WITH SCOTSMEN IN PREPONDERANCE REPRESENTS ALL VIEWS

John Burns and Lloyd-George Are Included—No Program in Meantime, But Home Rule is Not in the Plans—United Against Fiscal Reform.

A STRONG CABINET

Undoubtedly Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman has managed to get together a strong and able cabinet. The last ten years of opposition has opened the way for the advancement of the younger generation of politicians, who have, however, won their spurs in subordinate administrative posts. The three most important offices of finance and foreign and colonial affairs—have been given to men who are reported to be among the very best on the Liberal side, and they are an earnest that exchequer, imperial and international affairs will be handled with firmness, sobriety and good judgment.

In the meantime the government has no program, but some idea of the drift of cabinet opinion can be gained from the known affiliations of ministers. The Earl of Balfour is the Liberal Unionist, and his four chief henchmen have seats in the persons of H. H. Asquith, Sir Edward Grey, David Lloyd-George and Henry Fowler. Lord Crewe is his son-in-law, but has not identified himself particularly with either section of the Liberal party.

Another Liberal departure—in a department of considerable importance—is the departure of the noted labor leader to cabinet rank, while the Welsh nonconformist and former premier generally will be placed by the inclusion of D. Lloyd-George, a solidly Liberal, but whose activity, in 1910, brought him into high office. It is of some significance that he recently marked a marked tribute to Mr. Asquith, which has been taken to indicate political affinity as well as personal regard.

A new cabinet only has four members including the lord chancellor, in the house of lords, a fact indicative of the small number of Liberals who have in aristocratic quarters. As no duke is numbered among the ministers, a ministerial attack has been made on the Queen will have to be found in some lesser rank of the peerage, and Lady Grey's appointment has been suggested. This post has always been regarded as of considerable political importance, but in altered constitutional conditions it does not seem to stand in any different position from the former premier, other court appointments. There will be general regret that Earl Spencer's resignation to Mr. Chamberlain, and the leadership of the upper house will now have to be filled.

Home Rule Out of It.
On its political side the binding element is provided by the general opposition to Mr. Chamberlain's Home Rule proposals, which have for the time being given the Liberal party a working unity. There will be no home rule bill in the next parliament from the Liberal Unionist faction. W. H. THORNE HAS PASSED AWAY

WAS A VETERAN OF YORK COUNTY

Lived "All His Life Within Its Boundaries—Was Prominent in Its Public Affairs.

The death of W. H. Thorne, 66 East Bloor street, occurred yesterday after a brief illness. Mr. Thorne was born at Thornhill seventy-three years ago, and during his whole life resided within the boundaries of the County of York. He belonged to one of the oldest families in Upper Canada, and was a son of the late Benjamin Thorne (after whom Thornhill was named), one of the pioneers of Upper Canada, who carried on perhaps the largest grain and milling business in the country at that time, occupying the mill race in a position similar to that which the Delta occupy now. Benjamin Thorne was one of the first presidents of the Bank of Montreal.

Mr. Thorne succeeded to the business of his father, and carried it on with much success for many years at the time when he received the votes of his many years as reeve. In the York County Council he was an influential member, and for several consecutive years was warden of the county. For nearly twenty years he had been a resident of Toronto.

He was an active member of the Masonic fraternity and was worshipful master of Thorne Lodge at Holland Landing, the lodge bearing the name of his father, and carried it on with much success for many years at the time when he received the votes of his many years as reeve. In the York County Council he was an influential member, and for several consecutive years was warden of the county. For nearly twenty years he had been a resident of Toronto.

Mr. Thorne was survived by his widow, a sister, R. T. Coady, city treasurer, and by four brothers, Benjamin, Richard, Charles and Horace, barrister of this city, as well as by two sisters. The funeral will take place to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock to St. James' Cemetery.

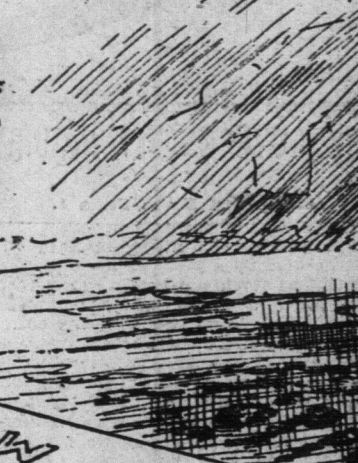

St. Petersburg, Dec. 9.—Another crisis is at hand involving the indefinite prolongation of the strike, the probable immediate precipitation of a general strike throughout Russia and the possible final struggle between the government and the proletariat.

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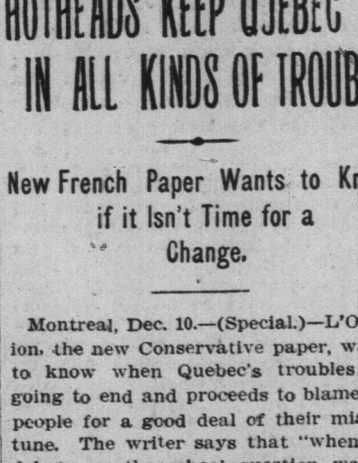
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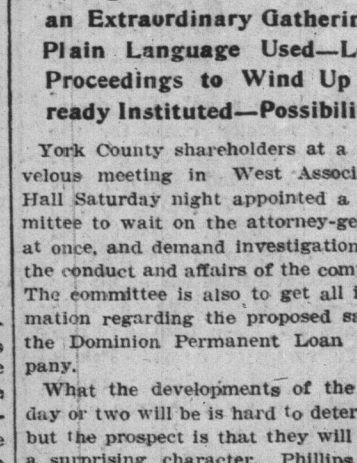
