TO CHOKO OFF THE TRIALS LEGISLATURE WAS CALLED

Hoyle of North Ontario Has Amendment to Address—Hon. Mr. Davis Put on His Defence.

A second amendment to the address disapproving of the calling of the legislature in advance of the election trials was moved in the legislature yesterday afternoon by Mr. Hoyle of North Ontario. This is the amendment:

That the following words be added to the amendment: And this house also disapproves of the summoning of the legislature to meet for the despatch of business, such as a time as to postpone the trial of several election petitions, completed at the election of members of this house.

Mr. Hoyle made an exceptionally able speech of an hour and a half, and covered a wide field of subjects. He was followed by the Commissioner of Crown Lands, who will finish today. Mr. Downey will speak this afternoon, followed by the Attorney General. It is not likely that a division will be reached before Tuesday.

As soon as the preliminaries were disposed of Mr. Whitney took the floor to object to the debate on the address being given precedence over other matters on private members' day. There were some questions on the order paper on Wednesday which would have to stand over now, and while he did not wish to be considered as being too critical he thought there should be some understanding. The Premier replied that the usual course was to dispose of the address de die in diem.

Hoyle of North Ontario. Mr. Hoyle (North Ontario) in resuming the debate, said it was a pleasure for him to follow Mr. Preston in this debate.

The member for South Bruce was one of the fairest men of the government benches, but the speaker was unable to agree with some of his conclusions. Mr. Preston, who was speaking, was unable to see that there was any crisis in the affairs of his party. He must be a colonist, he said, and he declared that the present distress in Ontario is due to the slackening effort and cooling enthusiasm of a few Liberals.

From the time the leader of the opposition assumed the grand position of a holder he had been the subject of more misrepresentation than anyone else in Ontario. In 1898 in his first contest the result was practically a draw, a battle, and had the party received fair play they should have occupied the government benches.
