CIVIL WAR ON IN RUSSIA, REBELS DEFEAT THE TROOPS, FIRE AND SWORD AT MITAU

Livonia Desolated by Torch===Letts Plunder Germans With Great Barbarities=-Cossacks Rushed From East

Mitau, Courland, Russia (undated), by mail to St. Petersburg, Dec. 19.-Frightful stories are pouring in from the interior, where desperate fighting has occurred between the troops and insurgents. Revolting tales are told of the barbarities practiced on the German landlords, who are more detested by the Letts than the Russians. In a fight near Tukun fourteen dragoons were killed and sixteen were wounded. It is estimated that the insurgents

A squadron of cavalry was ambushed and badly cut up near Grossanz and limped into Mitau with its wounded.

Mitau, Province of Courland, Dec. 17.—(Delayed in transmission). — The troops, in order to avoid annihilation at the hands of the insurgents have been forced to abandon the country districts and to concentrate at Riga, Mitau and Libau, where they actually are standing on the defensive, unable to

make head against the insurgents. Several detachments have been defeated. The garrison at Takum, consisting of a squadron of dragoons, and a company of infantry, not being able to depart in time, was set upon at night and lost its commander, Lieut.- Col. Mueller and 30 men. The insurgents, evading the sentinels, penetrate d the town and laid wire entanglements in front of the house in which the w earied soldiers were quartered. Then they set fire to the houses, and the troops rushing out were shot down from roofs or cut up in the narrow streets: The soldiers retired in confusion. leaving their dead. The latter were h orribly maltreated by the insurgents, who gouged out their eyes and cut off their ears and hands. Insurgents, who form great bands, have a regul ar military organization and are well armed with rifles and bayonets.

Rushing Troops From Manchuria.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 19.-In spite of the statement that two army corps are being sent to the Baltic Provinces, it is learned that no such number of troops are available. The Government has sent two regiments from St. sidered too dangerous to deplete the garrison of the capital any further during the present crisis, and the Government can only await the arrival of the Cossacks and other troops, which are being hurried forward by Gen. Linerebellion, which is pushing forward to the Polish frontier, may arouse the Poles to an armed uprising.

The Rupublic of Krakoff.

Reliable details regarding the establishment of the so-called Republic of Krakoff have at last arrived. The workmen's socialistic organizations, joined by 300 troops, took possession of the city, and with the aid of a militia armed with pikes, revolvers, and axes, established a government or "federated council," as the executive committee was called. This council issued decrees which the authorities were perfectly powerless to resist. The council turned off the electricity from the houses on the ground that it only benefited the rich, while allowing it to burn in the streets, where it benefited the people and declared war on the thieves who had previously been terrorizing the city. The Preservation of Niagara.

President Roosevelt's plea for international action for the preservation of Niagara Falls will meet with a cordial response in Canada. While public opinion on both sides of the line is favorable to the proposal, there are difficulties which each country must solve for itself before effective co-operation is possible. In Canada there is the divithe Federal Government and the State being:

The Province of Ontario, in the exercise of its riparian rights, has granted franchises to several power comvanies on the Canadian side of the Niagara River. These provincial charters state that the companies shall have the right to build transmission lines to the United States and deliver power under certain restrictions as to quantity. The question arises whether this privilege is subject to the jurisdiction of the Dominion Government, to which the B. N. A. Act assigns control of all matters of trade and commerce. The federal authorities would seem to have the power to prohibit or regulate the exportation or importation of electrical energy. ON EMIGRATION

Yesterday afternoon the new emigration offices of the Salvation Army at 27 Queen Victoria street, were opened by General Booth, who delivered an address on the Salvation Army's work and proposals. General Booth said that the emigration department was intended principally to serve the purpose of the poor man's "Cook." It existed to further, not the pleasure travels of the rich, but to make more feasible economic, and consistent with the highest interests of humanity the transfer of the poorer classes from one part of daily bread. It existed not for the profits of shareholders, but for the profit an institution was apparent. There was no independent and trustworthy source from which information on the subject of emigration could be obtained. At this office the poorest and most ignorant would be able to get information on every material point in respect to every foreign land or British colony. Many desirable emigrants were deterred from leaving their native land by fear of being devoured by lions and tigers and locusts. Here they would find out the truth. If they were poor they would get the information for nothing; but if they could afford to pay, they would be made to pay. To this central office, emigrants, employers of labor, and colonial governments would address themselves. Colonial governments were more and more learning to realize the value of 'people," and soon they would be ready to pay for them. What had puzzled him was that some governments were loud in expressing their desires for increased population, but when the people were offered to them they declared that they must not only be carefully selected and of the best quality, but that the cost of emigrating them must be paid at home. They would learn more sense

The need for emigration stared one in the face. Not only today, when an extra spasm of poverty had added a small percentage to the melancholy list of the unemployed, but at all times -a condition which made happiness impossible, health very difficult, and religion almost out of the question. To do this work on a large scale required a large capital. Last year out of the funds raised £15 to £20 was given to every family relieved, and here were the famlies again in need of relief. A feature of the Fitzsimmons-O'Brien fight tomorrow night that will interest people generally, regardless of any interest in pugilism itself, is the showing to be made by a man of Fitzsimmons' age. Firtzsimmons was 43 years old last June, and is the oldest man who ever entered the ring in America in an engagement as pretentious as that of next Wednesday night. Jem Mace was early 41 years old when he found Joe Coburn for the world's heavyweight championship at Bay St. Louis, Miss., and Joe Goss was close to his 46th year when he lost the championship to Paddy Ryan. In general, a man is supposed to reach his athletic prime between 20 and 30. This has been considered especially true of fighters. John L. Sullivan was champion at 23-34; Jim Corbett at 26-30; Fitzsimmons, middleweight champion at 29, heavyweight champion, 35-37, and light heavyweight champion at 41. Gans was lightweight champion at 25, and still holds the title at 29; McGovern won the bantamweight championship of the world at 20 and the featherweight championship before he was 21, and lost it at 22. "Young" Corbett was featherweight champion at 21-23, Jimmy Britt at 24-25, Battling Nelson is champion at 23. And so the list goes. Ball players, as a rule, are out at 40, and so are the representatives of almost all sports, especially those requirng great activity. Whoever heard of a leading tennis player 40 years of e? Prize fighting is supposed to call forth a man's supreme physical owers, both in offensive tactics and in defensive powers of endurance. Therefore, the spectacle of a man 43 years of age in the ring against a skillful fighter near his prime affords an interesting illustration of the possibilities of a man retaining his powers in good condition. Fitzsimmons always has been credited with temperate habits. He laid the foundation of strength in hard manual labor in his youth as a blacksmith, and has not shattered this foundation by dissipation after attaining fame and money, as most successful fighters have done. But even so, it is supposed he is too long beyond his zenith to make a successful showing in a 20-round fight. But perhaps old Bob will give another black eye to Dr. Osler's theory.

The Chicago Record-Herald man figures out nine good rules for foottall. This will entirely eliminate brutality and make the game very open. Rule 1-The field shall be bounded as at present and covered with three feet of cotton batting or eiderdown. It shall be banked on all sides with feather beds.

Rule 2-Players shall wear proper armament to prevent injuries. Said armament shall consist of large pillows for the chest, abdomen and loins, while a hair padding, if loosely packed, will be permitted for the shoulders and elbows. Shin guards stuffed with excelsior and shoes with cleats of soft felt shall be worn. Headgear shall be made exclusively of sponges, which will serve the double purpose of protection and a reservoir, thereby eliminating the revolting spectacle of an assistant rubber rushing onto the field

Rule 3-Signals shall be whispered softly. When the ball is put in play the man chosen to carry it shall walk back ten feet and either kick or call for a game of pull-away at his discretion.

Rule 4-If pull-away is called for, all players but the one with the ball and one on the opposing side shall retire to the side lines. The man with the ball shall then attempt to get past his opponent; if the latter succeeds in touching him he shouts "Tag!" and the ball goes down on the spot.

Rule 5-After each play the participants shall be cheered by the persons assembled in the grand stands. The cheering shall consist only of clapping of hands and exclamations of "Very well done!"

Rule 6-After the cheering the college bands will play some classical selection which has previously been approved by a committee, consisting of three members of the faculty.

Rule 7-If a kick is called for after the ball is put in play, all the participants shall recline on the field, with the exception of the kicker. He will then kick and the official shall note where the ball falls. The ball will then change hands and the teams will line up at the spot where the ball fell.

Rule 10-If a player becomes weary he shall approach an official and say in a low voice, "Sir, I am fatigued." Whereupon the official will blow his whistle and all participants shall recline while coffee, sandwiches and ice

Rule 9-After the game the favors will be distributed and the spectators will be permitted to walk upon the field, where the players will constitute the reception committee. COVERPOINT.


