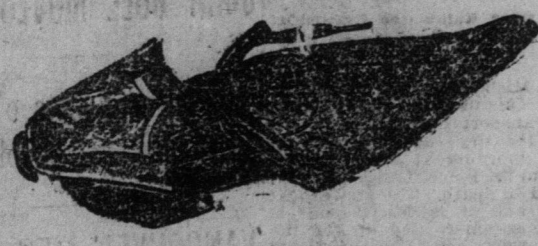

An interesting statement by an advocate of the Twenty Knot Line... From The Montreal Herald.

Of the important questions which confronted the Ministry on their assuming office in June last, being legal...

It has been claimed on one side that Canada must have the best service possible...

"First, then, let us look at the 16-knot line. The new steamer Canada is probably the best type of this class of vessel...

"Three different lines in the British North West trade possess steamers of 20-knot speed. One of these is the Canadian Line...

"A 16-knot vessel is also proposed to another drawback of the 20-knot vessel is its slow, or slower, than they were a few years ago...

"We may, therefore pass on to the consideration of the next class—the 16-knot vessel.

"This is the type favored by Mr. Dobbie and some others who have interested themselves in the subject, a vessel of this class would take about 30 hours less than the Parisian and about 15 less than the Canadian...

"We now have to consider the 20-knot steamer. A vessel of this class, with the two exceptions named, represents the maximum speed obtained for six days' consecutive steaming by any vessel on any sea route...

"The other prime objection which has received the endorsement of, although originated by, Mr. Standford Fleming, i.e., 'In view of the frequent fogs and ice in the St. Lawrence route it would not be safe to run 20-knot vessels on this route...'

"Again, in closing, we would say that a fast service alone would not prove profitable to any company. Every line possessing fast vessels has found it necessary to maintain a fleet of cargo steamers.
