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

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



STANDING RULES

FOR THE

CONSTITUTION AND GOVERNMENT

OF THE

Rewfoundland Church Society.

I.—This Society shall be called "THE NEWFOUND-LAND CHURCH SOCIETY."

II.—The Officers of this Society shall consist of a Patron, a President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer and Secretary. The Committee of Management shall consist of the Officers of the Society, andof Seventeen Lay Members, of whom four shall be elected by Members of the Society resident in the Deanery of Avalon; three by Members resident in the Deanery of Conception Bay; three by Members resi. dent in the Deanery of Trinity Bay; three by Members resident in the Deanery of Notre-Dame Bay; two by Members resident in the Deanery of Placentia Bay; and two by Members resident in the Deanery of Fortune Bay, of whom seven shall be quorum. The election of the Lay Members of the Committee shall be as follows :-- On Easter Tuesday in the year 1855, and on Easter Tuesday in every succeeding fourth year, a meeting of Electors resident in each Deanery shall be convened by the Senior Clergyman (or, in the

event of his omission so to do, by public notice,) at some convenient hour and place, of which notice shall be given during Divine Service in each Church in the Deanery, at least seven days previously; at which meeting the Senior Clergyman, or, in his absence, some other person then to be chosen by the Members, shall preside, and the Members present, whether in person or by proxies, shall elect seriatim, their representatives to the Committee; provided that the persons elected may be resident in any other Deanery than that which they may be chosen to represent.

III.-The President, or in his absence, the Archdeacon of the Diocese, or Bishop's Commissary, shall be ex-officio Chairman of the Committee; and in addition to his vote as Member shall, when the votes on any question are equal, have a casting vote. All Clergymen of the Diocese shall be ex-officio honorary Members of the Committee, with the right of speaking, but not, with the exception of the said officers, of voting at its meetings. As often as it shall become necessary, from the death, absence from the Colony, resignation, or refusal to serve, of any of the said Lay Members, to appoint others or another in his or their place or places, a special meeting of Members of the Society, in such Deanery where the vacancy shall arise, shall be convened in like manner as the Easter Meetine; and the like notice shall be given of such special meeting, when the necessary number of Members, to replace those retired, shall be in like manner elected.

IV.—His Excellency the Governor for the time being shall be requested to accept the office of Patron: The Lord Bishop shall be President, and the Rural Deans Vice-Presidents of the Society.

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V.—All persons paying the annual sum of Ten Shillings currency, shall be members of the Society with power to vote at the annual and other meetings.

VI.

V1.--It shall be the duty of the Committee to determine from time to time on the appropriation of the funds, to the furtherance of the Gospel in this Island, under the recommendation and sanction of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese: The objects to which such appropriation shall be made shall be as follows:--1st towards the maintenance of the Clergy and licensed Lay-Readers-second, the erection, enlargement or repairs of Churches, Parsonages, and School-rooms-3rd, the supply of Bibles, Prayer Books, School Books and Religious Works and Tracts.

vII.

VII.—The Committee shall meet on the first Monday of every quarter at St. John's.

VIII.—The Committee shall appoint, each year, two of their Members to audit the Treasurer's Account.

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IX.—A monthly Meeting of the Members of the Society shall be held on the second Wednesday in every Month, at 7 o'clock: and a General Annual Meeting on the 2nd Wednesday after Trinity Sunday, or as soon thereafter as the Bishop may appoint.

X.—No existing law shall be repealed or altered, nor any new rule established, except at a General Meeting of the Society, the proposed change having been first recommended by the President, or the Committee, and in the latter case approved by the President. A Special General Meeting of the Society may be convened by the President at any time on his own authority, or by the Committee, or by any twelve Members of the Society by a written requisition addressed to the Secretary.

XI.—All Meetings shall be opened and closed with the Prayers recommended to be used at the Meetings of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts.

XII.—The Members of the Church in every part of the Island, shall be invited to co-operate by forming Local Committees, under the direction of the Clergy, in each Mission or Parish.

XIII.—No Mission nor Clergyman of any Mission shall receive any allowance or assistance from the Society unless at least a list of the contributions made in such Mission to the funds of the Society in the preceding year, shall have been duly forwarded to the President or to the Secretary, together with a return of all payments or offerings of money, not being fees for occasional services.

NOTE.—While it is hoped that every Clergyman in the Colony will make a yearly collection for the promotion of the objects of the Church Society, and impress upon every individual under his Pastoral charge, the obligations by which he is bound to contribute thereto, year by year,—the system of the Church Society does not require any Clergyman to withhold the ordinances of the Church in any case of refusal or neglect to pay towards his support.

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VIII.

PROCEEDINGS

At the Sixteenth Anniversary of "THE NEWFOUND-LAND CHURCH SOCIETY," held at St. John's, 17th June, 1857.

The Report of the Committee having been read by the Secretary, and the Treasurer's Account submitted,—It was

1-That the Report be received, adopted, and printed, with the Treasurer's account.

Moved by H. W. HOYLES, Esq., M.H.A., seconded by Rev. J. F. PHELPS:—

2—That this meeting desires to express its gratitude to Almighty God, for that measure of Success which He has continued to vouchsafe to the operations of the Society.

Moved by B. ROBINSON, Esq., Q. C., seconded by CHARLES CROWDY, Esq., M. D.

3—That this meeting desires to express its deep sense of the loss which the Society and Church generally have sustained by the death of the late Rev. J. G. MOUNTAIN.

Moved by F. B. T. CARTER, Esq., M.H.A., seconded by Rev. T. M. Wood :---

4—That this meeting desires to record its thankfulness for the appointmentof other Clergymen to fill the late vacancies in this Diocese.

Moved by Capt. CARTER, R. N., seconded by the Rev. G. M. JOHNSON:---

5—That this meeting, recognising the education of the children of the poorer members of our communion as one of the most important objects of the Society, would be most thankful for any means put at the disposal of the Society for the maintenance of Schools.

Moved by the Ven. the ARCHDEACON, seconded by James BAYLY, Esq.,—

6—That this Society, anxious to eement the union of the various branches of the Church of Christ, looks with great interest upon the labours of the Diocesan Church Societies in the adjoining Provinces.

Moved by the Rev. G. P. HARRIS, seconded by W. V. WHITEWAY, Esq. :--

7—That the thanks of the Newfoundland Church Society be given to the Right Rev. the President, for his counsel and assistance, and to the Treasurer and Committee for their services during the past year; and that F. C. K. Hepburn, Esq., be requested to accept the office of Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Moved by W. H. MARE, Esq., seconded by P. G. TESSIER, Esq.:-

8—That the thanks of the meeting be offered to the Lord Bishop of the Diocese for his kindness in presiding on the present occasion.

REPORT, &c.

It having pleased Almighty God that the Newfoundland Church Society should be permitted to continue its labours through another year, your Committee desire to express very great thankfulness that the affairs of the Society have been allowed to prosper, and are such as to encourage a hope that God has been glorified and the interests of the Church advanced; and indeed, it must be acknowledged by all that the Society is only doing its work so long as these two objects are steadily kept in view.

It was the melancholy duty of the Committee, in presenting their last report, to pay a tribute to the memory of one who for so many years had been, as it were, the mainspring of the Society; but yet their feelings were tempered with the reflection that God had raised up a worthy successor to him, and one in every way fit for the onerous task laid upon him,-of taking pastoral oversight of St. John's, and administering the Diocese during the Bishop's necessary ab-Little however did they foresee that it would sence. so soon again be their task to record the loss of one so eminently gifted and so beloved by all who knew him, as the late Rev. J. G. MOUNTAIN,-one so thoroughly devoted to the sacred duties of his office, and who had toiled with untiring energy in the great work of the ministry, and bringing souls to Christ. It is felt that this may, perhaps, be recalling sad and sorrowful thoughts, but surely the Newfoundland Church Society will ever cherish the memory of those who have striven with all singleness of heart, and laid down even their lives, for that great cause, the glory

of GOD and the good of His Church, so dear to every one interested in the spread of our holy religion. At the same time it is a subject of great thankfulness, that the several vacancies in the Diocese have so soon been filled by the arrival of the Ven. the Archdeacon, from Montreal, of the Rev. J. Pearson, from Nova Scotia, for St. John's; of the Rev. H. Petley, from England, for the mission of Heart's Content; and more lately, by the ordination of Mr. LeGallais, of the Theological Institution.

Your Committee have to report a small increase in the Society's funds. The actual net income for 1855 was £1,230, while for 1856 it is £1,304,—showing that the Society is steadily though slowly increasing, and is we may hope destined to be, at no very distant period, the administrator of all the funds raised in this Diocese for the sustentation of that branch of the Church to which we belong. There is a strong and growing feeling that it is desirable to throw the whole income of the Church of Newfoundland into one common fund; as it would appear at once to commend itself to all who think the matter out, that whatever draws the various portions of the body spiritual more closely together, and cements the union, giving one life and pulse to the whole, must be the wiscr plan of action; and will give, when once obtained, such increased energy to the Church as may, with GODS blessing, insure her future progress and developement. Surely one chief reason why men join themselves together in any way, is that they may put aside every merely private and personal feeling, and act in unison for one great common good. And how can this be obtained better than in the way proposed by your Society, of bringing together the wants of the whole Church to be considered by the whole Church; of bringing the wants of our poorer congregations into contact with the means of others to relieve those wants; of bringing one man's need into relation with another man's affluence? Here there is an embodiment of that idea which we all profess to cherish, which has ever been acted upon by Christian men, and which has been found, and is found, the most powerfulorganization for extending the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ.

It is still a matter of regret that some missions, even of those which have forwarded their lists of subscriptions, decline availing themselves of the system of incorporation thus offered to them. This, it is to be hoped; will in time be effected; but meanwhile, owing to the increase of expense, and the limited funds available, your Committee at their last meeting were compelled to decide that after the present year no subscription list should be inserted in the appendix of the report, except so far as the money referred to in the list shall have been duly transmitted to the Treasurer of the Society. It has repeatedly been acknowledged that the time for combined action has long since come; that Churchmen throughout the Diocese should work together as one man; that the system of union through the Episcopate as the head must be acted upon as well as put forward theoretically, if ever the Church is to rise and be equal to the great and sacred work before her.

And here, there is a subject which may be referred to with thankfulness, that though slowly yet surely, the Church in Newfoundland is moving towards a position of self-support. The movement, though smal', is in the right direction: it is not retrograde. And of this we may be sure, that wherever and whenever the ministrations of religion and the service of GOD are understood and appreciated, there will be found are cognition of this first great duty,--the honorable maintenance of the Ministry and Ordinances of the Church. For many years this colony, like others in British North America, has been indebted for the support of its clergy to the bounty of the English Church administered by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel; for many years has this fostering care been exercised; and it was not unfil the innate energy of our race opened for that venerable Society new fields of labour, most pressing in their nature, that she was constrained, though reluctantly, to withdraw from the Church in Newfoundland, in common with all the other North American Colonies, a portion of that support which had been so long and so liberally accorded. At the same time, though this Diocese has not felt the diminution of income in anything like the degree experienced by the Canadas, New Brunswick, and Nova Scotia, yet there has been brought out clearly this great truth, which it were well for all ever to bear in mind, that a Church to be on a safe footing must be self sustaining, in order to adapt herself to the variety of circumstances with which at any time she may find herself surrounded, and to fit her for those multiform changes which the course of the world continually brings about. It may, certainly, be thought of with pleasure, that though the duty is not recognised by any means so universally, or to such an extent, as the importance of the subject demands, yet that still year by year we have abundant proof that the truth of the Holy Scripture is being felt, " that a labourer is worthy of his hire," and that " they who sow to us spiritual things" should in return "reap our worldly things."

Your Committee feel that this very important subject cannot be too frequently alluded to; and for this reason, that in all the more lately formed colonies the principle of self-support is acted upon to a much greater degree than in this. In Australia, especially, this is the case; and it naturally tends to deepen the interest of all in the welfare of their religion. There cannot, it is thought, be much doubt that it is the positive duty of all, high and low, rich and poor, to contribute to the support of the worship of

God; while the experience of all ages of the Christian Church proves that so far from inpoverishing, the tendency of such contributions is to increase, the store of those who are careful to maintain the honour of GoD. "There is that scattereth and yet increaseth; and there is that withholdeth more than is meet, yet it tendeth to poverty;" "they who honor me I will honor, and they who despise me shall be lightly esteemed." With respect to this subject, the following letters of the Clergy may be interesting.

PORTUGAL COVE,

June 11, 1857:

In closing up and making returns for the two Collections for the Newfoundland Church Society in which I have been engaged for the year 1856, I cannot refrain from making a few remarks upon the same. My own collection from my Mission I shall dismiss with few words. If the amount is small, it must also be remembered that my Mission is one of the smallest in regard of population in the whole Diocese, and that it includes within it none but fishermen, carrying on their business in a small and humble way, and therefore able to make only small and humble contributions. Taking therefore into account the number and circumstances of my people, I think my collection will not be found behind that of other Missions, from which if a larger sum be returned, there is a larger flock to contribute to the same, including also Merchants or their Agents, Government Officials, and Medical men, able to give larger donations than my own poor fisher-men. My exertions in the past year, as I believe in each of the four seasons I have occupied this Mission, have I rejoice to say been crowned with increase, nor shall I fail I trust to use my best endeavours to increase my amounts from year to year until a maximum shall have been obtained. I am sensible that there is yet room for considerable improvement, inasmuch as in my own Mission, as I suppose in all Missions, there are some alas who do not give at all, and more who do not give to the extent they ought to give.

The St. John's collection has I believe reached a larger amount than in any of the ten years last past, and therefore I suppose I may say is the largest ever made. Still this collection is very far from the amount it ought to reach. I believe this to be agenerally acknowledged opinion. I know our late Venerable and beloved Archdeacon always was of this opinion; and I trust I shall not be saying more than I ought when I add that having likewise thought the same myself, when associated with him as Curate, and working with and under him, a connection I shall always remember with pride and

pleasure, I am more than ever confirmed in the same from my experience in the past year, when making the collection from the Cathedral Congregation singlehanded and alone. In the first place, the collection has never been made with sufficient system and management to include all the members of the Congregation. This Archdeacon Bridge always felt and lamented, but it is needless to add in speaking of him that it was no lack of anxiety or energy which prevented his doing more than lament the same, but that incessant 'pressure of toil, and burden of care and anxiety, 'for (may 'I not say f') the higher and more purely spiritual duties of his charge for which he was pre-eminent himself, and of his friends and flock pre-eminently beloved and sorrowed after on his removal from the scene of his carthly labours to, we may hope and trust, his rest and his reward.

It will be seen that many new names have this year been added to the list, though many more I am well aware are yet wanting. Many of the new contributors are far from being new comers to the town, and far from having been previously unknown to the Archdeacon or myself. These men could doubtless have given before as they have readily given this year, had they but been called upon ; and there are many more whom I at this moment have upon my mind from whom had I been able to call upon them contributions might have been obtained. I menion this not as making an excuse for such, as they all ought if not called upon and without waiting to be called upon to bring their payments as and when they are able, but in explanation of the cause why their monies have not been given. I am sure the Church Society will understand that living nine miles away from St. John's and with separate dutics of my own, it has been impossible to do all I could have wished, and I am sure that due allowance will be made for my difficulties and deficiencies. This then is one cause why the St. John's collection is not and has not been what it might and ought to be. Others also exist, one of which perhaps I may be permitted to refer to, and this one which not only the Clergy in St. John's have ever been sensible of, but also many among the Laity. Of St. John's itself, I may also say, what I have already said in reference to my own people, viz., that while some do not give at all, more do not do what they might and ought. What ought to be given there I am far from being able to say. At present, difference of numbers leing taken to account, St. John's contributes to the Church Society not quite four times as much as does my own poor You will observe, I say, to the Church Society, and this Mission. I say advisedly, as I am well aware that in past years large contributions have been made for the Orphan Asylum, for the New Organ in the Cathedral, for the benefit of the family of the late Archdeacon, and for the New Church to be built on the South Side. But these things instead of being reasons why the Church Society's collection has not been more in times past, as some perhaps are disposed to regard them, shew rather that it might and ought to be more in time to come. Doubtless the St. John's people have done well in these matters, and I hope I shall be the last to detract from their

merit in them, but still the Church must be supported, not by impulsive feelings or personal considerations, but by deliberate principle and sustained and regular exertion. This cannot I think be too much impressed on the members of the Church in the Capital, and upon her members in all the Diocese, and if this were felt and acted upon by all, I am not at all afraid to say that the income of the Church Society which ought I think to be the receptacle of all the general funds of the Church will be more nearly sufficient, I will not say for all, but most of her pious and charitable purposes; and such special and charitable appeals as those I have spoken of and referred to will seldom or never be required. Such appeals shew in themselves, I think, that the pecuniary affairs of the Church are not in such a flourishing state as they ought, to be and we still wish to see them in, and the liberality with which these calls have been responded to, shew also in return the ability of the members of the Church in the Metropolis to contribute much more regularly and each and every year more largely than hitherto they have donc.

It is perhaps too much to say, that I hope one day to see all that has been said realized to the letter, but it is not I trust too much to hope that ere long much more will be done than hitherto has been accomplished. With these remarks, I beg to resign my trust into other and better hands, and shall only add, that I shall hope and expect by their exertions, to see next years collection and the collection of each future year far larger, if God will, than that which I have just brought to a close, so far as I myself have been concerned.

'To the Secretary of the Church Society.

For some time past it has been felt to be a great want in the Church of this Diocese that there was no fund for the relief of the widows and orphans of deceased Clergymen. Such provision has already been made in several of the adjoining Dioceses, and the matter placed upon such a firm footing as to relieve considerably the minds of the Clergy whose families may expect to be participators in such a scheme. Those who fully understand the straitened means of the Clergy of this Colony, and the present increased expense of living, must be well aware how very inadequate the small income of a clergyman must be to make provision for his family in the event of his death or disability; while the necessity of such pro-

vision is occasionally forced upon the Church in a most painful manner. Under these circumstances, your Committee have decided upon making an effort to establish such a fund, and would feel themselves justified in appropriating the greater portion of the balance for some time past in the hands of the Treasurer towards such a scheme as will, it is to be hoped, come before the Society at no very distant period for sanction and adoption. Already, the sum of £75, paid by the Committee to the widow of the late Incumbent of St. John's, for that gentleman's services, and most generously returned by her, has been devoted to this Fund, so that the name of MOUNTAIN will be for ever identified with the Church of Newfoundland, and be remembered by those widows and orphans who may in the providenco of God be benefitted by such a provision. The general plan of such Fund would be to apply the interest of a Capital sum, and the yearly subscriptions and collections made specially for such objects, in order to assist the families of such Clergymen as may die or be disabled in the service of the Church in Newfoundland. The provision it is to be feared will be, necessarily, small; but yet of sufficient value to be of importance to those who might otherwise have been totally destitute. The Secretary has been instructed to forward to all the Clergy the draft of a scheme for a "Widows' and Orphans' Fund" which has approved itself to the Sub-Committee appointed for that purpose; and it is hoped that during the next year the Clergy and Laity generally will be enabled to give the matter such consideration as will enable the subject to be discussed and finally agreed upon and put in operation at a public meeting to be held in St. John's during the visitation in 1858.

It can searcely be necessary to inform this Meeting or the members of the Church generally in the Dioeese, that the Lord Bishop has been detained almost

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uninterruptedly in the capital since our last anniversary, and for a considerable portion of the time has undertaken the duties of the Parish Priest, in addition to those of the Episcopate. His Lordship has in consequence been enabled to devote more attention to the management of the Self-Assisting Clothing Society, and to the Asylum for Widows and Orphans-both of which Charities the Committee are enabled to report in a very satisfactory condition. The latter, it should be generally known, is intended for the benefit of the whole Colony; and not of the capital only. Some destitute children from out-harbors have been already admitted; and the Officers and Committee of the Charity are prepared to receive applications from any quarter. The arrangements of the Building are found in every respect convenient and suitable.

The Bishop has further taken advantage of the opportunity to renew the attempt made some few years ago to crect a Church on the South Side of the Harbor-urgently required for the large and encreasing population in that locality. The members of the Church in all parts of the Colony will, it is believed, be much gratified to learn that the Bishop's appeal in his Pastoral Letter has been responded to in a manner which gives every hope of a comely and commodious Church, suitable to the requirements of the inhabitants, being forthwith commenced, and in due time, with God's blessing, completed. In the meanwhile, a benefit of a yet greater importance has been conferred upon the neighborhood by placing a Clergyman to reside on that side of the Harbor, who will be enabled to give much larger attention, than heretofore, to the inhabitants there; and build up it is hoped the spiritual House, together with the material Temple.

Since the arrival of the Archdeacon the Bishop has been enabled to pay some visits to the Out-harbors; and has consecrated a new and comely Church at



Aquaforte, which does great credit to the zeal, and liberality of the Missionary (the Rev. Mr. BAVLY) and the Church members generally, in that small settlement. His Lordship has also this week consecrated Grave-yards at Belle Isle Beach, in Conception Bay, and at Portugal Cove. And the Committee are given to understand that two new Churches on the Labrador, and some others on the North East Coast of this Island are awaiting consecration in his Lordship's approaching Visitation.

With regard to the question of education in the country missions there has been no alteration. Generally the Schools in the Island are protically exempted from that control and supervision of the Clergyman which are so very necessary to their well being. This, we trust, may in some degree be remedied whenever the income of the Church Society shall justify the Committee in taking the subject of general Education under their care. They are most anxious to do so, and earnestly trust that ere long they may be enabled to place the instruction of our children under the guidance and supervision of the clergy.

The Academy at St. John's still continues in a flourishing and efficient state under the management of the Rev. G. P. HARRIS; and it is earnestly commended not only to the town of St. John's, but to the country generally as a place of superior education, where boys may be placed, and receive such instruction as will fit them for any position in life. In a community like this, it must be of great moment, and will eventually exercise a great influence upon the colony, if only our youth have the opportunity of receiving that training both secular and religious, which is necessary for them on going into the world to encounter the difficulties and responsibility of life. The completeness of this Institution can only of course, be fully tested as years pass away, but it is not too much to say that its present state of efficiency

gives fair promise that it will be a lasting benefit to the colony and to the Church.

The Ladies School, under the care of the Misses LeGallais, also continues its most useful labours, and most abundantly sustains the high opinions which have been formed of it. When we reflect upon the quiet yet important influence which is always exercised, ultimately upon Society, by those holding the responsible positions of mothers, we must be sure that no care or trouble is too great to be bestowed in forming the characters and minds of those who will hereafter have under their charge the training of future generations. And your Committee can with confidence point to this Institution as fully accomplishing the intended object.

It is hoped that ere long the New School House near the Cathedral, for boys and girls, will be commenced so as to afford reasonable hope that these useful institutions so auspiciously begun, will be in operation for many generations.

It would be wrong to pass by the very earnest and touching letter of the Rural Dean of Fortune Bay, giving as it does such an insight into the life of a

REV. AND DEAR SIR,

December 31, 1856.

Another year has passed away, and it again becomes my duty to forward the list of Subscriptions and amount subscribed on behalf of the Church Society. I could indeed wish that they were much larger in amount than they are, but the difficulties in the way of a proper and regular visite ion of this Mission, are such that it is next to impossible under existing circumstances to obtain a list of Subscriptions embracing all who are willing to pay, to say nothing of those who might be induced by conviction, by argument, and by example to swell the amount. This year after great trouble and very day (July 1st) that he was to come, I was called to visit some siek people at Brunet, was away four days, and in the interval theavy and most unusual gale of wind drove my boat from her

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mooring and dashed her to pieces at Jersey Harbor. I cause home to find my hopes and expectations for the summer destroyed with my boat. All that I could do was to watch my opportunity and engage a fishing boat for a short time between the fisheries. I did this, and visited many places in the Bay, but could do nothing like the work I had set myself to do.

The Settlements in this Bay separated by water are so numerous and scattered too far apart to be united, too small to be constituted individual Missions, and yet too important to be neglected, that a proper system of visitation would entail more expense, labor, and suffering than can be expected in the present crippled state of the Diocese,—and without regular visits and the oversight of the Missionary, a people such as ours may be pardoned for not duly appreciating and acknowledging the Sacred Office of the Ministry. Ignorance and apathy must be removed, before faith and love can take root and flourish. The care of this world has swallowed up all thought for the next in men far wiser and better than ours, and whose position and circunistances render such conduct the less excusable.

I have been kindly received, and attentively listened to, while many wishes have been expressed for the constant and regular visits of a Clergyman. Subscriptions have been cheerfully offered for my scanty services, and as I now think of those services, I feel the reproach to the Mission, that they are not more frequent and fuller, and did I not know the utter inability of the duty being performed, the consideration would fill me with grief and shame. I have visited and held services in 25 different Settlements, Baptized 37 children, Married 8, Buried 8, and administered the Holy Communion publicly 19 times.

The Mission has suffered a great loss by the death of its former Missionary, Rev. J. G. MOUNTAIN, M.A., whose sympathy and counsel were my constant and valuable aid. His interest in the welfare (both spiritual and temporal) of his late flock, continued unabated, and promised to be of the greatest importance to them and myself. The lamented death of our deor Archdeacon was more a bereavement to me who had so often profited by his better knowledge—but by the removal of one so dear to this Church and Mission as the late Rev. J. G. MOUNTAIN, the loss- and I believe the grief to them and to me has become mutual.

To both these good men I have been again and again deeply indebted, and I believe that their works and labour of love have stimulated and encouraged many of their less gifted brethren in the ministry in the trials and difficulties which beset the Missionary work. They have led the van in the Church militant and fought a goodfight, and however much we lament them we ought not to murnur that they are the first to be welcomed by the Great Capitain of our Salvation, and the first to receive their Crown.

Since September the Schools have been closed. Mr. Shepperd (who has always shown himself ready for any good work,) having

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gone to Grole, as Ca'echist and Teacher, and the worthy and amiable Mrs. Trood has left for England with her no less worthy husband. Mrs. Trood has long been highly respected, and I am gratified to report that her Scholars have subscribed to present her with a Memorial or Testimonial of respect and regard.

The remainder of the Church has been painted. The fence round the yard completed, and a road made round the outside, thus closing up an unsightly and unseemly highway through the Churchyard.

REPORT of the Committee of the Trinity Branch Church Society, for the year ending February 25, 1857.

In preparing the Third Annual Report of the proceedings of the working Committee of the Trinity Branch Church Society, we are naturally led in the first place, to notice with regret, the removal during the past summer of the Rev. W. G. CROUCH, the Assistant Clergyman. We are bound to remark that though the sum required by the Bishop to be paid from this Mission towards his stipend was not fully raised, that circumstance was not the cause of his removal, for it was Mr. CROUCH's own wish and purpose to leave the Diocese as soon as he could obtain permission to do so; but we have reason for believing that no successor will be appointed by his Lordship without a guarantee of such payment being entered into on the part of this Committee.

The Lord Bishop expressed his belief that Sixty Pounds currency, at least, may be easily raised from the Mission, besides providing for the necessary local expences such as Salaries for Readers, Parsonage, Repairs, &c.

The amount of the collection last year, as you will learn from your Treasurer's Account, is considerably, *i.e.* some Thirty Pounds less than the amount of the previous year, owing it is believed in a great measure to the smaller average eatch of fish in this district, notwithstanding the increased prices of fish and oil.

Of course it may be expected that the amount of the annual collections will be influenced by the fluctuating success of the cod and seal fisheries; and another cause of the diminished collection may doubtless be found in the continued high prices of provisions, and of the articles necessary for carrying on the fisheries.

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We regret to have to state that no collection was made last year towards the completion of the Church at Old Bonaventure, not on account of any unwillingness of the people themselves, for before proceeding to the Labrador they had promised subscriptions; but owing to an oversight or omission on the part of the collectors, Messrs. HENRY and WILLIAM STONE, who had not as they intended, furnished in time to Messrs. SLADE of this place, the amount of the promises made, in order to their being collected from the parties who had dealings with that firm. However, the Messrs. STONE have engaged a crew to prepare during the winter, at their own expence, 2,000 feet of clapboard for the Church.

At Ireland's Eye no collection was made for the Church Society, as the ability of the people is for the present sufficiently taxed to build the New School House at that place under the Board of Education, having had a Teacher lately engaged by the Board to serve them.

It is hoped that when the New School House at the North Side shall have been finished or prepared for use, some person may be found capable and willing to read the Church Prayers on Sundays for the benefit of the many inhabitants in that quarter, young and old, who hardly ever, if ever, go to Church at Trinity or Salmon Cove. Last fall the Reader of Cuckold's Cove who resides at Trinity, declined continuing his services there, alleging his inability to do so. And in reference to Trinity, you are aware that since the removal of Mr. Crouch, Mr. Watts has been engaged by your Committee to say Prayers, &c., at Trinity Church, during the occasional absence of the Minister on Sundays, for an addition of 40s, to his salary as Reader at Salmon Cove; while the Reader at Euglish Harbour supplies his absence during half the day at Salmon Cove for an additional consideration of 20s, per annum.

In August last your Minister on the faith of the promised payment of Church Members here and elsewhere, and of the additional vote of the Committee here of Ten Pounds towards the Harmonium for Trinity Church, ordered out the Instrument from London, which as he is informed by Mr. Hepburn is expected to be sent out in the ensuing spring by Messrs. Brooking, free of freight, so that the expense of conveyance out may be saved to the congregation.

Trusting that this useful and honorable association, which is yet but in its infancy, may enlist the zealous exertions of its members, and that no temporary discouragement of whatever nature may have the effect of extinguishing their ardour in the good cause, we close this report of operations in the mission of Trinity for the year 1856.

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The Depository of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, fostered by your Society, and under the care of Mr. J. T. BURTON, Water Street, St. John's, is in a flourishing condition and is the means of doing much good by the circulation of

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Bibles, Common Prayers, and Standard Books of Devotion, as well as very many Works of a sterling character, calculated to diffuse the blessings of knowledge throughout the Island. The amount of the past years' receipts in St. John's, is upwards of £150.

In conclusion, your Committee would express their expectation not less than their desire, that the next few years may be of greater importance to the Church in this Diocese,—important particularly, that is, as throwing her more upon her own resources, and as more strikingly developing her energies. From whatever causes, it has too often been the reproach of the English Church that, in her Colonial possessions, she has done so little for her self-support. The newer Dioceses have been content to derive their Spiritual ministrations from the charity-for such it is-of their brethren at home! This ought not to be, and must not be; and let us thank GOD for it, the Church is at length awaking to a true sense of what is due from herself to herself, and we may ere long hope to see her in a firmer and safer position than she has ever yet occupied; and therefore the better prepared to fulfil her mission, of supplying the spiritual necessities of those who are seeking the means of grace at her hands.



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On Friday, June 19, 1857, the Right Rev. the President and the Committee of the Newfoundland Church Society waited upon His Excellency the Governor, by appointment, and presented the following Address:

To His Excellency Sir ALEXANDER BANNERMAN, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies, &c., &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,---

The Officers and Committee, of the Newfoundland Church Society, in offering to your Excellency their respectful and sincere congratulations on the arrival of yourself and Lady Bannerman on those shores, beg permission to bring their Society under your Excellency's notice, and to solicit the honour of your accepting the office of Patron, in accordance with the 3rd Standing Rule.

Your Excellency having been already pleased to receive a copy of the last Report published by the Society, which contains its rules and explains its objects, they will not trespass now on your valuable time with any lengthened exposition either of its constitution or of its purpose. They would but inform your Excellency briefly, that the Society was established, simultaneously with kindred institutions in the other North American Dioceses,—that it has obtained, year by year, increasing favour and support among the Members of the Church of England,—that it has enjoyed the patronage of former Governors of this colony—that its agency has been largerly blessed of Almighty God in extending the benefits of religion along the coasts of Newfoundland and Labrador, and that it may be regarded as the association, through whose instrumentality the ministrations of our Church are to be dispensed to her numerous and widely scattered children within the limits of your Excellency's present Government.

In conclusion, the Officers and Committee of the Society assure your Excellency that their Prayers shall not be wanting for an abundant blessing on your administration of your high trust, as the Representative of our beloved Queen, that it may tend to the promotion of the best interests of the people of this ancient dependency of the British Crown.

I have perused the last report published by your Society, which contains its rules, and explains its objects, and I readily accept the office of Patron in accordance with the third standing rule.


