#### THE TRANSCRIPT.

QUEBEC, MONDAY, 14ra OCT. 1839.

DISASTERS BY FIRE, WIND AND WATER.

The ereates' fire that has occurred in New Vork since the memorable one of Decembe 1835, broke out on Saturday evening the instant. The entire square, bounded by Wa-ter, Fulton and Front Streets, and Burling Slip has been reduced to a heap of tuins except five or six stores in Fulton streetonly one on that street being whol'y destroy The entire square was do oted to extensive commercial tursuits, and the loss is very serious-some of the papers estimate it at a million of dollars, which is about half insured - the total amount of the insurance fected being \$474,500 -- some papers say \$600,000.

Upwerds of thirty houses must have been burnt by this fire.

The Senday Morning News states that : fire broke ou at half-past 12 o'clock on Sunday morning, in Elridge street, New-York, by which two buildings and a number of small tenements were destroyed.

Philadelphia has also been visited with destructive conflagration on Friday. It broke out at 1 past 11 o'clock, and cor tinued until six o'clock the following morning. Of 52 buildings which were on fire, 40 are in ruins. It broke out in Mr. Stroup's farge provision stores, on South Wharves, between Market and Chesnut streets, and crossed the latter The National Gazette estimates the loss at \$600,000.—The Philadelphia Gazette at \$350,000, of which it says \$250,000 is covered by insurance. Several persons-it is not known how many-have been killed or severely wounded. #### FROM THE CELESTIAL EMPIRE.

It appears that after the delivery of the opi-um, the British superintendent and the Ame-rican and Dutch consuls applied to the con-missioner for leave to withdraw from China-for their countrymen as well as themselves— which was granted by the following edict;— "It appears that the English superintending officer Snow, and the Dutch superintending officer Van Basel, have presented addresses, request-ing that they all should return home at the head of the people and the vessels of their several nations.

"These addresses coming before us, the commissioner and the governor, and being duly authenticated, we reply— "China has indeed no nace of commercia

"China has indeed no need of commercial intercourse with other barbarians. But because won have come from far over the seas, it cannot bear to push you utterly away; you have enjoyed the overshadowing, the comprehensive, and deep benevolence of the great Emperor, who has given sanction to the trade with Kwangiung. You have come to the territory of the Celestial Empire, have not only eaten of the herbage and trod the soil equally with the people of the land, but have also, by your buying and sellior, acquired very rich advantages. It is naturally your duty to rest in your stations, observing the laws. But for tens of years past, you have on the contrary employed a thing hurtful to men, as a means of gaining and possessing yourselves of the people's wealth.
