Witte, president of the Committee of Ministers, who all along has been considered the Rus-sian statesman pre-eminently qualified to undertake the difficult task of ne-rotisting peace with Japan. gotiating peace with Japan.

Witte, has now indicated his readiness to make the appointment, the commission will not be actually signed until Foreign Minister Lamsdorff, who throughout has been M. #### HE SWITCHED BALLOTS.

Wondering House Saw Premier Gain Two and Borden Lose One—The Militia Bill Advanced.

Militia Bill Advanced.

Ottswa, July 12. On motion of the House to go into supply, E. Gus Porter brought up the matter of the ballot box frauds and gave a demonstration.

Mr. Blain of Peel was asked to mark three ballots for Mr. Borden, and Dr. Schaffner three for Sir Wilfrid. They were placed in the bogus ballot box in the usual way one by one. Then the box was opened and six ballot were taken out. They recorded this vote—Sir Wilfrid Laurier 5, Mr. Borden 1. Mr. Porter explained that by a special movement of the handle six ballots previously placed in the box had been substituted for the six marked before their eyes, the latter being switched into the secret compartment by the same movement. Mr. Fitzpatrick said everything had been done to bring the offenders to justice, and the matter dropped.



## THE LEPERS OF CANADA

HOUSED IN THE LAZARETTO AT TRACADIE, NEW BRUNSWICK.

Disease Introduced by Two Foreign Sailors, There Have Been Lepers In New Brunswick for Three Quarters of a Century or More-Pacific Coast Lepers Treated In a Building of Their Own.

A foreign ship that landed two in A foreign ship that landed two in-fected sailors at a northern New Bruñs-wick port is said to have been the means of introducing leprosy into Can-ada. By them the disease was com-municated to the unsuspecting villa-gers, and in time it spread to other districts of the Province. That was no one knows how many years ago, but for three-quarters of a century or more there have been lepers in New Bruns

there have been lepers in New Bruns wick.

When the proportions of the scourge became sufficiently serious the Dominion Government built a lazaretto at Miramichi, which was burned in 1844, and replaced by a larger building at Tracadie, a fishing settlement on the Gulf of St. Lawrence coast. Still amother building, the one now in use was erected in 1896.

A few lepers on the Pacific coast have been provided for in a building of their own. All the other lepers in

of their own. All the other lepers in Canada were removed to the lazaretto at Tracadie, which is considered to be equipment and method of treatment in equipment and method of treatment, the best in the world. At one time the population of this afflicted colony numbered half a hundred, but the past few years it has been less than twenty, and at present numbers only fifteen. The institution is maintained by the Dominion Government, but the inmates are



THE LAZARETTO AT TRACADIE, N.B. cared for by a band of unselfish women belonging to the order of the Religious Hospitalers of St. Joseph.

The lepers at Tracadie have every comfort which it is possible for them to have; and they are grateful. The building, a fine stone structure, is thoroughly equipped both as a home and a hospital. Whenever practicable, the patients are given light employment in and around the building, and, by way of recreation, some of the men go boatsailing in the harbor. Four of the fifteen, however, are blind.

During the last year important results in the médical treatment of leprosy were obtained by the use of chaul-

During the last year important results in the médical ureatment of leprosy were obtained by the use of chaulmugra oil, first introduced two years ago. Even in some advanced cases, so the superintendent reports, "the effects of the oil were very marked, the patients becoming vigorous, and expressing themselves as feeling better and much stronger." One of the inmates, a man of forty-one years, was apparently so far recovered as to be allowed to go out for a time on leave of absence. The youngest patient is ten years of age and the oldest sixty-two. Religious exercises are held at the lazaretto and are appreciated by the limates, who are surprisingly cheerful and contented. The tender devotion of the women who care for them is in itself a daily object lesson. Yet it is te the casual visitor a place of dreamy oppressiveness, rightly called a "cemetery of the living." It is gratifying to know, on the authority of the medical superintendent, that the disease is yearly lessening in Canada, and that the ratio to the total population is rapidly being reduced. being reduced.

Curious Devices of Bankers Some amusing anecdotes are being told of the devices resorted to by bankers to gain time and inspire confidence. On one memorable occasion the excited subscribers of a Chicago bank, much to their indignation, were only able to enter the bank one by one except at the cost of explicit costs as the outer many cost of spoiled coats, as the cute man-ager had caused the doorposts to be freshly painted.



LICENSES IN OXFORD AND

The Toronto News says editorial-

The License Commissioners' for North Oxford have addressed to license-holders a circular which is deservedly praised by the Woodstock Sentinel-Review. They advise the hotelkeepers to observe the law, not only in letter but in spirit. Their business is to "keep hotel," to maintain a temporary home for travelers, clean, inviting, comfortable, homelike. The bar is a mere incident of such a hotel. If it is allowed to take the first place, the intention of the law is defeated. "The law now is that you must not sell to minors, order or no order. Do not forget this. Do not sell to weak men, men who you knew are injuring themselves and beggaring their families through drink. You must know these men, and you should refuse them drink and so instruct your help. Do not suffer any loafing about your place outside or in. If a man is seen coming out of your place, or loafing in the neighborhood of your place drunk, it gives your place away. Close promptly at the hour for closing and keep closed tight till the hour for opening. Open your barroom for nothing or nobody during prohibited hours. Keep the law strictly as to Saturday nights and Sundays. Keep your premises tidy and allow no unseemly conduct about." This is all good, and we hope the

Commissioners will act as well as they write; will compel hotelkeepers to observe the law, and treat fairly those who do so. In West Kent the Commissioners have begun badly! The Hotel Rankin, Chatham, is one of the largest and best conducted commercial houses in Western Ontario. It is conducted according to the advice of the North Oxford Commissioners. The license is cut off. not, it seems, because the hotel is badly kept, but because the proprietor is an active Liberal worker. That is to say, the promise that under the Whitney Government obities would not influence the administration of the license law is broken. The Government and its officials have nothing to do with the politics of licenseholders. Hotelkeepers have a perfect right to hold and utter any political opinions they please, to work for one party or the other, to support or oppose a Government. To interfere with these rights of citizenship is grossly unfair and tyranmal, and will bring the law into discredit. The Ontario Government is responsible for the administration of the law; it ought to insist on a reversal of the action of the Commissioners, and ought to issue such instructions as will prevent a repetition of the offence in West Kent or elsewhere.

South Africa's First Finds Were Paid

For In Cows. South Africa's first diamonds were

paid for in cows. The story is told by Joseph B. Robinson, one of the wealthy pioneers of that country. In 1879 he gave eight oxen and a wagon loaded with sugar and tobacco to a native in exchange for a twenty-three carat gem. "The news spread like wildfire through the countryside that a white man was giving away wagons and oxen for bits of stone," he says. " set all the natives who came to wor to seek for diamonds on one side of the Vaal river, and I brought up my ow fifty men to hunt for diamonds among the bushes and scrub on the other sid of the stream. I had bought the land on both sides of the river, so that was working on my own property Next morning at sunrise, when I wa having my coffee, I was startled by a loud hullabalooing, and, lookin out, I saw the whole gang of my me rushing toward me in a state of wil

excitement.
"One of them had found a diamon of good size. They all had come see what I would do with it. 'Wh will you give me for it? said the finder. 'I will give you ten cows,' I replied and sent the man into the here to take his pick. He marked ten of the best cows as his own. The men had never dreamed of making such a bargain. Ten cows for a bit of stone!
Off they went again and found diamonds every day. They became rich, and I accumulated a good store of precious stones.

"After we had accumulated a large quantity we decided we would better send them to London. We made a belt full of small peckets, in each of which we placed a diamond. When the belt was filled my partner girded it about his body and started for Cape Town He never took off the belt until he reached London. And it was in this way the first consignment of African diamonds reached London."

HOLDS EMPIRE OF THE SEAS.

Ex-Minister Delcasse Explains Why British Alliance Is Desired.

Paris, July 13.—Former Foreign Min-lster Delcasse, in the course of an in-terview published by The Gaulois yes-terday upon the British and French naval amenities at Brest, was induced to discuss his general policy relative to Great Britain and Germany. He "The policy of nations nowadays is

"The policy of nations nowadays is not based on sentiment or antipathy, but upon their material interests. As between Germany, and Great Britain our commercial balance shows whereour interests lie. Great Britain is our best purchaser, while Germany buys almost nothing of us and tries to sell us all she can. Moreover it is evident that we could not leave open irritating controversies with Great Britain which might precipitate an armed struggle, for Great Britain holds indisputably the empire of the seas.

for Great Britain helds indisputably the empire of the seas.

"For every warship we build she builds four or five. It is therefore well to accept these manifest facts and consider the value which British co-operation would give us in certain eventualities. The greatest intrinsic value of such co-operation would be the virtual imposibility in which it would place Germany of making war upon us.

"It is the sea which it is necessary to command to-day, and the war in the Far East has conclusively demonstrated that."

The chief engineer will give his en-tire time to the duties of the dual posi-tion. He receives an honorarium of \$3,000 from the Government as engineer of the railway, and the power commisof the railway; and the power commis-sion will, it is expected, duplicate this. sion will, it is expected, duplicate this. The decision to seek joint quarters is taken to mean that the new rallway will be operated by electricity.
