Annual Report Of The Miramichi Hospital

May 1st 1920 to April 30th 1921

Chairman's Report

The Board of Trustees of Miramichi Hospital herewith present their report for the year ending 30th April, 1921.

The work of the Hospital has been actively carried on throughout the year in a highly successful manner, and the records of the in stitution show a wonderful increase over any preceding year.

From the Superintendent's report it will be noted that 438 patients were admitted during the year, an increase of 29 p. o. over the figures for 1920.

The Treasurer's report shows the amount received from patients to be \$15,954.21, and this compared with \$10,959.39 the preceding year is an increase of 45 p.c.

These figures give evidence of wonderful growth and progress.

Much credit is due the Superintendent and Nursing Staff for far hful service during the year. They have displayed a keen interest in their work and are loyal to the institution. We regret that a temporary breakdown due to overwork compelled Miss Keyes to rist for three months during the past winter, but we are glad that she is able to resume her duties again. During her absence Miss Lockerbie acted as Superintendent in a very satisfactory manner.

Nurse's Home

The outstanding need of the Hospital at the present time is a Nurse's Home. Adequate accommodations and comfortable quarters for the Nursing Staff are absolutely essential, if we expect efficient service from the Nurses

A fund for this purpose has already been started and generous contributions made to it. In view of present industrial conditions, it has not been deemed advisable to make an active move in the matter as yet. The project, however must be kept before us prompt action just as soon as conditions warrant our moving in the matter; and in the meantime, we invite the assistance and support of all friends of the institution towards this object and urge contributions towards the fund whenever possible.
