First Batch Printed in 1892. Dickson told the detectives that it was in April, 1892, that Crawford had the §2 bills printed. The "edition" consisted of 2000, for which he paid the printer §6, and they were deliver-ed at his then place of business, Queen-street west. The bills were intended for use on cigar boxes in the United State, said Crawford, and he drew Dickson's attention to the words "The Dominion of Canada will not pay," etc. The word not was in the same type as "will pay," and was evident-ly erased, as the bills in the hands of the police do not show this little, word. Barber printed 4000 \$1 bills quite re-cently, but it is thought not many of these are in circulation. A more thorough search will be made by the detectives in the hope of finding the place where the remainder of the lat-ter issue is secreted.
