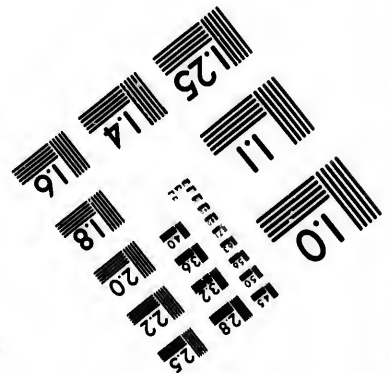
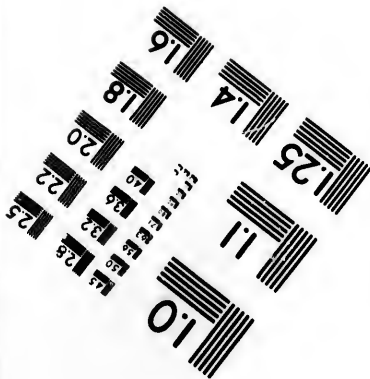
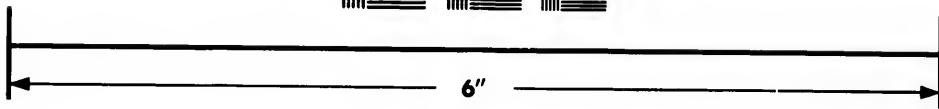
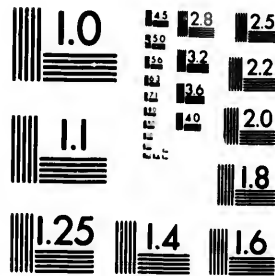


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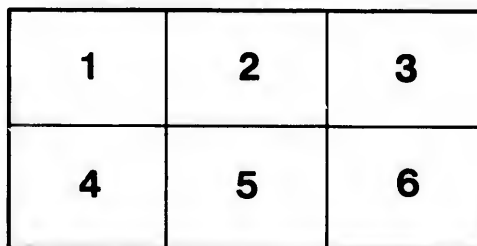
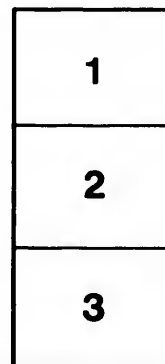
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ECLIPSES.

In the year 1850 there will be only two Eclipses ; both of the Sun.

I.—An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, February 12th, invisible at Montreal. Conjunction in Right Ascension at 1 hour 37 minutes in the morning.

II.—A Total Eclipse of the Sun, August 7th, invisible at Montreal. The mean time of Conjunction in Right Ascension will be at 4 hours and 37 minutes in the evening. This Eclipse will be seen from the North and Western parts of South America, from Mexico, California, Oregon, and from the Japanese Islands.

Brick-makers, Builders, or any person carting building materials in the City, shall pay an annual duty for registration, as follows:—For each two wheeled vehicle, or corresponding winter vehicle, drawn by one horse, 15s.—For each do. do. drawn by two horses, 20s.—For each Waggon or corresponding winter vehicle, drawn by two or more horses, 20s.

All Bakers, Brewers, and Distillers, and their Agents, shall pay an Annual Duty for registration, as follows:—

For each Baker's two-wheeled vehicle, and corresponding sleigh, 40s.

For each Baker's Waggon and corresponding Sleigh, 60s.

For each Brewer's or Distiller's Two or Four-wheeled vehicle, or corresponding sleigh, 60s.

The Tariff of Rates which Licensed Sweeps within the City of Montreal are allowed to charge, is as follows:—

Each chimney in use is required to be swept by licensed sweeps at least three times in the year—once between 1st May and 1st November, and twice at intervals of at least two months apart, between 1st November and 1st May,—under a penalty of 25s. to 50s. In every case of a chimney taking fire, the occupant of the house is subject to the above penalty.

United Kingdom.—The Mails for England are forwarded by Steamships which leave New York and Boston alternately, every Wednesday, until the 27th December. From the 26th December, till the 16th May, they leave fortnightly, on every alternate Wednesday.

Regulations and Rates.

All letters sent by post in Canada and other Provinces of British N America, are charged by weight.

The scale of weight for charging postage is the same as that by which letters to and from the United Kingdom are charged, viz. :—

For a Letter not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce.....	1 Rate
Ditto ditto 1 ounce.....	2 Rates
Ditto ditto 2 ounces....	4 Rates
Ditto ditto 3 ounces....	6 Rates

And so on, adding two rates for every additional ounce. After the first ounce, fractional parts are not noticed; thus, if a letter exceed one ounce, it becomes liable to four rates, and if it exceed two ounces, six rates.

And so on. Letters re-directed are rated afresh for the further distance.

Between the Province and the United Kingdom, a uniform charge of 1s. 2d. sterling, or 1s. 4d. currency per half ounce. English letters re-directed, 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. currency additional per half ounce.

Letters may be pre-paid or not, at the option of the sender.

The Inland Postage, on all Letters, Papers, &c., for the U. States, must be pre-paid, otherwise they will not be forwarded, but sent to the Dead Letter Office.

Newspapers

Colonial Newspapers, not exceeding two ounces, to or from any part of the British North American Provinces, pay one half penny, pre-paid or not, at the option of the sender.

If sent to any British Colony beyond sea, (not intended to pass through the United Kingdom) or to any foreign country, except the United States, one half-penny, to be pre-paid.

If sent to any part of the United States—one penny—to be pre-paid.

Newspapers from the United States pay, on delivery, one penny Provincial, in addition to the United States postage.

United States Newspapers if re-posted in Canada, are liable to letter rates of postage.

Newspapers from or to the United Kingdom, sent by closed Mails through the United States, are liable to a postage of one penny each—payable on delivery.

With exception of these last, (which are not limited as to weight) a newspaper to pass under the foregoing regulations, must not exceed two ounces, otherwise it will be liable to pamphlet postage,—*i. e.* one penny per ounce.

British Newspapers can be re-posted in Canada, subject to one half penny postage.

Supplements charged as distinct newspapers.

Votes and Proceedings in Parliament.

If sent to the United Kingdom by packet, or to any part of British North America or British West Indies, one penny for every four ounces.

If intended to be sent to the United Kingdom by private ship,—double the above rates.

No packet or cover containing votes or Legislative proceedings, permitted to be sent through the Post, if exceeding six pounds weight.

Pamphlets and other publications

If printed in the United Kingdom, British N. America or British West Indies, may be sent to any place in British North America, the United States, or British West Indies, at the reduced inland rate of one penny per ounce, in addition to sea postage, provided they do not exceed sixteen ounces.

Pamphlets mailed to any part of the United Kingdom subject to letter postage.

If printed and mailed in the United States, they are liable on delivery in this Province to the same rate, one penny per ounce; but if re-posted in Canada, they are charged with full letter postage.

Newspapers, Pamphlets, Publications and Parliamentary Proceedings, must be sent without covers, or with covers open at the ends. If this is not done, or if there be any marks or writing on them besides the address, full letter postage will be charged.

Arms, Clothing, Cattle, Provisions and Stores of every description, which any Commissary or Commissaries, Contractor or Contractors shall import or bring, or which may be imported or brought by the Principal or other Officer or Officers of Her Majesty's Ordnance into the Province for the use of Her Majesty's Army or Navy, or for the use of the Indian Nations in this Province; provided the duty otherwise payable thereon would be defrayed or borne by the Treasury of the United Kingdom or of this Province.

Horses and Carriages of Travellers; and Horses, Cattle and Carriages and other vehicles when employed in carrying Merchandise, together with the necessary harness and tackle, so long as the same shall be *bona fide* in use for that purpose, except the Horses, Cattle, Carriages, Vehicles and Harness of persons hawking Goods, Wares and Merchandise

through the Province for the purpose of retailing the same, and the Horses, Cattle, Carriages and Harness of any Circus or Equestrian Troop for exhibition. The Horses, Cattle, Carriages and Harness of any Menagerie to be free.

Donations of Clothing specially imported for the use of or to be distributed gratuitously by any Charitable Society in this Province.

Seeds of all kinds, Farming Utensils and Implements of Husbandry, when specially imported in good faith by any Society incorporated or established for the encouragement of agriculture.

The following Articles in the occupation or employment of persons coming into the Province for the purpose of actually settling therein, viz.

Wearing Apparel in actual use, and other personal effects not Merchandise; Horses and Cattle; Implements and Tools of Trade of handicraftsmen.

The personal Household Effects, not Merchandise, of inhabitants of this Province, being subjects of Her Majesty, and dying abroad.

And the following articles when imported directly from the United Kingdom, or from any British North American Province, and being the growth, produce or manufacture of the said United Kingdom or of such Province, respectively, viz;

Animals, Beef, Pork, Biscuit, Bread, Butter, Cocoa-Paste, Corn or Grain of all kinds; Flour; Fish, fresh or salted, dried or pickled; Fish Oil; Furs or Skins the produce of fish or creatures living in the Sea; Gypsum, Horns, Meat, Poultry, Plants, Shrubs and Trees, Potatoes and Vegetables of all kinds. Seeds of all kinds, Skins, Pelts, Furs or Tails, undressed. Wood, viz: Boards, Planks, Staves, Timber and Firewood.

[This exemption in favour of the *Provinces*, applies to their productions only while they receive similar articles free from this Province. New Brunswick and Nova Scotia have complied with those conditions. The Reciprocal arrangement is therefore in force with those Provinces.]
