MacBride, Halcrow, McNamara and Nelson Address Big Rally in Hamilton.

VICIOUS PROPAGANDA

Hamilton, Aug. 8.—(Special).—Why all this fuss and stall by the Drury government about Hydro radicals was demanded by Mayor M. M. MacBride M.L.A. here last evening.

Says Challenge to People. Sergeant-Major McNamara, M.L.A. of Riverdale, declared that the pro-corporationists were fighting to the death to beat Hydro radicals.

Says Greatest Electric City. Gordon Nelson, chairman of the local Hydro Commission, characterized Hamilton as the greatest electric city in the world and said a tribute to John Pattison, who was due the city's status in this respect.

George G. Halcrow, M.L.A., who called the meeting and who presided, outlined the history of the entire Hydro movement and made fitting reference to the memory of the late Allan Stephenson.

POLICEMEN SLAIN BY TRAIN BANDITS BIG MAN-HUNT ON

Two Hundred Police Reserves and Citizens Surround Hiding-Place in Crow's Nest Pass Region of Two Desperadoes, Following Revolver Battle in Cafe at Bellevue, Alberta, in Which Constable Bailey, of Provincial Police, Corporal Usher of the R.C.M.P., and One of the Bandits Were Shot Dead.

Lethbridge, Alta., Aug. 8.—(By Canadian Press).—In the Crow's Nest Pass from Frank to the divide are an armed camp today, and two hundred police reserves and citizens, sworn in for special police duty, surround the famous Frank slide, on which the two remaining desperadoes are supposed to be in hiding.

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SOVIET REFUSES TRUCE PREMIERS IN CONFERENCE DISCUSS WAR MEASURES

PREPARED TO DEAL WITH RUMANIA

London, Aug. 8.—A wireless despatch from Moscow announces that Foreign Minister Tchitcherin, of the Russian soviet government, has sent a note to the Rumanian government, saying that Russia is prepared to resume peace negotiations with that country.

EXPECT ENOUGH HELP FOR WESTERN HARVEST

Ottawa, Aug. 8.—(By Canadian Press).—There is no likelihood of an abnormal shortage of harvest help, according to reports received here from western points.

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Foch and Wilson Take Prominent Part in Discussion—Tentative Decision to Reimpose Economic and Naval Blockade—France to Bear Burden of Land Operations and Britain That of Blockade—Will Rush Arms and Aid to Poland.

Hythe, England, Aug. 8.—The rejection by the Bolsheviks of the British proposal for an immediate ten days' truce with Poland, made as a result of Premier Lloyd George's conference last Friday with M. Kameneff and M. Krasin, the Bolshevik representatives now in London, reached Mr. Lloyd George and Premier Millerand this morning while they were in conference at the home of Sir Phillip Sassoon at Lympne, near here.

The Bolshevik refusal of a truce resulted in the conference assuming a very war-like aspect, and the best and quickest means of giving Poland all possible aid to stem the Bolshevik tide were immediately discussed by the premiers.

Marshal Foch and Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson took a prominent part in the morning discussion, and it has been learned from an official source that the aid for Poland will centre in Marshal Foch.

While the Bolshevik refusal of a truce is said not to be final and there was mention of some counter-proposal, the premiers decided to complete all plans for Poland's assistance and then to wait a final reply from Moscow.

The memorandum for the truce was drafted at Friday's meeting between Mr. Lloyd George and M. Krasin and M. Kameneff, and sent by wireless to Moscow for an immediate reply. The purpose of the truce was to halt the Bolshevik onward rush on the ground.

After the arrival of the French party at Lympne a cordon was thrown round the residence of Philip Sassoon, the host of the conference.

With Mr. Lloyd George were Earl Curzon, the British foreign secretary, Admiral Beatty, commander of the fleet, and Lieut.-Col. Sir Maurice Hankey, secretary to the committee on imperial defence.

Arthur J. Balfour in today's meeting came as a surprise to British and French circles, and was the cause of much speculation. The accepted view was that Mr. Lloyd George desired to avail himself of the mature experience of a statesman such as Mr. Balfour in the present crisis.

Britain to Undertake Blockade. The subject of a final break in the negotiations with the Moscow government, it is believed France will bear the burden of land aid, while Great Britain will assume responsibility for the imposition of the blockade.

The blockade can be made effective within a few hours, as far as the British navy is concerned, and upon the British navy will fall the bulk of the work.

A squadron of light cruisers and other vessels in the Baltic is ready at a moment's notice to begin intensive patrols, while the units in the Black Sea are more than enough to effectively blockade all ports.

The force in the Baltic is considered sufficient, and the admiralty denies reports that another squadron will be ordered there immediately, even without additional blockade work be decided on.

Evacuation of Warsaw. London, Aug. 8.—Warsaw will be evacuated today by the Polish government to accept the terms of a truce, and the refusal of the Soviet government is taken in conference circles here as meaning that Kameneff and Krasin have but minor influence with Premier Lenin and War Minister Trotsky.

Every Guarantee Offered. At the conference Mr. Lloyd George offered every guarantee that the truce would not be used as a means for reinforcing the military position in Poland.

Polish Government Offered. The premier answered all the Russian objections to the present plan and Kameneff sent the plan to Moscow by wireless with a recommendation that it be adopted.


In British and French circles tonight it is admitted that the situation created by the Bolshevik refusal of a truce is a serious one.

Shots Fired at Demonstration. Belfast, Aug. 8.—The flying of Sinn Féin flags in connection with a Manx demonstration in Londonderry today was nearly attended by bloodshed.

Shots were fired between rival factions, but troops with an armored car came upon the scene and dispersed the disturbers of the peace.

Nine policemen were ambushed at Kildorrey, county Cork, today. Five of them were wounded. The arms of the policemen were taken from them.

ONLY SLIGHT CLUE

Philip Goldberg, aged 8 years, of 112 McCaul street, was murdered in a vacant lot near Queen street and Gendall avenue Saturday afternoon.

The murderer is thought to have been a lunatic, and, despite the fact that the police and people residing in the district made searches thru High Park and along the Lake Shore road, no trace has as yet been found of the criminal.

Three men arrested Sunday were brought before Albert McMurdy, 32 Bellwoods avenue, who found the murdered boy, but he could not identify them. One man was arrested at Sunnyside for approaching small children.

McMurdy's story is that he was coming from High Park and was walking along a path thru the field to Queen street when he noticed the child lying on his back in the long grass with blood pouring profusely from his throat.

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
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


The cross on this picture marks the spot where the murdered boy, Philip Goldberg, was found. A policeman can be seen on the right on the roadway, looking northwest.





FIND MISSING MAN IN NORTH ONTARIO

Ft. William Man in Woods Two Weeks, Nearly Fished.
 Port Arthur, Ont., Aug. 8.—David Kincaid, the returned soldier, who has been missing in the neighborhood of Loon Lake, 90 miles east of Port Arthur, was picked up by a passing train this morning at Mile "Ninety-Two." Kincaid has been in the woods for the past two weeks, apparently living on berries and roots. He was taken to his home in Port William this afternoon.

The finding of Kincaid brings to a close one of the longest man hunts in this section of the country. Ever since his disappearance hundreds of citizens from Port Arthur and Port William, Indians, Mounted Police and returned soldiers have been scouring the woods.

According to the story of the train crew, Kincaid crawled out to the track, being too weak to walk and was placed in the caboose of the freight. He was too weak to tell of his experiences.

Identify Man Killed by Train, But Home City Still Unknown
 Belleville, Ont., Aug. 8.—(Special).—That the man who was killed on the G.T.R. track near Marysville, in Hastings county, on July 22, was named George Wellington, was established at the inquest held here. Where the deceased's home was is unknown.
