TWENTY-THIRD YEAR

WILL BRING IN A BILL AIMING TO PUT BELL TELEPHONE COMPANY SOMEWHAT UNDER PUBLIC CONTROL—THOUGHT TO BE AN EFFORT TO HEAD OFF MR. MACLEAN'S MEASURE.

Ottawa, Feb. 28.—The government is evidently determined that Mr. W. E. Maclean shall not have the credit of putting through parliament a measure to bring the big telephone monopoly somewhat under public control. Either that or the scheme is to rally to the support of the measure, which will defeat that object, the united forces of the government in the House.

The speech from the throne contained no mention of a measure of the kind. Parliament has been told repeatedly since the opening of the session that the government would have no measures of importance to bring down. Yet to-night the Minister of Justice gives notice that on next government day he will introduce a bill entitled, "An Act respecting Telegraph and Telephone Companies." So far as can be learned, the bill is to consolidate the existing laws respecting telegraphs, and to provide for a certain control of rates, as in the case of railroads.

It is interesting to note that the bill is charged by telegraph companies to be subject to approval of the Governor-General-in-Council, but the vital features of an essentially restrictive measure are omitted. There is no provision in Mr. Maclean's bill to compel companies operating trunk lines to give connection privileges over such lines to other companies.

There is nothing in the government bill to directly forbid discrimination, nothing to oblige companies to furnish service to municipalities, applying and willing to pay for it; not a word to prevent increase of rates, which is the colossal measure with which the government will probably attempt to head-off the further increase of rates now before the House. Something, of course, had to be done to prevent the popular demand for reform of the telephone abuse, as expressed in the favorable petitions presented to parliament since the member for East York introduced his bill. An additional incentive to action of some sort was the approval with which the measure was received by the House. The result is, however, apparently unsatisfactory government bill.

He also resigned this position and came to this city, where he was appointed agent for Ontario of the Waterloo Mutual Fire Insurance Co., with offices in Temple Building. At the beginning of this year he returned to Berlin, and up to the time of his death was engaged in an effort to organize the Beaver Mutual Life Assurance company. His leaves a wife and two children living in Berlin.

THE HOUSE OF COMMONS
TWO AUDIENCES, FRED WILKINS' ZEAL, PLEDGE \$66,265 FOR THE SCHEME OF SUCCESSION

Crowds Were Turned Away From the Big Rallies and the Twenty-five Afternoon Denominational Conferences Were as Well Attended as They Were Helpful and Interesting—A Fitting Climax to a Convention Unparalleled in Student Life in America.

Two great missionary gatherings last night pledged \$90,385 for the carrying on of the work. It was such an outpouring of money as has not been witnessed on a similar occasion. Of this amount, \$55,235 was pledged by the immense Massey Hall meeting. The pledges are given for equal amounts for four years, or \$13,808.75 annually, in the Metropolitan Church the pledges aggregate \$5040 yearly for the same period, in addition to \$90 taken up in cash.

Two very handsome subscriptions were given in Massey Hall, one for \$2000, and another for \$1000 annually. Despite the chairman's injunction against applause the other day, many in the audience could not restrain their enthusiasm when the fancy figures were announced, and they applauded vigorously. The names of the donors are unknown, as it is the inviolable rule of the movement to keep all subscriptions secret.

Among the subscriptions was one for \$50 in thanksgiving for the escape from death of the two delegates injured at Hamilton.

Other pledges ran from one of \$500 and several of \$100, to smaller amounts of \$2 and \$1, of which the great bulk was composed.

Girl Tells a Romantic Story of Money and Wealth—Knew Jack Ross.

Montreal, Que., Feb. 28.—Montreal has a sensation. A missing servant and a stolen baby is the problem upon which the detectives are working to-day. The baby is Edgar Wayland, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Wayland of 1221 City Hall Avenue. He was stolen from the house some time yesterday afternoon by the servant, Audrey Erie, as she calls herself.

The story is a romantic one. Three months or so ago Mrs. Wayland advertised for a servant, and among the applicants was a young woman about 28 years of age, who gave her name as Audrey Erie. Yesterday she took some of Mrs. Wayland's clothing and left with the baby for parts unknown.

When the girl first went into the service she announced that she was engaged to be married to a young man named Jack Ross, who, she said, had just returned from the front. She also declared that she was heir to \$5000 by the death of a relative, that the money was in Toronto in the hands of two gentlemen, named Gurney and Forbes, and that she sought to reach them.

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PRICE HENRY INSURED AGAINST ASSASSINATION

Royal Visitor Carries a Policy of \$900,000, Taken When He Went to China—The Province and the Dominion Will Be Represented at Niagara Falls.

Ottawa, Feb. 28.—The Herald says: Insurance against assassination is one of the new ideas Prince Henry has brought to American shores. He carries a policy of \$900,000 against assassination, and it is said to be the only man in the world so insured. The Prince's brother, Emperor William, carries a life policy for \$5,000,000. King Edward's life is insured for \$3,000,000. The czar of Russia and his immediate family are insured for \$8,000,000.

Twenty Men From the Royal Canadian Dragoons to See Prince.

Ottawa, Feb. 28.—The Militia Department has made all arrangements for the military ceremonies in honor of Prince Henry when that distinguished personage sets foot on Canadian soil. A detachment of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, Toronto, will accompany the royal salute of 21 guns. One hundred men from the 13th Regiment will form the guard of honor. A field officer in escort of twelve men will be detached from the Royal Canadian Dragoons, Toronto. This is the same kind of escort that was provided when the Prince and Princess of Wales visited Canada. Major-General O'Grady-Hardy may go up to Niagara to represent the government. Lieut.-Col. A. P. Sherwood of the Dominion police has been asked to arrange for police and Sherwood.

COLONIES GET PREFERENCE. Canadian Hay and New Zealand Oats Go to South Africa.

New York, Feb. 28.—Another British transport is coming here to load hay for South Africa. The forage this time is coming from Canada, in bond, by rail. It is expected to be on to bring it here, to say nothing of the storing on board ship and freight to Cape Town, or such other port as may be designated later. The bales weigh about one hundred pounds each and are of the kind known as half bales, being put up at this weight for convenience of transport on mule-back, two to a mule.

SIX HUNDRED CASUALTIES. General Dewet's Son and Secretary Among the Captured.

London, Feb. 28.—The War Secretary, Mr. Brodrick, announced in the House of Commons to-day that during the last two days six hundred Boers had been killed or captured, and that 2000 horses and 25,000 head of cattle had fallen into the hands of the British troops.

AFTER TEN WEEKS. William Brophy, a Noted Robber of the Yukon, Captured.

Dawson, Feb. 28.—Mounted police at the Stockade Road House, Yukon, captured William Brophy, a notorious robber, after a ten weeks' hunt. During the chase Brophy was seen to have a revolver belonging to one of the policemen exploded, the bullet going through Brophy's abdomen and emerging at his back. He was taken to the hospital and is now recovering.

KILLED BY A TRAIN. Halifax, N.S., Feb. 28.—James G. Harris, manager of the Nova Scotia Nursery, met instant death this evening while attempting to cross the tracks at the foot of Russell street. He was struck by the outgoing suburban express, and his body cut in twain. He was 44 years of age, and is survived by a widow.

LET THEM MOVE. London, Feb. 28.—An editorial in "The Times," discussing Prince Henry's visit to America, says: "The more closely Germans adopt American principles, the more steadfastly they act upon them in China and elsewhere, the better pleased will be the English-speaking race on both sides of the ocean."

RESIGNED TO DUEL. Athens, Feb. 28.—M. Topalis, the Minister of Justice, resigned in order to fight a duel with Colonel Koumoundouris.

STUDENTS AT MOSCOW. St. Petersburg, Feb. 28.—According to an official account of the disturbances Feb. 22 at Moscow University, four hundred students, armed with badges, iron bars and revolvers, wrecked the interior of the University buildings, barricaded themselves within, and hung out red flags from the windows. The police had given orders for an entrance into the interior and arrested the ringleaders of the riot.

NOT ON THE PROGRAM. Goes for a Horseback Ride With President Roosevelt.

Washington, Feb. 28.—Prince Henry this afternoon enjoyed one event on his official itinerary, when he and President Roosevelt went in a motor car on a horseback ride of an hour and a quarter thru Rock Creek Valley and the suburbs in the northwestern section of the city. The Prince returned from Annapolis between 3 and 4 o'clock in the afternoon and went direct to the White House to pay a farewell visit. The farewell call was entirely informal, lasting only about five minutes, and then the Prince drove to the Embassy and exchanged his admiral's uniform for a riding suit.

ONTARIO TO PARTICIPATE. Premier Ross Says That His Government Will Honor the Prince.

When Prince Henry of Prussia arrives at Niagara Falls, His Majesty's legislative assembly of Ontario will extend to him a welcome on behalf of the people of Ontario. His Royal Highness will be accompanied with an address, and a deputation who have not yet been named, will be on hand to pay their respects to the distinguished visitor. Premier Ross yesterday afternoon, in answer to a question by Mr. Montford (South Perth), stated that a notice would be placed on Monday's Order of Business in regard to the appointment of a deputation to meet the Prince, and it goes on to say that there will be no objection to it.

CZAR AND CABINET FOR WAR Steps Are Being Taken to Strengthen Russia's Position in Far East.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 28.—The cabinet, the czar and the leading military authorities held a long conference to-day at which it was decided, in view of the Anglo-Japanese agreement, to make improvements and alterations in Eastern Siberia, especially at Vladivostok and Port Arthur.



NO CAUSE FOR ALARM.

Asylum is Well Equipped With Fire-Fighting Apparatus. The World paid a visit yesterday to the Insane Asylum to investigate what grounds there are for the charge that the institution is not properly equipped for fighting fire. The fact is that most thorough provision has been made.

There are six wards in the main building, and in each of these is a stand pipe connected with the main and 250 feet of hose, each of three wards, which is similarly provided for, except that the length of hose is but 150 feet. In the basement are three hose reels, each carrying 100 feet of hose, and 100 feet of emergency hose. There are 5000 feet of hose provided, and disposed in such a manner that several streams could be brought to bear upon any part of the building, and a complete system of alarm bells is installed. Pails are hung every day for still greater safety, and every inmate is instructed and the men are trained for service.

But how a fire, even if started, could make any headway is a question. The building is entirely of brick, and the walls are a two-foot brick wall, all floors are hardwood and dead-end joists, both brick and cement. Even the window sashes and doors, the only wood in that part of the building, are made of fireproof material, and the windows are protected by iron doors, and the furniture, carpets, and other articles are separated by iron doors. Night and day there is a strong guard on guard, and the most explicit instructions are given to all inmates as to conduct in case of fire. Besides all these appliances, the Dundas-street fire has only 100 yards away.

The only building in the asylum that is not fireproof is the dispensary, which is an independent main. All the other buildings are fireproof, and the only building in the city, and indicating 60 pounds of pressure, which, in the last official test, might possibly be one-clogged at a critical moment. An independent main for fire purposes only, has been recommended by Chief Thompson of the Fire Department.

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WHY WOOLLEN BLANKETS WEAR THIN.

A SCENE IN A GROCER'S STORE. Separating the two, because they were thoroughly worn through, and it was only by detaching the fine fibres from each other that you identified the cotton fibre. A bill was introduced by the Premier to amend the act respecting the improvement of highways. The bill was read a first and second time, and sent to the Municipal Committee. Mr. Ross observed that he was desirous of securing the opinion of the committee on the question of extending good roads debenture issues to 30 instead of 20 years, and also as to the advisability of allowing County Councils to issue the debentures without first securing the permission of the electors.

Overcrowded Institutions. Mr. Kribs (South Waterloo) moved for copies of correspondence in connection with the necessity for increased accommodation at the Deaf and Dumb Institute at Belleville and the Asylum for Idiots at Orillia. He explained that for some time he had been unsuccessful in his efforts to get patients admitted to one or the other of the institutions.

Subsidy Fund Formed. Mr. Matheson asked: Has any railway subsidy fund been formed under the provisions of 22 Vic., ch. 10, s. 9, and if so, what is the amount to such fund? Has any separate account ever been kept of the moneys lands within ten miles on each side of the Ontario and Huron River Railway, the Farry Sound Colonization Railway or the Brockville, Westport and Small Site, Marie Railway, as provided by this act.

Toronto's Bill Mutated. Toronto's bill was again before the Municipal Committee yesterday morning. The clause giving power to the Board of Control to amend the estimates was struck out. The board's estimates should be controlled by the city Board of Control.

The committee scarcely considered the clause providing for a two-year term for aldermen and other utilities authorized the city to acquire and operate lighting, telephone and other utilities which it considered.

Winton's Bill Passed. The bill of the town of Winton was passed by the Private Bills Committee yesterday. It provides for the payment of a \$25,000 bonus to a best sugar colony and a fixed assessment of \$80,000 for nine years.

The proposed amendments to the High School Act was considered by the Municipal Committee yesterday morning. The clause providing that in cases where pupils attend high schools in adjacent counties the counties must pay for their maintenance to the schools where they attend was passed.


