New York, Sept. 14.—The Assoclated Pres today issued the following:

The scope of the victory won by the American first army in Lorraine, in its initial offensive effort, continues to grow. The number of prisoners taken is now said to number 20,000, which is virtually the equivalent of two enemy divisions.

Gen. Pershing's forces in two days drove in to a miximum depth of thirteen miles, which is approximately the distance from the tip of the salient below St. Mihiel to Hatteville, a mile and a half north of Vigneulles, through which the American line was last reported as running.

The Germans are reported readjusting their lines on the edges of the former salient, the probabilities being, however, that they are not being allowed to do this in peace by the American forces or the French on the flanks. What further development the offensive may have is uncertain at present the official communications, and even the news dispatches today throwing little light on the prospects.

## PERU DECLINES TO DECLARE WAR ON GERMAN EMPIRE WOMAN OVERCOME

Satisfied To Let Severance of Diplomatic Relations Stand.

Lima, Peru, Sept. 14.—A motion for a declaration of war on Germany, made at a secret session of the Peruvian chamber of deputies last night, was defeated by a large majority. Instead the chamber approved a motion presented by the minister of foreign affairs, reading as follows:

"This position in the event of no new circumstances had been maintained and unaltered as a protest against the cutrage of which Peru was the victim, and as testimony of our solidarity with the great American democracy which proclaims for the world the reign of justice."

## ENGLISH, SCOTCH AND WELSH WERE IN SOMME ATTACK

Divisions of Each Took Im-· portant Part in Recent Fighting.

London. Sept. 14. - Supplementary dispatch from Field Marshal Haig states that in the series of successful battles on the Somme front, beginning August 8, English, Scotch and Welsh divisions took an important share in the fighting performing many gallant actions. Most of these divisions had been advancing over the same ground over which they met and ultimately checked the enemy's great offensive of March. During the past few weeks they had shown, without exception, that the tremendous strain sustained earlier in the year with so much courage and resolution had in no wise diminished their splendid fighting spirit. For example, the Guards division, which in March and April at Boyelles, Soiry and Becquerelle had maintained the northern pivot of our defence, had attacked on August 21 and had captured Moyenneville and Hamelincourt and had taken St. Leger on the 24th. The gallant exploits of some 20 to their divisions were mentioned, including the 4th, which broke the enemy's attack on the north bank of the Scarpe March 28, and in the face of strong resistance on September 2 carried the defences of the Drocourt-Queant line. The 22nd Division, after heavy fighting at Dammery on the 10th and 11th of August, captured Herleville August 23, and Vermandovillers on the 27th. over the same ground over which they



In order to compensate for inability to put on the races and jumping events in the ring, owing to the condition of the racetrack, the directors arranged for a mammoth program of attractions in the evening, including the regular vaudeville features, the dancing of Henderson's clever juveniles, the musical selections and military drill, a display of fireworks, which combined all the novel features that under other conditions would have been distributed over three evenings, and finally, a brilliantly spectacular feature, as well as one of exceptional merit musically, the big military tattoo by torchlight.







Our problem this year was to prevent the Germans from winning the continental phase of the war by victories in France and over the French and British before the American troops arrived in effective numbers. We had accomplished this when we defeated Ludendorff at the Marne. Since then we have taken back substantially all the ground gained by the Germans since March 21, and won enormous successes, measured by prisoners and guns taken.

So far, so good; but we have not by prisoners and guns taken.
So far, so good; but we have not broken the armies of the German, and until we have accomplished this we shall not have achieved our military victory, even though Ludendorff retires to the frontier or behind the Meuse and Scheldt. The condition of the army, not the amount of the territory evacuated, is what counts and will count. We shall get a measure of that condition within a few days, when we see whether he has the necessary reserves to attempt a few days, when we see whether he has the necessary reserves to attempt a counter-offensive at the Hindenburg line, as Foch counter-attacked at the Marne. This is the next test, and it is at hand; if Ludendorff lacks these reserves he must retire or risk disaster; in either case our profit will be unmistakable, but we have already exceeded that minimum, which was a matter of life or death, victory or defeat, for our strategy to achieve this year.

Not a slice of bread dare be wasted that is the slogan of the conservation ousewife. Left-overs from the table can be kept in a jar, tightly closed, and when the oven is used, heated until crisp, then powdered into crumbs with rolling-pin. These crumbs can then be used instead of flour or raw meal to make sauces, omelets, puddings and

substitute meat dishes.

Staie Bread Biscuits.

4 tablespoonfuls of shortening
5 cupful of boiling water
1 cupful of flour
1 cupful of flour
1 teaspoonful of salt
3 teaspoonful of salt
4 cupful of grated cheese
Add the fat to the hot water and add to the crumbs, which have been ground.
When lukewarm, work in the flour, salt and baking powder. Roll out as biscuit dough, cut and brush with milk. Bake in a quick öven. The grated cheese should be added just before shaping into biscuits.

London reports to Bradstreet's that nere is a healthy activity in almost all nes of trade. Drygoods men, while mplaining of the difficulty in securing goods, anticipate a good fail business. Trading with country points should also be of a sound character. A steady normal trade is being done in groceries, but prices continue to advance. Provisions are higher, and offerings here show contraction. There is a good request for hardware lines, even in the face of advancing prices. Payments are on the whole very satisfactory.

FAIR HAS NEST EGG

TO CARE FOR LOSSES

No Anxiety On That Score,

Says President.

**CAUSED BY WEATHER** 

In bringing to a close the final meeting of the directors of the Western Fair board, Col. W. M. Gartshore, president, reviewed the calamity which befell the fair during the past few days.

"What we have anticipated might happen for a number of years, and what we have looked forward to with apprehension—that we might have a wet week—has happened," said the president, "although it is perhaps worse than we ever dreamed of." It was a great disappointment to the directors, who have worked all year, to have the whole fair spoiled by the rain, yet he thought

disappointment to the directors, who have worked all year. to have the whole fair spoiled by the rain, yet he thought it a greater disappointment to the visitors from the country.

Annual Outing.

Many of them, he declared, look forward to the fair as their annual outing, when they gather their families and their savings and come in for a good time. It was rather pathetic to see these people walking about in the rain and trying to enjoy themselves. The situation was accentuated by the condition of the roads in the grounds. However, he feared that during the war they would hardly be able to get the council to approve of pavements. He approved of Controller Little's suggestion that the grounds should be placed under the one management.

Nest Egg Ready.

The president, in reviewing the fair, paid tribute to the foresight of the directors of years gone by who provided a nest egg for just such a contingency as has arisen. It leaves the board in a happy condition and there is no anxiety on that score. He hoped that all the directors would see the year go out with flags flying.

The directors discussed the proposal to turn the full control of the park over to them. Controller Little, the father of the proposal, asked the opinion of the board in regard to the matter. They approved by resolution, and left the matter to the executive.

There was considerable discussion as to the condition of the roads. Many regrets were heard that the streets of the grounds were not paved.

#### **WORK COMMENCES** ON \$400,000 GROUP OF CAMP BUILDINGS

The staff of Bate, McMahon Company of which Col. Bob Low of Valcartier-Borden-Halifax fame is the chief, has arrived on Carling Heights, and willcommence work at once on the housing arrangements for troops, involving the construction of 23 buildings and the ex-penditure of \$400.000. Superintendent George C. Palmer, accompanied by Traffic Manager A. Altken, arrived in the city yesterday, and

set in operation the machine which is relied upon to throw up the buildings in two months. The system of battalion housing involves a certain unit of buildings. Two of these units will be required for the troops at Carling Heights this winter, accommodation to be provided for upwards of 2,000 men.

Will Be Eight Barracks.

In the group of buildings, which will be situated at the southeast corner of the heights, there will be eight barracks, two stories in height, 212 feet by 41 feet set in operation the machine which i two stories in height, 212 feet by 41 feet in dimensions. These will be used as sleeping quarters, and will be two stories high. Two men's messrooms will be 261 feet by 41 feet in dimensions; two

Stories high. Two men's messrooms will be 261 feet by 41 feet in dimensions; two ablution-rooms, containing baths and lavatories, will be 56 feet by 31 feet in dimensions; two sergeants' messes will be of the same type of buildings; two battalion orderly-rooms; two recreation-rooms, and two guard-houses will also be 56 feet by 31 feet in dimensions, while the officers' quarters and mess will be 212 feet by 41 feet in dimensions and two stories high.

Asked as to the period required to build the 23 structures, Superintendent Palmer stated to The Advertiser that he has just completed the last of three units at Halifax, and the time required to compete the last of the was seven weeks. On that standard the London work should be complete in fourteen weeks' time.

Depends on Labor Situation.

Much will depend on the labor situation, and the firm is advertising for carpenters and laborers up to the number of 250. If the men can be secured in London or Western Ontario the work will go to the local men; otherwise the company will bring in labor which it handles extensively on the many large Government contracts upon which it is constantly working.

Lieut.-Col. R. W. Bishop, in command of the Engineers at Carling Heights, is co-operating with the builders, and Mr. Ross, clerk of works from Ottawa, is also on the job.
The company is advertising for lumber and labor, and has six carloads of material in the city or on the way. Mr. Palmer says a local shortage of material will not hold up the construction.

#### STRIKE IS SETTLED

Electrical Workers and Employer Compromise on Wage Scale.

The electrical workers of the city announce that the strike is all settled. The Commercial Electric Company reached an agreement with the union yesterday. While the men asked 55 cents an hour for armature winders and 50 cents for wiremen, they compromised for 50 and 45 cents respectively. These are the minimum prices. Helpers with eighteen months' or more experience will receive 30 cents per hour. The scale for journeymen was formerly 30 to 40 cents. Within the last few weeks before the strike some of the men had been raised to 45 cents per hour. All the men are back at work today it is said.


