#### RECONSIDERED DECISION.

Before Inspector Hammett arrived today, City Clerk S. Baker governor-general. received a communication from Director Ellis, stating that, in view of "the newspaper controversy in London" regarding the condition of houses on Pine Lawn and Garfield avenue, he has reconsidered his former decision declining to order an inspector from Toronto to look the houses over, as requested by the London Housing Commission at its last meeting.

Director Ellis further stated that he has no desire to become involved in the "newspaper controversy," and that following his tour of the dwellings on Pine Lawn and Garfield avenue, Inspector Hammett will complete a report to be turned in to Director Ellis. Should the London Housing Commission desire a copy of this report, Mr. Ellis states that same will be forwarded from Toronto.

## U. S. WILL ASK BRITAIN TO **DECIDE WHETHER DOMINIONS** SHALL ATTEND CONFERENCE

President Harding Likely To Suggest That Each Government's Delegation Be Limited to Five or Six—Some U. S. Officials Fear British Empire Party Would Dominate the Conference—Canada's Vital Interest in Pacific a Good Reason Why She Should Have Her Own Delegates.

Washington, Aug. 10.—(By Canadian of delegates, it is believed that an effort will be made to have representatives of Canada and other British dominions attend the conference as delegates of a conference as delegates of the conference as delegates. Press.)—In connection with the issuing of the formal invitations to the disarmament conference to be held here on November 11, the status of the British dominions in connection with the event is reported to be occupying the attention of the state department officials. No statement could be obtained from the department this morning as to the possibility of Canada and there are invitations, and it was said that no announcement was likely to be made on the subject until the day of the sending out of the invitations.

The general feeling here appears to be that owing to Canada's vital interest in the Pacific problems, the claims of the Domlnion to a seat at the conference should not be ignored, but whether Canada will be represented as a separate unit or will have representation in Great Britain's delegation is a question upon which there appears to be some difference of opinion. It is known that President Harding believes the number of those who will assemble around the conference table should be as small as is consistent with proper representation of the various interested nations, and it is likely that the suggestion will be made in the the suggestion will be made in the invitations that the number of delegates of each government be limited to five or six.

OUR DAILY BREAD.

The mysterious virtues of the kind of bread "that other used to bake" have never been very clearly by Charles E. Saunders, Dominion cerealist, and discoverer of Marqu's wheat, who received the degree of LL.D. from the Western Univerthe last convocation. Dr. Saunders' observaare embodied in a bulletin on "Researches in Regard to Wheat, Flour and Bread," just issued by compilation he was assisted by the late Capt. R. W. Nichols, F. C. S., and P. Russell Cowan, B. S. A.

In referring to the question of the differences between bakers' bread and the home-made product, It is pointed out that the bakers claim that, obviously, a professional breadmaker, devoting his whole time to the one problem and possessing the latest knowledge, as well as improved machinery and appliances, must be able to turn out a better as well as a cheaper product than the relatively inexperienced operator under home conditions.

The bulletin goes on to state that: "The majority of people, on the other hand, unconvinced by these arguments, assert that not only is home-made bread superior in flavor, but that it is more wholesome as They even go so far as to accuse the bakers of adding a number of more or less objectionable chemicals to the bread-apparently for no other purpose than the joy of watching their customers die off with siarming rapidity."

Commenting further on this matter the bulletin indulges in a few scatning remarks regarding a lurid pamphlet issued a few years ago, which speaks of "the crooked manoeuvres and the great conspiracy of those thieves, the millers and bakers, aided by the subsidized press." The bulletin refers to the further allegation in this pamphlet that the parties concerned are said to add to the flour, alum, talc, boric acid, salicylic acid, gypsum, sulphate of copper and other deleterious ingredients, and adds that "such statements would be all right in a comic opera, but

they are out of place in a serious publication." Commenting on such wild and irresponsible assertions the publication of the Department of Agriculture declares emphatically that flour in Canada is not home-made product may be dismissed at ridiculous. bonest and too reasonable to indulge in the sport of

killing off their own customers." Dealing with the causes of the popularity of homemade bread, the bulletin expresses the view that in cities this is partly due to its comparative rarity. The concludes with the opinion that a fortune awaits the baker who will have the courage to put before the public thoroughly cooked bread made from the old-time simple ingredients and with the genuine home-made flavor, but sagely adds: "Of course, such bread would not please everyone." It certainly would not.

#### DEMOCRATIZING OXFORD.

Lord Haldane, addressing the Congress of Universttles of the Empire at Oxford, had something to say about higher education in Great Britain that was very much to the point. In the old lands, as in the new lands, the after-war period has seen a movement of students into the universities greater in numbers than was ever known before. The reasons for this are various, actual love of knowledge with many no doubt, with others a feeling that university education will enable one to "get on," with a few perhaps a desire for the experiences of "college life" along social and recreational lines. As far as Oxford and Cambridge are concerned there is a very marked searching of hearts at the present time. As Lord Haldane pointed out:

The essence of the intention of those universities for the two centuries before the twentieth was to equip the young men of the class then ruling for 'service in church and state.' Until fifty years ago almost every cabinet minister, like almost every bishop, had been at Oxford or Cambridge. Thanks to the inherent independence and generosity of the human mind, they also reared involuntarily many of the most ardent and successful leaders of democratic revolt against that class rule. When the democratic flood began to rise, the older universities, by the aid of some pressure from the state, made terms with it by abating certain abuses and by making it more easy for a few quick-witted, resolute and adaptable youths of no fortune to make their way into these fastnesses of Conservatism, become sharers in the opportunities to be found there, and so, as a rule, to detach themselves from their own class and be naturalized in the class previously ruling. Somewhat naturally, the leaders of Labor have come to doubt the perfection of an 'educational ladder which they believe to be so manionlated as to bribe away many of the most

capable of the younger minds of their class into the service of another.

In view of the growing power of the Labor party in Great Britain, a power that is likely to be even greater after the next election, the two great universities are likely to be called upon to give evidence of the adequacy of their service to the country, particularly if, in view of straitened finances, they must appeal for state support. 

#### WOMEN'S NATIONAL COUNCIL RECOMMENDS CENTRAL JAIL

Resolution Passed Regarding Those Under Sentence of Death-Govt. To Be Petitioned.

A communication has been received by Mrs. Gordon Wright from the representative of the National Council of Women at Calgary, containing the resolutions drawn up by that body concerning the question of capital punishment. Their resolution is as fol-That whereas the law as at present

That whereas the law as at present constituted requires that a person convicted of murder be executed by being hanged in the jail of the county in which the deed was committed;

And whereas there are few, if any, of the jails throughout the Dominion properly equipped for the detention of convicted criminals under sentence of death:

convicted criminals under sentence of death;

And whereas the detention of a convicted murderer awaiting execution in any county jall is not only expensive and hazardous, but casts a depressing gloom over the community in which the jall is situated, which gloom becomes increasingly aggravated as the time of execution arrives;

And whereas execution for murder by the imposition of the death penalty by hanging is increasing;

Now, be it therefore resolved that all necessary and proper proceedings be taken by petition or otherwise to the proper authorities, praying for a change, whereby all executions by hanging be carried into effect at some central point, such as the provincial pententiary in each province, and that immediately after the conviction the criminal be removed to such place for detention awaiting his or her executions.




