In this column, not long ago, I recorded an attack on of his choice when on coming up to Longfellow's "Psalm of Life" by some jocular English critic. This iconoclast made fun of Longfellow's "Footprints on the Sands of Time," claiming that they could not be seen by another 'sailing o'er life's solemn main." Professor Lounsbury does not raise the same objection, but he shoots up the whole noem. His damaging comments are as follows: "The Psalm of Life or what the Heart of the Young Man said to the Psalmist" is the most widely quoted of Longfellow's poems; to me it is one of the least worthy of quotation. It is largely a collection of observations, which, when they are not platitudinous, are not true. There is little use in telling us that the lives of great men remind us that we can make our lives sublime. Most of us are perfectly well aware that the sublime lives of great menand their lives not unfrequently have been petty-cannot serve as examples to us, because we are not great men. Consequently we lack the ability to leave footprints on the sands of time, however much we may have the desire. Nor indeed does the particular method recommended strike one as practicable. The last place a rational man would choose for leaving a permanent footprint would be on the sandy beach bordering an ocean. 





"If a \$50,000 breakwater bylaw is submitted to the ratepayers it will be defeated for sure," said Mr. Heavey. 'It would be far better to submit \$20,000 or a \$25,000 proposition, which would build a reasonable embankment. If the larger sum is voted on the bylaw will never carry, while if the citizens saw that our demands were reasonable, the chances for the bylaw carrying would be greatly increased."

Again, the Progressives thought it would be a wise policy to drop one of their schemes, the breakwater or the bridge, and place all their energy in btaining one of these two necessities. 





LABOR DISPUTES

Number of Strikes in October Double Those of Last Year.

Ottawa, Nov. 14.-The preliminary estimate of the number of labor disputes in October, issued by the department of labor, shows that the number of strikes was about twice as great as that recorded during the same month of last year, although there was no material change from conditions during the previous month of the present year. The dispute of coal miners in Vancouver Island continued throughout October, this being the only dispute in which a great number of men vere involved. About twenty-one disutes were in existence, ten of which ommenced during the month. Upwards of 4,300 employees were lved in these disputes, which caused a loss of about 98,000 working days.

INDUSTRIAL ACCIDENTS

104 Workmen Killed and 324 Injured During Month of October. [Canadlan Press.]

Nov. 14.-According to the Ottawa, record of industrial accidents maintained by the Department of Labor, there were 104 workmen killed and 324 injured during the month of October. Compared with the record for September, this is an increase of fifteen in the number killed and a decrease of 95 in the number injured. The greatest number of fatal accidents occurred in steam railway service, there being 28 employees killed. The building trades are next, with 15 fatalities.

FIRST METHODISTS WILL IMPROVE CHURCH ORGAN

It Is Proposed to Spend From \$12,000 to \$13,000 on the Work.

A number of members of the First Methodist Church who attended the mid-week prayer service last evening, at the conclusion of the meeting passed a resolution in which they gave their indorsation to a scheme to expend \$12,000 or \$13,000 in improvements to the church organ.

The necessity of undertaking a portion of the work without delay was emphasized in a demonstration by the organist, Mr. A. D. Jordan. The proposal is to overhaul the present organ and to make certain additions by means of which the instrument will be converted into one of the most modern type. The present manual is to be replaced, but will be attached to the rear of the instrument, and thus a keyboard and organ for Wesley Hall will be provided at small cost. SOCIAL SERVICE CLUB AT NEW ST. JAMES' CHURCH

Organization Was Launched at an Enthusiastic Meeting Held Last Night.

At a meeting held last evening in the schoolroom of New St. James' Presbyterian Church, a Social Service Club was formed, to consist of men only, the object and aim being the moral uplifting of the young men and women of the city.

Rev. T. H. Mitchell presided over the meeting, which was addressed by Sheriff Cameron, who gave an interesting statement of the conditions as they exist here. He drew attention to the fact that from Sept 8 to Oct. 19. 1912, there were 58 juveniles (between the ages of 6 and 14 years), who appeared before Magistrate Judd for various offences. The cause of the great majority of those thus appearing, was owing to their environment, which was not conducive to their moral wel-

Reference was also made to the splendid work done by the Children's Aid Society, which in twenty years has placed in foster homes 870 children, all of whom, with but a very small percentage, have turned out well, and are a credit to themselves and to the society. A large group photograph was shown of 250 of such children surrounding a photo of the venerable and beloved inspector, Mr. Sanders. A finer group of children, happy and healthy,

could not be seen anywhere.
Several speakers followed, speaking dong the lines suggested by Sheriff Cameron, and showing the urgent need that exists for a concerted movement on the part of all citizens, irrespective of creed, to take steps at an early date to try and improve the moral welfare of the young.
