# AMERICAN PRESIDENT BACKS UP BRITISH PREMIER'S WAR AIMS: PRESENTS PROGRAM FOR PEACE

# WHAT U.S. FIGHTS FOR

Washington, Jan. 8 .- In his address to Congress today, the president presented the following as necessary elements of world peace:

"1-Open covenants of peace without private international understandings.

"2-Absolute freedom of the seas in peace or war, except as they may be closed by international action, '3-Removal of all economic barriers and establishment of equality of trade conditions among nations consenting to peace and associating themselves for its main-

"4-Guarantees for the reduction of national armaments to the lowest point consistent with domestic safety. "5—Impartial adjustment of all colonial claims based upon the principle that the peoples concerned have equalweight with the interest of the government.

'6-Evacuation of all Russian territory and opportunity for Russia's political development.

'7-Evacuation of Belgium without any attempt to limit her sovereignty. "8-All French territory to be freed and restored

and reparation for the taking of Alsace-Lorraine. '9-Readjustment of Italy's frontiers along clearly recognizable lines of nationality.

"10-Freest opportunity for autonomous development of the people of Austria-Hungary

"11-Evacuation of Rumania, Serbia and Montenegro, with access to the sea for Serbia, and international guarantees of economic and political independence and territorial integrity of the Balkan States.

"12-Secure sovereignty for Turkey's portion of the Ottoman Empire, but with other nationalities under Turkish rule assured security of life and opportunity for autonomous development, with the Dardanelles permanently opened to all nations.

"13-Establishment of an independent Polish state, including territories inhabited by indisputably Polish population, with free access to the sea and political and economic independence and territorial integrity guaranteed by international covenant.

'14-General association of nations under specific covenants for mutual guarantees of political independence and territorial integrity to large and small states alike.

"For such arrangements and convenants," said the president in conclusion, "we are willing to fight and continue to fight until they are achieved; but only because we wish the right to prevail and desire a just and stable peace."

# HUGHES CABINET RESIGNS OFFICE

Australian Govt. Steps Out Following Defeat of Conscription Act.

London, Jan. 8 .- The Australian cabinet, headed by William Morris Hughes, has resigned, according to a Reuter's dispatch from Melbourne. Frank G. Tudor, Labor leader, has been summoned to form a new min-

Since the defeat of the Government's conscription bill in Australia, it has been reported that Premier Hughes probably would resign. On the defeat of the conscription bill in 1916, Premier Hughes tendered his resignation of his cabinet. A new cabinet, however, was formed with Hughes as premier. Last fall he again brought up a conscription bill, and in the election shortly before Christmas, conscription was defeated by a majority greater than in 1916. The majority against conscription was nearly 200,000, Australian soldiers giving a majority against the bill also.

Woodrow Wilson Once More Presents the Nation's Intentions in World Struggle.

AGREES WITH THE ALLIES

United States for Just and Lasting Peace Based on Conditions Named by Lloyd George.

Washington, Jan. 8 .--President Wilson today, addressing Congress, delivered a restatement of war aims in agreement with the recent declaration by the British premier, Lloyd George. The president presented a definite program for world peace containing fourteen specific considera-



Chief Justice of the Supreme Court Gives Decision.

washington, Jan. 7. — Every contention raised against the selective draft act was swept aside by the supreme court today in a unanimous opinion delivered by Chief Justice White upholding the law as constitutional. Authority tr enact the statute and to send forces to fight the enemy whereever he may be found, the court held, lies in the clauses of the constitution, giving Congress the power to declare war and to raise and support armies. "As the mind cannot conceive an army without the men to compose it," said the chief justice, "on the face of the constitution the objection that it does not give power to provide for such men would seem to be too frivolous for further notice."

Of course obedience to the strict letter of the order varies with the different regiments; it depends largely on the officer commanding. But there are many battalions that adhere to it strictly except in the heat of attack, A company officer told me that his own men shaved daily even while occupying some captured shell holes before new trenches had been dug."

# An American Major's View

By Ring W. Lardner, in "Collier's"

"Daily shaving ought to be compulsory in our army as it is in the British. When a man hasn't shaved he isn't at his best, physically, morally, or mentally. When he has he's got more confidence in himself; his morale is better. Shaving has a psychological effect, and I try to impress my men with the importance of it. They say it's a difficult operation here, but I guess if the Tommies can do it in the trenches, we can in these billets."



# THE MANUFACTURE OF OLEOMARGARINE.

Now that oleomargarine has been admitted to our market it may be inter-Now that oleomargarine has been admitted to our market it may be interesting to some of our readers to know how this substitute for butter is made. The process consists briefly in comminuting the cooled beef fat, which is then melted in steam-jacketed caldrons at a temperature of 160 degrees Fahrewolving agitators keep the mass moving, so as to evenly distribute the heat. Salt is then added to the welt, which is allowed to settle for about two days, with the result that the scrap settles to the bottom and the stearin—or glycerold substance—is allowed to crystallize on the surface and around the sides of the vessel, leaving the pure oleo oil between. When the settling is complete the substance is broken up, into a mushy mass, which is wrapped in canvascovered packages of about three pounds each, and subjected to great pressure, gradually applied. Thus the oil is separated and drawn off into tanks, from which it is piped to the floor below, to be mixed with other substances and of oleomargarine to be produced—the better grades containing a higher percentage of neutral lard and pure cream or butter with salt and coloring matter, the lowest grade containing milk and cottonseed oil.
