## OPENING OF NEW STORES

The front is of Milton Buff Pressed Brick and cut stone trimmings. The ground floor which will be the main store is beautifully finished inside in dark oak finish. ## BRAINY WORKERS

Working Shoemakers, Chimney Sweepers, Trimmer Men, and Seamstresses Are Among the Most Learned.

Genius like murder, will out, and the history of modern literature provides us with some striking examples of men and women who, although humbly born and denied by circumstances any educational advantages, have given to the world some remarkable literary works. At the present time, for instance, the compilers of the great Oxford English Dictionary are deriving much help in their work from a Concordance of the words of Thomas Kyd, a learned literary man and dramatist of the sixteenth century, which has been compiled by Mr. Charles Crawford, a London railway clerk.

Mr. Crawford is a great authority on Elizabethan English, and published his Concordance five years ago. His knowledge of words has been acquired through close study, and is certainly extraordinary, for often when experts have elected, without investigation, that such and such a word or phrase occurs only in certain writers, or does not appear in certain authors, Mr. Crawford has produced abundant evidence showing the statement to be incorrect.

### The Shoemaker Historian

An even more remarkable work than Mr. Crawford's Concordance, however, was that compiled by John Mackintosh, LL.D., who died of Aberdeenshire four years ago. Although Mackintosh was a shoemaker by trade, he was one of the most notable personalities that the North Country has of recent times produced, and his "History of Civilization in Scotland," in four big volumes, has been described as one of the most complete histories of Scotland ever written.

It is only a few weeks ago that the University Extension Board appointed Mr. Walter Hunt lecturer on sociology. Mr. Hunt has had an amazing career. He started life as a sailor, spent some time in the fire brigade, and then set up as a chimney sweep at Streatham. He then decided to attend the Robert Browning Settlement in Walworth, and in time was led to write a book about the question, "Are we a declining race?" which attracted much attention among critics. Mr. Hunt's successful writings on race deterioration, involving as they did an immense amount of research work, are the more remarkable when one considers that his calling took him out at four o'clock in the morning. Most of his study was done at night time, and he confided in an interview a little while ago that he found no time to read anything but works on science and history. "Life is too short to waste time in reading fiction," he said.

It might be mentioned that London also possesses a linguistic treasure in the person of Mr. Richard Hobdell, of London, who is employed by the London County Council as a pointman on the car system. Mr. Hobdell has a perfect knowledge of Arabic and Sanskrit, and has just finished translating a book from Sanskrit into English. Hobdell, who was with Lord Roberts on the famous march from Kabul to Kandahar, has devoted much of his leisure time since leaving the Army to the study of languages—a study of which he has always been very fond.

The literary sensation of last year was a book, "Marie Claire," written by a Parisian seamstress, Marguerite Audoux, who worked as a dressmaker in one small room on the sixth floor of a house in Paris. The story won a prize of \$1000 and royalties—a prize given every year by what is known as the Goncourt Academy for the best novel of the year. It took her a great stress ten years to write her book. "I did not write it to be published," she said, during the course of an interview, as she sat in her little workroom. "It is just my life. And it is because Marguerite Audoux told the story of her life in plain, simple language that she scored such a literary success."

## A CONTRADICTION

The position of the fox is a curious one—he exists solely by reason of persecution. Once let humanitarians step in and put an end to the cruel treatment of foxes, and he must come to exist.

At present a huge sum is spent every year for the apparent purpose of exterminating canis vulpes, yet an industry is raised by a single desire to see that the fox does not exist. A fox is a victim, yet he is more carefully protected than most game, and, save in the hunting season, his person is sacred.

True the naturalist, interested in one of the last wild beasts existing in England, tries to make out as good a case for him as he can. He points out with perfect truth that foxes kill rats, when they come across them, and that they eat worms and beetles.

## Clerical President; Socialist Vice-Pres.

Berlin, Feb. 9.—Dr. Peter Spahn, the leader of the Clerical Party, part was elected today president of the Reichstag, defeating August Bebel the leader of the Socialist party, by 196 votes to 175.

Philip Scheidemann, a Socialist, was elected vice-president of the house, defeating the Conservative candidate, Hermann Christian Dietrich, by 188 to 174.

Dr. Hermann S. Pasche, the national liberal leader, was chosen second vice-president of the Reichstag.

## Premier Flemming at Gagetown Banquet.

Tells of Plans to Try to Get More Families in Province.

Gagetown, B. F., 8.—More than a hundred and sixty people attended the banquet in honor of Premier Fleming, Mr. S. L. Peters was chairman and Mr. J. R. Dunn vice-chairman. Mr. Peters read a letter from Hon. Mr. Hasen in which he regretted his inability to attend. When Mr. Fleming rose to speak, he was greeted with loud and continued applause. He said he believed that the Valley Railway would be a great factor in the development of the province. But the government intended to acquire the deserted farms and improve them, selling them to settlers at cost. These farms would be in condition to produce a crop the first year and they will be sold to the settler at an initial cost of 25 per cent. of the whole, with the balance payable in ten equal instalments with 5 per cent. interest. This would be quite independent of a plan which would be worked out in conjunction with the Canadian Pacific Railway for assisting worthy immigrants into the province. Then there was another plan to assist immigrants already here to bring their families out.

### W. M. F. BUCK

Wm. F. Buck, a native of Newcastle, and later a resident of Moncton and an employee of the I. R. C., who afterwards became Superintendent of motive power on the Atchafalpa, Topeka and Santa Fe railway, died on the 31st ult., while being carried by a special train to Los Angeles from the hospital at Albuquerque, from an attack of tonsillitis.

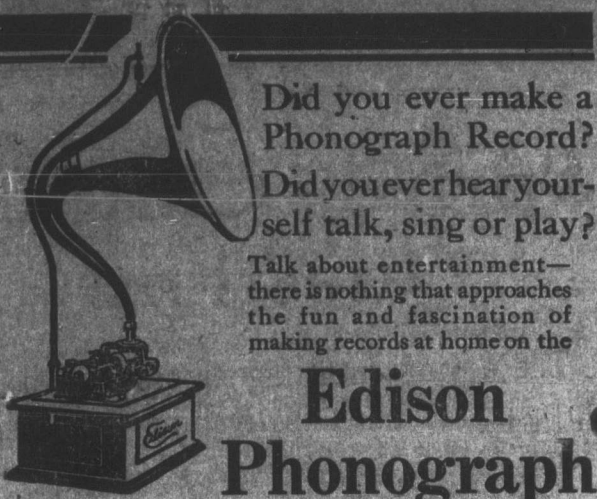

## MORRISSY SUPPORTERS MEET.

**Elect Parish Officers, Appoint Delegates and Discuss the Political Situation**  
—President and Secretary Absent

At a meeting of Local Government Supporters in Newcastle Tuesday, Hon. Allan Ritchie was elected Parish President; Aldermen Charles Sargeant, Vice President; Clare P. McCabe, Secretary; and Charles J. Morrissey, Denis P. Doyle, J. V. Creighton, Aldermen Samuel A. Russell and A. C. Allan, additional members of Executive.

Following were chosen delegates to tomorrow afternoon County Convention—Hon. Allan Ritchie, Ald. Sargeant, Wm. L. Durick, D. P. Doyle, Chas. J. Morrissey, Edward Hickey, J. Mitchell Falconer, Timothy W. Crocker, John Robinson, Jr., Dr. Desmard, Eugene Connolly and Andrew McCabe.

In the absence of President John Clark and Secretary W. H. Belyea, who had called the meeting, J. D. Creighton presided with Geo. McDade, secretary pro tem.

Mr. Creighton said that while, as a Conservative, he had once thought that a straight Conservative ticket would be better, he now thoroughly agreed with Premier Fleming that it would be better to continue the coalition policy of the Hon. J. D. Hazen.

Liberals and Conservatives should unite in support of the best men that could be obtained as candidates. Delegates were then appointed.

The chairman then called upon W. B. Dickson, M. P. P., who was present.

Mr. Dickson said that he had been proud to sit in the House under the leadership of Mr. Hazen and he considered that the new premier, Hon. J. K. Fleming was Mr. Hazen's equal in ability and integrity and was a splendid leader. No provincial government in his recollection had given the province such a good administration as the present one. It had fulfilled all its promises. In regard to the rumors of dissatisfaction with the Coalition idea in this County he would say that, as Coalition had been laid down by Premier Fleming as his policy, no loyal follower of the leader should attempt to dictate to him in the matter. He hoped that the outcome of the Convention on the 15th would be the brushing away of all the little difficulties that were disturbing the politics of the County.

Hon. John Morrissey said he very much regretted some feeling in Newcastle and Chatham concerning the ticket to be chosen in the interests of the Local Government. He believed, with Mr. Dickson, that when the leader of the party says down a program it should be followed. The friction seemed to be caused by the fact that he (Morrissey)—a Grit—was in the Government. But why were some gentlemen should object to him now more than four years ago he could not tell. His actions had, ever since he became a member been to strengthen his leader, first Hon. Mr. Hazen and now Mr. Fleming. Nothing would be gained by dividing in provincial politics on federal party lines. He thought the friction would amount to very little and that the candidates chosen would most likely be three of the old ticket and one new man. The interests of this County were greater than the matter of party politics. His advice to the people was not to swap horses while crossing a stream. Even should Northumberland go opposition the Fleming Government would be handsomely sustained by the province. And it means much to Northumberland to have a member in the Government, with its vast number interests to protect.

Officers were then elected, and on motion of Geo. McDade, Premier Fleming was chosen Honorary President and Hon. John Morrissey, Honorary Vice President.

Hon. Allan Ritchie then addressed the meeting. He was, he said, more of a worker than a talker. He was in full accord with the government policy and would do all he could to support it.

J. D. Creighton, referring again to the question of Coalition, said that that policy had been a success and was necessary to continued success. It would not be wise to read such Liberal supporters as the St. John Globe and Chatham

Commercial out of the party. Votes of thanks were tendered J. D. Creighton, Geo. McDade and W. B. Dickson, to which each suitably replied.

Mr. Dickson said that on looking carefully over the province he felt sure the Fleming government would regain the four seats of Westmoreland, carry the entire St. John valley, lose nothing but rather gain in the north, and go back with a bigger majority than in 1908. Ex-premier Robinson had seen the storm coming in Westmoreland and had retired.

## CHINESE EMPEROR

### ABDICATES

China Now a Nominal Republic.

Royal Family Fare Well in the Settlement.

Peking, Feb. 12.—The Imperial family abdicated the throne today, consenting to the establishment of a republic. The Royal family and nobility are guaranteed protection, and the use of their titles and property; Chinese, Manchus, Mongols, Tibetans and the Mohammedan tribes are placed upon an equal footing and religious liberty is guaranteed.

The legations consider that the first phase of the revolution has been concluded, but they fear that the second may be more disastrous.

The legations will deal unofficially with Yuan Shi Kai's government until it is recognized. It is expected that such recognition will be given immediately upon the formation of a coalition cabinet. Provision for Dr. Sun Yat Sen, President of the South, has not yet been made.

### For Ireland

First Step Towards the Federation of the British Empire, Says Churchill at Belfast.

Hon. Winston Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, addressed a meeting of 6,000 people in Belfast on the 8th inst. There was no riot and no one was hurt. 5,000 imperial troops were prepared for emergencies but there was no occasion for their use.

Mr. Churchill outlined the proposed Home Rule Bill, the main features of which are the following:

Irish home rule to fit into a general scheme of Parliamentary devolution, leading ultimately to the federation of the Empire.

Provision to be made for fair representation of minorities in the House and Senate.

Supremacy of the Imperial Parliament to be maintained in respect of all legislation.

Military to remain under Imperial control.

The Irish Parliament to have real control of its finances, subject to the financial system of the United Kingdom. Ireland to obtain a subsidy of \$10,000,000 a year, which may ultimately be increased.

Land purchase and old-age pensions to be carried out by the Imperial Parliament.

Irish representation at Westminster to be reduced.

Religious freedom to be secured.

A special despatch to the Montreal Star of the 10th inst., says that "The Irish Nationalists are delighted with the issue of the Belfast crisis. Irishmen realize this morning that there exists a new Belfast, in which good humor takes the place of the old bitterness, and tolerance the place of bigotry. Sir Edward Carson admits that Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill got a good reception. The generous money settlement, indicated as part of the Home Rule Bill, a settlement which Mr. Churchill says, is cheap as the price of converting a loyal Ireland into something more than the equivalent of large military and naval forces, makes it impossible to maintain this anti-Home Rule agitation with anything like its recent heat."

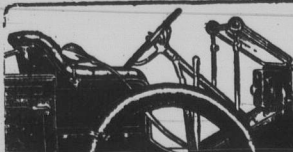

## BELFAST AND HOME RULE

We are glad to see that the result of the Great Home Rule meeting in Belfast has disappointed a gaping world always more or less inclined to believe anything to the disparagement of the Irish race and to regard a row as the inevitable accompaniment of every Irish gathering. So greatly had this unhappy feeling been worked by the inflammatory dispatches sent out prior to the meeting that everyone shuddered to think what might happen under the circumstances. It was therefore with a sense of immense relief that every humane mind received the news that the anxious event had passed off in much more peaceful and orderly fashion than great political gatherings often pass off in English and American cities.

The great point gained by the holding of the meeting was the assertion of the British right of free speech. It has laid down and vindicated the sacred principles that there is no spot in the British Isles where men may not speak out their minds freely on great public questions and above all, that there is no spot in the Great Isle where the doctrine of Home Rule cannot be as openly and unobstructedly preached as elsewhere. That the whole agitation to prevent this was a Tory move from the beginning in order to create the false impression in the rest of the United Kingdom, with an eye to the next general election, that even in Ireland Home Rule is violently opposed by a large, important and influential section of the people, is now perfectly clear. It was simply a great bluff to delude and deter the Home Rule leaders and the Imperial Government from proving that, even in the supposed hot bed of opposition, the antagonism to Home Rule was not as serious a factor as the Tories would have the world imagine. They counted, however, without their hosts, when they had to deal with the Liberal Ministry of Mr. Asquith, and with men of the bold and courageous stamp of Winston Churchill and John Redmond. These men were not to be bluffed or trifled with and the result has proved the value of their boldness and their courageous determination to stand up manfully for their convictions. Indeed, too much admiration cannot be wasted upon the fearlessness with which Winston Churchill refused to be turned from his resolve to show the lion in his den and to beat up all the fallacies and misrepresentations of his adversaries. And in his speech at Belfast on Thursday, he did so in a way so thoroughly that he left them and their appeal to racial and religious passions not a leg to stand upon.

He stripped the bogy of the Home Rule Bill, which the Government intends to pass, of all the fearsome features with which the imagination of its enemies had invested it and showed that, far from tending to division, it would tend to promote greater union, that it would be harmonious with Imperial interests, strengthen the British Empire and smooth its path, liberate new forces for its service and for ever do away with the armed system and machinery by which hatred had been manufactured and kept alive in the past and had blood maintained between Ireland and England, which is a result to be sincerely desired by all—Ex.

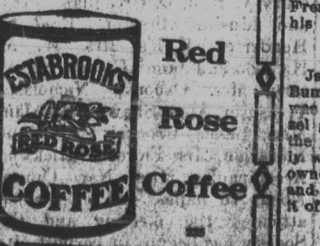

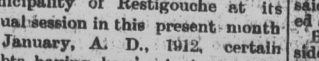

**THE CANADIAN NAVY**

BY C. FREDERICK HAMILTON

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The late government embarked upon a very big, very expensive and a very protracted piece of work in attempting to organize a naval force of our own. It is important that we should have clear ideas as to what we want; that we should set about our work in accordance with a sound plan; and that we should do nothing now which will at a later stage work mischief.

First with regard to our object. We are building a navy to be useful in Imperial wars. An Imperial war is likely to spread itself over a very large proportion of the earth's surface, and so large a theatre of operations, will divide itself into primary and secondary fields of action; into regions where the big fighting is done, and into regions where less important fighting is done. In an Imperial war Canada might be the scene of the big fighting, but she is rather more likely to be a secondary sphere of operations; that is, that while the great fleets will contend on the other side of one or other of the oceans which touch her shores, she may be in danger of annoyance by casual raiding from detached naval forces of the enemy. Thus there are two distinct parts to work a Canadian Naval Service may contemplate. It may aim at defending the country against secondary attacks, leaving it to the Royal Navy to look after the big fighting; and it may aim higher, and desire further to bear a hand in the big fighting. Of course the former is the earliest duty to which we must address ourselves. The Canadian coast-line, Canadian Coastal waters, Canadian ends of ocean trade routes, must be protected. When that is done, we may help in the main operations.

I am wholly in favour of going further, of taking part in the main operations of any Imperial war, and of organizing our service from the outset with this in view. For us to do nothing but attend to our local defence, leaving the care of the main war to Great Britain, or rather to the rest of the Empire would be like a man undertaking to keep the grass cut on his lawn, but leaving his father and brothers to pay the rent of the house. So long as the main fighting is on the other side of the ocean, very slight forces usually will suffice for strictly local defence. The cruisers which an enemy might use for the purpose of harassing a secondary sphere of operations, such as the Canadian coast would be, if the main fighting were in the North Sea or off the coast of Australia, as a rule, would be few and weak and could be driven away by a few ships of no great strength. The real thing on our behalf would be done by the big British fleet far away; and if that fleet were beaten, the enemy would soon place upon our coasts a force with which no local defence squadron could cope. Our plight would be like that of the man already mentioned if the family were to be ruined while he was contenting himself with keeping his lawn tidy. He would be turned out of his house, no matter how closely he had kept the grass trimmed. A few armed men would make short work of a force amply strong enough for secondary local defence. Thus, to take part in our own real defence we must help in the main battle.

Thus I maintain that we should organize our Canadian Naval Service from the start with the idea that it shall be ready to go anywhere and do any sort of British fighting-work that the ships can do. The Canadian officer, the Canadian sailor, must not go about his business with the idea that he is to be tied by the leg to the Canadian coast-line, never to leave it. He is to be tied by the leg to the do coastal work on our own shores; to patrol trade routes that may be distinct from Canada; to serve in fleets at the other side of this ocean or that ocean. Whatever he does he will be serving Canada if he is serving the Empire.

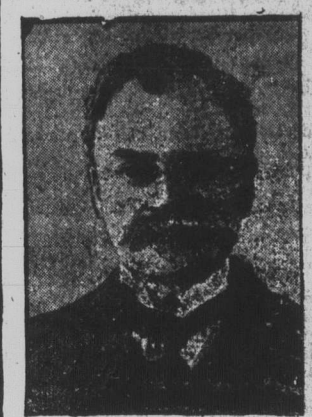
I leave to one side the question of the sort of ships we should buy or build. The important thing is the men we train, and the spirit in which we train them. Good officers, good men, well educated, well trained, well disciplined, skilful and brave, are far more necessary than good ships. If the Japanese and Russians had changed ships before the Russo-Japanese war would have been the same. In most British naval victories the enemy had the better ships. I am infinitely more concerned in the men we train, than in the ships we provide for them.

Thus we seem to have arrived at two needs of the situation.  
1. The Canadian public must recognize that its ships must act sometimes on the Canadian coast-line and sometimes away from it; that its ships will be doing it service even when across the ocean. It must be willing to see its ships sent hither and thither as the situation demands.  
2. The Canadian seamen must be trained in the idea that they must serve anywhere in the world. They must not be taken by surprise at an order to cross the Atlantic and report to the Admiral in command of such and such a fleet.

When I lay down this latter condition, I demand a great deal. It will not do for our men merely to be willing. They must also be skilful. The business of handling ships is skilful work in the very highest sense. It is one thing for a captain to command a single ship and make her efficient for solitary service; it is another thing for him to command a fleet which is one of a squadron.

Our Canadian forces must practice in peace the same thing that the big fleets of the Royal Navy. They must play up themselves in their own little corner and then go out to sea and come to be able to play in the big game.

I leave that aspect of the case and pass to another. Ours is bound to be a small force. Any small force is bound to suffer from a shortage of personnel. If we have only a dozen or so ships, the commands, posts, billets, etc., will be very few. Our first batch of officers will rise very rapidly, will reach the top ranks at very early ages, and then will stay there till grey-headed; and meanwhile the men of the second and third batches will be kept down. These after a while we shall have small crews commanded by men of sixty, and have lieutenants of fifty and more. That is very bad in many ways, but chiefly in this, that men often are at their best for certain commands at early ages. Kipling's Sub probably was only twenty-one. Torpedo craft are put into the hands of very young men; King George commanded Torpedo boat No. 79 when 24 years old, and did a very pretty piece of seamanship in her; command of the Thrush, a gunboat of some size, when 25. In the British Royal Navy great efforts are made to ensure youth in officers, who are given commands.

and on the whole with greater success than in most navies. Again, a force should hold out a fair number of high prizes towards which men may aspire. The Royal Navy has 94 flag officers on the active list, and there are other prizes. How many such posts could a small Canadian Navy afford?

A Canadian boy entering it would be very fortunate to rise to admiral, and really would have little hope of becoming anything higher than a captain. I need not enlarge on the subject; it presents many aspects of great importance. This set of considerations is driven home by the fact that it is part of the whole problem of standardization, of interchangeability. It is all right to have one part of the great Imperial fleet owned by Great Britain, a second part owned by Canada, a third part owned by Australia, and so on. But it is absolutely necessary to have all these parts trained to the same standard. The Canadian admirals must be animated by the same strategic principles as British Admirals. The staff and intelligence systems must be identical. The guns must use the same ammunition. The systems and standards of gunnery and signalling must be the same. If the British interests are to be entrusted to the protection of Canadian ships and the protection of British ships, the officers of each must feel they can rely on the officers of the other, and so they must know each other intimately.

Actuated by these several considerations, I put forward this proposal. Let the ships be owned by Canada. Let them be maintained by Canada and administered by Canada. Let Canada maintain her list of officers sufficient in number to man these ships. But let us make an arrangement with the Admiralty whereby there will be a common list of officers for the British, Canadian, Australian and New Zealand Navies. Let each Nation have on that list a proportion of officers roughly adjusted to the size of its fleet.

Once we arrange that, several plans could be followed. We might arrange that Canadian officers should serve in alternate commissions in Canada and in other vessels; or we might let them take their chances in the whole big service, content that if an English man commanded a Canadian Cruiser off Equiano, and an Australian a Canadian ship working out of Halifax a Canadian would be commanding a battleship in the North Sea and another Canadian a ship on the coast of South Africa. I should regard the latter as the preferable scheme. Observe this feature of the arrangement and I advocate—that numerous prizes would offer themselves to the Canadian lad entering the service, say that a Canadian who showed aptitude could hope to rise to be a British Admiral. Of course, the British officers posted to Canadian ships would be under the control of the Canadian authorities, just as the British officers lent to Canada are under the control of our Military Department.

I urge this as a great need of the situation. It will be a great danger to the actual efficiency of the force in which we expect to take so much pride. We cannot hope to be better than the Royal Navy. Let us resolve to be as good as the only way to achieve that is to standardize our force—to keep our officers and our men in the Big Navy.
