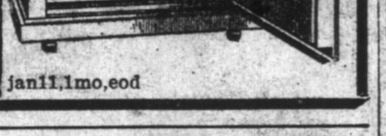

Provisional Government Irish Free State.

Treaty With England Approved-- French Cabinet Crisis Over-- Poincare Submits New Ministry to President--Closer Anglo- French Relations Desired.

PROVISIONAL CABINET.
DUBLIN, Jan. 14. The Provisional Government composed of Michael Collins, William Cosgrave, Eamon J. Duggan, P. J. Hogan, John Lynch, Joseph Mc Grath, Professor John McNeil and Bryan O'Higgins.

FUNCTIONING BODY.
DUBLIN, Jan. 15. The Provisional Government of the Free State is now a functioning body. The final formalities of the treaty with England were completed late Saturday, when, after a historic meeting in the Mansion House of Representatives of the Irish Constituencies who ratified the treaty, Eamon J. Duggan took to Dublin Castle a copy of the treaty signed by members of the Provisional Government as provided for in the terms of the peace pact. First on the list of the eight men appointed to constitute the Provisional Government is the name of Michael Collins and it is assumed he will be the nominal head. As a matter of fact, however, the correspondent has been informed that Michael Collins is the President of the Provisional Government and chair man of the delegation that negotiated the treaty, will be looked to as its supreme authority. ARMENIANS TO LEAVE TURKEY.
GENEVA, Jan. 14. Paul Symans, President of the Council of the League of Nations, presented to the Council this morning a telegram which Cardinal Mercier, Primate of Belgium had received from the Protestant community and Armenian Catholic Patriarchate of Constantinople stating that the entire Armenian population had decided to evacuate the country. The telegram urgently appealed for vessels to transport 120,000 persons.

ALBERTA PREMIER'S WIFE DEAD.
EDMONTON, Jan. 14. Mrs. H. Greenfield, wife of Premier Greenfield of Alberta, died to-day following a major operation yesterday.

LADY WHITNEY PASSES AWAY.
TORONTO, Jan. 14. Lady Alice Whitney, widow of Sir James Whitney, former Premier of Ontario, who died in December 1914, died here to-day after two weeks' illness.

IRISH RAILWAY STRIKE POSTPONED.
BELFAST, Jan. 14. The strike on the Irish railway, which had been called to take effect at midnight to-night, was postponed one month as a result of to-day's conference between representatives of the workers and the employers in Dublin, according to news received here this afternoon.

PICKED UP DOBY.
NEW YORK, Jan. 15. Captain Mitchell of the steamer Rosalind from Newfoundland reported on reaching the City Island to-day that he had picked up a fisherman's dory loaded with provisions about fifty miles East of Chatham, Mass. The dory bore no mark of identification.

ANOTHER FISHING SCHOONER A WRECK.
LUNenburg, N.S., Jan. 14. The schooner J. Duffy, a contestant in last fall's Nova Scotia fishing schooner races, is beached full of water and on her beam ends after striking on Oxner Bar at the mouth of LeHave River. It is feared the vessel and her cargo of 2400 quintals of fish for Halifax will be a total loss.

HARVARD DEFEATS DALHOUSIE.
BOSTON, Jan. 15. Harvard hockey team defeated Dalhousie of Halifax last night four to one.

Take Off the Duty.
Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—According to rumour the House of Assembly is likely to open on or about the 25th inst., and it is understood that the Humber Valley project is to be tabled and if found acceptable will possibly become law without much delay. It is also stated that as soon as this venture is disposed of that the House will close for some time and no business of a public character will be transacted at this sitting. My object in addressing you now is to remind the Government and the Premier that the latter promised a reduction in the duty of 2½ cents per pound on Sugar as soon as the losses made by the blundering Food Control Board were recovered by the present excessive and unheard of duty on this commodity. Perhaps you are not aware that the Government has been selling in New York to-day at less than THREE cents per lb., and our Government is charging SIX cents per lb., duty on this article are taxing the people two hundred per cent. on a food commodity which is one of the principal necessities of life. Assuredly the public cannot stand this treatment forever, and the Gov-

ernment would be well advised if they would take this outrage into consideration and remove this duty of 2½ cents per lb. off this article before adjourning the present session of the Assembly. Householders are finding it hard enough at present to secure food for themselves and families and are in no mood to keep on giving their very life blood to the Government in the shape of excessive taxation, and it is hoped that this unreasonable, unwarranted and unjust "hold up" on Sugar will be removed as speedily as possible.

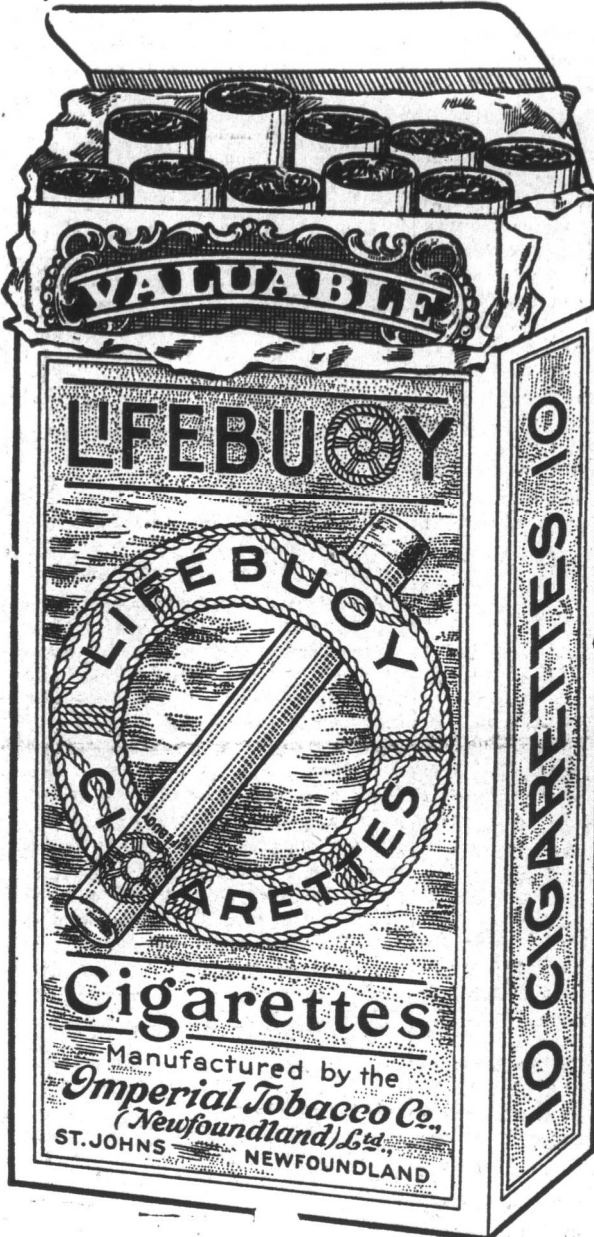

Will Increase Consumption.

Exchange Situation will improve, says Maritime Merchant, which will lessen cost of Fish Considerably. (Trade Review.) "The tone of the world to-day," says the Maritime Merchant, "is favorable to stronger fish markets." With this the Trade Review is in entire accord, and we predict a recurrence of new life and energy into the prosecution of the voyage next spring. As the Merchant says, "In the Spanish and Italian markets for the moment there is a surplus of supplies due to excessive shipments from Newfoundland within a short period, but this condition is likely to be relieved very shortly, and much stronger markets are likely to prevail during months of March, April and May. The exchange situation is going to improve considerably, and countries that have been paying enormous figures for fish supplies, will, under the new conditions, be able to obtain fish at cheaper rates, and hence consumption will be increased and, at the same time, will give better returns to fish exporters.

"When one comes to think of the almost prohibitive exchange rates," says the Merchant, "it is wonderful that the consumption of fish has been so good the past year. In Brazil, for instance, owing to exchange a pound of codfish has been double the value of a pound of the choicest beef or other fresh meat. The dried fish market then before long will be a seller's market that is to say, there will be more willing to sell at that price. This condition has been brought about not by the extraordinary demand for fish in foreign markets, but by a belief that is growing stronger every day, that all the dried codfish that is in the world at present is going to be needed, and before the time comes around, when the new catch will be offered, markets generally will be bare enough. "It is not surprising therefore, to note that with the past week some very large sales have been made at Halifax at \$3.00 per quintal in early December. Those who bought were thinking a little bit ahead and their foresight will, from all the indications, be justified before winter closes."

Gibbon, the Historian.

Edward Gibbon, the historian of the Roman empire, was born on April 27, 1737 at Putney, and after a private school education he was sent in 1762 to Magdalen College, Oxford, where he spent fourteen idle and unproductive months. At the age of 16 his inclinations were towards the Church of Rome, to counteract which his father sent him to live with a Calvinist Minister at Lausanne, in Switzerland, who ultimately re-converted him to Protestantism. Here he fell in love with an accomplished young lady named Curchod, but his father would not consent to the engagement, so young Gibbon "sighed as a lover, but obeyed as a son." Soon after this he returned to England and became a captain of militia. He next travelled on the Continent and it was at Rome, on Oct. 15, 1764, as he sat musing among the ruins of the Capitol, that the idea of writing the history of the city first came to his mind. Returning to London he set about collecting books and studying for his self-imposed task and soon began to write "The Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire." The death of his father left him independent and he returned to Lausanne, where he continued his historical labours for twenty years. He thought nothing of writing a chapter five or six times till he got it to his liking; or of spending a whole winter studying Roman law, which he condensed into a few pages. His vast learning and accuracy, together with his comprehensive grasp of every part of his subject; his orderly arrangement of his matter and his ornate and dignified style make his immortal work the king of all histories. It is in fact the bridge of history over the gulf of time; reaching, as it does, from the age of the Antonines, about A.D. 150, to the fall of Constantinople in 1453. Though nearly a hundred and fifty years have passed since the memorable moment on June 1787, when he laid down his pen, modern research had added little and upset nothing worth mentioning. Gibbon returned to London to publish the last vols. of his history, and lived six more years, during which he wrote his autobiography. He died on Jan. 16, 1794, from a long-neglected complaint brought on by overfeeding and want of exercise. The day before he died he said that he thought himself a good life for twenty years.

Russia is now unable to pay and cannot estimate her ability to pay in the future, unless she learns what outside financial help she will receive.

WELCOMED EVERYWHERE. LONDON, Jan. 16. A Reuter cable from Madras, India, dated Jan. 13, describing scenes on the arrival of Prince of Wales, somewhat discounts the highly colored reports of despatches previously received. Reuther's correspondent says the Prince was welcomed by large crowds.

All the Labrador fish will be gone out by the end of this month.

The shipments since New Year were 10,112 gallons from A. E. Homan Co. Ltd. to Boston, by the S. S. Rosalind, 2,110 gallons to New York, by the S. S. Rosalind from Job Co., 2,260 gallons, from A. Homan to Halifax by the S. S. Rosalind 12,653 gallons to New York by the Franklin Agencies Ltd., to 12,835 gallons. Stocks are now low and the market has slightly improved on both sides of the Atlantic. Outlook for the coming season is all round.

The Codliver Oil market is making up a little from the long period of inactivity. The Norwegian price has improved to the level of recent sales made from Norway to New York. The supply of codliver oil in New York is ample for all immediate requirements for some time to come. Export from Newfoundland has been little to go forward now.

The S.S. "Prospero" arrived from the Northern Coastal Wednesday with 840 barrels of cod from Springdale and Piley's mostly Scotch Pack. The fish is still going on at Springdale. The fishermen, who are getting sick every day with scurvy, still see conditions dearer than working their nets. The S.S. "Prospero" will likely call at Springdale to clean up the remainder of the fish trip.

The imports of the week just totalled 659 barrels. The trade has fallen down to the usual winter level in this commodity, as in all provisions. Pork seems to be the cause of the decline in prices. Chicago and New York quotations this week indicate a softening of prices, which is believed to be due to the Western strike and improved European export.

The imports since New Year totalled 81 barrels. The market is at last week's prices, and no change is anticipated during the winter. There is no noticeable change in quotations, but after the heavy sales of the past twelve months there is not much room for best quality to lower levels, and it may be assumed that prices are now at a level. The local quotations are: per barrel wholesale for Bos. \$20.00. Box, Packet, \$21.00. and \$21.25 for Boneless.

The imports this week were 1,111 barrels by the S.S. Rosalind from New York. The quotation for Wisconsin Wheat this week is fluctuating between 107 and 100 and Chicago 111½. Importers here look for strength in the course of the year as a result of improved export from Canada and the United States to Europe on the expected improvement in trade. To-day's quotation is \$9.60 wholesale for leading brands, and \$9.00 to \$9.40 for grades.

The market is weaker and has been sold in New York recently at 2 cents per pound. When Contract Committee went to business at the close of the week about one-third of the old crop was on hand. 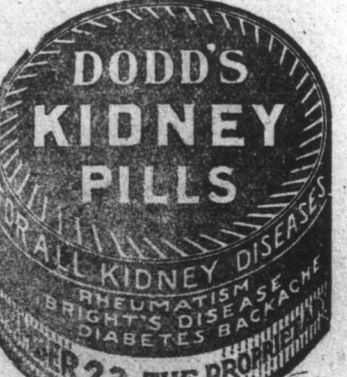

Delegates Meet Council.

Breaking Stones—a Matter for the Government.

On Saturday evening the Municipal Council held a special session to receive a delegation in reference to the labour problem. The delegation representing a committee recently formed at the Government House consisted of Messrs. Ayre, Shaw, Davey, Butler and Bambrick. Mayor Cook was in the chair and the full Council was present. The proposition put forward was that the Council purchase about one thousand tons of broken stone and a quantity of paving blocks from the Unemployment Committee. The delegates intimated that the unemployed of the city would be given work breaking stone and quarrying. The Mayor in reply stated that in so far as it was compatible with the interests of the tax payers of the city, the Council would give whatever assistance was in its power but, said he, in any expenditure they would require a dollar value for a dollar paid out. At present the problem for the Council was one of finance, and he said he had reason to believe a deficit of nearly \$50,000 had to be met. Proposals for raising the revenue were then put forward by members of the delegation. One of these was a debenture loan of a half million dollars raised in the city. Another was that the city should demand its share of the general revenue. It was urged that the Council make extraordinary efforts to


Square Rig Versus Fore and Aft.

A REASONABLE HYPOTHESIS.

In two recent issues of the Telegram reference has been made to the increase of the Insurance Premium rate on local transatlantic fish carriers, the large percentage of losses of such being advanced as the justification therefor. This is to be regretted, but it would appear to be unavoidable, and by some few at least the losses and consequent increase of Premiums were foreseen. No one can deny that the losses have been unprecedentedly large, and it is to be feared that whilst we continue to employ fore and aft rigged craft during the Fall and Winter seasons in our transatlantic fish trade that our losses must continue to be heavy. Until within recent years the great bulk of our fish carrying tonnage was English built, and more or less square-rigged. This meant a far greater measure of resistance in the hulls to the wear and tear of winter navigation, and their rig subjected the hulls to the minimum of straining and largely confined this to the direction to which the hulls structurally offered the maximum of resistance, hence losses in the past were fortunately limited. With the advent of the fore and aft rigged vessel an entirely changed condition of things came in. Structurally the latter are not nearly the equals of the English built craft, and their rig would appear to impose the maximum of the thrust of their sail power, through their masts, on the hull in the direction to which it structurally is able to offer the minimum of resistance. In other words the thrust of the spars in the square-rigged—or some—square-rigged vessel is largely fore and aft—the direction in which the hull is structurally strongest, but in the fore and aft rigged vessel the thrust of the spars is largely lateral, the direction in which the hull structurally offers the least resistance.

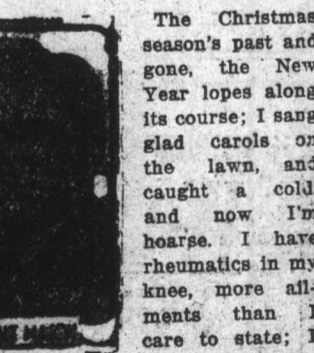

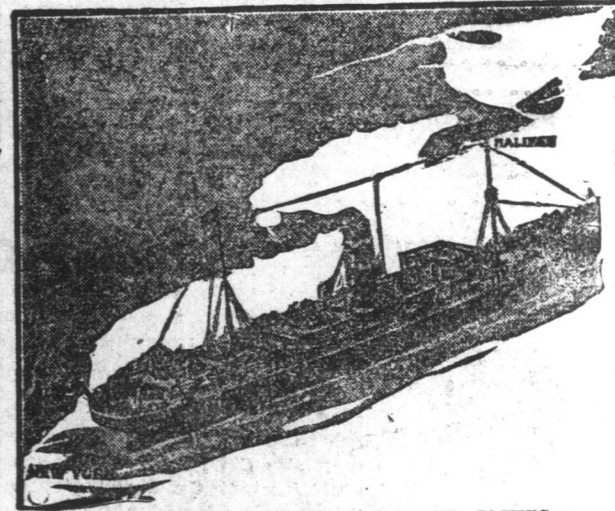
