

Paris, Feb. 24.—France gave notice esterday at a meeting of representatives of member nations of the Latin monetary union that from December 23 next she will not consider valid the monetary convention of December 23, 1865. By this pact France, Italy, Belrium and Switzerland agreed of the same coinage, so that their metal money might be mutually inter-changeable. The reason given in the notice was that French sliver coins are no longer current in the other countries concerned.

MANY AMERICAN FARMERS ARE MOVING INTO CANADA

Toronto, Feb. 24.-A special train of 42 cars is being made up for the accommodation of a number of farmers and their families, who will leave for Canada on March 3, according to a special dispatch to the this morning from Bloomington, Ill. The venture is likely to prove the nucleus of much larger movements of settlers depending on the reports sent back to the United States by these families. The families who are included in the peparations are well-to-do, substantial people, well equipped with money, agricultural implements and supplies. Owing to the fact that prior to the war a similar migration was under way the present movement is described as merely the continuation of a delayed plan. During the war many Americans who had settled in Canada, either entered the service of their adopted country or went back to the United States and served under the Stars and Stripes. Unusual interest is being shown in Bloomington, according to the dispatch, in the removal of the families, and it is rumored that there will be early steps to fit out other special trains which will carry from one to five families here. Similar movements are also said to be in prospect in Nebraska, Iowa and Northern Missouri.

Paris, Feb. 24.-Socialists of the most extreme faction will hold a large majority of the delegates sent from the seine Federation to the national congress to be held at Strasbourg this week. Ottawa, Feb. 24 .- A unique precedent vas established by the Ottawa Hydro-Electric Commission at the annual meeting held yesterday in the city hall. Decision of Supreme Council Prevents Diplomatic Relations Being Resumed Between Allied Governments and the Soviet Administration—Allied Powers Cannot Accept Responsibility of Advising Border States To Continue War Against Bolsheviki.

London, Feb. 24.—The Allies will decline to deal with soviet Russia until they have arrived at the conviction that the "Bolshevist horrors have come to an end," It was announced after a meeting of the Allied supreme council today.

REDS CONTINUE SUCCESSES.

The decision of the supreme council, it was reported, precludes diplomatic relations between the Allied governments and the Moscow administration in the immediate future.

The council expressed itself as pleased that the international labor bureau had decided to send a delegation to Russia to study conditions, but it stated its belief that supervision of the delegation should be under the council of the league of nations, giving the investigators greater authority.







Churchill Says Britain Fought At Peace Table To Abolish Conscription

Met With No Response Even placed on the country in consequence of the war, and, besides, the whole eastern world, in which Great Britain was interested more than any other power, was in a state of extreme dispute. Russia-Compulsory Service Ends in Britain March 31-Nation Has Raised New Volunteer Army-New Tank Perfected.

be abolished in Great Britain on March 31, and within a month from that date the last conscript will be entitled to be released, it was announced by Winston Churchill, the secretary for war, in moving the army estimates in the House of Commons today. Mr. Churchill stated that Great Britain had succeeded in raising and organizing an entirely new volunteer army which at the time conscription would lapse would number about 220,000, excluding troops serving in India.

Produced New Tank.

Incidentally Mr. Churchill disclosed the fact that a new tank had been produced, with a speed of twenty miles an hour, which has mechanically a long life. In a trial run of 1,000 miles, he said, virtually no wear had developed. Fought at Conference.

In his speech Mr. Churchill declared that Great Britain had fought at the beace conference for the abolition of conscription, but that there was no conscription, but that there was no response at all to her representations. The only great power which Great Britain succeeded in persuading to abolish conscription was Germany, and that only under dire compulsion. All the other states had maintained compusory service as the basis of their military system and apparently had no intention of departing from it. These states, he added, included even the United States, which was the originator of the League of Nations and Russia "the home of advanced political thought."

UNION GOVERNMEN IS ONE OF TINKERS, SAYS BOB ROGERS

Predicts a Crisis As a Result of Maladministration.

WINNIPEG. Feb. 23. - (Canadian Press).-"Canada's industrial and economic conditions have reached a most critical period in the history of our existence," said Hon. Robert Rogers, who addressed here tonight in the Fort Garry Hotel an open meeting of the Garry Hotel an open meeting of the Conservative Club of Winnipeg, declaring that he had "no further political aspirations to gratify" and that he proposed to speak plainly.

Mr. Rogers declared the Union Government to be a "government of tinkers and jobbers, a government of second-hand dealers. . their energies almost entirely devoted to second-hand theories that are the product of the diseased brain of some poor unfortunate uplifter."

Traditional Policy.

Mr. Rogers declared himself a "lasting believer in the traditional policy that has ever governed the actions of the Conservative party in this Dominion." Union Government might have been necessary during the war, but in peace it was a different thing.

Mr. Rogers urged the importance in Canada of stable government, which, he said, could not be expected from "an incoherent army" with "a thirst for power."

Dealing briefly with the tariff Mr. Rogers said:

"This is neither the time nor the place for compromise if we are to save Canada from the ruin of paying such enormous sums to our American neighbors for their natural products—

save Canada from the ruin of paying such enormous sums to our American neighbors for their natural products—products that under a definite and fixed tariff we can produce in our own country at practically no cost outside of the cost of development. With efficient development of our natural products we can then place our manufacturers in quite as mode a resiston as their we can then place our manufacturers in quite as good a position as their competitors across the line. The great work of the Conservative party for the immediate future must be the efficient development of our great mineral wealth, the construction of smelters and the rendering available for manufacture of our unlimited natural products. All the members of the U. F. O.-Labor cabinet have now secured seats. That will cause a feeling of relief throughout the Province, as the situation was developing into an exasperating one. Now with the ministry duly elected the public can look forward to an early meeting of the Legislature that it is hoped will bring into being progressive legislation and reforms for which there has long been a crying

"INDUSTRY AND HUMANITY." Article No. 3.

"Industry exists for the sake of humanity: not humanity for the sake of industry."

This fact may be brought home if we look back a few years. It is not many years since the greatest inventions affected the whole world. In Canada within a comparatively few years manufacturing was on a very limited scale. "Under the old domestic system, many a man worked in his own home, with his own tools, procured the material necessary for the work, and then sold the proceeds." Take shoemakers as a sample of this London had no large mangrown into one. It is still the only one, There is a great difference between the relations of employer and employed in small concerns a concern becomes large that the difference between employer and employed is at all emphasized. There must and should be in a growing country like Canada consideration given to this difference. Many a comparatively large business has grown with the country by careful attention. McClary's is one of these. McCormick's and Perrin's are other instances. Under D. S. Perrin, with able help, such as the late Herbert Allan gave, it grew to large proportions. The late Thomas McCormick was the architect of his own fortune. The industry in the seventies was carried on in the house south of the First Presbyterian Church. His sons completed and enlarged his work. Other samples could be given, but these suffice to show that the question of capital and labor form a small factor in a growing business. The workers in all these shared in the general prosperity, and the right feelings existed between employers and employed. Mutual respect existed. Each cared for the prosperity and welfare of the other.

It has been at all times doubtful whether the introduction of questions of capital and labor, of employer and employed, is not an injury to all concerned. Appeals to workingmen carry with them a suggestion of inferiority not at all justified and not desirable. Employers have frequently had very little capital to start with and frequently not much more to end with.

The principle laid down by Mr. King that "Industry exists for the sake of humanity and not humanity for the sake of industry" is correct. It is shown in varying degrees during the whole history of London. The employers were building up businesses. The employees were receiving the benefit of it and their families were going out into trades, professions and occupations of all kinds and contributing to the common good.

THE TURK STAYS.

Throughout the United Kingdom there is a general—and in some cases violent—expression of dissatisfaction at the decision of the Supreme Council to permit the Turk to remain in Constantinople. It is certain that throughout Canada there will be a feeling of een disappointment that the Ottoman not been ejected from Europe. The Christian world throughout the war conidently looked forward to the end of Turkish ruelty and misrule in Europe, once the Allies ad conquered. The tremendous sacrifices made by the Entente seemed in the public mind to have justified the removal of the Turk, "bag and baggage," from the north shores of the Boshorus. For half a thousand years this bloodysinded race has ruled a Christian section of urope with unspeakable cruelties. If there was ne good thing the world has counted on as a esult of the great triumph it was the passing the Turk from European affairs. Especially as the Christian world hoped that Armenia, at east, would be made safe from Turkish ferocity. t is true that the Supreme Council has notified urkey that the massacres must cease, but here is no good reason to think that Turkey will obey this warning any more than they ave a hundred others. At the present moment, while the Turk is being solemnly warned that

he must behave, he is reliably reported as car rying on a new slaughter of Armenians.

India apparently is the reason Great Britain has decided to leave the Turks in possession of Constantinople. The unrest in Hindustan has brought about a grave situation there. At various places it has caused industrial demoralization. Some parts of the country are ripe for revolt. Should the vast Mohammedan population be called upon for a holy war, as might easily be the case, should the supreme insult be put upon Islam of ejection from Constantinople, there would in all probability be a period of dreadful anarchy throughout India. To expel the head of Islam from his ancient and sacred seat would be taking a chance of an Indian and Asiatic catastrophe that the British Government evidently is not willing to assume. It must be admitted that nobody so thoroughly understands the east as the Englishman. If he finds it best that the Turk should remain in Constantinople it is because he is convinced that expulsion would bring about a situation that would plunge the whole eastern world into bloody strife. The Christian world will be greatly disappointed at the consideration shown the Turk, but, if it is fair, it will concede that any other course is probably impossible at

ATOMIC ENERGY. [Montreal Hereld 1

One of the leading scientific men of the day, Frederick Soddy, F.R.S., Lee, professof of inorganic and physical chemistry in the University of Oxford and formerly demonstrator in chemistry at McGill University, Montreal makes some remarkable predections in a new work, "Science and Life," just published. He is famous for his researches into the nature of the elements, and particularly into radium and its cognates.

He says: "The discoveries in radio-activity have shown that in the smallest atoms of matter all around us there exist stores of energy a million times greater than any so far harnessed. Limitless physical power awaits humanity so soon as the knowledge that shall lead to its control and application has been obtained.

"How many unrecorded ages elapsed before the energy of fuel was controlled, and in how short a space of subsequent time has it altered the whole mode of life of the world! Given a clear course and that most rare of national qualities, common sense, physical science can abolish the struggle for existence so far as concerns food and fuel.

"Already science, through the medium o atomic energy, has laid its hands upon a tool which if controllable by man, could eliminate for ever the nightmare of existence prolonged from day to day by unremitting toil."

The new science has revealed elements which pour out energy, force and heating power for interminable periods, with no apparent reduction in their

Professor Soddy has much to say of queer elements and strange atoms and of the alchemist's dream of turning base metal into gold. There was nothing extravagant in them: elements can be transmuted into one another, or could be if we | full equality in the assembly of the League of gold from mercury," he says, "expel from the atom of mercury one beta-particle, which will make thallium; then one alpha-particle, which will turn the thallium into gold. Or, to get gold from lead, expel from the atom of lead one alpha-particle. which will turn it into mercury, and proceed as

It sounds like a recipe from a cookery book, yet investigators are working along these lines, and any day we may hear that some of them have succeeded. Indeed, there have already been reports-not yet verified-of such success.

Quietly and convincingly, Professor Soddy predicts that the potential energy latent everywhere in nature will, as time goes on, be utilized more and more to replace animate energy-the toil of man. As primitive man froze to death on the site of modern coal mines, so the majority of mankind today drags out a miserably confined existence with the means of a life for which we have no standard all about him, but still beyond his reach.

"Could the energy steadily diffused in the transmutation of radio-active elements be harnessed by man," he says, "and the rate of progress being made justifies the belief wthat some day this will be done, we will see a transformation of the stan-dards of life incomparably beyond that brought by

'Control by man of the atomic energy thrown off by radio-active elements-in a manner similar to the way ordinary chemical processes, such as the combustion of coal, are now controlled-is the vital step which science has yet to take."

That which will hamper the scientist most in leading mankind forward into a new era, Professor Soddy fears, is the well-founded fear that under existing social conditions new discoveries may be so mishandled as to create more millionaires and "The uses already made of science," he says,

"show how necessary it is that a new social order be developed before a million times more awful powers are unleashed by man. So far the pearls of science have been cast before those who have given us in return the desolation of scientific warfare and the almost equal desolation of unscientific govern-

"In the world that is to come the control of financiers, lawyers, politicians and the merely possessive or acquisitive must give place to a system in which the creative elements must rule.

Mr. Gooderham has discovered, as was pointed out in this paper when the change was made, that many drivers who had been accustomed to drive at twenty miles an hour when the limit was fifteen, continue to travel five miles an hour faster than the present limit of twenty miles. This is true in Peterborough as it is true everywhere else where there are motor cars and drivers anxious to take chances. The question of speeding is very likely to come up in the next session of the Legislature, and a revision of the traffic rules, reducing the speed of cars within the limits of towns and cities would not be a surprising development.

What counts is not what the British think or the Irish think about Canadian representation, but what the Canadians think. We cannot afford to have Canada out, even though she were willing to stand aside. An American of sense and fairness would not find it easy to answer a Canadian friend who might say to him: "You put Cuba, Panama, Hayti, Santo Domingo, your dependencies, in the league, but you were unwilling to trust us. Why?"

THE FLIGHT OF "HONOR,"

[New York Times.] When the Germans refused to comply with the French demand for the surrender of war criminals, and declined on the ground of "honor," they made the usual heroic pose. Every German would die before surrendering a single other German to the allied monsters. But there was not the usual truckling, the usual worming out of the hole. However, the omission has beeen supplied. All the time that the Germans were making this heroic pose, the war culprits were slipping into Switzerland, just as if they had not the least confidence in all the sound and fury, and fully expected Germany to give them up at last. Not all of them have gone, of course but numbers are there, and other numbers on the way. Even such a prominent leader as the former minister of marine, Admiral von Capelle, is reported to be over the border; not that there was ever much likelihood of his being tried. In the case of Baron von der Lancken, who was civil governor of Brussels, there is more reason for panic: the Allies would like to get their hands on Von der Lancken, especially Belgium, Meanwwhile, it is observed that the French demands are not the English demands. Each country apparently advances its own list, consisting of criminals who have committed atrocities against it. The two demands are apart in principle, too. All the British want to do is to punish men against whom specific crimes are alleged, while the French want to punish those who gave the general orders under which the crimes were committed. The French demand is a counsel of perfection. Of course, the men who unleashed the passions of their millions of underlings, and even compelled decent German officers to carry out a policy which they did not like, ought to be punished, from the kaiser down. But as a practical matter, everybody knows that the kaiser Hindenburg and Ludendorff will never stand in the dock, whatever their desserts, and the British demand for only 120 prisoners, as against France's demand for 880, seems closer to the line of possibility.

TEA BISCUITS.

It is a very simple thing to make good biscuits, but before trying to master the art it is necessary to learn some foundation facts. If it is thick enough to be handled upon a board, it is called a dough. The difference lies in the amount of liquid used. If one cup of milk is used to one cup and a half of flour the mixture will pour, and is called a pour batter; if one measure of milk is used to two of flour, it is called a drop batter; one measure of milk to two and two-thirds measures of flour makes a soft dough, and one

The method is not quite so easily learned. Flour is of such a nature that when it is wet and kneaded it becomes a glutinous mass. This is just what is not desired in tea biscuits, so after the moisture is put into the flour mixture there must be as little mixing as possible. The fat is rubbed into the flour, into which the baking powder and salt have been sifted. When the fat is evenly distributed the liquid is added, slowly and the particles united into a soft dough with as little handling as possible.

Hecipe—Two cups of flour, two teaspoons fat, three level teaspoons of baking powder, a half teaspoon of salt, and about three-quarters of a cup of liquid, milk, or milk and water. The over must be very hot, the mixing must be done deftly, and the biscuits baked quickly.
