3rd. With one exception, the meetings for transacting the affairs of the church have been regularly held. We believe the Discipline is seasonably and impartially administered in the spirit of restoring love.

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(Note—Exception referred to was on account of severe ice storm.)

4th. As far as we know, Friends are in the practice of reading the Holy Scriptures daily in their families collectively, with time for reverent waiting upon the Lord with thanksgiving and prayer.

5th. We believe all our members are clear of the manufacture, sale or use of intoxicating liquors, except for purposes strictly medicinal.

(Note-One meeting reports, "With one exception as to use.")

6th. With few exceptions, Friends are just in their dealings and punctual in fulfilling their engagements.

7th. Two meetings report they have no trust funds. Their titles are duly recorded but one is disputed. One meeting reports a part of trust moneys properly invested in accordance with the directions of the donor. Some trust funds are not considered to be applied according to the directions of the donor, and the titles to some properties require attention.

XXVI. The meeting convened pursuant to adjournment. XXVII. P. W. Raidabaugh, of Chicago, addressed the meeting on the publishing interests of the Society of Friends in America, presenting the claims of the American Friend, and our Bible School publications. We direct this subject to the careful consideration of our members, and the officers of our Bible schools.

XXVIII. The Bible School Committee make their report and statistical statement, which are as-follows:

To the Yearly Meeting:

The Bible School Committee make the following report: We believe that on the whole there is an increased interest in our Bible School work. One more school has been opened during the year. Last year we had 1001 children enrolled, this year we have 1065, showing an increase of 64 children. Last year we had 478 adults enrolled, this year we have 492, showing an increase of 14 adults; total increase of adults and children being 78. We are glad there is an increased attendance on the part of the older ones as well as among the children, as we believe that in all cases it will help the work of our schools. As last year, the increased enrollment is principally in Yonge St. Quarter. We regret that in any case our schools are supported by entertainments. May the different meetings realize their full duty to their respective Bible Schools. We would encourage all schools if possible to have a mission collection, that our children and young people may constantly have the privilege of ministering to the needs of others. Our prayer is that during the coming year there may be a greater work done in our Bible Schools, and where there may have been lack in the past may there be great blessing.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE OF W. F. M. S.

Another year has passed and we again present the report of work done. It has been a year of varied experience to the workers in the mission field. The war which broke out between China and Japan early in the year brought with it a time of close testing to the Friends' Mission in Tokyo. However, through it all they have come, and the work has not been stopped in any way. Our Missionary, Gurney Binford, has pursued his work in the Sei-ai-Gakko (Boys' Training School) and his evening Bible class, beside teaching English in the Government Fisheries' School. Since New Year he has opened a school for poor children in which he is deeply interested and from which he hopes good results. This, with the Sunday School and Bible Class work, with meetings, has occupied his time. His monthly letters have been very interesting and are appreciated by our Auxiliaries.

The work at Mito is going on well. Kato San has moved his family there, while he still pursues his medical studies in Tokyo, and goes out there for every alternate Sunday. His wife is a very efficient worker, and keeps up the Sunday School and works among the people as a Bible-reader.

At the suggestion of J. Cosand, we have lately undertaken to pay the fees of Terao San at an Industrial School, so that she may fit herself for further usefulness.

The young man who held the scholarship in the Sei-ai-Gakko provided by the Pickering College Y P.S.C.E., left the school at the time of the dissatisfaction on account of our anti-war principles, and his place has been taken by another young man, Takase San, who is reported as a bright, energetic student. He helps Gurney Binford some in the school for poor children.

The prospects appear bright for the work the coming year, and we ask not only your hearty support financially, but your sympathy and earnest prayers on behalf of the workers.

We believe the interest in the work is being well sustained throughout our Auxiliaries at home.

The remaining five bands report a total membership of eighty-seven. On the whole, there seems to be a good degree of interest in mission work among these bands, and nearly all seem to promise more earnestness and faithfulness in the future.

Of the five bands, the one at Pelham seems to be a society of young people, hardly to be called a Junior Band.

REPORT OF THE PICKERING COLLEGE COMMITTEE.

To Canada Yearly Meeting:

Your College Committee present the result of the work of the past year with feelings of gratitude to the Lord for the evident blessing resting upon our institution.

Although in a period of business depression which has materially affected similar schools financially, we are able to report a larger attendance, as well as a much larger surplus on current account, than that of the previous year. It is further gratifying to note that the Government examinations of 1894, for which twenty-two of our students wrote, passed sixteen, a percentage far above the average of similar institutions in Ontario.

It gladdens our hearts that we can also state that the religious influence has not been abated in the school, many students having testified to spiritual blessings received.

We present herewith the financial report of the Principal, which shows a gain on running current account of \$524.07. It will also be noted that the surplus now in current account is \$1097.79, from which, deducting Trustees' acct. debit shown in current books, shows a net surplus of \$793.60, as against College overdraft with Albert S. Rogers,

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n aid of \$667.50, ames will

ommittee our last of \$956.96, so that in effect the net floating debt to-day against the College is only \$163.36, thus showing the College financial position improved since last year by \$640.06, besides having paid for \$501.13 of improvements, a total increase of capital account of \$1141.19, made

up of current account gain and of subscriptions.

Some expenditure on capital account has been necessary. The Committee were ordered by the Township Engineer to continue a large tile drain across the College grounds and beyond to outlet some distance below. This affords complete sanitary drainage to the buildings. Connections were also laid which now thoroughly drain the lower College grounds. Difficulty was experienced during autumn and winter by scarcity of water, compelling us to expend a considerable amount in drilling for further supply. It was a great relief to the Committee when this was finally secured.

Dear Sir,—I have read the discipline of the Society of Friends, published in 1881, also the Minutes of the Canada Yearly Meeting of Friends, published in 1894, respecting the Solemnization of Marriage. I have also carefully gone over the proposed changes respecting the forms and procedure in the solemnization of marriage with you, and in no respect do these changes affect or in any way interfere with any doctrine held by the Society of Friends. All the changes proposed relate only to the outward forms to be observed in the ceremony, and declarations required to satisfy the Society that the persons proposing to be married are without impediment preventing them entering into that state. These changes the Yearly Meeting has clearly power to make, and no further legislation will be necessary to make them valid, they being clearly within the competency of the Yearly Meeting to deal with.

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CHANGE OF DISCIPLINE.

The important subject of revising that portion of our Discipline of 1880, relating to the solemnization of marriage, having been under consideration by the Yearly Meeting of the religious Society of Friends, held at Pickering in the year of our Lord 1894, and the following proposed changes having been discussed in the said Yearly Meeting and having been published by the authority of the said Meeting, in the Minutes, on pages 38 and 39,

And whereas the said Minutes were distributed throughout the various subordinate meetings belonging to the Canada Yearly Meeting, thereby affording the members of the said Meeting an opportunity of forming judgment as to the advisability of adopting or rejecting the proposed change; be it therefore resolved by this Yearly Meeting convened, that—

Marriage being a divine ordinance and a solemn engagement for life, is not to be entered into unadvisedly or lightly, but discreetly, soberly and in fear of the Lord, duly considering the relative duties of husband and wife.

Marriage implies union as well in spiritual as in temporal concerns. If the parties differ in religious belief, they stand disunited in the main point, even in that which should increase and confirm their mutual happiness and render them blessings to each other.

Those who contemplate any procedure with a view to marriage, should seek for Divine guidance, and such as have parents or guardians should early acquaint them with their intentions and seek their counsel.

In order to prevent marriages between persons of too near kin, no marriages between first cousins or persons of equally near relationship shall be permitted amongst us.

Monthly Meetings are not to permit proposals of marriage to be made in them sooner than a year after the decease of a former husband or wife.

No charge of misconduct shall be brought forward against any person at the time of proposing his or her marriage, or during its progress in meeting.

G., propose taking each other in marriage, which we hereby offer for the approbation of Friends, and we, severally and solemnly, declare that we believe there is no affinity, consanguinity, pre-contract, or any other legal impediment to bar or hinder the solemnization of our marriage; and we severally make this solemn declaration, conscientiously believing it to be true and knowing that it is of the same force and effect as if made under oath and by virtue of the Canada Evidence Act of 1893.

This declaration to be made in the presence of two members of the Society of Friends, or the clerk of the Monthly Meeting, who shall sign their names as witnesses.

Upon receipt of such notice, the clerk shall enter the same in the Minute Book of the Monthly Meeting, and the Meeting shall thereupon immediately give or refuse its consent, and the clerk of the Meeting shall forthwith notify the proposed contracting parties of such consent or refusal.

If no reason appears to prevent it, their said intention, with the consent of parents and guardians, should be recorded. The consent (unless the Meeting should judge it to be unnecessary) should be either personally expressed, or sent to the Monthly Meeting in writing, and it is advised that it be presented to the Monthly Meeting in which the proposal of marriage is first introduced. If, however, the contracting parties belong to different Monthly Meetings, it is advised that their proposals and declaration be sent to both Meetings, they having the right of choice, with the approbation of the Meetings aforesaid, to select where and when the marriage shall take place (except on First Day), and the clerk of the said Meeting (or some one appointed by the Meeting as clerk for the day) shall be in attendance, and every clerk duly appointed by the said Meeting shall perform the duties imposed by the Act, respecting the registration of births, marriages and deaths, upon a minister and clergyman, and shall with regard to such marriage to be performed by the clerk or secretary of the Meeting at which the marriage is solemnized. Statutes of Ontario, 1891, Chapter 23, Section 20.

Our members may be united in marriage, if they so prefer or elect,

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by any or either of our ministers of the Gospel, who are acknowledged o who may hereinafter be acknowledged as such by the Discipline of our Society, and such ministers are authorized to solemnize marriages as provided for ministers of the Gospel in other denominations in and by Chapter 23 in the Revised Statutes of Ontario, 1891, entitled "An Act to further amend the Law respecting the Solemnizations of Marriages," by using the following form:

You, AB. (taking the hand of C.D.) do solemnly declare that you take this Friend, C.D., to be your wife, promising through Divine assistance to be unto her a faithful and loving husband until separated

by death.—I do.

You, C.D., do solemnly declare that you take this Friend, A.B., to be your husband, promising through Divine assistance to be unto him a faithful and loving wife until separated by death.——I do.

Marriages should be accomplished with solemnity befitting the occasion, and the parties and all concerned are to exercise due care that all conduct themselves as becomes our religious profession. Friends are advised to avoid making expensive entertainment and inviting large companies.

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LVI. We direct the Treasurer to pay the expenses of the Committee on Solemnization of Marriages.

LVII. The Memorial of our late dear Friend, Mary Jane Bowerman, has been read. It has awakened glad remembrances of her devoted life. We direct that it be printed in the Minutes.

A TESTIMONY OF WEST LAKE MONTHLY MEETING CONCERNING MARY JANE BOWERMAN, DECEASED.

Mary Jane Bowerman, the subject of this sketch, was born at Elginburg, Ont., 5th mo. 5th, 1834. She was the daughter of Philip and Elizabeth Brewer, members of Kingston Monthly Meeting. In 1855 she was united in marriage with Charles G. Bowerman, of West Lake Monthly Meeting.

Being blessed with godly parents, she was early in life brought to a knowledge of sins forgiven, but through not fully understanding her privileges as a Christian, she sometimes fell into doubt and discouragement; but in middle life she was brought to a full knowledge of the truth as it is in Christ Jesus.

She occupied the station of Elder for a number of years, and her voice was frequently heard in testimony or prayer in the public assembly, but her special mission was to the poor and needy wherever found, and none were ever left to suffer where her hand or purse was able to help, and with the help always went some word of Christian counsel or admonition.

All through her last illness she manifested the same desire for the welfare of others by giving counsel to Christians to be faithful to the Lord, and in messages of warning to the careless.

In giving directions concerning her funeral, she requested that the speakers sound the word of warning to the people, and that a badge be placed upon her breast bearing these words: "Be ye also ready." Her care for the needy was also shown in the desire that the expenses be moderate, and the money often needlessly expended be given to the deserving poor.

We feel that it might be said of our dear sister as of Dorcas of old:

"This woman was full of good works and almsdeeds," and we believe when she went from us 4th mo. 7th, 1895, she was received by Him who said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these My brethren ye have done it unto Me."

A TESTIMONY OF WEST LAKE MONTHLY MEETING CONCERNING ALEXANDER DERBYSHIRE, DECEASED.

We record the death of our dear friend, Alexander Derbyshire, a member and minister of West Lake Quarterly Meeting. He was born near Farmersville, Leeds County. His parents were Daniel and Mercy Derbyshire, the latter an elder in the Society of Friends. Early in life he was made sensible of the visitations of a Saviour's love, was converted at the age of 21, and soon after united in membership with Friends. Yet, like the Apostle, found a law in his members warring against the law of his mind, sometimes bringing him into captivity. But when convinced of error he was ready to obey the injunction: "Confess your faults one to another." For years he labored under physical weakness; at times brought near the gates of death. In the year 1883, his ministry was acknowledged. The calls for service for the Master were mostly within the limits of his own Yearly Meeting. He frequently visited those in remote localities, where his labors were crowned with abundant blessing. We mention the following for the encouragement of all to faithfulness: In the last meeting appointed by him, two persons were converted. Six weeks later one of these was called from works to reward. He bore his last protracted illness with much patience, saying he had no desire to recover unless the Lord had further service for him. Was often heard to exclaim, "Praise the Lord! He comfort to triumph of lof his age.

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Lord! He is precious to my soul." He frequently gave words of comfort to those around him. It may be truly said of him: In the triumph of living faith he has fallen asleep in Jesus, in the 69th year of his age.

"Blessed are the dead that die in the Lord."

LXII. The report of the Peace Association of Friends in America has been read and directed to be printed in the Minutes, so that our absent members may have the benefit and become interested in this branch of church work.

REPORT OF THE PEACE ASSOCIATION OF FRIENDS.

The Christian Arbitrator and Messenger of Peace ceased to be published by the Association at the close of the year 1894, after having been issued regularly every month for twenty-four years. This step was taken mainly on account of the scarcity of funds. The subscriptions and advertising never paid the actual expenses of the paper, partly because it was sent free to Ministers of the Gospel, Y. M. C. A. Reading Rooms, College Reading Rooms, and other public institutions. The paper is now published by John B. Wood, of Philadelphia, Pa., on his own account.

Four hundred and fifty-three thousand and seven hundred pages of Tracts have gone out from this office the past year, against one hundred and seventeen thousand and nine hundred the previous year. A few bound volumes have also been sent out. This literature has been widely

scattered over the country.

William G. Hubbard, President of the Association, has been in the Lecture field most of the year. These lectures have covered a wide field East, West, North and South. They have been mainly before large audiences of College and High School students and officers, just the class that it seems most desirable to reach. He reports that he and his lectures have been well received everywhere, and in many instances his strongest utterances for peace have been heartily cheered by the students. I judge that a good impression has been made not only from his reports but from numerous letters from students speaking highly of the lectures, and desiring Peace literature that they may further investigate the subject. It seems very desirable that as many as possible of our schools and colleges should be reached by our lectures and literature now, when military drill has been introduced into many of them, and influential men are working with a zeal worthy of a better cause to introduce this war-breeding device into all our seats of learning, and even some who claim to be teachers of the religion of Jesus favor the movement and are organizing "Boys' Brigades" in Sabbath Schools and Churches. A greater delusion could hardly prevail than that this military paraphernalia could help the boys to admire and love the Prince of Peace. This military movement among the boys is doubtless one of Satan's stratagems to counteract the growing sentiment against war, which is spreading throughout the civilized world.

Eleven essays were written and sent in, competing for the three prizes offered by the Association a year ago, on the topic, "War Inconsistent with the Teaching and Spirit of Christ, and hence Unwise and Unnecessary." The judges gave the essays a careful examination and gave the First prize to a student of Oberlin College, Ohio, the Second to a student of Penn College, lowa, and the Third to a student of Guilford College, N. C.

One of the hopeful signs of the progress of peace principles is the fact that recently a Member of the British Parliament came to this country with a petition from 354 Members of that Body to our Govern-

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ples is the me to this our Government to enter into a treaty with their Government, to settle all difficulties that may arise between the two countries for the next twentyfive years, that cannot be settled by diplomacy, by peaceful arbitration. The example of such an agreement between these two great Englishspeaking nations would be very great and salutary upon surrounding nations.

Josiah W. Leeds, of Philadelphia, has recently made to our Association a donation of 500 copies of his Tract entitled "The Dress Parade at West Point," and 500 copies of another Tract entitled "Ought Christians to Engage in War?"

Tamar T. Hill, of Richmond, Ind., who deceased on the 5th of Twelfth Mo. last, bequeathed \$500 to the Peace Association of Friends in America.

There is a pretty fair stock of Peace literature in the office here at Richmond awaiting the orders of those who desire to read or circulate.

The Peace Department of the W. C. T. U. is doing effective work in many localities.

The war in the East between China and Japan still continues its bloody and barbarous work. But let us hope that its end is near.

Commending the work of the Peace Association to the favorable consideration of the Yearly Meetings, and earnestly praying the Lord's blessing upon their labors, and that He will hasten the day when nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more.

Rogers our Committee on Printing, and we direct that 800 copies of the Yearly Meeting's Minutes be printed, 1000 blanks for Bible School reports; 1000 blanks for Statistical reports; 700 slips for change in Discipline. They are directed to draw on the Treasurer for cost.

LXVI. The Committee on Correspondence presents the following report, with draft of Epistles. These have been read, and the Clerk is directed to sign and forward a copy to each of the Yearly Meetings with which we correspond.

The Committee on Correspondence find nothing in the Epistles to claim special and separate notice. We therefore offer two Epistles—one to the Women's Meetings that have sent letters, and one to all the Yearly Meetings.

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APPENDIX.

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HELD IN LONDON,

By adjournments from 22nd of Fifth Month to the 30th of the same, inclusive, 1895.

To the Quarterly and Monthly Meetings of Friends in Great Britain, Ireland, and elsewhere:

Dear Friends,—Met together in our annual gathering representing our religious Society in this country, we have been engaged in prayerful deliberation on its varied interests, and we desire that you may be sharers in that which has occupied our thoughts.

A striking feature of our meeting has been the presence of Friends from five of the Yearly Meetings on the American continent, as well as from Japan, China, India, Madagascar, and Mount Lebanon; to all of whom we have been glad to extend a cordial welcome. We have addressed an Epistle to our Friends in Ireland and to those in America with whom we have usually corresponded, and also to the newly constituted Yearly Meeting of Friends in California.

The need for renewed effort in the cause of the slave has been brought home to us by the disclosure of cruelties practised in certain districts of Africa which are under British control. We earnestly commend this great cause to the continued sympathy and support of our members.

We have been deeply interested in receiving a report from two of our members who were appointed, on our behalf, to present an address of congratulation

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congratulation to the Emperor of Russia on his accession to the throne, containing also a plea for the exercise of liberty of conscience.

We have at this time reviewed our position as a Christian Church in reference to the traffic in opium carried on by the Indian Government. After very careful consideration of all that has been laid before us in the light of fresh evidence as to facts, we are brought to the conclusion that nothing has transpired to shake our deep-rooted conviction that the trade in this drug for other than medicinal purposes is morally indefensible; and that no questions of expediency or of supposed political necessity can justify us in giving the least countenance to that which is the cause of so much evil to multitudes of our fellow-men. We therefore desire that the efforts of our own members and of our fellow Christians everywhere, to bring about the entire suppression of the opium traffic, may be prosecuted with unabated vigor, until the overthrow of this iniquitous system is complete.

We have been favored, from sitting to sitting in this Yearly Meeting, with a delightful sense of the Lord's presence, uniting us together in our service for the well-being of the Church. We affectionately salute all our dear Friends in their different localities in the love of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. "Grace and peace be multiplied unto you

through the knowledge of God and of Jesus our Lord."

The disciples of Christ can never lay aside their solemn responsibility as His witnesses. They must never forget His own words, in prayer to The Father, "As Thou has sent . into the world, even so have I also sent them into the world." Their witness, if faithful, must be complete and comprehensive; a witness to Him in all His offices, without compromise and without human addition. We have no other Saviour. Our faith must rest on Him and on Him alone as the foundation on which we build. The Son of Go and the Son of Man, He died on the le rose from the dead, and lives as cross, "the just for the unjust." the exalted Head of His Church. When the ascended Saviour appeared to His Apostle in the Isle of Patmos, He was pleased to reveal Himself in these memorable words: "I am He that liveth and was dead, and behold I am alive for evermore." As the heart is yielded to God, and and the work of regeneration is accomplished, the new life will bring forth its appropriate fruit. The words of our Lord will receive their fulfilment: "Because I live, ye shall live also." The utterance of the Apostle will not then seem strange: "The life which I now live in the

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two of our address of flesh, I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me."

The work of the Holy Spirit is the all-sufficient provision for the communication to man of the grace which God bestows through Jesus Christ. This communication is made directly to the spirit of man, often in connection with "the Holy Scriptures, which are able to make wise unto salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus". It needs no channel of sacerdotal ordination or of ritual ceremonial, but flows freely to all who will receive it immediately from that Spirit who prefers, "before all temples, the upright heart and pure." Hence our simple worship; our ministry open to all whom the Lord qualifies, whether men or women; our unadorned meeting-houses; our silent waiting upon God.

We must remember that our practices in these respects are the result of principles which we regard as essential, and are not arbitrary plans of our own. It is therefore more important to keep these principles steadily in view, than too anxiously to discuss the precise methods which may be adopted. Let all our meetings be held in the power of God, and let our ministers speak under the anointing of the Holy Spirit, not as teachers only, but as those who are entrusted with messages to the souls of men, that all may be done in the heavenly order and wisdom.

We turn with loving interest to the children and young people of our religious Society. To you, dear children, we send a special message We want you to think of the love of Jesus; how for you He became a little child; how He gave Himself for you when He died upon the cross; and how He asks you to let Him come by His Spirit into your hearts that He may be your own loving Saviour and Friend. The children of Jerusalem once welcomed Him to the temple with words of gladness; will you not welcome Him now into your hearts? Your life is like a boat upon the sea; you cannot guide it safely yourselves, for you know not the dangers and difficulties that may be in your course. Jesus knows them all; and if you ask Him, He will come into your little boat to guide it safely all the way. How happy are the children who have Him with them every hour. We are glad to know that many of you have this joy. We want you ALL to have it.

Dear young people, we greatly rejoice in the evidence, which so many of you are giving, of a desire to live not unto yourselves, but unto Him who died for of Christic foreign mis allegiance those who would appeared in the calling of Gare entirely there may home to the

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who died for you and rose again. Many of you are engaged in works of Christian love at home; others have devoted themselves for the foreign missi n field. We bid all who are in any way manifesting their allegiance to their Lord, God-speed in their labors. And if there be those who have not yet yielded themselves fully to God, to such we would appeal in tender interest, beseeching them to remember the high calling of God in Christ Jesus, and the rich inheritance of those who are entirely consecrated to Him. Nor do we appeal to the young alone. There may be those in middle or even advanced in life, who need to take home to themselves these solemn thoughts.

It is not only in our hours of worship, or in what are usually called religious duties, that the Christian is to show on whose side he is. The father and mother in the home, the man of business in his intercourse with his customers and his servants, the professional man with his clients, the workman with his fellow-workmen, are all alike called to exhibit the Christian character and conduct. Nor will the guidance of the Holy spirit, so necessary in the service of the Church, be withheld from those who seek it in the every-day duties of life, bringing the whole mind and temper into harmony with the will of God. If men in their relations one with another were under this Divine control, we cannot but believe, that the social and industrial difficulties which inflict so much injury upon our country, and which at times bring disgrace upon our civilization, would find their true solution.

Parents have been reminded of the importance of cultivating uninterrupted freedom between themselves and their children, thus keeping the way open for natural and easy intercourse, not only on matters of ordinary life, but on those also which relate to the highest interests. To this end fathers have been encouraged not to allow the pressure of business engagements, to prevent their maintaining frequent correspondence with their absent children.

We would also encourage those who are fathers and mothers in the Church to be faithful in handing the word in season, in conversation or by letter, especially to the young. Such manifestations of personal interest have often been instrumental in leading souls to Christ as their Saviour, and in helping the timid or the wavering.

In reviewing the general condition of our religious Society, we would acknowledge with deep thankfulness the mercy and loving-kindness of the Lord, and the many signs of spiritual life amongst us. With our

hearts filled with praise, animated with fresh courage, we appropriate the prayer of the Apostle for the early Church, "Now the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, that ye may abound in hope through the power of the Holy Ghost."
