OBJECTS OF INSTITUTES.

The objects of Farmers' Institutes, as stated in the act respecting the estab-lishment of Farmers' Institutes in the province of British Columbia, recently by the legislature of this province, dissemination of information in regard to agriculture, horticulture, aroriculture, manufacture and the useful

(a) By holding meetings for the discussion of and hearing lectures on subjects in connection with the theory and practice of improved husbandry or other

industrial purpose.

(b) By promoting the circulation of agricultural, horticultural, arboricultural, and mechanical periodicals.

(c) By importing and otherwise pro-

curing and distributing seeds, plants and animals of new and valuable kinds. (d) By offering prizes for essays and questions of scientific inquiries relating to agriculture, horticulture, arboricul-ture, manufactures and the useful arts. (e) For disseminating information re-

vided for in the act. All institutes organized under the act shall be strictly non-partizan and non sectarian, and no institute shall operat in the direct interest of any party, or society, but for the equal good of all citizens of the farming community, and no subject shall be presented at any institute or any discussion allowed of a political or sectarian nature, nor shall any apeaker be allowed in his lecture ess or speech, or in any discussion, to advertise shares or schemes in which he has direct or indirect pecuniary interest.

OFFICERS OF LOCAL INSTITUTES.

The officers shall consist of a president, vice-president, secretary-treasurer and a board of directors. There shall be one director for every ten members up to fifty, the number of directors, however, in no case to exceed five until the membership shall reach one hundred. after which there may be an additional director for every additional twenty members. All officers except the secretary treasurer are elected by ballot and remain in office for one year. The offi-cers and directors elect from among themselves after the annual meeting and when afterwards necessary, a secre-tary-treasurer, who shall remain in office during pleasure.

The duties of each officer is stated

minutely in the rules and regulations in the Farmers' Institutes and Co-opera-tion Act, 1897, a copy of which will be supplied to all officers of each institute The secretary-treasurer is supplied by the superintendent with necessary books for recording the proceedings of each in stitute and making his annual report.

GOVERNMENT AID TO INSTITUTES.

The schooner was then some 40 miles from Skagway and a mile and a half from shore. 




