LABOR LEAGUE OF AMERICA

Twentieth Annual Convention of the American Federation Opened Yesterday at Louisville.

BRITISH AND CANADIAN DELEGATES

President Gompers Reported a Year of Wonderful Growth—Seeks to Avoid Strikes.

Louisville, Ky., Dec. 6.—The twentieth annual convention of the American Federation of Labor met today in Music Hall, with 217 delegates in their seats. Representatives were present from the British Trades Union Congress and the Canadian Trades and Labor Congress.

President Gompers' Address. After the preliminary formalities, President Gompers delivered his annual address, in which he said, in substance, that the past year has witnessed a most remarkable growth in organization among the workers, who have realized that there is no protection for their interests or hope for justice and freedom in the future unless it results from the unity of wage-working masses.

"We had at the end of the fiscal year, Oct. 31, 1900, affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, national and international unions, 82; state federations, 16; city central labor unions, 200; local trade unions and federal bodies, 10,000,000 members.

There were issued during the year from national and international unions and the American Federation of Labor (direct) charters to the following: 1,000,000; newly formed unions, 3,375; charters surrendered or unions disbanded, 348, leaving a net increase of local unions for the year of 3,027, and a gain in membership of 244,220.

Our movement has had to a considerable extent secured, a diminution in the number of strikes. The barometer of strikes has fallen from 1,000 in 1899 to 600 in 1900, and the number of men and women who have been out of work has fallen from 1,000,000 to 500,000.
