

Russia Holding Manchuria If She Is Victor.

London, Feb. 9. - Earl Percy, Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, announced in the House of Commons yesterday that Great Britain intended to send consuls to Mukden and An-Tung recently opened to the commerce of the world under the treaty between the United States and China.

The St. James' Gazette asserts on diplomatic authority that, assuming Russia defeats Japan, she will be confronted with a demand for the acknowledgment of Chinese sovereignty in Manchuria from Great Britain and the United States, and that she must either grant it or fight both coun-An understanding, the pap r adds, has been reached in this sense

DENIED AT WASHINGTON. Washington, D. C., Feb. 8.-The state epartment officials deny that any agreement has been made to the effect that the United States and Great Briain would intervene after Russia has rushed Japan, and insist that Manchuria remain part of China. Ever since the Turko-Russian war it has been customary for the great neutral ence at the conclusion of war to assure the vanquished nation in the strugg'e undue exactions and punishments. This was notably the case in he Turko-Russian war, and attention is called to the fact that although Japan was the victor in her last war with hina, the neutral powers, especially Russia and England, brought pres sure to bear upon Japan to prevent her rom pursuing her advantage beyond reasonable limits. Incidentally it also was pointed out that the two nations profited themselves by the acquisition of more important strategic points which had been the object of Japan's operations. Therefore, it is said to be within the probabilities that some kind of conference will follow a Russo-Japanese war. 



The railroad employes of the country have a special claim on public gratitude for the heroic battle they have waged against the elements during this extraordinary winter. Every man from the highest to the lowest grade of the service has been subjected for weeks to an exhausting strain. Commercial travelers and others familiar with "the road" fully appreciate the difficulties under which railway men have labored. The best locomotives have succumbed to the task of hauling trains against the resistance of snow, wind, ice and frost. Even when the rails are clear of snow, the ice and frost act as brakes on the wheels and put an enormous tax on the motive power. Long hours of duty, hard work and exposure to the weather have been the lot of every trainman. It has been a stern test of endurance for the many thousands engaged in the operation of trains and as a class they have met it nobly. The occupation calls for high physical and moral qualities at any time and the railwaymen of Canada have measured up to the standard in the trials of this winter.

Trainmen Give Their Testimony-No New Light on Case.

On the resumption of the inquest inkilled in the east end Grand Trunk yards, three hours were spent last night by Coroner MacLaren examining

four witnesses. Mr. J. B. Robinson of Sarnia, engineer on the G. T. R. express, No. 7, testified to arriving at East London about 3:58 a.m. Witness saw the semaphore when he got within a short distance of proaching the semaphore and before he could see it. The brake had then been applied. Had he found the semaphore against him he could have stopped, as the train was under control. Witness released the brake at the semaphore, and answered the signal. Trainmen were restricted to eight miles an hour, going over switches. Witness' train was going from eight to twelve miles an hour when the collision occurred. As witness came on to the switch he saw lights, white to him, which

meant all right, to go ahead.

V. A. Gray, fireman of the express, orroborated the evidence of the previous witness, with the exception that he didn't see the semaphore nor the lights, as he was busy firing.

That Engineer Phibbs was reputed to be one of the most careful engineers on the road, and was that morning working under signals, was the testimony of J. W. Norwood, fireman on Phibbs' engine.
