WEDNESDAY, APRIL 18TH, 1900. -The news from the field of war in South Africa is not indicative of any marked progress in the campaign. Fighting of a mino nature is taking place nearly every day be-tween some one of the British army divisions and the federal troops, but no general ad

vance has been ordered to carry the war into he heart of the enemy's territory. Lord Roberts undoubtedly has good reason for delaying his advance, though his inactivity nting for the time the dashing gen eralship that relieved Kimberley and Ladyamith and forced Cronje to surrender within such a short time after he assumed command Those who know him best, and are conversant with the situation, do not hesitate to predict that his next move will be as dashing and as effective as his first one was. His men are now resting along the line of railway within the range of rapid transport facilities, and but little attention is being paid to the energetic guerilla tactics that are being pursued by the Boers. Evidently Roberts has no


intention of breaking his army formation to chase these raiding forces who are spending their energy and strength without attaining any advantage whatever. When his worn out horses are in condition for another dash, which will surely be within a few days, then the cry "On to Pretoria" will be passed to the divisions and well rested troops will be hurled from half a dozen quarters against the demoralized and fatigued federal forces, and then the heavy and decisive fighting of the campaign will furnish war news of a different tenor from the accounts of the enents that are now being published. If only Mafeking were relieved, the British sympathizers would not be so impatient at the apparent inactivity of the army, but

time will no doubt show that the delay was a wise one. The British army is now suffer ing its greatest handicap from the scarcity of horses, and it is this handicap that is largely the cause of the delayed forward movement. It is stated that French's cavalry advance to the relief of Kimberley was made at a cost of three thousand horses, so it may be seen how great the need is for equine re-






