



Board of Trade.


We congratulate Hon. W. C. Job on his election to the Presidency of the Board of Trade. Mr. Job has shown a keen interest in its progress since its inauguration and was one of the most ardent of its projectors. With his lively interest in public affairs, and his geniality and tact in dealing with men, favourable progress may be predicted for the Board of Trade under his auspices. It is also a matter of congratulation to the Board that the services of Mr. Fearn have been volunteered and accepted for another year. The success of the Association must largely depend on its enthusiastic workers. We note also that Mr. Gosling, who is second to none in the class just referred to, has had his merit recognized by his election as First Vice-President. It is a curious circumstance that the elevation of Messrs. Job and Gosling has taken place in their absence.

A New Ladder Truck.

While Inspector General Sullivan was abroad we learn that he gave particular attention to the securing of a ladder truck for the fire department, and one which would be particularly adaptable to the requirements of this city. The best which he could find he secured at Elmira, N.Y., where trucks at once light and strong are turned out, and one of these he purchased from the L. Franc Seagrave Ladder Co. of that city. It cost \$1,600, and will be drawn by two horses. This is certainly a step in the right direction, as our firemen were often impeded in their work by the tardy arrival of ladders, which often had to be drawn by men over long distances to the scene of an outbreak. When this truck is in commission it will arrive at fires with the rest of the apparatus and will be immediately available to the firemen. We congratulate Mr. Sullivan on the acquisition of this requirement.

A Frosty Snap.

To-day is far the coldest of the season and many say it is the coldest for the past three years. After the storm last night the mercury began to drop and at 3 a.m. to-day the glass recorded 3 below zero in the city. It was 2 below at the signal station at that hour, but at 10.30 it registered 1 below. All day there was a vapor of frost on the waters of the harbor and on the higher levels a high N.W. wind blew with intense frost. It registered 4 below zero on the upper parts of the city early this morning.

Fire Alarm.

During the sitting six members of the Labor party were ejected. One Laborite showed fight and the service of the police were required to remove him. The uproar at times was so loud that the speaker was reduced to a state of helplessness, and finally the Labor party withdrew from the House in a body. Progress having been made with the bill, the assembly rose. The bill will be carried into law in spite of the opposition of the Labor members.

### Prescription by Wireless Saved Him.

Portland, Me., Jan. 12.—As remarkable proof of the value of the wireless telegraph, Capt. Arthur N. McGray, master of the tramp steamer Herman Frasch, of New York, which arrived here to-day with a cargo of sulphur from a gulf port, told how he had been saved from a death by poison by a prescription wired him 800 miles when the Frasch was two days out.

Just after the Frasch left Sabine Pass on the gulf on January 2, Capt. McGray was taken ill from eating canned salmon. His malady grew worse so rapidly that 36 hours later he was writhing in his bunk, and realizing that he would die without prompt treatment, as there was no surgeon aboard his vessel, he sent a wireless message to the physician at the Government naval station at Dry Tortugas, which was then about 100 miles distant. This message was intercepted by the operator on board the Ward Line steamship Merida, which was then at Progresso on the coast of Yucatan, 800 miles away, and the surgeon on that ship wired a prescription and rules for treatment over an hour before the message from the naval station was received. Capt. McGray was in terrible agony, and believes that the timely intervention saved his life.

### A Plucky Mail Clerk.

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 5.—The police are convinced that two men who robbed the mail car of the Northern Pacific coastbound north coast limited as it was leaving Seattle last night, and shot and seriously wounded Harry C. Clark, one of the mail clerks, are still in Seattle. Two men arrested at Kent do not answer the description given.

Mail Clerk Clark, who was shot in the mouth and seriously injured, was highly complimented by the police for his fortitude in refusing to go to a hospital until he had given the officers all the information he had concerning the robbery. Clark was unable to speak, but bravely wrote his report while blood was dripping from his mouth onto the paper.

### They Agree to Differ.

The Earl has been described as an "unswerving and rigid" Tory, while his wife has always been a staunch supporter of the Liberal cause. Their son, the Hon. Geoffrey Howard, is also a keen Liberal, while the eldest son of the family, Viscount Morpeth, has been elected again for South Birmingham as a Unionist.

### Only Women Can Vote

All the Men in Ohio District Disfranchised for Selling Ballots. West Union, O., Jan. 9.—Following the votes in Adams County, every male elector in Billtown school district has been disfranchised and only women are qualified to vote at the next election for school trustees, and only two women will be eligible to hold the office of trustee.

### Killed His Wife Because She Lied.

Philadelphia, Jan. 12.—Because he believed that his wife had told him a lie, Henry Beckman fatally shot her at her home, 2536 South Watts street, to-day, and then killed himself.

Mrs. Beckman had told her husband last night that she was going to the theatre. Beckman, it is said, learned that this was not true. When she returned early this morning she found Beckman awaiting her with a loaded revolver in his hand. After unbraiding her he opened fire upon her and then shot himself in the head, falling dead.

### The Last Greah Auk.

Although it is as long ago as 1844 that the last great auk was seen alive, and the peculiar bird is set down as extinct, there is still a faint hope that somewhere in the cold regions it may be making a final stand for existence. The great auk or "gare-fowl" was a strange rover after its rank was diminished by wholesale slaughter. It disappeared from the Orkneys for a full century, and then, in 1813, a pair showed up only to perish there. Though the islanders called them "the king and queen of the auks," the female was killed by a stone while sitting on her precious eggs. The disconsolate male went away. Great auks were scarce even then, and when he returned the next year it was without any mate, and before long a fisherman shot him. Eight years or so later one great auk was taken alive on a small island near St. Kilda, and it is believed that in 1840 another was captured and killed as being the cause of the timber. In Iceland, or near the coast line, a few remained until 1844, when what appeared to have been the last two on earth were taken alive on Geirfugla-sker, a rock skerry near Reikjanes.

Thus perished a race of birds so ill adapted to self-preservation that on Funk Island, Newfoundland, many years ago, sailors used to drive them into pounds like so many sheep.

Meanwhile the record price of a great auk's egg stands at 300 guineas—about \$1,500. There are only 70 or 75 eggs known, and they are worth little, just about that many thousand dollars. The skins and mounted specimens in existence are 80 in number.

# The Typhus Outbreak.

## Question of Quarantine.

### The Public Health Officer Meets Municipal Council.

A special meeting of the City Council was held yesterday forenoon to discuss the latest developments in the typhus fever outbreak. Dr. Behm attended and was closely questioned by the Mayor, Councillor Channings and Councillor Mully, each of whom expressed upon the Health Officer the necessity of strict quarantine being enforced, and said that it was safe to act in this matter on the safe side.

Dr. Behm said that he was not bound to hold the inmates of a house under quarantine after being disinfecting. The rule followed so far, he said, was that when a patient was removed from a house the place was disinfected and released from quarantine, although other inmates who may be developing the disease, other people who wished to do so were allowed to visit at will. When Mr. George Cheeks was removed to the hospital and his house disinfected the house was not quarantined and there was no regulation put in force to prevent others from visiting his son and daughter who afterwards developed the disease, and are now in hospital.

It is true that instructions were given to a watchman on Fanning's house, a considerable distance away, to pay an occasional visit to Cheeks' premises, which in itself was an admission on the part of the Health Officer that there was danger of people visiting Cheeks' house catching the fever. No body knows how many neighbours visited Cheeks' house after the father was taken to hospital. Certainly the man watching Fanning's house was unable to prevent people from going there.

The Councilors were of the opinion that a watchman should have been placed on Cheeks' house as well as on Fanning's. The result since has proved that this should have been done.

The question of removing the residents of the infected houses on Pope Street to Wills' Range was discussed. The Mayor reported that the residents of that locality had waited on him and made a strong protest against people being removed there who would be likely to communicate the disease to those whose homes are already in Wills' Range. The Councilors consented that this protest was perfectly reasonable and quite natural under the circumstances. Whilst they are anxious to do what they possibly can to limit and root out the disease, they are most zealous that there should not be the smallest risk of giving the fever to anybody in a healthy locality. It was decided on the advice of Dr. Behm that the Pope Street people be not removed till the period of infection is passed, which will be in a few days.

Nurse Ellis who has been attending Fanning will have to go hospital and put in 25 days. She has no symptoms of the fever, but having been in contact with the patient, W. Fanning, this step is taken in order to make sure that the disease will not be spread through Miss Ellis. Fanning himself is reported to be doing well and will be able to get out of bed tomorrow. The man O'Neill who had been working at Mully's cooperage and confined in Fanning's house, has not shown any symptoms of the disease as yet. He will be held for 3 days more for observation.

### Annual Report of the

The Board of Trade held its second annual meeting in its rooms yesterday afternoon, with the following present in the chair: The Secretary had the honour to read, which in part is as follows:—

The Council reported the partial failure of the fishery for the previous year by 15,000 quintals. Westward of St. John's the fishery yielded fair results, although in some localities the voyage was unproductive.

Northward of St. John's, in Trinity and other Bays, the fishery was considerably short, while in the Straits and on the Labrador it has been one of the worst on record.

This shortage enhanced market values, and the average price of fish in foreign markets are probably as high as they ever reached. The prices of cod fishermen in many cases have been phenomenal. The long period of bad weather was a serious drawback to the merchants, as it resulted in buying much partially made fish in the hands of the merchant, which would have been fully made for us.

#### RECIPROcity.

The small and yearly diminishing fishery of Gloucester has induced some enterprising American firms to send vessels to our ports to buy cod fish. They purchased large quantities of this fish at satisfactory prices to us, and it is generally expected, in view of the revised apportioning of Newfoundland fish imported into the United States in American bottoms, that this business may be continued, and probably largely developed.

It is to be hoped that the Preliminary contemplated visit to Washington, in reference to fishery matters, and the decision arrived at by the Arbitrators at the Hague last summer, may not only lead to a satisfactory arrangement with United States of the fishery dispute in question, but that the cordial spirit which is now being manifested by Newfoundland and the United States towards each other, may eventually in more satisfactory negotiations, and to the advantage of both countries.

A very brisk business was done in December, probably the best for many years.

Year by year an increasing amount of trade is done in the exports by small merchants, who purchase wholesale in St. John's.

This has led to an increase in the wholesale trade and a decrease in the retail trade in some of the larger houses in St. John's showing a considerable increase in turnover, but with a normal standing in the cost of assistants in retail trade it is questionable if profits have increased.

Lumbering has been carried on with increasing vigor with the progress of last year. The European markets are not good, but those of South America are healthy. The building industry on railway construction, the prices of fish, and additional employment, have been the result of the spending power of the people in the revenue. The Minister of Finance collected for six months over 1,000 more than in the corresponding period of the previous year. The financial condition of the Colony is good, and the two or three failures which have affected the general trade are of little.

**AGRICULTURAL EXHIBITION.**  
The Agricultural Exhibition was a marked success, the building being prettily decorated and the exhibit of vegetables were good and abundantly ranged. The needlework continued some specimens of rare excellence, as well as those for ordinary use in the artisans and labourers' homes. The quality of the poultry on exhibition was extremely good, and it seems a pity that these excellent breeds are not more generally raised.

They purchased large quantities of this fish at satisfactory prices, and it is generally expected, in view of the revised appraisement of Newfoundland fish imported into the United States in American bottoms, that this business may be continued, and probably largely developed.

It is to be hoped that the Premier's contemplated visit to Washington, in reference to fishery matters, and the decision arrived at by the Arbitrators at the Hague last summer, may not only lead to a satisfactory arrangement with United States of the fishery dispute in question, but that the cordial spirit which is now being manifested by Newfoundland and the United States towards each other may continue in more satisfactory trade relations, and to the advantage of both countries.

A very brisk business was done in December, probably the best for many years. Year by year an increasing retail trade is done in the outports by small merchants, who purchase wholesale in St. John's.

This has led to an increase in the wholesale trade and a decrease in the retail trade in some of the large houses in St. John's, showing a considerable increase in turn-over, but with a normal standing in the cost of assistants in retail trade, it is questionable if profits have increased.

Lumbering has been carried on with increasing vigor with the prices of last year. The European markets are not good, but those of South America are healthy. The building of the branch railroads has provided considerable labour. The increased wages on railway construction, the high prices of fish, and additional means of employment, have been reflected in the spending power of the people and in the revenue. The Minister of Finance collected for six months \$70,000 more than in the corresponding period of the previous year. The financial condition of the Colony is good, and the two or three failures have affected the general trade very little.

AGRICULTURAL EXHIBITION.

The Agricultural Exhibition was a marked success, the building being prettily decorated and the exhibit of vegetables were good and nicely arranged. The "needlework" contained some specimens of rare excellence, as well as those for ordinary use in the artisans and labourers' homes. The quality of the poultry on exhibition was extremely good, and it seems a pity that these excellent breeds are not more extensively bred in the outports instead of the dwarfed and unsatisfactory birds, which are generally found there. The live stock exceeded general anticipations, some very fine specimens being on exhibition.

INDUSTRIAL EXHIBITION.

The Industrial Exhibition, held in the Prince's Rink, was a huge success from every standpoint. The fact of such an exhibition being possible was never contemplated, even by the manufacturers themselves, but when the thoroughly artistic stalls and splendid exhibits of local manufactures were in place, the scene was one of extreme brilliancy and beauty. The success of an exhibition can be largely gauged by its popularity, and when it is considered that something over 60,000 persons entered this exhibition during the week it was open, that its courts and aisles were always thronged, even on one or two very wet nights, its excellence received a very thorough endorsement.

IMPORTANCE OF MANUFACTURES TO ST. JOHN'S.

The importance of manufactures to St. John's may be estimated by the fact that over \$35,000 per week is paid to employees by the various factories in operation, and there is no reason why the prosperity of St. John's should not be largely increased if the local articles were more generally used.

TELEPHONES.


The Council are informed that no fewer than four separate Telephone Companies, in excellent standing, have investigated the condition of affairs here, and they are now making reports, which will be forwarded to the City Engineer, who will consider the same and formulate recommendations to the Government at an early date.

MARCOONI STATIONS.

It is with pleasure the Council note the progressive policy of the Government in establishing Marconi stations on the Labrador, and they anticipate that their suggestions for stations on the northern coasts, principally to keep in touch with the sealing fleet, will receive their favorable attention.

TELEGRAPHS.

The establishing of the Night Letters by telegraph has been of very great benefit to the trade. The Council trust that some arrangements may be made by the Cable Companies looking to facilities to the trade, similar to the Night Letter, perhaps in a modified form, which could not doubt be framed in such a manner as to vastly benefit the commercial community and the Cable Companies themselves.

awaits ratification at the next session of the Legislature. It is understood that this company will manufacture peat in the form of peat coal and briquettes, and in order to do so will erect a number of factories, each having a capacity of 20,000 tons of carbonized peat per annum, and which, it is anticipated, will cost \$125,000 to \$150,000 each.

COLONIAL FINANCES.

The Colonial Finances are in a very satisfactory condition. The surplus at the end of the fiscal year, namely, the 31st December, is \$70,000 in excess of the previous year. This satisfactory revenue has enabled the Government to make a wise provision for Old Age Pensions.

Mr. Fearn also states that the Government floated the 3 1/2 per cent loan in London at a gross price of 97 1/2 per cent, or 96 per cent net.

TRANSPORTATION FACILITIES.

The transportation facilities given by the Reid-Newfoundland Company since the establishment of their rail way and steamers, have no doubt very largely contributed to bring this about. The increased tourist traffic, and interchange of commodities between Canada and Newfoundland, would seem to make the time ripe for a daily express service between Port aux Basques, and it is hoped that the tri-weekly service, now carried on by the Bruce, will soon be superseded by one of six days a week.

STEAMSHIPS.

The steamship services as performed by the Red Cross and Black Diamond Lines during the past summer season, were of a satisfactory character. The Allan Line have slightly improved their service by taking the S.S. Siberian off the route, and putting a boat, with somewhat better accommodation, in her stead. The Furness Line has also been operated with considerable regularity.

Facilities for the receipt and shipment of goods from the Red Cross and Black Diamond Lines have been much improved by the receiving of some cargoes of fish for shipment by way of New York at the Coastal Company's premises, and it is understood that further improvements for the handling of the inward freights are in contemplation by the Agents.

STEAMERS FOR MEDITERRANEAN.

To eliminate the risks of delay, damage from heat or cold in transshipment, via Liverpool or New York, three steamers were sent with fish cargoes to the Mediterranean during the past season. The ventures were successful.

A company has now been formed for the furtherance of this business and it is anticipated that during the coming season, steamers will leave St. John's at regular intervals for the Spanish, Italian and Sicilian ports. It is understood that efforts will be made to secure steamers having a limited amount of passenger accommodation, and a fair rate of speed.

A LOCAL LLOYD'S.

The establishment of a Board of Marine Underwriters in connection with the Board of Trade is in contemplation.

FESTIVAL OF EMPIRE.

Every effort will be made to exhibit the resources of the Colony at the Crystal Palace exhibition to the best advantage.

TRADE COMMISSIONER.

At the suggestion of the Board of Trade, it has pleased the Government to appoint Mr. George Hawes, of Malaga, Newfoundland Commissioner of Spain.

CURE OF FISH.

It is with extreme regret that the Council note that there is no improvement in the cure of fish. The percentage of merchantable this year is lower than heretofore and it is difficult to obtain fish of a class suitable for the best European markets. Letters have been received in the City recently from the Gorton-Pew Fish Co., stating that some of the fish which they recently purchased in Newfoundland, was of inferior cure, and that if it were not for the excellence of the markets, they would suffer a very large financial loss. It is surely a matter of most serious concern, when fish is condemned even when only in salt bulk. If the people who sold this inferior fish to Gorton Pew Fish Co., had to split their fish properly, wash it thoroughly, and salted it carefully, three very simple and elementary operations, which every fisherman ought certainly to see done, there would have been no complaint whatever, but what hope can we have of benefitting the individual fisherman, and the Colony at large, by our fisheries, if, at the beginning of the process of cure, the fish is spoiled? In seasons, like the present, when the voyage is a small one, inferior fish may often be sold, but in the event of a large voyage there can be no doubt that all cures of inferior

EXPLOSIVES.

The importation of explosives into the Colony has an aggregate value of about \$100,000 per year. Negotiations are now being carried on with a view to the establishment of a manufactory for this purpose in the Colony, and it is hoped that large quantities of these materials may be exported, since the Colony can offer all the facilities for the satisfactory conducting of such a business.

PEAT.

An agreement has been entered into between the Government and the International Carbonizing Company, of London, England, for the manufacture of peat in the Colony under certain conditions, and which only

fish will suffer large individual losses, as well as also inflicting them on the Merchants. It is to be hoped that the repeated warnings that have been uttered by the Board of Trade, and others, will be given heed to, otherwise the inferior quality of dried fish being produced, will lead to its disastrous results, as it has often done before, and the new opportunity we have of introducing our salt bulk fish into the American markets will be killed.

The quantity of "dun" fish this season has been abnormal. This question of "dun" on fish has received the serious attention of the Council. They have got a certain amount of information and are now awaiting some translations of Norwegian documents on the subject, after receipt of which a Circular will be issued, stating the cause, and the best means of preventing and curing "dun."

STATISTICS.

The Council will endeavor to obtain statistics of the fishery as it progresses. Norway and Canada wish to exchange such information.

FISH SCIENTIST.

The Council have thought that it would be beneficial for the Colony to have an up to date Pisciculturist to superintend the preservation and encouragement of our fisheries and they have made a recommendation to the Government to this effect.

TRAWLING.

The hope is expressed that arrangements for trawling on the Labrador be made under conditions which will not interfere with other modes of fishing.

LOBSTERS.

The fishery last year was not prosecuted by so many men as the year before but owing to the increased size of the lobsters, about the same quantity was packed, the value of which is about 15 per cent. greater than before. There have been, and still are, a number of packers who persist in reprocessing leaky and blown cans, and a number of prosecutions have been undertaken by the Department of Marine and Fisheries for offenses of this kind. The Council are strongly of opinion that the offenders against the law in this way should have their licenses permanently withdrawn and that punishment should be of a more severe character than it is at present. The law which came into operation last year in Great Britain forbidding under any circumstances the importation of "Do overs" makes his class of goods quite unsaleable here. Germany, the other large consumer of lobsters, also rejects them without any compunction.

SEAL FISHERY.

The total catch of the 19 sealers which returned from the sealfishery was 333,349 seals with a gross weight of 7,628 tons, and one steamer was lost, with about 5,000 seals on board. An amount of over \$210,000.00 was distributed as earnings among the 3,364 men employed.

The prices of the seal produce were satisfactory, and but little still remains to be marketed.

HERRING.

The winter Herring Fishery gives promise of being good.

DRIED SQUID.

Dried Squid for purpose of bait has been recommended, and several fishermen have been induced to try it with marked success. There has been no case of failure reported by any of the fishermen who have tried it; they have been pleased with results. From shipments which have been made, it would appear that there is a fair opening for our squid in foreign markets, for food purposes. It is, however, a matter of the greatest possible importance that the squid should be cured in the best possible manner. The trade is at present in its infancy, and the Council strongly urge that the present time should be availed of to pass most stringent laws, forbidding the export of dried squid for food purposes, unless in-

BRAZIL REPORT.

The report of Mr. Dallas' mission to the Brazils is now completed, and is open to any member of the Board, on application to the Secretary.

INSPECTION.

The inspection of fish has been proceeded with during the past year, with great success. Two of our largest firms have exported all their casks fish under the Board of Trade inspection, and the result has been of a most satisfactory character.

The inspection of Cod Liver Oil has been suggested, and the Council are now considering the matter.

WHALE FISHERY.

The Whale Fishery for 1910 has been pursued with only moderate success, by many of the Companies. There were six steamers operating, and the catch was as follows:—Balena—16 whales, and Snook's Arm—60 whales for 1 steamer.

Dublin Cove—4 whales, and Trinity—130 whales for 2 steamers. Hawk's Bay—30 whales for 1 steamer.

Rose au Rue—89 whales for 2 steamers. Hawke's Hr.—33 whales for 1 steamer.

Some of the Companies will show a profit, others will not. One steamer was lost in the early part of the season, that of the Labrador Whaling Co. She will be replaced by a new one next season.

RETIROFFICERS.

With the advent of the New Year, the Council will be remodelled; the President (Hon. M. G. Winter), 1st Vice-President (Hon. John Harris), retiring, in accordance with the provisions of the Rules and Regulations, are also Messrs. W. C. Job, R. F. Goodridge, W. A. Munn, J. H. Monro, W. F. Horwood and J. J. St. John.

The Rooms have been used a great deal during the past year by various people interested in the welfare of the Colony, and the Council have granted their use for such purposes in the hope that much good may be accomplished thereby.


