For By His Counsel—Case of Greeks Over Several Fifty Dollar Notes

In the circuit court this morning, John Allen, who was previously allowed out on suspended sentence by Mr. Justice Barry, was sentenced by His Honor to serve two years in Dorchester Penitentiary.

This is an action to define on five promissory notes for \$50 each, and \$50 damages are claimed for the detention of the notes. It is alleged that the notes were stolen from the plaintiff, while the defendant says that he paid them and they are rightfully in his possession. The plaintiff and John Theodore were examined this morning. Hearing was resumed at 10 o'clock this afternoon.

D. Mullis, K. C., and Macrae, Sinclair & MacIsaac appeared for the plaintiff and R. M. Hargreaves, K. C., and J. A. Barry for the defendant.
