BROOKE COUNCIL.

Inwood, 4th May, 1912.
Council met pursuant to adjournment. Members all present. Minutes of previous meeting read, and on motion of Mr. Monro, seconded by Mr. Fisher, were approved. Report read on the proposed tiling of 15-16 sideroad drain, across concessions 5 and 6. Estimated cost \$2250.00. Monro—Annett, that report be accepted and Clerk be instructed to prepare a by-law for submission at next meeting, authorizing the tiling and repairs to the drain, and the borrowing by debenture of the funds required for the work.—Carried. The following report was presented and read: Brooke, May 4th, 1912. To the Municipal Council, Tp. of Brooke: Gentlemen—Your committee appointed to inspect the roads and bridges throughout the township, beg leave to report as follows: 1. We found the bridge on sideroad 18, between cons. 9 and 10, known as the 'McVicar Bridge,' a wooden truss structure, in a bad state of repair and would recommend that a new bridge be built of concrete or steel or both. 2. We also found the bridge on sideroad 21, con. 7, a wooden structure, unsafe for public travel, and recommend it to be replaced with a more modern structure. 3. Your committee inspected a site for a proposed new bridge over the Sydenham River, con. 8, sideroad 24, and whereas there is no crossroad in the eastern portion of the township between

sideroad 18 and the boundary line between Brooke and Metcalfe, a distance of approximately four miles, and which no doubt is a serious inconvenience to the ratepayers in that portion of the township and to the public in general, we recommend a bridge to be erected on the proposed site, and sideroad 24, across concessions 7 and 8, opened out for public traffic. 4. The construction of the aforesaid bridge and necessary grading, will necessitate a large expenditure; we therefore recommend to your honorable body that at the earliest possible date, a by-law be submitted to the ratepayers of the township for the purpose of borrowing on the credit of the municipality, by means of debentures payable in ten equal annual payments, a sum not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars, for the purpose of defraying expenses in connection with said bridges. All of which is respectfully submitted. ALFRED DARVILL, Acting Chairman. Darvill—Fisher, that report be adopted and Clerk instructed to prepare a by-law for submission at next meeting, to borrow by the issue of debentures the sum of \$10,000.00, to cover the cost of the construction of the bridges proposed to be built.—Carried. Yeas, Darvill, Fisher, Monro, Sutton, Nay, Annett. Parties interested in the lighting of the streets in the Village of Inwood asked that the sum of \$165.00 be levied annually pro-rata on the village assessment, and on the assessment on buildings on farm lands within 40 rods of the village limits. Clerk requested to prepare by-law. Messrs. McCoubrey and Handsford asked that tile be given them for culverts in Award drain leading into their farm buildings.—Refused. Tenders were opened for the construction and repairs needed to the following drain: Bourne Drain, F. D. McGugan 16287 c yds. at 23c. per yd. \$3746.01 Bourne Drain, H. & M. Brain ... 3590.00 " Woolman Construction Co. 16287 yds at 27 5/8c. 4492.97 Watson Drain, Woolman Const'n Co. 14750 yds at 28 1/2c. 4203.75 Bryan-Johnston dr. Walter Brown 397.00 Edgar dr. H. & M. Brain ... 390.00 John Edgar ... 437.50 Johnston-Mills dr. Johnston & Mills 800.00 Fisher—Sutton, that the tenders of the Woolman Construction Company be accepted for the work on the Bourne and Watson Drains, the tender of Walter Brown for the Bryan-Johnston drain, that of John Edgar for the Edgar drain, and that of Johnston & Mills for the Johnston-Mills Drain.—Carried. Annett—Darvill, that the sum of \$25.00 be tendered Walter Mills, in full settlement for any claim he may have, for injury to his horse on the road south of Inwood last winter.—Carried. Annett—Monro, that the sum of \$125. be granted in aid of the Brooke & Alvinston Agricultural Society.—Carried. By-law submitted to authorize the construction of the Holbrook Drain, and the borrowing by debenture of the funds required for the same. Monro—Darvill, that by-law be provisionally adopted, printed in pamphlet form and a copy served on each party assessed, with notice that a Court of Revision on same would be held in Code's Hall in the Village of Alvinston on Saturday the first day of June 1912, Mr. Sutton to be Commissioner and to serve by-laws.—Carried. By-law No. 9 introduced and read to punish by fine or imprisonment persons found guilty of damaging the concrete sidewalks in the Village of Inwood, or the concrete culverts or bridges anywhere in the Township. Sutton—Monro, that by-law be read a third time and finally passed.—Carried. Letter received and read from Mr. Irving, Clerk of the Village of Alvinston, asking for the payment to their Treasurer of the sum of \$3900, the amount which the Council of the Township of Brooke agreed to pay, for the construction of a joint Town Hall in the Village. The letter stated that the Council of the Village had in good faith carried out their share of the agreement, by submitting and carrying a by-law to raise the sum of \$3900.00 and was now ready to proceed with the work. Darvill—Sutton, that the Council as a whole, meet the Council of the Village of Alvinston, on Saturday the 11th inst., at 4 o'clock p.m.—Carried. Fisher—Monro, that Council do now adjourn to meet in the Village of Alvinston on Saturday the first day of June, 1912, and to open as a Court of Revision on the Assessment Roll for the present year.—Carried. W. G. WILLOUGHBY, Clerk.

Thamesville, May 8.—John Bert died on Wednesday of blood poisoning. About two weeks ago Mr. Bert was scratched by a fowl. The mark was hardly perceptible, but blood poisoning set in and he became very ill, suffering great pain the past week. Mr. Bert was well and favorably known in this vicinity for a great many years. He resided in Howard, where, in addition to farming, he followed his trade as carpenter. After the death of his wife, about two years ago, he moved to town and has since lived with his son. He leaves three daughters and one son, Mrs. Martin, of Detroit; Mrs. Henry Secord and Mrs. Geo. Barber, of Thamesville, and William Bert, Thamesville.

Duke's Private Income.

There are only a few wealthier men in the Dominion at the present time than his Royal Highness, the new Governor-General. In addition to the salary Canada will pay him the Duke enjoys a yearly income of \$126,000, which was settled on him for life by the British Parliament because of his being one of the younger sons of the late Queen Victoria. Nor does this exhaust the amount of his income from official sources, for he also draws some \$35,000 annually as Field Marshall in the British Army.

Besides his revenue from official sources, the Duke of Connaught enjoys the returns from his share of the estate left by his mother, Queen Victoria. That the whole estate was very large is common belief, rumor estimating the Duke's share at varying amounts from five to fifteen million dollars. It is said in well-informed circles that his total income is greater than that of King George.
