IT WORKS BOTH WAYS.

The Prince Edward Island speech from the throne makes proud mention of the fact that the value of the crop of that province has doubled in ten years. As the population has remained constant or decreased, it would appear that the average income of the people has increased one hundred per cent. This looks like prosperity. On the other hand it is certain that a large part of this gain is in price and not quality. Now the farmer is the largest consumer of his own produce, and from this part of his crop he gets no benefit from the increased value. He gets benefit from the higher price of his surplus crop, unless he has to spend these proceeds in buying supplies at prices equally enhanced. The man who would be laying up money from his surplus crop when prices were low would lay up more now. He who just made both ends meet with low prices would be in the same position now if merchandise has increased in price in the same proportion as farm produce. He who does not raise quite enough to pay for his supplies is worse off with high prices than with low. But as a matter of fact prices have not doubled in ten years, and farm produce, as retailed in the shops, has advanced in price more than other commodities.

The effect of higher prices on the individual family is thus various. But we learn that it is inconsistent to rejoice over the increased value of the produce of a province, and at the same time to mourn over the increased cost of living.

And Its Keeping Qualities

SOME people find it necessary to buy a considerable quantity of flour at one time—sufficient to last for a long period. Naturally they are anxious to procure a flour of the kind best adapted to lengthy storage.



Anti-Tuberculosis Association Arrange To Have Patients Treated Free Of Charge At Board Of Health Rooms.

In Capital Recently — Old **Burial Ground Location Now**


Final arrangements have been made for the opening of the dispensary in the Board of Health rooms, Princess street, at 4 o'clock. Thursday afternoon, under the auspices of the St. John Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis.

Dr. Stewart Skinner will attend and can be consulted by any tuberculosis patient who has not secured the services of a regular physician, or any persons who suspect they have a trace of tuberculosis in their system and wish to have a diagnosis made. Advice will be given free and literature telling how cases should be treated to prevent contagion will be handed out by the Board of Health.

The patented sputum cups which are to he supplied by the Board of Health have arrived and are an ingenious contrivance. A single piece of waterproof paper is folded up into a square box with a flap for a cover. These may be used during the day and night and burned the mext morning, destroying every germ of the disease.


