DOINGS OF THE PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT

Campbellton's Tax Reform Bill Agreed To, With Amendments

Fredericton, April 9.—The Legislature resumed to-day after the Easter recess.

The early closing bill which gives municipal councils power to make by-laws regarding early closing was passed through committee. An important government measure providing for the purchase of 18,000 acres of land from the New Brunswick Railway Company was introduced by Premier Fleming. These lands are to be opened up for immediate settlement. Much of the land has already been applied for; indeed from an answer to an inquiry it would appear that there are more applications than land.

The House adjourned to meet to-morrow at 3 o'clock.

The resolutions committee met this afternoon. The bill to incorporate the Sussex-Studium and Havelock Railway Company was agreed to with amendments that construction should commence in three years and be completed in five years.

Fredericton, April 10.—The House met at 3 o'clock.

Mr. Sheehan gave notice of inquiry regarding the loss of oyster boats.

Mr. Borehill gave notice of inquiry regarding the southwest Miramichi bridge.

Hon. M. Landry presented a petition in favor of the bill to incorporate the North Shore Railway and Navigation Co., Ltd.

Fredericton, April 11.—The accounts and miscellaneous committee met this morning. The bills for passing the bills for bridge expenditures in the County of Restigouche, and the latter considered a bill from the Town of Campbellton relating to assessment. The bill provided that buildings and improvements on land be exempt from taxation, but also the taxing of personal property and means and provides for a poll tax.

W. H. BELYEA ELECTED MAYOR OF NEWCASTLE

Chas. Sargeant, D. P. Doyle, Dr. F. C. McGrath, John Clark, James Falconer, S. W. Miller, H. H. Stuart and A. H. McKay Will Compose the New Council.

Election day was fine and a much larger vote was polled than last year, 373 electors voted, as against only 294 last year and 279 in 1910. There were 14 ballots spoiled as regards voting for the aldermen, but 7 of which were counted for one or other of the mayoralty candidates. The mayoralty contest was one of the closest for years, both young men being respectively popular with the electorate. For Alderman Chas. Sargeant was well in the lead, followed by D. P. Doyle, Dr. McGrath, and John Clark, then by James Falconer, S. W. Miller, H. H. Stuart and A. H. McKay. Only three of the last Council were re-elected: Aldermen Sargeant, Clark and Stuart, Aldermen Kethro, Dickison and Stables going down to defeat. On the new board, the members having experience previous to last year are Aldermen Miller and Doyle, while Aldermen McGrath, Falconer and McKay are new men. Ald. Stuart's advocacy, in the last Council of the abolition of property qualification for Mayor and Aldermen and the changing of the system of taxation did not, apparently, do him any injury with the electorate, as he polled a slightly larger vote than last year, while all the opponents of those measures, with the exception of Ald. Sargeant, received less votes than last year, three of them being left out of the Council.

ABOUT 1300 'UNDREDE' PEOPLE DROWNED

Iceberg Sinks White Star Liner Titanic 400 Miles South of Newfoundland

The mammoth White Star S. S. Titanic on her maiden trip from Southampton, England to New York struck an iceberg Sunday morning in latitude 41 16 North and longitude 50 14 West about 400 miles south of Cape Race, Nfld., and foundered four hours later with it, it thought, her crew of 860 and about 431 of her 1300 passengers—1294 souls in all—866 of the passengers, mostly women and children, are reported saved, were taken on board the S. S. Carpathia, which was called to the Titanic's aid by wireless. Other vessels apparently reached the doomed ship too late, although it may transpire later that more have been saved. Among the 350 passengers in the first cabin were several artists, journalists, military and railway men and multi-millionaires. The more distinguished were F. D. Millet, the artist, and president of the Consolidated American Academy at Rome; Major Archibald Butt, military aide to President Taft; C. M. Hays, president of the Grand Trunk railway; J. Bruce

The Titanic was the largest ship ever built. Her dimensions were: Tonnage, registered 45,000; Tonnage displacement 68,000; Length over all 852 ft. 6 in.; Breadth over all 92 ft. 6 in.; Breadth over boat deck 94 ft.; Height from bottom of keel to top deck 97 ft. 4 in.; Height from bottom of keel to top of captain's house 105 ft. 7 in.; Height of funnels above casing 72 ft.; Height of funnels above boat deck 81 ft. 7 in.; Distance from top of funnel to keel 175 ft.; Number of steel decks 11; Number of watertight bulkheads 15; Crew 880.

KENT-NORTHUMBERLAND DISTRICT DIVISION

Met in Chatham on the 15th Inst. Increased Interest in Northumberland County.

The twenty-fifth quarterly session of Kent-Northumberland District Division S. of F. met in Chatham on the afternoon of the 15th inst.

The report of the District Secy, H. H. Stuart of Newcastle, showed that during the quarter just past Doaktown division had been re-organized and new divisions instituted at Whitneyville and New Jersey. The Grand Organizer, the District Worthy Patriarch Rev. R. H. Stavert, was the organizing or re-organizing officer, assisted at New Jersey and in many public meetings in the lower end of the county by Worthy Associate Harold C. Stothart of Ferry Road.

There was a substantial and hopeful revival of temperance interest in Northumberland County where there are now eleven divisions in existence. In Kent Co. Bass River Division was dormant, but six divisions were active and doing good work. He suggested that this District Division discuss the advisability of separating into two District Divisions—one for each county. Each county should now be able to maintain quarterly meetings of itself. If so, they could have twice as many meetings as now, with a better percentage of attendance.



ONE MAN ONE VOTE IN QUEBEC

Bill Finally Passed—Males Over 21 Allowed to Vote.

The "One man one vote" bill was finally passed in the Quebec Legislative Council on the 29th ult.

By the new law suffrage is practically given to every British subject in the province of Quebec over twenty-one years of age, and while a considerable number of votes will be removed by the new system, it will on the other hand serve to add thousands more to the list of voters.

By the new bill the right of suffrage is given as follows:

- To any owner of property, lessee or sub-lessee of property, of any value whatever.
- To any son, stepson, or grandson of an owner, lessee or sub-lessee of property.
- To all laborers or tradesmen providing they receive a salary of at least \$120 a year.
- To all clergymen irrespective of denomination, and without any other qualification.
- To all engaged in the teaching profession, irrespective of salary.

The only restriction is that the voter must be a British subject, male, and must be twenty-one years of age or over.

There is no limit of time made for residence or ownership of property.

The new measure is about the nearest step to universal suffrage, and will entirely revolutionize the old system of suffrage in the Province of Quebec.



UNION MAJORITY NOT LARGE ENOUGH

Presbyterians 2 to 1 For Union, But Nearly Half do Not Vote.

Toronto, April 4.—The Church committee of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met yesterday and received reports showing the vote cast was as follows: Eiders, 6,245 for union, 2,473 against; members—106,755 for union, 48,776 against; adherents—37,175 for, 14,174 against. Ninety per cent of the elders but only 54 per cent of the members voted.

A resolution was passed expressing the opinion that the lay vote in favor of the organic union called for action toward closer union

although the strong minority vote indicated that organic union was not feasible at present. The committee therefore recommended that the General Assembly co-operate as far as practicable with the Methodists and Congregational Churches in foreign and home missions, educational work and theological publications.

An amendment favoring delay in view of the fact that one-third of the membership refraining from voting was rejected.

MILWAUKEE SOCIALISTS DEFEATED

Elected in Three-Cornered Contest by 28,000 out of 60,000 Votes in 1910, They Are Beaten by a Combination.

Milwaukee, Wis., April 5.—In yesterday's civic elections, the Socialist party, elected in 1910, by a majority vote of 28,000 out of a total of 60,000, the Republicans 21,000 and the Democrats 12,000, was defeated. Their vote decreased to 32,000 but the Republicans Democratic fusion ticket polled 48,000 total vote being 80,000.

Under the fusion plan the victorious ticket is under Democratic designation, but there is an even division of the candidacies between the old parties, and all candidates were pledged to abstain from party activity while serving the city.

Facts About the Chinese Famine

Area of affected districts, thirty to fifty thousand square miles.

Number of people who may meet death by starvation before next harvest two to four million.

\$1.00 will provide for one person for one month; \$3.00 may save a life; \$15.00 may save a family from starvation.

The following is an extract from the report of Mr. C. D. Jamason, the engineer sent out by the Red Cross Society of America to make a survey of the famine districts of China.

"As to the condition of the people, the suffering, starvation, cannibalism, robbery, etc., have been described each year for many years by the missionaries who live and work amongst them. But to me, worse than all the acute and actual suffering, is the mental and moral effect these years of want and discouragement are having upon the sufferer. Amongst a people with years of good harvests at their backs, although a terrible flood is a dreadful calamity, when the shock passes there is a rebound and a vitality which makes for strenuous work in repairing the damage and building guards for the future, which is the normal recuperative power of a healthy people; but in North Anhui and North Kiangsu this vital recuperative power is entirely lacking, killed by continuous years of failure and starvation. Year after year the crops are a failure by what appears an act of God, then the farm animals are eaten, then there is no seed for new crops, then the small farm is sold and the money soon expended and the choice comes between begging and stealing, and often not even this choice, as there is but little to steal and the strong take that."

It is suggested that all Canadian relief funds will be remitted through Canadian channels direct to China. The Bank of Toronto will be pleased to forward subscriptions from any part of Canada.

1000 SQUARE MILES FLOODED

Mississippi Overflows its Banks in Arkansas and Louisiana,

Greenville, Miss., April 13 — The Mississippi is taking its life on southern Arkansas and northern Louisiana today. With the force of the greatest flood in the history of the waterway behind it, the flood is pouring through two gaps in the levees, at Panther Forest, in Arkansas, and near Kosciusko, over fertile flat lands of the Louisiana Arkansas delta. Here it is estimated that 1,000 square miles in East Carroll and Madison parishes Louisiana and Chicoland, Arkansas, will be flooded.

In the meantime the river has paused its assault on its east banks and prospects of holding the dikes on the Mississippi side have brightened. The levees last night are regarded as the most serious that have occurred since the God period set in. The territory which will be inundated is populous, villages are numerous, and Arkansas City and Lake village, Ark., and Lake Providence, Tallulah, and Delhi, La., and other important towns are directly in the path of the overflow. While the damage to property will be heavy, it is not believed that the loss of life will be large.

CHINA'S CONSTITUTION

Guarantees Liberty of Association and Freedom of Religion and Speech.

Article II (relating to the People) of the draft of the provisional constitution of the Republic of China, presented to the National Assembly at Nanking on February 20, but which has to be adopted by the permanent Parliament when elected, reads after section 4, as follows:

- (5) There shall be no distinction of race or religion, all being on an equality. (6) They shall have the following liberties: (a) No infliction of punishment without judicial trial; (b) No confiscation of house and home without judicial sentence; (c) Freedom in the possession and use of property and choice of occupation; (d) Right of free speech, publishing and printing; assembling and forming societies; (e) Privacy of correspondence; (f) Freedom of dwelling and removal elsewhere; (g) Freedom of religious belief.

(7) They shall have the right to petition the National Assembly. (8) They shall have the right of appealing to the Executive. (9) They shall have the right of submitting all cases to the judiciary for settlement.

(10) They shall have the right, when officials violate the law to the injury of popular rights, of appealing to the Administration Court. (11) They shall be eligible for Government examination.

(12) They shall have the right of voting and of standing for office. (13) They shall pay taxes according to a fixed tariff. (14) They shall give due respect to the military.

(15) The above rights must be limited by legal provision when demanded by public advantage, the maintenance of peace, or times of special emergency.

Miramichi Quarry Re-opens

Quarryville Stone in Demand A Thousand Miles Away.

R. Geo. Hood, President and Manager of the Miramichi Quarry Co., returned from Montreal last week to start the season's operations at the Company's Quarry at Quarryville which is the new name given to Indian town. Mr. Hood says he already has orders for large quantities of stone part of which will be dressed at the quarry and part shipped in the rough. A busy season is looked forward to. He has brought a gang of men with him and will also have employment for all the local help available.

Mr. Hood speaks highly of the stone resources of this province and expresses surprise at the lack of appreciation of the beauty and durability of our New Brunswick sand stone shown by some people who erect structures in a mere imitation of stone, when the beautiful genuine stone is so plentiful and inexpensive.

The fact that it is in demand six hundred and even a thousand miles away where the freight charges more than double the cost of it here, suggests, he thinks, a lack of good architectural taste on the part of a number of New Brunswickers.

Mr. Hood does not find fault with imitation stone where the genuine article is unobtainable or unreasonably high in cost, but he considers its use in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia unpardonable.

Bishop Richardson at Newcastle, Nelson and Chatham

St. Andrew's Church, Newcastle was visited by his Lordship Bishop Richardson on Sunday evening last when the building was filled to overflowing by a large and reverent congregation. The usual service of evensong gave way to confirmation for which rite the rector presented nineteen (19) candidates, five men, four women, four boys and six girls, making a total of seventy one (71) confirmed in the parish during the past eleven months.

After the confirmation the Bishop spoke a few words of congratulation on the progress of the parish financially and spiritually. His Lordship afterwards gave a quiet talk to men only, on duties, politically, socially and religiously. The Bishop's visit was much enjoyed by the people and as for himself, when his Lordship entered the Rectory at 4 church he said, "I have spent a very happy evening."

On Monday morning the Bishop and Rector proceeded to St. Mark's Church, Nelson, when a good congregation was assembled to witness the consecration of the new burial ground lying between the church and river and recently decided to the Bishop of Fredericton and his successors for the use of a Church of England burial ground, by Miss Vye, a former parishioner.

At the door of the church the Rector on behalf of the congregation read a petition for consecration, after which the Bishop, Rector, and others in procession walked around the land to be consecrated reciting the 133rd Psalm. After prayer and reading of a special portion of Holy Scripture from St. Paul's 1st Epistle to the Thessalonians, the Bishop read the sentence of consecration, a portion of it being: "We, John, by Divine permission, Bishop of Fredericton, do by virtue of the authority ordinary and episcopal to us committed, consecrate the said piece of land, and do set it apart from all profane and common uses, and do dedicate the same to Almighty God for the burial of the dead, according to the rites and ceremonies of the Church of England, and none other, that the bodies of the faithful may therein rest in peace and hope of the resurrection to eternal life, through Jesus Christ our Lord."

After further prayer and a few words of advice from the Bishop the service closed with a hymn and the Episcopal blessing.

Bishop Richardson was the preacher at St. Mary's church, Chatham, Sunday, at the 11 o'clock service. In the afternoon the bishop preached to a very large congregation at St. Paul's, three miles above Chatham. This week the bishop leaves for Toronto, where he will attend a meeting of the Missionary Society of the church. Ven. Archdeacon Forsyth will also probably proceed to Toronto to attend the same meeting.

A TEMPERANCE SERMON

Sunday night, in the Methodist church, Rev. W. J. Dean's subject was: "Shall Run rule Newcastle?" In the course of his sermon he declared that business was suffering in Newcastle because of excessive liquor drinking, to say nothing of the bad condition morally. He wanted a clean, sober town. Men might preach to-day, but with little effect if law was not properly enforced. He would like to see women in the Council. Men who have been in prominent places in this town had spent days, and nights too, in places where liquor had been sold. The tendency the last few years appears to have been to use blood money in building up this town. He urged the rate-payers to vote for the temperance men only among the civic candidates.

FIVE CHILDREN POISONED

Doctors and Authorities Mystified as to the Cause of Death.

Charlottetown, April 14.—The death of five children of Patrick Magee, St. Marys road, 1 1/2 miles from Montague, all within 24 hours, is a great mystery, and the authorities are puzzled over the strange affair. After an investigation which lasted nearly twelve hours before Coroner Dr. Allan, of Cardigan, no definite conclusion can be arrived at.

Dr. Fraser thinks it a case of poisoning. In the post mortem dark spots in the intestines and interior of the stomach clearly pointed to poisoning. The organs will be forwarded to Montreal for analysis. Thursday the whole family, except one child who was absent, dined on having bread and tea. In 24 hours the five children were dead.

Dr. Fraser said decomposed fish might cause the symptoms he observed. Illness might begin six or twelve hours after the food was eaten.

NO LOW NECK GOWNS AT BALL

April 15.—In the course of his remarks in St. Dunstan's R. C. church yesterday morning, Rev. F. L. Carney referred to the assembly under the auspices of the Ancient Order of Hibernians to be held on Wednesday evening and strongly admonished the ladies of his parish who contemplated attending the assembly to conform with the regulation Catholic dress. The reverend gentleman expressed strong aversion to low neck gowns which are generally in evidence at social functions, and informed his parishioners that those desirous of wearing such gowns would find that their presence was not desired and that the doors of the hall would be closed against them.

DOINGS OF THE PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT

(Continued from page 1)

Mr. Sheahan asked if the Government knew of the Act passed last session at Ottawa permitting under certain terms and conditions, the government of the Maritime Provinces to grant leases to persons or companies of some or all of the unproductive oyster beds, barren bottoms, areas of sea coast bays, inlets, harbors, creeks, rivers and estuaries, situated and being in their respective provinces for the purpose of cultivating and producing oysters?

The Premier replied, Yes; also that the Act had been passed, he understood, at the request of N. S. and P. E. I., and the N. B. government had no intent on making any grants to private individuals or companies under such Act.

Hon. Mr. Morrison in reply to Mr. Burchill's enquiry: 1. Is the Government aware that the bridge across the South West Miramichi at Nelson is generally considered to be in an unsafe condition?

A. Yes. 2. Has any examination of said bridge been made by any official of the Government and if so what was the result?

A. Yes. Personally examined by the Provincial Engineer and report submitted.

3. What are the intentions of the Government with regard to said bridge?

A. Now under consideration. Hon. Mr. Morrison in reply to Mr. LaBelle's enquiry:

IRISH HOME RULE BILL INTRODUCED

Ireland to lose 61 Members at Westminster and to Gain a Local Parliament With Merely Provincial Powers.

London, April 11—The Home Rule Bill, the third effort made by Liberal governments of the United Kingdom in a quarter of a century to settle the quarrel between Great Britain and Ireland, was introduced in the House of Commons this afternoon by Premier Asquith.

The official title of the bill is "The Government of Ireland Bill." The bill provides that the matters to be excluded from the control of the Irish parliament are the Crown, the army and the navy. Imperial affairs, the Irish land purchase and the old age pensions, and national insurance acts, the Irish constabulary, the post office, savings bank and public works in addition to those excluded by the home rule bill of 1883 which left the customs under the control of the Imperial government. The Irish constabulary is to be automatically transferred to the Irish government after six years, and power is given by the bill to the Irish parliament to demand the transfer of the old age pensions and insurance act to its control on giving a year's notice to Imperial government. The Irish parliament is debarr'd from altering the home rule bill or the power to appeal to the Privy Council.

Provision is made for the protection of religious equality in Ireland and stipulating that the Irish parliament cannot make laws, directly or indirectly to establish or to endow any religion or to prohibit the free exercise thereof, or to give a preference or privilege to any religion or to make any religious ceremony a condition of validity of any marriage.

The Lord Lieutenant of Ireland is to have the power to veto or suspend any bill on the instructions of the Imperial Executive.

Any question regarding the interpretation of the Home Rule Bill is to be settled by appeal to the judicial committee of the Privy Council.

The Irish Senate is to consist of 40 members, and the House of Representatives of 161, of which Ulster is to have 59 and the universities two. The senate is to be composed of nominated members.

In the first instance, the Imperial Executive is to control the nominations with a view to assuring the representation of the minority. The nominations are to be for a fixed term and as the members retire by rotation, the vacancies will be filled by the Irish executive.

In case of disagreement, the two Houses are to sit in joint session. The Lord Lieutenant is to be head of the executive. There will be no religious bar and he will hold office for a fixed term. The authority of the executive is to be co-extensive with that of the Irish parliament. The 161 representatives are to be elected by the existing constituencies, but no constituency is to have less than 27,000 population.

The collection of all taxes is to remain in the Imperial service, and they will be paid into the Imperial exchequer, which is to pay over to the Irish executive an amount equal to the expenditure on Irish services at the time of the passing of the act.

An additional sum of \$2,500,000 is to be paid to Ireland the first year and this will diminish by \$200,000 yearly until it is reduced to \$1,000,000. The postal services are to be handed over to Ireland.

The Irish parliament is to have power to reduce or to discontinue the imperial taxes excepting the income tax and the stamp and estate duties. It will also have power to alter the excise duties but except in the case of beer and spirits it is debarr'd from adding to the custom duties anything which will give a greater increase than 10 per cent. The Irish representation at Westminster is to be 42 members, one for every 100,000 of the population. The representation is now 103. In proportion to population it would be 62.

P. for Calgary, will soon leave for England and it is understood will take up his residence there permanently with a view to entering British politics in the Unionist cause. He is said to be wealthy and there is a good field for Canadian financiers and political orators in England. He will probably receive his seat in Calgary before parliament reassembles.

I, C. R. TO RUN "FARMING SPECIAL"

Lectures on "Better Farming" to be Given to New Brunswick Farmers.

Farmers along the line of the Intercolonial Railway in New Brunswick will have the opportunity next June to take advantage of lectures on "better farming" to be delivered by members of the staff of the Provincial Government Department of Agriculture, in connection with the tour of the "Better Farming Special" train. The Intercolonial Railway will furnish the exhibit train, which will consist of three baggage cars laden with specimens for illustration and demonstration, a passenger car where the lectures are to be given and a car for the habitation of the officials in charge. The train will start from Fredericton about June 20th and its stops will be governed by a schedule which will be announced at a later date. The principal points along the Fredericton Division, to Blackville, will be visited, thence via the Indianston Branch to Millerton and thence to Newcastle and Chatham. From here the "Farming Special" will proceed East as far as Sackville, making stops long enough for lecturing purposes at Barnaby River, Rogersville, Harcourt, Memramook and Dorchester. Returning to Moncton where a two hours' stop will be made, the schedule will then cover Salisbury, Petitediac, Sussex, Norton and Hampton. The North Shore will then be visited and stops made from Bathurst to Campbellton and Dalhousie, after which the train will return to Fredericton.

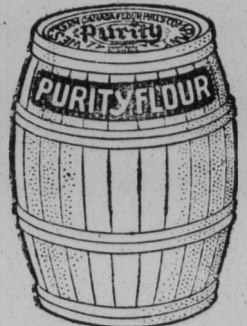

Temperance Meeting in Town Hall

A temperance mass meeting, well filling the Town Hall, was held Friday night immediately after civic nominations. Rev. W. J. Dean occupied the chair and gave the opening address. He was followed by Rev. Dr. Cousins, Sons of Temperance, Grand Organizer Rev. R. H. Stavert of Harcourt and S. of T. Grand Secretary Rev. W. R. Robinson of St. John. Rev. Mr. Dean sang a temperance solo and Miss Ella O'Donnell gave a reading. The speakers urged the citizens to support out of the 17 candidates for civic honors only those in favor of giving the town a clean government.

Rev. Mr. Stavert also severely condemned the game of "Bridge" as most demoralizing to the community.

Mr. Robinson showed that the intention of the Scott Act was not to provide revenue as appeared to be the purpose of its enforcers in most towns of the Maritime provinces, but to have second and third offences in regular order and to suppress the liquor traffic. It was illegal to use Scott Act funds to pay policemen or for any purpose but to enforce the Act. The fine for first offence could be made \$100 and for second \$200. The "occupant" was the proper person to be fined for violation of the law. He said that a law enforcement committee of 1000 members had been formed for the province and the day of rarping with Scott Act funds and enforcing the Scott Act as a sort of license was about over. The person to fine for an offence was the "occupant" as well as the actual seller.

SYSTEM OF SLAVERY

United States Steel Corporation Labor Conditions Denounced.

Washington, April 11th, 1912.—Labor conditions in the plants of the United States Steel Corporation were denounced as a brutal system of industrial slavery in the Senate, Labor and Education Committee's report on the proposed eight-hour law for government contract labor submitted to-day.

The government is bound in its own defence, for its citizenship, its life, to interpose between the strong and the weak," the report declares. "No man can meet the obligations and discharge the duties of citizenship in a free government who is broken in spirit and racked in body through such industrial peonage. And before he has reached the prime of life under such conditions, sodden in mind and broken in health, he is cast off as a useless hulk—a burden and a care in society, and a menace to the Government. It is just as much the government's duty to protect citizens from such outrageous treatment as from the burglar and the highway man.

The report made by Senator Borah, of Idaho, chairman of the committee, said the proposed law would mean better work, was constitutional and would produce better citizens.
