SPEAK NOW, SIR HECTOR. More than ever does it seem necessary t investigate the extraordinary charges made against the Dominion Minister of Public Works and his associates by Mr. Tarte, eading Quebec Conservative, who appears Setermined to make a clean breast of it. Sir Hector Langevin has said that he knows nothing about the matter, and he rests his defense here, just as he contented himself with a bald refusal to say what he did with the \$32,000 of the Pacific scandal fund which he handled. But to satisfy the public, and restore confidence in the Public Works Department, after the revelations fathered by Mr. Tarte, and published by him, more than a simple denial is required. A full and complete investigation must be entered on by an independent commission in whom the people will have confidence. Mr. Tarte is stringing out his exposure, perhaps unnecessarily, but even now he produces letters to prove his contention that large sums were made by the contractors for public works by the agency of information received from the Public Works Department. The contractors were, indeed, kept posted from day to day as to the Ministers' intentions. One class of contractors "were discouraged and rebuffed by requirements and calculations" with regard to which another class received asces and information to guide them in their future relations with the department. The letters published by Mr. Tarte affirm that this information was paid for in hard cash. That is a strong statement, and the men who have made it should, in the interest of justice, be examined on oath, so that the final receptacle of the boodle might be laid bare. We again affirm that as the leaks of con fidential information and the payments made therefor center round the Department of Public Works, and Mr. Tarte's allega tions against Sir Hector Langevin are no nger inuendoes, the Minister of Public Works cannot ignore them. He should court an immediate investigation and not try to laugh off the effect of Mr. Tarte's exposures, or retire from public life.

The egg question is still exciting attention in Canada. Mr. J. D. Moore, of St. Marys, and Mr. John A. The increased cost of carpet wool under the new luties, it is stated, really compels a con-


