NEW FRUIT GROWING DISTRICT. Big Area Near Kamloops Being Handled by an English Company.

A guest of the city at the present time, on his annual visit to the province, is Cecil Ward, managing director of the Canadian Real Estate Properties, Ltd. He is an old Victoria boy, the son of W. C. Ward, formerly of British Columbia, who is now residing in a pretty country seat in Kent, England.

The company of which Mr. Cecil Ward is the head, own Fruitland, a newly opened section of 17,000 acres on the opposite side of the Thompson river, north to Jamieson creek and eight miles west, and as large as five of the size of the Thompson river. It is mentioned that 20 miles of irrigation canals have been put in, besides seven miles of lateral ditches. The canals are not small affairs, but of sufficient dimensions to irrigate 10,000 acres.
