


DUTCHMAN, HIRAM WOODRUFF UP.

"The mellow, richly colored canvas is perhaps the earliest portrait of an American trotting horse of celebrity that has yet come to light. Mr. Wenrick obtained it fro Thomas Worth, the veteran artist whose caricature of men and horses made him famous haif a century ago. M Worth says it hung in the Lake House, a widely known resort for sportsmen, at Islip, L. I., long before the Civil Wa It portrays the renowned old time trotter with Hiram Woodruff on his back in the memorable performance against time which still stands as the best on record at three miles. It was on August 1, 1839, that Dutchman trotted in 7:32½ over the Bacon course, in the outskirts of what is now Hoboken, N. J.
