

MEN HAVE THE BEST OF TRAVEL.

Wrested from the Railreads.

Anything new about a first-class railroad car is a rarity. The ordinary coach has never changed since it grew away from its original shape, which is still followed in England, and is the shape of an omnibus. The Pullman and Wagner cars have never changed in their main design. They have always been divided into a long central saloon and two private cabins or compartments, one at either end. Six wheeled trucks have followed four-wheeled, running water has supplanted inand pumps, and gas has taken the place of oil for illuminating purposes. One company of car builders gives its patrons a long net to use as a shelf for storing ladies' hats and men's and women's cuffs and collars at bedtime, and everybody wishes the other company would do the same thing. Separate smoking and library cars are now run with the best trains, but only for the use of the men. The women, who often outnumber the men, would greatly enjoy something of the sort, for as it is every woman must sit still in one seat, even if she is on a six-days' journey from ocean to ocean.

The only change or variety that comes to a woman on the cars is when a meal is declared "ready in de diner." Then she can stretch her legs and start her blood in circulation. That is to say, she can walk half a block three times a day. Of all the changes and imprevements that have been made in the best cars in the whole history of railroading only one has been made especially for the women. That is the recent introduction of the dressing-room. Until a short time ago the men had a room at the end of a car with three wash-bowls and plenty of towels and mirrors, but the women had nothing more than a closet such as is used to keep brooms and a dust-pan in at home. The latest change in the best cars is an improvement in the method of vestibuling the solid trains that are used on the principal route to Washington. Instead of a little constricted passage from coach to coach, the new vestibule is a large, square, well-lighted room. It is made by covering the platform steps with trap doors that extend the floor to the full width of the cars. The platforms meet as if they were cemented together, a carpet covers the floor, great lights of plate-glass let in all the daylight, and thus a number of rooms are added to each train. This, also, is a gain for women, for they can stand or sit upon a camp stool in these vestibules, and enjoy the scenery on both sides of the train—a privilege that was before that only obtainable by such men as cared to sit out on the end platform and swallow smoke and cinders by the mile. It this high-pressure steam bath the stones remain for forty-eight to seventy-two hours, afterward being submitted to shath of boiling and saturated chloride of calcium for six to twelve hours, also under a pressure of about ten atmospheres, in the same boiler, and the condensed water may be used for the bath. The stones are allowed to dry in the open air, or, more quickly, by circulating steam inside the boiler after the chloride of calcium has been withdrawn and prior calcium has been withdrawn and prior to taking out the stones.

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
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
