

The writer was at Rotting-dean School, and recounts the following reminiscences:

How to Sink Submarines.

Veteran Whaling Captain Says Bomb Guns Would do it.

Boston, Mass., July 28.-"A submarine ought to be an easier mark than a whale," says Captain John A. Cook, of Provincetown, a veteran whaler, who is a recognized authority

on that subject,
"I have often thought," said the Captain, "that if I were in one of my old whaling vessels and found myself in the danger zone, I would put out my six boats, with a bomb gun in each of them, and would feel certain that if a submarine came within striking distance she would be sunk before she could do any damage."


