\$9000 IN BOGUS BILLS PLOTTED

Watering Case Assuming Greater Dimensions Each Day - A Fifth Man Arrested Saturday.

Frank J. Crawford, 33 Collahit-st., who is alleged to have executed the photographing work for the counterfeiting gang which was broken up Friday evening, was arrested by Detective Porter Saturday morning.

The five men under arrest were all arranged in the Police Court Saturday morning, but on the request of the Crown were remanded for a week.

First Batch Printed in 1892.

Dickson told the detectives that in April, 1892, that Crawford had printed 20,000 bills. The edition consisted of 2000, for which he paid the printer \$8, and they were delivered to him in the afternoon of that day.

The bills were intended for use on cigar boxes in the United States, and Crawford, and he others, were to be paid for the bills in the hands of the holders, but the bills were never used.

The Case Against Kramer.

Even since his arrest, Kramer has been strong in his protestations of innocence of complicity in any crime. He has been ascertained that he was present in April, 1892, when Crawford paid Dickson for printing the issue of \$2 bills.

Crawford has been seen in the street, and appears, ex-employees of the Street Railway Company, and the arrest a few days ago of street conductors on a charge of offering counterfeit money serves to strengthen the belief that these bills were in circulation.
