





In winning the women's national golf title on Saturday it is not too much to say that Miss Dorothy Campbell of Scotland, likewise champion of Great Britain, has worked a benefit rather than a harm to the game in this country, says an east-

to the game in this country, says an eastern expert. American maidens and matrons have shown a disposition to take things too easily of late years, apparently weil satisfied with their own doubtful progress. The success of Miss Campbell should open the eyes of the drowsy to a realization of the fact that there is more in golf than drinking ter on the lawn or clubhouse piazza.

On the other side Miss Campbell and many of the other leading exponents of the game in her land play nearly all the time. They practice with the definite object of working up their game and strengthening the weak points. They do not try to drive the ball a mile, Miss Campbell in particular paying a deal more attention to direction than distance. Miss Teacher came with a reputation as a wonderful driver. She did hit long balls, exceptionally so, but no longer than Miss Margaret Curtis or Miss Anita Phipps.

She could not have had a harder draw, and while not compelled to meet Miss M. Curtis or Miss Kate Harley, it may be said that neither showed championship form at match play. Miss Harley lost to Miss M. B. Adams, who in turn fell before Mrs. Caleb F. Fox, who also defeated Miss Curtis. Miss Campbell's hardest match was with Mrs. C. T. Stout, the former national and metropolitan champion. Mrs. Stout practiced hard for this tournament, and played in her old time form. There is little if anything to choose between these two. If anything Mrs. Stout is longer off the tee. She plays her irons beautifully and puts nearly as well as the Scotch girl. What she needs more than anything is an expert caddie, for her own judgment at times is wofully lacking. At any rate, Miss Campbell did not hesitate to say after the tournament that she considered Mrs. Stout the best woman golfer in America.
