An Old Charge Hanging Over Him,

Some little talk has been occas Guelph and Elora within the past week respecting a Methodist minister, who gave his name as Charles Warren, who for the last two or three months had been acting as assistant in Elora, and who eached in the Methodiat Church, Guelph, a week ago last Sunday. Chief Constable Kelly has furnished us with some particulars, respecting this ministerial fraul, for fraud he evidently is, as the following facts will testify: Two years ago last June our Chief reesvied a circular from the office of the Chief of Police Milwankee, giving a photograph and discription of a Methodist minister named Charles W. Copeland, who was charged with forgery, and who had left that city for parts unknown. A reward was offered for his apprehension. Mr. Kelly kept a sharp look out for the clerical scamp, but never came across any one resembling him till a week ago last Sunday, when Charles Warren, alias Charles W. Copeland, entered the pulpit of the Wesleyan Church, Guelph. He was at once satisfied that the preacher was the man who was so badly wanted in May, 1871, in Milwankee. He kept his own council, however, till Monday morning, and as soon as the telegraph office was open sent a despatch to the Chief of Police in Milwankee, informing him of the facts and asking instructions, as he (Mr. Kelly) was aware that under the U.S. law a warrant only holds good for a certain time after being issued, and he was careful not to make any arrest without proper authority. He shortly after received an answer saying that Copeland was not wanted on the charge of fergery or on any other charge. In that case he of course could do nothing, but in a day or two after he informed the Rev. Mr. Howard of the circumstance. Warren happened to call on Mr. Howard some days after, when he was informed of Mr. Kelly's suspicions. He indignantly denied being the man, or knowing anything about the affair, but refused to go and see Mr. Kelly and satisfy that officer on the point. An important meeting of the farmers of the township of Erin was convened at Mr. John Fielding's Hotel, Ospringe, on the evening of Friday, Oct. 24. Mr. Laughlan Currie was chairman, and Mr. Robt. Rott Secretary. Several topics of considerable interest to the township were discussed, but the chief topic before the meeting was the Grouping Act in reference to railways. The following resolutions were passed in relation to this matter:— The Erin Farmers' Association.

Moved by Mr. Robt. Rott, seconded by Mr. Thos. Tolton, that this meeting without delay petition the Legislature for the repeal of the Municipalities Grouping Act, deeming it obnoxious to and baneful to the interests of the general public. Moved by Mr. Edwd. Tolton, seconded by Mr. John Webb, that for the purpose of effectually carrying into effect the former resolution, different municipalities objecting to the coercion exercised by railroad companies, in compelling objecting parties to pay benuses, be solicited to co-operate with and aid the projectors of this meeting, and would suggest that a meeting be held at some central point of the county where delegates can meet with mutual convenience and more fully discuss the subject; and that the Secretary write to influential persons in cash township to facilitate arrangements for developing plans for systematic and universal action.

The Secretary vites as follows in relation to this question: "The law gives power to railway companies to group municipalities for the purpose of extorting bonuses in furtherance of their plans. The gross iniquity of this law is now attraction grave consideration. Mr. French ably cluciated the injustice perpetrated on the public by its existence, and strongly depreciated the crude legislation in connection with it; substantiating his assertions that the people were unfairly handled, and that unprecodented privileges were being conferred on railway companies by quotations from the unparalleled number of railway acts passed during the last few years.

"Admitting that railroad enterprises are immensely practical, and essential to the prosperity of our rapidly developing country; this fact, important as it is, does not justify our law-makers in sanctioning acts that detract from the liberty of the masses, placing them in the clutches of a few wealthy speculators. Such being the case, it devolves on every intelligen

some cases does not produce the desired effect) additional influence was extended them, by allowing them to cut and subdivide townships. It is pleaded that this system excluses more people opposed to the different plans submitted to them. But what have we to thank for this leniency and "disinterestedness?" Simply the fact that without this cutting and slicing it would be morally impossible for some of the minor branches to succeed in obtaining a bonus at all. Another and an insuperably objection is that in cases where it would be quite possible to exclude all sections manifestedly opposed to giving a bonus, numbers are retained and compelled to pay their quota, being unable to help themselves in the face of the majority so adnoitly arranged to overwhelm them. The township of Erin is peculiarly situated in this respect at the present time; a large number of its ratepayers being only relieved from compulsory payment of an exorbitant amount to the C. V. R. by the County Council of Wellington refusing to submit an illegal by-law. From the foregoing resolutions, the course they purpose taking is clearly indicated. Other parts of the county will shortly be requested to coalesce with them, and it is to be hoped that all individuals sympathizing with their laudable efforts will, without hesitancy, lend their aid towards arranging a meeting at which the whole county may be represented."


