WASTING CITY WATER IN COLD WEATHER.

The waterworks committee met yesterday afternoon. Present, Ald. Sheppard, the city engineer, Burton and Davies.

The city engineer reported called attention to the excessive waste of water throughout the city during the past few days, caused by citizens leaving their taps open and pipes from freezing.

From Dec. 19 to 22 there was a loss of less than 12 inches of water from the reservoir, making it necessary to keep both pumps at the engine house working at their full capacity.

During the few days of cold weather it was estimated that as much as 10,000,000 gallons of water was wasted in this way.

The committee recommended that the council pass a by-law compelling all city water takers to provide a stop-cock at tap and tank in side of their dwellings, so that their pipes could be stopped in case of freezing.

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VICTIMS OF THE GREEN CLOTH.

Another Story from the Monte Carlo Gamblers' Journal.

The London Pall Mall Gazette in a recent issue, says: "A correspondent who happened to be there in the winter of 1873-4 sends us the following experience of Monte Carlo and its tragedies: 'I had strolled, he says, 'into the Casino in the afternoon, and was standing behind a table watching the players. My attention was attracted by the look of an old lady, whom I saw win the same stake of 1000f. eleven times running. At the same time I was indignantly aware of a young man who rose from the table a few paces off to my right, and went to a sofa near a window close by.'

A minute later there came a report from the direction of the window, and on turning to see the cause I found that the young man had rolled from his sofa, and a pistol was lying on the ground beside him. The proprietors sat at the tables unmoved, but the players started and shuffled, and in a few moments most of them had risen hurriedly to their feet. Several women went out of the room crying.
