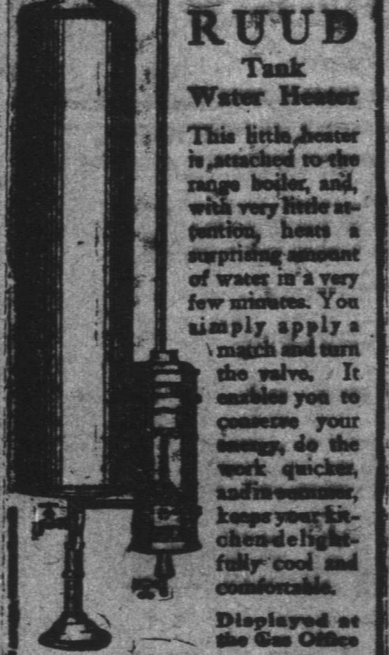

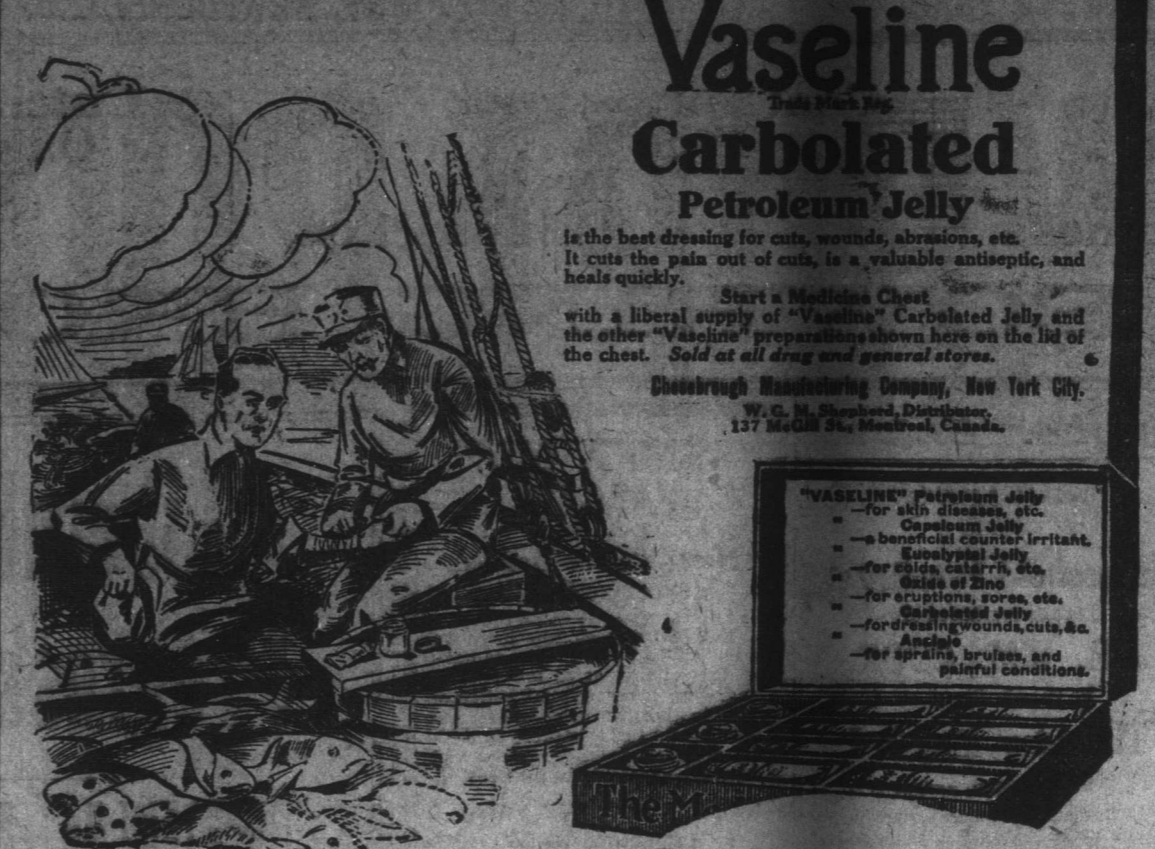

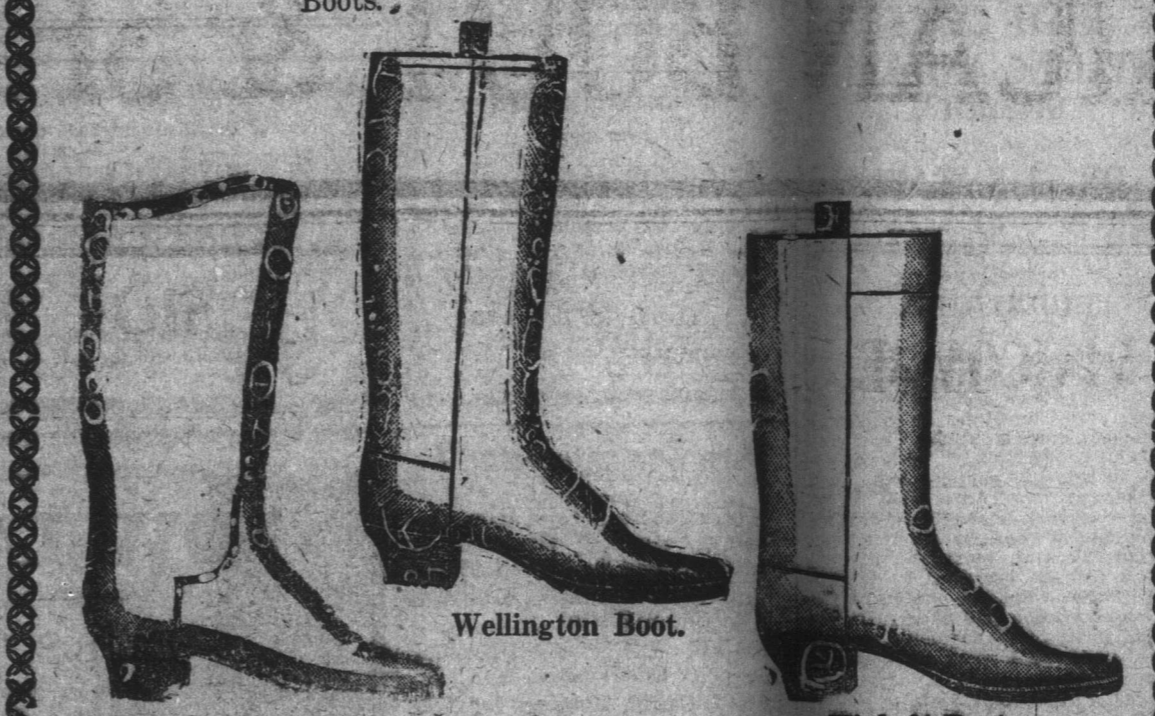

That they possess in undiminished vigour the freedom to use their own judgment unswayed by the ravings of the demagogue who boasted they were his willing and obedient tools. They have reasoned for themselves as between their duty to their own best interests and those of their families in considering which was better for this country, the policy of Bennett and Better Times as against the record of the Squires Government and the appeal of the latter to snatch the reins of power by the hoodwink policy of a secret Humber Deal; and their answer they have given to their fellow countrymen is one which leaves no false impression of their intelligence and independence. They have unmistakably answered by their public meetings, by their endorsement and enthusiasm in messages over the wires and by other means of communication that though in the past they gave to Coaker a mandate to assume power in their interests and those of the country generally they no longer consider he is entitled to that confidence and therefore the misuse of the Squires-Coaker Government must give way to that of the party of Bennett and Better Times. ### Banking Under a Tree.

Since the Indian village bank, a new departure for rural villages which have hitherto been dominated by the individual money-lender, does business with the central bank through the medium of the post-office, no village bank building, no office with counters and wicketed windows and vaults and safes is needed. If you happen about seven in the morning to wander into one of the countless groves of trees that shelter the thousands of villages scattered over the plains of India, you may chance to come upon a meeting of the board of directors of the bank. In the very center of the village is a big, shady tree, with a little square platform two or three feet high built round the trunk. There sit the elders of the village, each wrapped in a sheet, each with a twig tooth brush in his mouth, talking village politics for an hour or two before dispersing for the work of the day. Possibly a villager who wishes to borrow money paid a visit to the house of the president the night before and obtained a promise that the matter should be further discussed in the morning. If he has gone off now to hunt up a missing director or two, the others remain comfortably on the platform, cross-legged or with feet resting on the ground, chewing betel-nut, perhaps, or smoking, polishing their teeth with their tooth-brushes and discussing among other things the character and prospects of applicants for loans. If a man's grandfather has been in jail, or he himself has ever fallen foul of the police, or if his wife has quarrelled with the wife of one of the directors, those facts are taken into account.

Though non-members may deposit money in the bank, only persons who live in the village and belong to the co-operative society may borrow. A man who wishes to obtain a loan must bring two securities, and sometimes in addition must put up his land as collateral security. He must borrow for productive purposes and no more than he needs. If he says he wants 100 rupees for a cow, one of the elders may ask: "Can't you buy a cow for 75 or 80 rupees? Last month my uncle's cousin bought a cow for 60 rupees." The board, unlike the money-lender, encourages him to borrow economically, and it will also help him buy the cow, so that the seller cannot cheat him. ### EARLY CABLES.

**FIFTY STEAMERS BARRED BY ICE**  
NORTH SYDNEY, May 1  
A solid field of heavy close packed ice is stretching between the Cape Breton Coast and Newfoundland and far south into the Atlantic. It is estimated this morning to be blocking the passage of at least fifty ocean going steamers, judging from the mass of wireless calls with which the air had been charged during the past 24 hours. The nearest vessels were the Kyle from Newfoundland for North Sydney with passengers and mail which was caught in the ice with a blade lost from her propeller, and the Government steamer Montcalm, from St. Lawrence port en route to aid the steamer Cyrric Queen, ashore near Point Esprit. Both are having a hard time but they are not in danger.

### THE LABRADOR TRAGEDY.

ST. JOHN, April 28.  
According to news received by relatives in St. John, records concerning the death of Miss Marguerite Lindsay, Labrador school teacher, are not yet closed and it is expected there may be startling developments when findings of the official inquiry are made public.

### FLOOD CONDITIONS IN NEW BRUNSWICK.

FREDERICTON, May 4.  
New Brunswick is in the grip of flood conditions of such nature as to fast approach the record set in the spring of 1887. The damage is already estimated at a million dollars.

### TWO GRADUATES.

MONTREAL, April 28.  
May Athena Grimes, St. John's, Nfld., and Nellie V. Parsons, Lush's Bight, Nfld., are included in a graduation class of eleven from the Children's Memorial Hospital, here.

### GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP.

OTTAWA, May 1.  
The Canadian Government Merchant Marine had a deficit last year of \$8,699,000 after all charges had been met. The losses on operations alone was \$2,384,000.

### RUM RUNNER LOST.

FISHER'S ISLAND, April 28.  
British steam yacht Thelma Phoenix was driven ashore here Sunday and twenty-one members of the crew were rescued by a lifeboat crew. A negro cook named Robert was drowned. A number of cases of liquor drifted ashore.

### SCHOONER POUNDS TO PIECES.

PORTLAND, Me., April 20.  
The three-masted schooner Francis Goodnow, of Boston, ran ashore at Mickenney's Point Sunday morning, and was pounded to pieces. Capt. W. J. Johnson and crew were rescued.

### SYDNEY MINES THREATEN TROUBLE.

SYDNEY, April 30.  
Protests against the detention at the border of Alex Howatt, deposed President of the Kansas miners, who was to have been the principal speaker at the Cape Breton May Day demonstrations, were voiced at a mass meeting of Glace Bay and Sydney miners yesterday. Unless Howatt was released the miners threatened in a resolution to resume strike on job tactics.

### Hints for Housewives.

When fruit for stewing is very acid a pinch of borax will reduce the acidity.

To make clothes beautifully white, slice an unpeeled lemon into the water in which they are to be boiled. Black shoes can be improved by rubbing them well with the inside of fresh orange peel; polish after with a soft cloth.

To pare apples easily and economically, pour boiling water over them and let them stand in it for one minute before paring.

To clean a light or white straw hat rub with a lemon dipped in sulphur, wash off with water, and stiffen with white of egg.

To clean black, grey, or variegated marble rub briskly with a cloth wrung nearly dry out of cold water, dust while still damp with flour, dry with fine flannel, and polish with a leather.

A cut lemon rubbed on clove, real or imitation, removes grime, and renews both freshness and lustre.

Clean discoloured crusts by putting into them tea-leaves fresh from the pot, with a little soap and hot water; shake well, and rinse.

To soften a hard sponge, cover with cold water, to which a tablespoonful of borax has been added, bring slowly to the boil in a clean saucepan, take out the sponge, rub dry borax into it, and rinse well in cold water.

Take the knot of the thread through to the right side of the material. It is the wearing of this knot which often causes a button to come off. Now place a pin over the button, and proceed to sew on the button in the usual way, working it over the pin, and entwining the thread at the stem of the button, finally pulling out pin.

By this method there is not the same strain when fastening and unfastening a button, and if properly done will last very much longer.

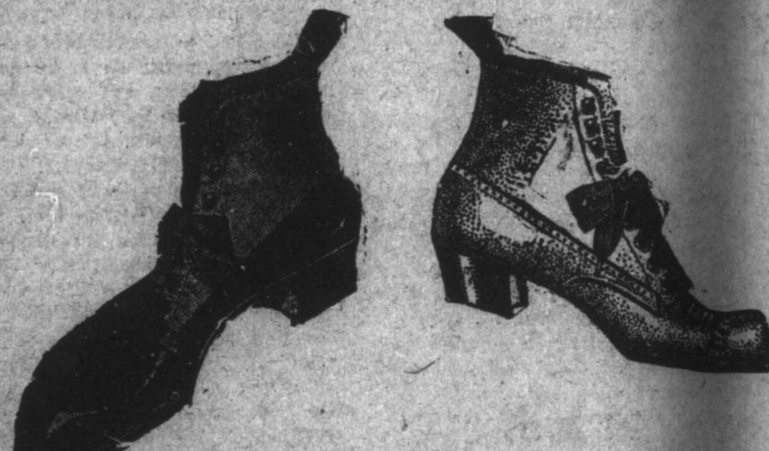

**Buying Goods Without Assistance.**

A lecture at the Imperial Institute in London, England, recently, which Mr. Brown described a primitive method used by the natives of the island of selling goods without assistance.

men but they fooled us. We thought that they might think that it was our money, but they have justly punished us because if we had done right we could not have put them in the humiliating position and increased their taxes in the bargain. For it is they who will have to pay the additional taxes.

The next argument they use to fool the working man into voting for them is, "Oh, if the Government is defeated all this work will stop." The answer to this is that work will be found of some kind to keep every man from starving. No Government

will allow that, but we hope it will be better work than rock breaking and snow shovelling, and that the workman's manhood will not be sacrificed. There will be such a boom in business and such a new confidence awakened when this gang is defeated, that every man before long will find his old time employment.

Men who have capital simply won't invest money in the fisheries and minerals and other industries of the country while this wretched bunch of incapables are in control. They fear their want of knowledge, they fear their lust for place and pay,

they fear their hampering legislation, they fear their interference with the fish export and trade generally. They fear their expressed hatred and antagonism to the merchants and all is kept tied up except the mere bit to eat. All this cloud will be lifted when the new Government takes control.

AND THE GOVERNMENT'S PROMISES.

The Squires organ with its customary trickery returned last night to the attack on Mr. T. J. Freeman and those connected with the St. George's Coal Company. But we do not propose to let the public attention be distracted from the real issue by this sort of thing. The real issue, we would point out, is embodied in this question: "Why did not the Squires Government carry out its promise to the St. George's Coal Company?" That is what the 2,400 shareholders in the Company and the public in general want to know and they will not be fooled by any dis- tress such as the Daily Mail was trying to get off yesterday. The public generally and the shareholders of the St. George's Coal Company in particular know full well that two companies with coal prospects had put their claims before the Squires-Coaker party. These two companies were the St. George's Coal Company, with twenty-six hundred local shareholders, most of them in humble circumstances whose investment represented a real sacrifice to them. The other was the Reid Newfoundland Co., a wealthy corporation which had been denounced by Squires and Coaker and their candidates from every platform in the country in the election in the Fall of 1919. The public and these twenty-six hundred shareholders would like to know now, why the half million dollars, which was taken from the public funds by the Squires-Coaker crew, to use for developing coal areas was not applied to the property owned by these twenty-six hundred shareholders, but was applied to the property owned by the Reid Newfoundland Company. To put it in another way, the shareholders in particular and the public in general would like to know what was the influence that was powerful enough to get Squires and Coaker to take half a million dollars of the public money and spend it on the Reid property a few months after they attained office, on a policy of denouncing the Reid, instead of putting it on a property owned by twenty-six hundred shareholders, all of them natives of the country and most of them men owning one or more shares of small value, because this property was developed on the theory of getting the investment in it spread over a great number of people in moderate circumstances who would buy its product and thus provide a market for the Company. The day is gone by when the Squires-Coaker crew or its newspapers can fool the public by the sort of talk that was put up last night. The people, and especially the shareholders in the St. George's Coal Company, want to know why the Squires-Coaker party did not make good its promises and why it took public money to spend on developing the Reid property. That is the question fairly and squarely stated. It is up to Squires to answer it. We wonder will he answer it. We feel certain he cannot answer it in a way that will satisfy the twenty-six hundred shareholders or the public in general.

Citizens of St. John's!

Don't Permit Coakerism to Put a Mortgage on Your Property, Your Homes and Contents and Your Very Earnings.

Fellow citizens: There is something greater at stake in this election than the Premiership of the Premier or of any man or other belonging to this party or that, and this is the outstanding fact that if we vote for a continuance of the domineering rule of Coakerism, St. John's will receive its death blow. The arrogance of Coaker will then assert itself with a ten fold violence to rule this country according to his most fantastic whims. It is easy to calculate what will happen then for we have the record of Coakerism during the past three years as a basis from which to start. When, after the defeat of the former Government, Coaker stepped into the Executive Council he at once forced upon the colony those ruinous regulations which hit St. John's as much as any other part of the Island a terrible blow. Business that had been booming for a long time was at once covered with a pall of depression worse than what had happened in the year of the Bank Crash; the money circulating medium created by the previous hampered movements of our fishery products dried up at its source, and thousands, who otherwise obtained good earnings to support their families were gradually thrown out of employment. Month after month factories slackened off in their production and reduced their staff of workers. Business men who had large trade connections with the outside found it unable to turn over any more of their stock to those former good customers outside the city, and for the goods and supplies that had been previously sold they could obtain no returns simply because the hampering conditions of the Coaker Regulations dried up their sources

from which money had hitherto been freely available. Month after month this cloud of depression kept on increasing, one business house after another tumbling to the wall and bringing down with it to its ruin the loss or employment to tradesmen, clerks and laborers. Families who were comfortable before were reduced to varying stages of discomfort. Earnings which previously sufficed for the family needs were lessened in some cases to a degree, which only by the strictest economy, and by the denial of many necessities, enabled the housekeeper to barely exist. In other cases—families barely tottering along with small earnings from time to time, going for weeks with scarcely enough food in their larder to give them a laudible meal; others were obliged to use up the savings of other years to keep them alive, whilst there were many instances of families being obliged to seek ordinary necessities from charitable sources and friends and relatives not much better off than themselves. Stores and mercantile premises, where happy and contented men found continual employment, both on the Water Street front and on the Southside were one by one closed down, their owners either drifting into insolvency or becoming so straitened for the want of the ready capital they were prevented from obtaining that these former hires of industry became only rumping places for the rats. Good money which should have found its way into our former channels of trade and commerce, and thus to be circulated amongst our citizens, no longer could be had, making St. John's the poorer by many millions of dollars which our own fishery pro-

**M. Devine Interviewed.**

M. Devine, ex-Trade Commissioner to the United States, who arrived in St. John's Monday, was interviewed by a representative of the "Coastline." The first question asked him was: "Why did you sever your connection with the Coaker-Squires?" He replied: "Well, sir, I can give you several reasons and if you care to do so without feeling that I am in any way infringing on the rights of Mr. Squires, I will give you my fourteen points."

**1. DEVIENE'S 14 POINTS.**

1. My cabin coming along with me, I realized that I would be asked by many of my countrymen why I had not been on the last lap and when I gave the answer and put them to rest, I found that I had 14. Here they are:

1. Mr. Richard Squires was not asked to perform any duties made in his Majesty's service.

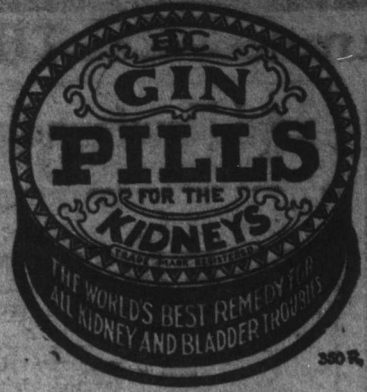
2. I regard it as a sound policy that when the Government retards industry and the necessities of life by taxation, it is not only a waste of money but also a menace to the health of the people.

3. I saw that the Prime Minister had fallen beyond hope into a position of being a puppet to the dictates of a Premier who was Premier in name only, a veritable vixen.

4. I was brought to realize that the most important department of the Government, namely the Fisheries, was being used as a tool to jeopardize Newfoundland in the fish markets.

5. It was used to destroy the fisheries of our coast.

6. I realized that it was a Government that a Government



that does not work in harmony with the exporters of a country's staple products and refrains from enacting laws in "restraint of trade" and setting up its ideas against the expert knowledge of exporters of fish on this side, and importers on the other side, and acting in defiance of the law of supply and demand forfeits the confidence of the people and deserves to be dismissed.

7. Because while I have my senses I refuse to support a Government of Newfoundland that says in effect: "It is impossible to run the Civil Service for less than \$600,000."

8. Because I cannot support a Government that does not make a better attempt to pattern its trade policy after that of the Mother country, which realizing the independence of our nationality on another encourages and fosters trade relations with all regardless of nationality.

9. Because no sane man can support a Government that apparently imagines that it is the highest form of statesmanship to impose taxes to the extent that makes prices of essential commodities prohibitive to the majority of its people.

10. Because a Government that fails in the obvious duty of advertising its people's products in countries where there are millions of prospective buyers of the said products is either ignorant of modern trade methods of expansion, or is obsessed with gross indifference to the welfare of its people the producers, by remaining a supporter of such a Government I would be doing violence to my conscience and to my intelligence.

11. Because when a Government fails to protect the legitimate trade of its people against the incursions of unscrupulous dealers there is only one word to apply to that Government namely "Incapacity."

12. Because the Squires-Coaker Government failed to foster trade relations with people who have money to buy Newfoundland products and who want those products. They acted in diametric opposition to the policy of the astute statesman of his Mother Country.

13. Because a million-dollar capacity market for our Scotch Cured Herrings in America has been lost under this Government in their failure to make even an attempt to bring about reciprocal favorable trade relations with the United States.

14. Because I realized that there must be if Newfoundland is to survive a complete transformation both governmentally and commercially of the affairs of the country and the continuous borrowing which brings nothing as a substantial increase of earning power and increases the burden of yearly interest has gone to the limit. It must end. Mr. Squires does not seem to be able to do this.

15. I believe that the best business brains of the country are to-day lined up with the Opposition and I have confidence in the intelligence of my countrymen in that Opposition that they will elect in the majority save Newfoundland from utter ruin and that when men like Bennett, Cahin, Higgins, Monroe, Hickman, Long, Ayre and Harris sit down in conclave to work on this problem after May the 3rd we shall see the dawn of a better day for Newfoundland.

**Unemployed Call on Governor**

**RELIEF GIVEN MEN YESTERDAY.**

Several weeks ago, the Telegram drew attention to the fact that provision should be made for the men employed on relief works. During the period of nomination and polling day. It was pointed out that the men could not make provision for a period of 10 days on the small amount of pay they were receiving. 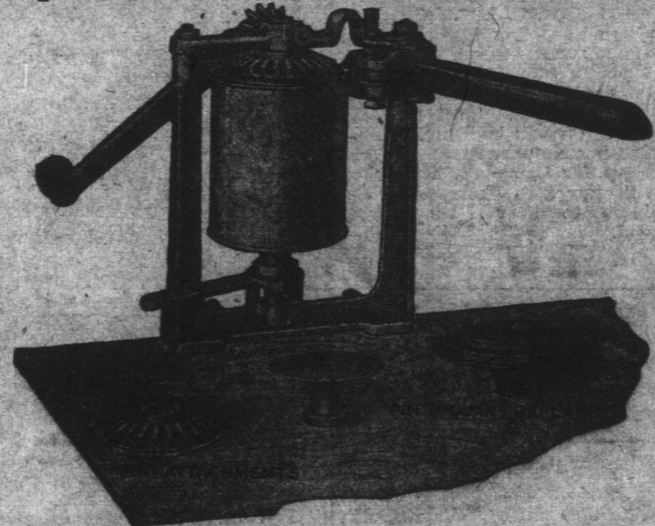
