task of undoing the atrocious wrong perpetrated by the gerrymanders of 1892 and 1893, and this had filled them with dread. The Bill contemplates only one change in New Brunswick, by which St. John city and county are divided into two constituencies, each returning one member. Nova Scotia is left untouched.

There are two or three changes in Quebec; but the principal effect of the Bill will apply to Ontario. It is simply stipulated that the constituencies so scientifically carved in the two years alluded to, so as to give the Grits and make Conservatives safe, shall revert to their original county boundaries.

It is about time that the policy of filling up such important light stations as that at the entrance to the Miramichi in second-hand gear was abandoned by the government. Everyone on board of vessels that enter this port will continue to be reminded that the Ottawa authorities do not consider it of sufficient importance to justify them in providing it with a properly constructed lightship.

Mr. Mulock has given notice of a bill regarding the representation of the House of Commons. Mining Enterprises. MONDAY, May 17.—A party of five mining engineers and representatives of American capitalists arrived here this afternoon from the United States to look over coal, copper and iron properties in the Miramichi and Nova Scotia with a view to the organization of a company with a large capital for the development of mining properties, the party consisting of Mr. Magford of New York, J. W. Cresser of Detroit, Mr. Martin of Cleveland, R. Ditt of Boston, Major Ostin of New York, and J. R. McDonald. The latter has been in the province for some months prospecting. This party goes to Albert county tomorrow to inspect the Carmel coal field, and also to look over copper and iron property at Point Wolfe. Mr. Lodge, who has been working for some years interesting American capitalists in New Brunswick mining enterprises, has the party in charge and the prospects are good for the organization of a company and the development of mining properties in Albert and other parts of the province.

The Pilots' Dilemma. In consequence of the objections of the pilots of the Miramichi to the new regulations advised by the commissioners approved by the governor-general in council, which latter have been already published in the ADVANCE, all the pilots of the port have tendered their resignations to the commissioners, the "round robin" in the hands of the secretary, Col. R. R. Cell. The commissioners were endeavoring to get a pilot to take the barque Mark Twain to sea from Newcastle yesterday, requesting the several pilots in turn to do so, but they all refused. One is reported to have given the commissioners who met and accepted him "the glass eye and marble heart" by refusing even to stop and speak to them as he passed; others said plainly that they refused to do duty under the recently gazetted regulations.

Were they Drowned, after all? THE ADVANCE published on Monday recently the circumstances of a supposed drowning, a double drowning near North Sydney, C. B. I. is now believed by many that it was a runaway case instead of one of drowning, as the situation is the ultimate outcome of the matter.
