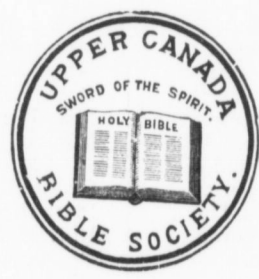

LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,

As adopted at a General Meeting of the Society, held in the City of Toronto, on the third day of August, 1855; and amended at General Meetings held on the 13th day of April, 1880, and 18th day of November, 1887.

[UNDER THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.]

ARTICLE I. This Society shall be denominated the "UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY," having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society—that is, the circulation of the Bible, without note or comment.

II. This Society shall endeavour to unite all Bible Societies in the Province, and to concentrate their operations, in order to give more efficiency to the whole.

III. This Society shall maintain, in the City of Toronto, a general depôt of Bibles and Testaments, from which all Societies in connection with it shall be supplied with the Scriptures at the lowest price at which they can be afforded.

IV. The business of the Society shall be carried on by a Board of Directors, to consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer and Secretaries, and a representative from each Branch, as provided in Article V., together with twenty clerical and twenty lay members so selected as to give the Board always, as before, a representative character as regards the principal religious bodies interested in the work of the Society, five of whom shall form a quorum. The five clerical and five lay members who shall have attended the least number of meetings of the Board shall not be eligible for re-election, except in cases where the non-attendance has arisen from illness or absence from the country, in which cases the Board may nominate such member or members for re-election.

V. Each Branch Society shall be entitled to a representative on the General Board. The President of the Branch shall be *ex officio* such representative, or any other resident member whom the Committee may appoint as a substitute, who shall be a member of such Branch.

VI. At any meeting of the Directors, the President, or in his absence, the Vice-President, first upon the list then present, and in absence of such Vice-President, the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be chosen for that purpose, shall preside.

VII. Each person paying annually one dollar shall be a member of this Society; and persons paying fifty dollars at any one time, either to this Society or to any of the Societies in connection therewith, or through them to the British and Foreign Bible Society, or who may have rendered important services, shall at the discretion of the Directors, be declared Life Members.

VIII. Each Life Member of this Society shall be furnished with a certificate of membership, under the corporate seal of the Society, duly signed by the President and Secretaries.

IX. The Board of Directors for the time being shall have the appointment of the Permanent Secretary, Agents, Depositary, Colporteurs, Book-keeper, and Assistants of the Society, and the fixing of all salaries and allowances; and shall have the superintendence and management of all the property, real and personal, of the Corporation, as well as the management and control of its general affairs

and the appropriation of its funds, with full power to enact such rules as may be requisite to effect the objects contemplated by the Act of Incorporation.

X. The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of business on the third Tuesday of each month, at the hour of 7.30 p.m. Special meetings may be called by the Secretaries at any time, at the request of the President or of any three Directors.

XI. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be held on the second Wednesday in the month of May in each and every year, or at such other time as the Directors, for the time being, may deem best for the interests of the Society; when the Officers and Directors for the ensuing year shall be chosen; a report of the operations of the Society during the foregoing year shall be presented, together with the Treasurer's and Depository's accounts duly audited. Special general meetings may be called at any time by the Board.

XII. In case of the death or removal of any Director or Officer during the year, the Board shall at the next ensuing meeting thereof fill such vacancy.

XIII. No alteration of these By-laws shall be made except at a General Meeting of the Society, and after one month's notice of the proposed alteration has been given to the Board.

RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS RELATIVE
TO GRANTS TO SUNDAY-SCHOOLS, SEPTEMBER, 1878.

That in all applications for grants of Bibles to Sunday-schools, the applicant be requested to furnish the Secretaries with an account of the state of the school; the number of scholars and teachers; the amount of funds at the disposal of the managers; who are its officers; and why it is necessary to make such application; all of which should in every case be certified by a minister of the Gospel, or some person of known respectability. And further, this Board recommends that the Secretaries make grants in future only to destitute settlements; reporting the same to the next General Meeting of the Board of Directors.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RELATIVE TO "GRANTS TO
SUNDAY-SCHOOLS," ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS,
18TH JUNE, 1888.

That the forms of application for grants, already in use, as authorized by the Board in October, 1867, and September, 1878, regarding Sunday-schools, be continued, although it is right to state that the superintendents of schools have not availed themselves of the privileges offered in the form of September, 1878, to any extent.

In the opinion of your Committee, mission churches and schools, under denominational auspices, are not in general to be considered fit objects for the gratuities of the Society; but missions among Indians, Jews, French-Canadians, Chinese, Italians, etc., though under denominational auspices, are not to be taken as coming under this general rule.

RULES

RECOMMENDED TO BRANCH SOCIETIES.

(Revised May 17th, 1887.)

- I. That a Society be formed in connection with the Upper Canada Bible Society, and through it with the British and Foreign Bible Society, for the purpose of contributing to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment.
- II. That the Society be denominated "The _____ BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY."
- III. That all persons subscribing one dollar annually shall be members of the Branch Society; and those subscribing twenty dollars at one time shall be life members of the same.
- IV. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee consisting of not less than _____ other members; five to constitute a quorum.
- V. That all Ministers of the Gospel who are subscribers to the Society shall be members of the Committee.
- VI. That the Committee shall meet quarterly or oftener; time and place of meeting to be fixed by themselves.
- VII. That the Committee divide their sphere of operations into districts, and appoint visitors for each district, to solicit subscriptions and donations, and also to ascertain the wants of the people regarding the Word of God.
- VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Branch Society shall, after deducting incidental expenses, be remitted yearly to the Upper Canada Bible Society, or through it to the British and Foreign Bible Society, for the purpose of translating the Word of God into the various languages, and for supplying the whole world, through the Parent Institution, with the pure Word of God.
- IX. That a depository for the sale of the Holy Scriptures be opened in a suitable central locality, and that the books be placed in a conspicuous position, the necessary supply being obtained from the Upper Canada Bible Society *on sale*. Remittances on purchase account to be made from *proceeds of sales only*.
- X. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on the _____ day of _____, in each year, at _____, when the accounts shall be presented; the proceedings of the past year stated; moneys voted, a new Committee appointed, and a Report agreed upon; the Report to be published under the direction of the Committee if required, and a copy forwarded to the Secretary at Toronto.
- XI. That on the formation of a new Committee, the President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and such three-fourths of the other members of the Committee as have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

FIFTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY

FOR YEAR ENDING 31ST MARCH, 1892.

The record of the work of the Upper Canada Bible Society varies but little from time to time. The experiences of one period closely resemble those of another, and the past year has been no exception to this general rule. As directors and officers we have occasionally been privileged to labour in the sunshine of progress and achievement, and again, the shadow of difficulty and discouragement has surrounded us—but to-day we can offer the tribute of praise to God, from whom comes the power to render acceptable service, that the march of this branch of Christian work throughout has ever been onward and upward.

In 1840 the Upper Canada Bible Society was established as an auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society. Primarily, our work is to circulate the Holy Scriptures; by sales at our numerous depositories in Ontario, Manitoba, the North-West Territories, and British Columbia; by Colportage, conducted by godly, faithful men, who carry the *Word* to the homes of the people throughout the length and breadth of our Canadian field; and by gifts to public institutions, hospitals, prisons, hotels, steamboats, railways, and to individuals who are unable or unprepared to pay for them. Of equal importance is the privilege to co-operate with the parent organization by raising funds to assist in the more extended and comprehensive plan for a world-wide circulation of the Bible, and the fact that our Society is the largest contributor and auxiliary is to us, and all interested in the work, another source of grateful satisfaction.

The Bible Society stands before the world with the *Book of books* in hand—whether by the Colporteur or at the Depository, one book alone is held up to view, and that the Bible, which claims the attention of the inhabitants of all countries, because as the Word of God for our salvation it alone supplies the world's great need, and we have the blessed assurance that it shall endure forever.

The object of the British and Foreign Bible Society is definite and simple, viz., to publish in all known languages, and to distribute in all lands, the Holy Scriptures without note or comment. The words of Divine Truth enlighten, convert, purify, comfort, elevate and strengthen the soul. "The law of the Lord is perfect, converting the soul; the testimony of the Lord is sure, making wise the simple; the

statutes of the Lord are right, rejoicing the heart; the commandment of the Lord is pure, enlightening the eyes."

It may be asked: What is the British and Foreign Bible Society doing to accomplish its special mission?

In the first year of its existence—1804—it had not sufficient means to print a single copy of the Scriptures; the second year a thousand copies were issued; this year—1891-92—it has issued and circulated nearly four million copies of God's Word in different languages throughout the world, being 62,680 copies over 1891 and 196,952 over 1890.

The total issues of the Society since its birth to the close of its last fiscal year (31st March, 1892), are: One hundred and thirty-one million eight hundred and forty-four thousand seven hundred and ninety six (131,844,796) copies.

Thirteen thousand copies of the Bible, in whole or in part, are asked for at the hands of the Society for every working day in the year, and it employs more than one thousand Colporteurs and Bible women to carry the message of Salvation to the homes of the people in various countries.

Dr. Cust states that the Bible may now be obtained in three hundred and thirty-one (331) languages, and of this number the British and Foreign Bible Society publish and circulate it in three hundred and two (302) languages.

Versions of some part of the Sacred Book in over seventy (70) languages claimed the careful attention of the Translators and Editorial Committee of the Society during the past year, and nine of these languages find a place for the first time among those privileged to convey the Gospel message to men in their own tongue.

In reflecting on such a prodigious work as this, embracing the translation, publication, and distribution of all those different languages, we are led to exclaim, "What hath God wrought?"

From last year's Abstract Report (1891-2), we regret to note that for the third successive year the revenue has not been equal to the requirements of the British and Foreign Bible Society, the expenditure amounting to £43,430 more than the receipts during that period. The total revenue for the past year was £211,384 10s. This is less by £5,764 7s. 3d. than in 1890-1. We trust this deficit will be speedily covered.

At the present time a pertinent question is:—What has been done by the Upper Canada Bible Society to meet and discharge the responsibilities of service devolving on it, and with what success?

Since the organization of the Society the blessing of God has rested upon it, and steady progress has marked its course. The issue of the Scriptures, and the revenue, has largely increased from year to year, and the work of the Society has been greatly extended, embracing the whole territory from Kingston to the Pacific Coast, except a small portion occupied by the Western Ontario Society in the neighbourhood of London. (For detailed statement of income and issues see page 7.)

During the past year our numerous Branches and Depositories have, as usual, been visited by agents, with a view of deepening and intensifying the interest and extending the work in Ontario, Manitoba, and the North-West.

The greater number of the Branches responded nobly, and have forwarded their revenue from sales of Scriptures and free contributions to the head office in Toronto.

Sixteen (16) new Branches have been formed and others resuscitated.

The new Branches are, *viz.*—In *Ontario*—Wilton, Inverary, Wolfe Island, Tottenham, Dashwood, Kemble, Delhi, Holmesville, Fort William and Keewatin.

In *Manitoba and North-West*—Cartwright, Stonewall, Russell and Miami (Manitoba), and Saltcoats and Yorkton (Assiniboia).

In the City of Toronto, Branch Bible Societies have been organized in seven (7) different districts, three of which have already shown the result of their labours by sending in their collections, while the others are expected to be in active operation during the coming year. It is hoped that this method will largely increase the subscriptions from the citizens, and eventually relieve the Society of the necessity of employing a city Collector. The Pastors are earnestly requested to present this matter to their respective Congregations.

Six Colporteurs have been engaged in circulating the Word of God in districts considered most suitable for the work—Manitoulin Island, the north shores of Georgian Bay, Algoma, Muskoka, and Parry Sound Districts, where the settlers, employees in mills and lumbering camps, miners, fishermen, etc., were visited, and our Colporteurs have had many opportunities for earnest conversations with careless men and women, who seldom, if ever, enter the house of God or hear His message of love proclaimed. Many interesting incidents have been reported by these faithful servants of the Society of conviction, and in some cases conversion, through the reading and explaining of the Scriptures. A large number of Bibles and Testaments have thus been distributed by sales and gratuitously to those families or individuals found destitute of the Word of God.

The total issue of Scriptures for the year is, 39,972 copies, 1,557 over last year. In addition to this, the Society has assisted the work of Bible Colportage in Quebec to the amount of \$1,814.03, and in Manitoba and the North-West to the extent of \$918. The total revenue for the year is \$38,729.50.

Although the total revenue of the Society is about \$1,300 less than last year, we are thankful to be able to state that the ordinary revenue (that is, from sales and free contributions) is nearly \$1,200 larger than in any former year, the apparent decrease being caused by the large sum of \$5,000 received last year as the first instalment of the late Mr. William Gooderham's munificent bequest, as against \$2,500, the second payment of the same bequest which has been received this year. Thus we have the great gratification of being able to report another year of increase and extension of work. Our remittances to the Parent Society during the year have been over \$17,000.

In view of the great work and pressing needs of the Parent Society and its vital relation to all missionary effort, and the ultimate evangelization of the whole world, we would appeal to the Christian people of Canada to sustain the Bible cause by their sympathies, prayers, and benevolent offerings.

During the past year a breach was made in the ranks of our Directorate by the death of Mr. George M. Evans, M.A., who for many years was a regular attendant

at the meetings of the Board and a faithful supporter of the Bible Society. The vacancy was filled by Mr. C. R. Cooper, who was elected by the Board on 16th June, 1891. Whilst we have been graciously spared let us realize that our time here is short, and that it behooves us to be up and doing, for "the night cometh when no man can work."

We would most sincerely renew our expressions of obligation to those hundreds of faithful officers of Branches—many of whom are becoming old in the service of the Master, in connection with the Bible Society. To the younger officers we would say—Be of good courage, the world is the Lord's.

To the lady and gentlemen collectors we are under a deep sense of gratitude, for we know their work is frequently arduous and difficult, but, thank God, who sends encouragement, and does not despise the day of small things, but is ever ready to crown the efforts of His servants with His "Well done." Then shall we not in our Master's name and with His help strain every nerve and use every power, however feeble, in His service and to His glory.

In most of the Branches, the work is being performed courteously, efficiently and promptly, and there are officers who state "that they do not know of a family or individual in the district, destitute of a Bible."

A number of the Branches held their Annual Meeting under the direction of their own officers and neighbouring pastors. We believe the work was well and faithfully performed, and the proceedings much enjoyed by interested audiences. We trust that in future years much more of this work will be done by the resident ministers, so as to create increased interest, and save the Society the expense of agency. Will the officers of Branches and pastors kindly take this into consideration and notify the Permanent Secretary at Toronto of their decision by the 1st of September, as arrangements for visitations will be made during that month.

The flourishing Branch at Brampton having attained its 50th year, arrangements were made by its Officers for a Special Jubilee Meeting, which was held on Tuesday evening, 23rd February, '92. The venerable President, Mr. George Dawson, occupied the chair and gave a most interesting history of the Society. Mr. M. Treadgold, Treasurer, and Mr. E. J. Graham, Secretary, spoke of its work. By invitation the Revs. Dr. Thomas and J. Burton, B.D., of Toronto, were present and addressed the meeting with much acceptance. The Revs. A. Gandier, W. Herridge and W. J. McKay, resident ministers of the town, were also present and took part in this interesting meeting.

We desire respectfully and earnestly to urge that an Annual Report (Blank forms of Report are furnished from Toronto) showing the receipts for sales of Scriptures, free contributions, donations or legacies, accompanied with remittances of revenue, list of names of subscribers, and a statement of stock of Scriptures on hand at the Depository, should be sent by the Treasurer and Depository of each Branch Society to the proper Officers in Toronto before the 31st March, as our fiscal year closes at that date. This is essential to a full and correct knowledge of the operations of the Branch and the prompt acknowledgment in the "Recorder" and *Annual Report* of funds intrusted to the Society.

COLPORTAGE.

The important work of Colportage was continued during the year by our Colporteurs:—Messrs. Peter Cromar, John Lockhart, Perez Dean, George Armstrong, W. G. White and James Sinclair. In consequence of advanced years, Mr. Dean has resigned, being unable to continue longer in this arduous employment. Two students from colleges in Manitoba have been engaged to canvass in Manitoba and the North-West during the ensuing summer months. Mr. White has resumed his work in Algoma, and will extend his field of labour into the eastern portion of Manitoba. (Particulars of their work are shown on page 6.)

As in former years, an attractive stock of Bibles and Testaments, in many different languages, was placed in our "Kiosk" on the grounds in Toronto during the Exhibition, and although there were not a great many copies of Scripture sold, the aims of the Bible Society were thus made known, and people became interested in the work who had no knowledge of it previously.

MANITOBA AND THE NORTH-WEST.

The Branch Societies in Manitoba and the North-West were visited by our Provisional Agents, six of whom were temporarily engaged in the work, with good results. Ten new Branches and Depositories were formed in that territory, with encouraging prospects.

The work of the Branch at Winnipeg is prosperous. A special effort is being made by Miss Maguire among the immigrants, under the auspices of this Society. A good remittance as free contributions has already been received, and the Depository's remittance for sales is expected daily.

BRITISH COLUMBIA.

We have eight Branches and Depositories in British Columbia. The Societies at Victoria and New Westminster are in a healthy state, and have sent us handsome remittances, which are considerably increased over the former year.

Vancouver Branch has also sent us a good remittance for sale of Scriptures.

MONTREAL AUXILIARY.

The Seventy-first Anniversary of this Society was held on the 27th January, 1892. The report shows another year of success and advance. The total revenue is \$16,938.47; 22,714 Bibles and Testaments were issued.

QUEBEC AUXILIARY.

The Quebec Auxiliary has done excellent work during the past year under the supervision of the General Secretary and Agent, Rev. Edward J. Stobo. The officers of the Society gratefully acknowledge the great assistance received from the Upper Canada Bible Society and its Branches (amounting to \$1,814.03), and plead for a continuance of the sympathy, prayers and benevolence of the people of Ontario, without which aid they could not successfully continue their present work of French Colportage.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

The American Bible Society held its Seventy-sixth Annual Meeting in New York on the 12th May, 1892, and statistics show another very successful year's

work. The total receipts for general purposes were \$556,527.29. Total issue of Bibles, Testaments and portions, 1,298,196, of which 434,240 were circulated in Foreign Lands.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

The British and Foreign Bible Society held its Eighty-eighth Anniversary in Exeter Hall, London, Eng., on the 6th inst. An abstract of the report is given herewith (see page 8).

BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

ABSTRACT OF THE REPORT, 1891-92.

The Committee meet the members of the Society at this anniversary with many grounds for thanksgiving, and one for vigilance, if not for anxiety.

The eighty-eighth year of the Society's history has finished its course. A "never-failing Providence" has, throughout, graciously kept the Society from disaster, and has opened to it many a door for successful advance. Though it be still "tried to the uttermost" in the furnaces of friendly or of hostile criticism, the Bible is the book for which men everywhere ask as they ask for no other. Thirteen thousand copies of it, in whole or in part, are asked at this Society's hands for every working-day throughout the year. Versions of some part of it in over seventy languages last year claimed the careful attention of the Editorial Committee. Nine of these languages find a place for the first time among those privileged to convey to men in their own tongue the Gospel message of the Most High.

The total circulation of the year in Bibles, Testaments and detached books of Scripture only falls short of four millions by 10,785 copies.* It shows an advance of 62,680 copies on the issues announced in 1891; an advance of 196,952 on those of 1890; and an advance of 1,050,670 on those of 1882, ten years ago. The advance is in this respect specially satisfactory in that it is due to increased issues from depôts abroad. They reached 2,118,197 copies.

The copies sent forth by the Society since 1804 have been 131,844,796.

The issues of the "Penny" Testament since its first appearance in July, 1884, have been 5,000,668 copies. The disparity between the cost of these Testaments and the price at which they are sold has of late been considerably reduced, and the large-type Gospels at a halfpenny are still further mitigating the loss by taking the place of these Testaments.

Financial relief in some form has become a pressing necessity. For three successive years the story told at these meetings has had its one disappointing feature in the inadequacy of the year's receipts to meet the year's expenses. Three years ago the deficit announced was £13,508; two years ago it was £15,488 more; last year it was £14,434 more. The warning note then sounded brought in some welcome special donations, but it has had only a small appreciable effect on the aggregate Free Contributions received from the Auxiliaries at home and abroad. The legacies paid within the year have come to £23,833, but that is less by £6,320 than the amount in the previous year. From all sources the

Society received in fresh income for the year £114,284 14s. 1d. This is less by £1,560 14s. 3d. than the corresponding figure in 1891; but the decrease did not arise in England or Wales.

Meantime the sum converted into Scriptures during the year to meet growing demands, largely from mission fields, has been £117,402 4s. 3d., or £1,122 1s. 3d. more than in 1891, and more by £3,117 10s. 2d. than the entire *new* income received from the Christian Churches of the world within the same time. The Committee felt that supplies of the Word of God must not be withheld. These are not days when the book to which the soul must go for light and truth, for direction and comfort, should be more sparingly provided than heretofore. Least of all should this be so for mission lands. The centenary of the Baptist Missionary Society this year, followed as it will be by the centenaries of other societies, will inaugurate a fresh era of more rapid advance in them than before.

If those whose zeal for missions is now so happily kindling more and more will realize that their liberality to Missionary Societies soon leads to larger demands on the Bible Society, and will also help it more generously to meet these demands, the case will be met.

As has already been stated, more than the whole of its *new* income for the year has again been invested by the Bible Society in copies of the Scriptures in many tongues. How then have the working expenses of the year been met? How have the Foreign Agencies and the depôts, and the colporteurs and the Biblewomen been sustained? How has the difference between the cost of the books and the prices obtained for them, especially in Foreign Missions, been made up? How have grants in money, or in printing paper, or in Scriptures for Sunday schools and Mission-rooms, and numberless good institutions been supplied? The other branch of a year's gross receipts has had to bear all these charges so far as it could. It consists of that portion of the income of past years which returns to hand through the payments for books which it had been spent to produce.

For the year just ended, although the total circulation was numerically greater than in the year before, the receipts from sales were less by £4,305 13s. 1d. than those in 1891. They reached £96,871 15s. 8d.. Uniting this sum with the *new* income previously stated, and adding to them £111 2s. 0d. for the Roxburgh Colportage Fund, and £116 18s. 3d. contributed to the Special Fund for printing Scriptures, we get £211,384 10s. 0d. as the gross receipts of old and new money for the year. On the other hand, the gross expenditure of all kinds came to £234,782 4s. 2d., leaving a deficit of £23,397 14s. 2d. This, like its predecessors, has been met for the time from the capital retained in more prosperous years to meet working expenses.

With liabilities so vast, the Committee feel that the Society's working capital must not be exposed to the risk of still further reduction to meet a large deficit next year. Again and again during the year now gone, they have been sifting the accounts to discover any reducible expenditure. Minor retrenchments have begun to be put in force. These must quickly be followed by much larger curtailments of generosity in supplying Scriptures at home and abroad, if there be not a speedy and decided change in that disproportion between receipts and charges which the last four years have shown. They rely on the efforts of the Society's friends to avert retrogression.

Encouraging reports on the work achieved in country after country will be found summarised in this Abstract. Suffice it here to give but a single instance of a special kind illustrating one branch of the help which is being given to Missions by this Society.

For eight years it has placed grants at the service of the Missionary Societies for the maintenance of additional female agency to get the Scriptures into the hands of the secluded and untaught women of the East. This plan was thought the surest way for hastening the wider circulation and the deeper influence of the Bible in countries like India. Where the obstacles to be overcome are so

fixed and strong, it will take time to show extensive returns. But encouraging progress is being made.

In the past year, through twenty-seven societies, grants were made for 364 Biblewomen, an increase of twenty-four. The number of native women to whom on an average they each week read the Scriptures rose to 18,742, an increase of 861. The number of their pupils who attained in the year the standard of being able to read the Bible for themselves was 1,374, an advance of forty-three on the number of the previous year. The circulation of Scriptures through the Biblewomen increased by 623 copies through gifts, and by 809 through sales, a total increase of 1,432 copies. The entire circulation, so far as reported, was 12,361 copies; 9,715 of which (or more than three fourths of the whole) were sold. This progress has been effected at an additional cost to this Society of only £87 13s. 9d. in its grants, but their aggregate amount was £2,450 12s. 4d.

The Obituary of the year has been unwontedly heavy. Among the distinguished men whose interest in the Society had enrolled them among its Vice-Presidents were the late Duke of Devonshire and his son, Lord Edward Cavendish. The Duke's name had been on the list for fifty five years, and stood at its head. Simply to mention the others will be enough to recall honoured and beloved fellow-workers who brought to the Bible Society as their common centre the gifts and graces which had made them pre-eminent in their respective churches. They were Bishop Perry, Bishop Harold Browne, Bishop Mesac Thomas, the Rev. C. H. Spurgeon, the Rev. Dr. Owen Thomas, the Rev. Dr. Donald Fraser, the Rev. Dr. Allon, Sir Robert Fowler, Bart., and F. J. Wood, Esq., LL.D., second to none in warm-hearted devotion to the Society's object.

In their room the following take office as Vice-Presidents: Lord Middleton; the Right Revs. the Bishops of Peterborough, Lichfield, Sodor and Man, and Montreal; the Most Rev. the Bishop of Sydney, President of the New South Wales Auxiliary; the Rev. Dr. Mackennal, the Rev. Principal Edwards, D.D.; J. H. Angas, Esq., President of the South Australian Auxiliary; Alderman Sir Joseph Savory, Bart., Alexander McArthur, Esq., M.P.; W. Blomfield, Esq.; H. M. Matheson, Esq., and George Williams, Esq.

Among the Honorary Governors for Life who have gone, affectionate regard enshrines the names of Bishop Pjetursson of Iceland, Prebendary Blenkin of Boston, Dr. Collingwood Bruce of Newcastle, and the Rev. James Calvert, who loved this Society, and through it gave the people of Fiji and others renderings of the Bible perfected to the utmost of his power.

To fill the vacancies in the list of Honorary Governors for Life the following have been appointed: The Rev. Prebendaries Stephenson of Lympham, Tate of Kippington, and Wightman of Shrewsbury; the Rev. W. S. Swanson, late of Swatow; C. F. Foster, Esq., of Cambridge; C. J. Plumptre, Esq., of Fredville, near Dover; H. J. Tomlinson, Esq., of Barton-on-Humber, and E. Chambers, Esq., of Chelsea.

To these must be added, in a special list, a little band to represent a large company of persons to whom this Society owes more than any honorary distinction can express. Its lady friends have been its sheet anchor throughout. So early as 1811, the name of one appeared among its Honorary Governors for life, as having rendered it very essential services. For forty-seven years that lady's name held its place, suggesting, but not securing, additions of a similar kind. The omission is at length to be corrected. Following that early precedent, the Committee have this year named the following ladies Honorary Governors of the Society for Life:—

sington; Mrs. Snell, Bournemouth; Mrs. Steel, Cambridge; Mrs. Taylor, Thornbury; Mrs. Taylor, Tunbridge Wells; Mrs. Joseph Tritton, Upper Norwood; Miss Walker, Chester; Mrs. Whittard, Brixton.

Such are the statistics, and, nearer home, some of the personal details of the year. Let us now turn to the facts of life and work which these statistics may be said to summarise, and to that immense and many-peopled landscape to which they refer.

Closest to the eye—with their network of railways, their overcrowded cities, their stretches of field and forest—lie the countries of EUROPE. As in a panorama, the eye passes along a line of view which, touching the mountain-heights of Norway and crossing southwards the lakes of Sweden, and the meadows and canals of Holland, and the plains and hills and rivers of the Fatherland, rests at last, beyond Geneva, on the snowy brows of Mont Blanc. And the student of Church history will remember that just under such a line lie the continental countries in which the Reformation chiefly made its home. In this rapid sketch these may be grouped together, and the more suitably because, with some minor differences, the position of them all as regards Bible work is practically the same. And what is that position? It is that all of them have become or are becoming centres of independent Scripture supply—that from all of them the Bible Society has withdrawn, or is contemplating withdrawal, excepting only and always in the way of cordial sympathy and assistance, as it ceases to be necessary for the supply of the wants of the people, and free to turn corresponding energy and outlay to foreign and non-Christian lands. In NORWAY there are six centres of Bible work, the colporteurs as they visit the homes of its devout peasantry are everywhere welcomed, and new additions are being issued from the Christiania presses. From SWEDEN the latest accounts are of steady advance. From HOLLAND the report of the present year is practically the last; and though as he forecasts the closing of the Society's Agency, there is the sorrow of farewell on Mr. Grelinger's pages, it is with a sense of accomplishment, not of failure, that he speaks of the "vigorous life of the Netherlands Society," of the extension of colportage, of the establishment of new Depôts, of the issue of fresh editions. In GERMANY eight Bible Associations supply the wants of her people, and allow the British Society in its colportage operations to devote principal attention to the large Roman Catholic population and those whose vernacular is not German. In this comparatively restricted sphere the circulation by colportage (over 62,000) was in 1891 the highest average on record,—“the colporteurs accomplished more per man, were more free and happy in their work, and realized a higher commission than in any previous year, and though slightly lower than those of 1890, it is significant that the total circulation by all the Bible Societies—German, British, and American—rose to so large a figure as that of over 639,000.* SWITZERLAND has at work more than ten native Bible Associations, and the Society's supplies to them and for other purposes advanced from the 39,000 of 1891 to 57,000 of the latest returns. All this—in the case of each of these countries—is surely a record of signal accomplishment. It is the completion, along the whole line, of a chain of fortresses against which the forces of materialistic thought may beat in vain; or to change the metaphor for one more pleasant, it is the building of storehouses of living bread, where in an age which is unsatisfied because unspiritual, the people may eat and hunger no more.

In the great Latin and Catholic countries, FRANCE is naturally conspicuous. She is herself the mother, only too prolific, of a literary progeny which—gay, sensuous, and earthly, like the world it delights—spreads its seductive influence far and near. Even in rural districts like Auvergne and Picardy, distant as they are from cities, we hear the peasants ask for the latest novel of Zola or Gaboriau,

or for some belated romance of Voltaire. The case is similar in BELGIUM. In both countries, also, we have too frequent glimpses of another figure whom the colporteur knows only too well; it is the *curé*, who, when he cannot hinder the acceptance of the little Portions and New Testaments, follows in the track of the salesman to collect and destroy the copies which have been put into the people's hands. In spite, however, of many difficulties, the circulation in both countries has increased; that in France by some 20,000 in a total of over 146,000,* while that in Belgium has advanced from over 16,000 to over 19,000.† This is encouraging and in the journals of the men there is much to engage the attention. But in Europe, so far as the Society's work is concerned, the centres of special interest, for the past year, lie elsewhere, and it is to SPAIN, to ITALY, and eastward to HUNGARY, that the eye must chiefly turn.

To SPAIN—for seldom have the records of any year been more remarkable than of that which has recently closed. Long recognized as the Puritan of Catholicism, intense, conservative, contemptuous of others, the Spaniard has for centuries been one of the least hopeful subjects for evangelical effort. But in one of the first sentences in his report, Mr. Jameson confesses that he has hitherto erred by being too pessimistic, and that he now must give another and a far more hopeful view of the progress of Scriptural Christianity in the Peninsula. "I feel entitled," he writes, "from the history of the year, to lay it down as an ascertained fact that when the people can get to some acquaintance with the Scripture, without overshadowing influence, there is a glad and hearty reception of it." This conclusion is supported by many facts. Among other means of engaging serious attention to the truth of the Bible a band of educated men have visited many of the centres of population. And with what results? Here is an account of a meeting at which an address was given on the Scriptures and on the Society's work, and which was attended by a thousand people. "Think," says Mr. Jameson, with his memory full of the depressing past, "think of a thousand people at a Bible meeting in Spain!" In other places there are instances hardly less noteworthy; the people gather in large numbers; they crowd out smaller halls; they fill the reading rooms at the new Depôts: in fact the Depôt, with not a few, has superseded the café and become a popular resort. The Press becomes interested, and comments favourably on the astonishing work of the British Society. Even in the Chamber of Deputies one of the ministers declares "that the Government sees nothing censurable in the publicity which is being given to the Society." In one village we read that there is "hardly any one who is not studying the Scriptures;" in another, that "there are many Evangelicals, and that the people love the Book." In some 300 of the railway-stations large placards on the Society's work arrest attention. A new issue of the Scriptures in attractive type and in the paragraph arrangement of the text (the first of the kind among the Spanish editions) has lately been published.‡ So general has been the interest awakened by these and other means that in one very significant sentence Mr. Jameson affirms, "It is not too much to say that the Bible has been made the theme of more conversations in Spain during the past year than in all the centuries since the Reformation." He adds, "The future of the regeneration of Spain is to-day most unquestionably in the hands of the Bible Society, and each year as it passes will make this more apparent." All these are remarkable statements, but Mr. Jameson's acquaintance with the Peninsula is exceptional, and he supports them by the marshalled testimonies of a report, one of the most detailed and voluminous he has ever prepared.

From Spain let us turn to ITALY. "The one word which expresses the work of the year," Sig. Meille writes, "is that of Progress." The circulation has been the highest ever known; it has risen to over 166,000.* Nor do these figures sufficiently describe the advance, for it is significant that the number of complete copies of the New Testament has been exceptionally great. It should be remembered that alongside of the Society's editions several others, illustrated and sold in serial parts, are commanding a large sale. So pronounced is this popularization of the Bible that Sig. Meille can write—and the sentence is of immense import—"More than ever it can be affirmed that no book is more widely circulated in Italy than the Book of Life." This is the latest report from a country which, but a few years ago, was dominated by the Papacy, and in which, consistently and characteristically, the Bible was popularly unknown.

From Italy let us turn to HUNGARY. Not indeed to the exclusion of the other and diversified Provinces which compose the Dual Empire, but because of its own special attractiveness. In a recent conversation Mr. Millard described Hungary as the "Bible Society Paradise of his Agency," and his latest report may perhaps illustrate his meaning. In other provinces—in Bohemia where Huss and Jerome testified, or in Moravia where the fragrance of an early piety still lingers—there may be perhaps brighter spots, but within the mountain-guarded valleys of the Magyars there is a diffused warmth and light which implies a prevalent Christianity. In Hungary as in Italy the circulation of 1891 has been the largest hitherto known: the previous year it was hardly over 40,000, it is now close on 50,000.† There has been a "great demand for the Word of God." The Government officials have been most courteous and, as might be expected, the authorities of the Protestant Churches have been warmly sympathetic. "Christian life and activity are making visible progress year by year. Sunday schools are increasing. Special efforts are being made to enlarge the circle of Christian workers throughout the whole country." These sentences imply not only the existence but the glow and the activity of life. They recall the morning of the Reformation when the clouds had not yet gathered after its rain, and Pázmány had not won back Hungary for the Papacy. Better still, they awaken the hopes of a future when the race which once broke the force of the Turkish invasion of Europe, and in later years secured its political liberties, may repossess itself of its spiritual inheritance and fulfil the promise of its prime.

While a new Christian state is thus slowly rising north of the Danube, the Muhammadan races which once held its southern shores are slowly falling backwards along that track which, four hundred years ago, was desolated by their terrible advance. And along with temporal power is slowly vanishing the prestige of their Prophet and the influence of the Kurán. It is being superseded by a higher and a purer Gospel. In the heart of CONSTANTINOPLE the stranger notices a Bible Depôt; it is one of seven in connection with the Society in the Turkish European provinces; and occasionally he may see a colporteur at his unobtrusive work. He is one of thirty-eight who are distributing the Scriptures over the same area, and last year, in spite of epidemics and opposition, with such success that the circulation within the Agency rose to almost 40,000 copies.‡ This includes the issues to GREECE, and in spite of the recent outbreaks at the Piræus, Dr. Thomson can write that "in the Greek circulation everything is

encouraging; the people are resolved, whatever may hinder, to read the Word of God." This dawn of the higher intelligence is perhaps most evident in Greece itself and in Albania, but it is not confined to them, and with strangely impressive recurrence to the early days of Christianity in these very regions, Dr. Thomson reports that "the Gospel is again asserting its power over the hearts of men in the regions of Galatia, Lystra, Iconium, Pisidia, and Pamphylia, where Paul and Barnabas once toiled and suffered for the truth they proclaimed." In the island of Samos a testimony was borne which one would gladly apply to wider regions. "It is well-known," said one of the colporteur's outspoken friends to a fault-finder, "that there was no spiritual life among the people until the Bible Society came."

There are yet left, within Europe, the western territories of the RUSSIAN EMPIRE and Agency, but to follow its eastward extension and touch its limits leads us deep into Central Asia, and as far as the Yellow Sea. There are perhaps no more important sections in a Bible Survey than this group of countries—interesting as including many of the old homes of civilization, and still more interesting as holding the promise of a future which however indefinite and even uncertain can hardly but be great. It is welcome intelligence that, in spite of the shadow which from famine and pestilence clouded every record of 1891, the circulation, which the previous year was under half a million, has now risen above that large number and exceeds 523,000. This includes both sections of the Agency. Of this total over 55,000 copies have been issued from the SIBERIAN Depot; 11,000 have through Dr. Baedeker's friendly hands reached the inmates of various State Prisons, and Mr. Wilkinson has spread above 20,000 copies among the Jews.* In Russia one of the pleasantest aspects of the Society's work is the goodwill and the assistance of many of the Government officials—a goodwill of which the sub-agent for Siberia had a highly-valued proof in the courtesy shown him by the State Inspector of Prisons, and in the thanks which he repeatedly and cordially expressed to the Society. In the journals of the year there are many illustrations of the "quiet success" which everywhere, and especially among the Russian people, follows the colporteurs' work. And if we turn to the south, and to Central Asia, to Odessa, to Kiev, to Tashkent, to Merv, similar accounts meet us.† There has indeed been terrible suffering, it has been a "Black Year" long to be remembered, but the colporteur has not been the less welcome because the people were involved in misfortune. On one page of Mr. Morrison's singularly vivid account, we see one of the men wading knee-deep the day long in mud, but effecting good sales nevertheless; another seated with a group of wild Turkomans discussing the claims of the Scriptures; a third pursuing his word in one of the compartments of a railway train as, full of returning pilgrims, it speeds northwards from Kiev—the Sacred City—and delighted, when to the stock of relics which they are taking home, he can add a copy of the New Testament. "Wonderful people," says Mr. Morrison, "these pilgrims are, leaving their far off homes, and impelled by a strange impulse coming up to their 'Jerusalem.' They wander in and out of the solemn Byzantine interior of the Kiev Cathedral, listen to the dirge-like music of the choir, duly inspect the sacred pictures, wander with guttering candles through the draughty catacombs, touch with their lips the relics of saints, and when all is finished turn back to their squalid homes." All this the colporteur sees, but he desires to give them something better than anything they can find in their sad strange pilgrimage, and he knows that if he can but send a Bible home with them it will be

read by the fire during the long, frost-bound winter, and may become far more precious to its owner than anything else he has brought from the city of his heart.

From Central Asia the transition is natural to the great countries of the East—to Persia, to India and Burma, to China, to Japan, to Malaysia, to Australia and New Zealand.

From PERSIA Mr. Hodgson's report is necessarily brief. Arriving in Baghdad in April of last year, and, passing on to Isfahan, he found Dr. Bruce at Julfa absorbed with his translation of the Persian Bible, and the colporteurs steadily pursuing their work. The remaining months were largely given to journeys of enquiry and inspection. The people often struck the travellers as depressed and listless, and many of the towns in the once brilliant home of Hafiz and Firdusi seemed tumbling into melancholy ruin. In Baghdad, of which there is a glimpse as of an oriental picture, the case is different, and Jews, Turks, Arabs, Muslims and Christians, Kurds from the mountains, Turcomans, Afghans and Indians, jostle each other in the bazaar. It is pleasant to know that in this busy centre the circulation of Scriptures has doubled that of the previous year. New Depôts have been arranged in the important towns of Sultanabad and Kermanshah, and Mr. Hodgson has established himself in Bushire. Persia is thus more completely occupied, and every year, it is hoped, will record progress.

From INDIA the reports are still unhappily incomplete, and of the six auxiliary centres, Lahore, Bangalore, Madras, Bombay, Allahabad and Calcutta, the returns of the two latter have not, at the date of this survey, arrived. The brief account from the Punjab Auxiliary, centred at Lahore, records continuous progress both in Panjabi-Gurmukhi and in Persian character; a circulation sustained at the high figure of over 47,000 copies, and the general estimate that "though the work is gradual, vernacular Scriptures are being offered to the whole country, and are now finding their way to every part of the province." Bangalore is the centre of the Kanarese-speaking people; here, also, the revision of the Bible is going forward; a total of over 15,000 copies, the highest yet reached, has been attained, and it is believed that distribution of the Scriptures far and wide, as this has certainly been effected, is exerting undoubted influence. The Bombay report tells a similar tale: "fair and steady progress." Local subscriptions and Scriptures circulated (60,876) have increased. The revision of the Marathi and Gujarati Scriptures is progressing. A new Depôt has been opened at Nagpur. "An earnest desire to possess and study the Bible is increasingly manifest." The report from Madras is even more copious and more pronounced in its record of progress. "In all directions there is clear and unmistakable evidence that the seeds of truth and righteousness have taken root in the soil." The circulation, over 177,000, has exceeded that of last year by nearly 50,000 copies. The Depôt system has been extended, and colportage has entered on new fields. The work among native women, to whom the Scriptures are read, is increasingly useful. The distribution of Scriptures and of religious books among university students has had "far-reaching results, which the Committees of the Bible and Tract Societies can hardly estimate." The very revival of Hinduism and its organized activity have awakened interest everywhere in the Word of God. "The foundations of Hinduism are being undermined by its own followers." Sentences like these are of deep significance. They are vivid with a sense of some great approaching change, and happily also with the conviction that it is to be such a change as, after a long season of dark weather, comes in with the sunshine and soft breath of spring. It is a change which, had they but seen it, would have filled the hearts of the early missionaries—of Ziegenbalg, Swartz and Plutschö—with rapture, and made the devout spirit of William Carey leap for joy. It is beginning to crowd the mission stations, and perplexing the missionaries by the demands of multitudes who wish to know more of Christ. It is altering old customs, overthrowing ancient beliefs, awakening unaccustomed thought and hope. What is all this?—for that a new age

has come many evidences show with ever-increasing clearness. Is it not the dawn across the plains of Hindustan of that divine light which once brightened the forests of Britain, and replaced the haunts of an old idolatry by the cities and the homesteads of a Christian land?

Of BURMA little need be said here but that there has been an encouraging issue of 22,000 copies, and the beginnings of an organization which promises much for the future. At the close of 1890 two colporteurs were at work, and a Dépôt had been opened at Rangoon. At the beginning of 1891 seven men had been enlisted; small stations had been planted at Pegu and Toungu, and a Dépôt formed at Mandalay under the charge of an influential committee there. Many problems are naturally waiting settlement, and experience is needed, but good work has been well begun in Burma, and it will have its development and reward.

The reports from CHINA, now divided into two Agencies, are unhappily incomplete. That from the Northern Section must be considered favourable, for in spite of prevalent illness among the colporteur force, and considerable disorganization owing to the disastrous floods of last year, the circulation of 1891 has been well maintained, and above 75,000 copies have been distributed. During the year thirty-five native colporteurs have been at work, and many of the missionaries have given important and cordial assistance. The records are without special incident, but they show that of the eight divisions of the Agency—and among these are Korea, Mongolia and Manchuria—hard and well-considered work has been accomplished.

In JAPAN the story of the year has been singularly unrestful; and the earthquakes which shook the cities, and the storms which swept across the skies, seemed mysterious counterparts of political upheavals and social disturbances. Evidence seems to show that the bulk of the people, while less hostile to foreigners, are still indifferent to Christianity. The Bible circulation of the year, now superintended by a united committee representing the British, the American and the Scotch Societies, while exceeding that of 1890 is less than the average of previous years. On the other hand, it has advanced in method and effectiveness, and what seems lost in numbers has been gained in more important ways.

What can be said of MALAYSIA—of that "Naturalists' Paradise," among the beautiful islands of which the Malay peoples have their home? In the records of the Bible Society the chapter of this Agency is one of the shortest, but not the least hopeful or inspiring. Ten years since the circulation was under 3,000; in 1891 it was close on 40,000—and this is less by some 9,000 copies than that of 1890. But we must not trust too much to a numerical test. Six Europeans and, on an average, nine native colporteurs are distributors of the Scriptures. They have visited Java, Sumatra, Borneo and the smaller islands: one devotes himself to the sailors whose ships touch at Singapore. Meantime, patiently fashioning the weapons of their spiritual war, Mr. Jansz is revising his translation of the Old Testament, and arrangements are in progress for a review of the versions in Malay. The leading languages of the islands are Malay and Javanese, Tamil and Chinese, English and Dutch; but there are full thirty others. This is good work, but the field is immense, and European Christianity has heeded too little the thirty millions of Malaysia.*

Beyond these Malaysian groups, and stretching eastwards far into their tropical seas, lies that "Island World of the Pacific," to which so much of the romance of missions, and it should be said of Bible translation work, belongs. The story of John Williams in earlier, and that of James Calvert in our own times has charmed many a reader, but there is hardly less to impress in the narrative were it but fully written of each of the thirty versions which the Bible Society supplies to the many-languaged Polynesian Christians. To this attrac-

tive subject no fuller reference can be made, nor is it possible to stay to summarise the reports of AUSTRALIA and NEW ZEALAND. These are indeed so strikingly different from those descriptions of Bible work among non-Christian people that they might seem to be excluded from this summary altogether. We read of Bible meetings such as we have in England—of active Auxiliaries, of homes as cultured and enriched as those in the old land, and from the scenes of civilization so advanced, the aborigines are sinking out of sight, soon entirely to disappear. But these great Colonies of the Southern world are among the truest and most necessary of the Society's allies, and there are no journals more interesting than those we owe to the alert intelligence of Mr. Robjohns, and the glowing spirit of Mr. Davidson, as well as the circles of friends who make this work so full of pleasure and success.

But to two immense sections of the Society's work no reference has yet been made.

The first is AFRICA. From this great continent, the accounts are still incomplete, and little can be said of the Morocco, and Algiers Agencies, which occupy the shores of the Southern Mediterranean. A deeper interest is centred in EGYPT; and it is most welcome intelligence that the circulation by sale in this Agency has steadily risen for the last two years, and that this is by no means the only symptom of a deepening attention to the Scriptures.* At Port Said the distribution on ship-board is increasingly valued and useful; a new Depôt has been opened in Southern Abyssinia, and in the capital of Yemen, in Arabia, Scriptures have for the first time been sold. It is a characteristic of the position held by Mr. Weakley and his staff, that it is situated close to the great thoroughfare between East and West, and that the currents on which the Bread of Life is cast, carry it into the furthest regions of the earth; nor can any limits be placed on the influences exerted by so wide a diffusion of the truth. In the sphere of the Universities' and other missions where the Swahili, the Ganda, the Yao, the Bondei and other Scriptures are speaking to the people, the Society has rendered essential services. It is a very significant fact of the year that, of the nine versions which appear for the first time in the Society's lists four belong to Africa—the Tasiko, the Chagga, the Sagalla, and the Ovambo. It is by such services in translation that the progress of Bible work is perhaps best measured, and the surest evidence given of the way in which the Darkness is lifting and moving away from the African mind.

The other great section of the Bible field is AMERICA. Of the CANADIAN Auxiliaries it can only be said that their reports so far as received are full of the spirit of progress, and indicate the large amount of work which is being done. During the year the Society's Honorary Home Secretary visited, on behalf of the Committee, some of the principal centres in the Dominion, and received fresh and welcome assurance of the good-will and power to help to which Bible work owes so much. In his WEST INDIAN Agency, Mr. Heath has had opportunity to strengthen weak places in organization, and successfully develop new schemes. Of the Agencies of the Southern Continent—those specially of BRAZIL and the ARGENTINE REPUBLIC, it may be said that their importance is yearly increasing from the influx of European emigrants; and it is one of the most notable social facts of the closing century, that in the old kingdoms of the Incas and Pizarro new states are rising—a new Italy, a new Spain, perhaps a new Judea—with which not a little of the future will necessarily rest.

As we approach the end of this survey, there are two facts which—never entirely absent from the thoughts as it proceeded—seem to become clearer and more emphatic at its close.

The first is the ADVANCE, specially within recent years, of the Society's own work. No minute comparisons may be made, but let us go back to the report

which summarized the history of 1881. Since then nine new Agencies have been formed, fifty new languages have taken their place on the list of translations, a million of copies have been added to the annual circulation. There is something more than this, although it is less definite and uniform, and it is difficult to give it precise expression. But as one turns the pages of that elaborate report, it makes itself felt—we become aware how much the light has widened since then, and in how many places where there was comparative silence, there is now the stir and activity of life. Ten years ago in Italy a popular Bible was unknown—the Malaysia Agency had just been established—in Siberia the circulation for the year was under 3,000, nor had there arisen from the plains of India that voice now so audible, so articulate, so full of earnestness, of the awakening people who are turning to the Son of Man.

The other fact touches more nearly the FINANCE of this ever-enlarging enterprise. That has not increased step by step with the work for which it is needed. Recent years have indeed been—it almost may be said—the later heroic age of missions; we hear everywhere of new countries opened, of hundreds of volunteers: we think of what has been done for Africa, for China, for people and tribes which once would have seemed hardly worthy of the translator's attention or the missionary's care. There arrive morning by morning from the great lakes of Central Africa, from the centres of population and the outlying districts of India,—from east and west alike—despatches which have almost ceased to stir us because they have become so common. But to the Bible Society, what does all this mean? Work indeed, more and more copious supplies, enlarged issues—but immense expense also. The advance along the line of mission work implies corresponding drafts from the commissariat and claims upon the resources of that Society, without which, as it is constantly confessed, there can be no satisfactory missionary advance at all. And if the income of the Bible Society be unsatisfactory, is it not because all this has been overlooked? Have not Christian people forgotten that the first step is to strengthen the resources whence every new mission—every new departure and every enlarging work must draw? And if they did remember all this, should we then have to deplore the deficits of recent years, which, though filled with accounts of successful work everywhere, are depressed by returns of insufficient means?—Let all this be remembered—as for the moment it seems to have been forgotten—and the Society will take that place in the regard of Christian people—not the second but the first,—which it holds in actual position and achievement, and be able to advance in the van of those ever-enlarging powers by which is being built up the Kingdom of God.

EXTRACTS FROM AGENTS' REPORTS.

REV. J. C. AYLESWORTH—*Lynedoch*, Jan. 11th.—Had an excellent meeting in the Presbyterian Church. Subscriptions and collections in advance of last year. John Charlton, Esq., M.P., president, occupied the chair. Rev. Mr. Hamilton, pastor of the church; Rev. Mr. Collamore, resident Methodist minister, and Rev. Mr. Tremble, of Delhi, were present and took part in the meeting. Three ladies were elected on the committee of management, who expressed themselves as determined to awaken a greater interest in the work.

Langton, Jan. 12th.—Dr. Tweedale, president of the branch, occupied the chair. The secretary, George Smith, Esq., was unavoidably absent. The meeting was held in the Baptist Church. Those present expressed a determination to try and do more for the Society. Some ladies were appointed on the executive. The amounts signed at the last meeting had not all been collected, but may yet be heard from.

Norwich, Jan. 13th.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. James Barr, Esq., occupied the chair. Rev. Mr. Myers, pastor of the church, was present and did good service. Thomas Walker, Esq., secretary, presented a very comprehensive and gratifying report of the work of the branch for the year. The agent presented the various facts and reasons which make free contributions to the Society necessary.

Otterville, Jan. 14th.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. Clark, the pastor, was present and assisted. R. Paxton, Esq., the president, occupied the chair. The officers of the branch acted last year as collectors. They did their work so well that they were re-appointed at the close of the meeting. The president read an appropriate and touching poem entitled, "My Mother's Bible."

Bookton, Jan. 15th.—We had a delightful drive to this place with several of the officers of the Otterville branch. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, Mr. Paxton again presiding. The cause here is in good hands and will be ably prosecuted. The weather is almost too fine for our work, as so many local entertainments are in full blast.

Port Dover, Jan. 18th.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. Peter Lawson, Esq., president, presided. Rev. Mr. Robertson, pastor of the church, and Rev. Messrs. Saunders and Paterson, resident Methodist ministers, were present and took part in the meeting. The agent preached the previous Sabbath in the Methodist and Presbyterian Churches, and the Methodist minister closed his services on Monday night and brought his people with him to the meeting. This branch has a most efficient staff of officers and is doing successful work.

Port Rowan, Jan. 19th.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Rev. R. W. Johnstone, of the Church of England, is president of this branch, and presided at the meeting. He gave some excellent personal reminiscences, showing the power of Scripture truth. Rev. Mr. McDonald, Baptist minister, gave a short and appropriate address. Two ladies are on the official staff—Miss Wood is treasurer, and Miss McLennan, depository. Port Rowan is delightfully situated and the interests of the Bible Society are very well attended to.

St. Williams, Jan. 20th.—The meeting was held in the Baptist Church. Rev. Mr. Archer, Methodist pastor of Port Rowan and St. Williams, was present and occupied the chair. The president, Wm. Nesbitt, Esq., has been ill most of the year, and was unable to be present. Some of the officers were present and made reports. Rev. Mr. McDonald, Baptist minister, of Port Rowan, was present and gave an appropriate address.

Vittoria, Jan. 21st.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. Mr. Newton, Baptist minister, is president, and not being present, the chair was ably filled by S. McColl, Esq., ex-M.P.P., treasurer, now in his 85th year, and well preserved and well informed in the history of this country. He expressed his unabated interest in the work of the Bible Society.

Waterford, Jan. 22nd.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The pastor, the Rev. A. R. Caswell, occupied the chair, and is evidently interested in the work of the Society, and will be an inspiration to its operations in the future. Several ladies were added to the committee, and this branch bids fair to take rank among the most efficient.

Delhi, 23rd February, 1892.—On consultation with the Rev. Thos. Trimble, Methodist minister, a meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. There was a fair audience, and it was the unanimous desire that the Delhi branch should be re-organized and a depository opened. Officers, zealous in the interests of the Bible Society, were appointed with good prospects of success.

REV. ALFRED ANDREWS—*Cyprus River*.—Although our meeting had been announced, only eight persons were present to show their sympathy with our work. Why this small interest I cannot tell. I suggested a change of agency. Rev. H. Kenner was present and acted as chairman.

Glenboro.—Attendance twenty-five. Heartily supported by presence of Rev. Mr. Cheney and Archdeacon Phair, both Church of England. Presbyterian pastor from home.

Stockton.—Rev. P. McGregor (Methodist) helped us in his beautiful new brick church, the best church along the south-western line. Good attendance.

Douglas.—Douglas is a fine branch. Rev. R. Milliken (Methodist) assisted in the meeting. Attendance at meeting only twenty-two.

Tricherne.—Here we had no resident minister to help us. Yet they had well announced the meeting, and over one hundred were present.

Holland.—Evangelistic services held in the Methodist Church by the Misses Judd reduced our attendance to twenty. Rev. Mr. Drensfell (Episcopalian) kindly took the chair.

Griswold.—A fair attendance. Rev. W. W. Colpitts assisted us, and the audience contributed \$3.30 in collection. Subscription not yet complete. The committee have ordered a stock of Bibles, and hope soon to get the depository in good working order.

Alexander.—Here Rev. Mr. Lockhart, the newly inducted Presbyterian pastor, greatly aided us, and the meeting was full of interest.

Brandon.—Our Bible Society work has been almost at a stand here for some time, owing partly to changes in depository. Dr. Fleming has been again appointed, and the stock has recently been removed to his beautiful new drug store. A large additional stock has just been ordered. Contributions will be over \$60. Our public meeting was held during a terrible storm, and we had only a small audience. Rev. Mr. Mason (Congregational) assisted in the meeting which was held in the Methodist Church. Dr. McDermott presided.

Elkhorn.—Fair attendance in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. Mr. Stevenson, Episcopalian, opened the service. Dr. Rolston, the president, occupied the chair. Collection and subscriptions, \$12.35.

Virden.—On account of counter attractions, public meeting postponed after election of officers and passing reports.

Oak Lake.—This was the last meeting we held. Attendance thirty. T. Wright in chair. Rev. Mr. Hodges, pastor, assisted us. Collection \$2.45, sales \$23.18. Collectors appointed to canvass for aid. Rev. Mr. Hodges stated that in this vicinity are large numbers of French Canadians offering a good field for colporteur work, and he hoped the Society would shortly occupy it.

REV. DR. BEAUMONT—*Chatham Township*.—A heavy rain storm greatly interfered with the attendance; the branch is, however, in a thriving state, and is well sustained by the efforts of Messrs. Thos. Campbell, Geo. Oliver, and other trusty friends of the Society.

Dover.—This branch is in an encouraging and prosperous state, but the meeting was a failure. I had the pleasure, however, of addressing at least the officers and a few others. Already there is a sum of \$25 in hand which the treasurer, Mr. T. Rankin, desired to remit as soon as the collectors have finished.

Wallaceburg.—I am happy in giving a very favourable account of this branch. I had a very satisfactory conference with the officers and friends in the afternoon, and addressed a good meeting in the Presbyterian church in the evening, the Rev. D. Currie presiding.

Dresden.—We had a very gratifying attendance at the meeting; S. W. Sharpe, Esq., mayor of the town, presiding. The secretary, Mr. W. Ward, read an able and satisfactory report. This branch is in an advancing and prosperous condition.

Dawn Mills.—I had the pleasure of resuscitating this seemingly defunct branch, having made a special effort to get here early in the day for the purpose of conferring with our old and respected friend, Mr. W. A. Ward. The meeting had been duly announced, but I spent the whole time up to dark in the evening, in calling upon the principal residents in the surrounding country and securing promises of contributions when the collectors call. An interest in the Society has been newly awakened and good results may be at least hoped for. The attendance at the meeting was good. Rev. Mr. Andrews was elected president.

I preached two sermons on the following Sabbath in *Thamesville*, preparatory to the meeting there which will be held later on. My subject was the "Word of God" and the fruitful results already apparent from the dissemination of the "Holy Scriptures among the Nations of the Earth."

Botany.—We had a moderately good meeting here and heard a highly favourable report from Mr. N. P. Weekes, the secretary. The branch is in a prosperous state.

Windsor.—The attendance was small. The most earnest wish was expressed by each and all the speakers to make special efforts toward a revival of the work. There is still a large amount of real vitality in this branch. The officers were re-elected. Besides the president and officers the Rev. Canon Hincks, Rev. Mr. Learoyd and Rev. Mr. Matheson (African) were present. The stock is well kept.

REV. BERNARD BRYAN—*Milton*.—Meeting held in town hall. Was considered a good one. Mayor Dice occupied the chair. In addition to the address of the agent, interesting and encouraging remarks were made by Rev. Rural Dean Mackenzie and Rev. John Pickering. It was the fiftieth annual meeting of Milton branch, and Mr. Austin Wilmot, who has been a member of the branch from the beginning, was present, and at the close of the meeting came upon the platform and said a few encouraging words commending heartily the good work of the Bible Society.

Cooksville.—Meeting held in Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. Washington, pastor of the church and a good friend of the Society, in the chair. Bad roads and other meetings prevented a large attendance. It was resolved to keep a supply of Bibles at Pt. Credit as well as at Cooksville in connection with branch, but all under the charge of the Cooksville depository. Usual reports were made and officers elected.

Streetsville.—Meeting held in Methodist Church. Rev. R. J. Glassford in the chair. Pastor of the church was absent holding special services at another place. The attendance was very fair and the interest manifested good. An effort was made to make the collectors chosen as representative as possible to secure the co-operation of all Christians in the good work.

Georgetown.—The meeting this year was a very good one. An excellent spirit prevailed. In addition to the words of the agent, stirring, practical addresses were delivered by Rev. Mr. Fennel, Mr. Bachanan and Mr. Gee. Rev. Mr. Love occupied the chair. This branch is fully alive and is doing a good work.

Norval.—Meeting held in the Methodist Church. Mr. Robert Watson, an old and tried friend of the Society, in the chair. Meeting was conducted in thorough business-like order. Rev. J. Argo and Mr. Willoughby were present and took part in the proceedings. Interest good. Reported a good year's work for the Society. Hope to do more next year.

Derry West.—Roads very bad and weather most unfavourable, but strange to say an excellent meeting. Good attendance and words of encouragement from all. Mr. John McAulay occupied the chair. Branch was well organized for work. A novel feature of the proceedings was the appointment of a young man to every pair of lady collectors to see that they were driven about in their collecting tours.

Mansewood.—Meeting held in Presbyterian Church. Rev. R. C. Finney in the chair. Good attendance. All seemed to join heartily in the exercises and business of the evening. Rev. J. W. Milne was present and spoke encouragingly of the good work of the Society. This is a young branch, but promises well.

Erin.—Meeting held in the Methodist Church. Rev. H. Reid in the chair. Attendance very fair. After the business of the meeting was attended to, the agent delivered his address. This was followed by addresses from Rev. J. Ball, Rev. G. Munro and Rev. Mr. Graham. The aged Wm. Tyler, who has been secretary of the branch for a great number of years, was present and took well his part in the proceedings.

Hillsbury.—Meeting held in Presbyterian Church; the pastor of the church in the chair. The reports of the year's work were not ready and a late executive meeting was arranged for. Officers for the coming year were appointed.

Cheltenham.—Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. James Hamilton in the chair. The business of the meeting was well arranged. Reports very encouraging. Efficient officers appointed for the coming year. Rev. Mr. Campbell was present and took part in the proceedings. A large number of Bibles were sold from the depository during last year.

REV. R. BURNS—*Port Colborne*, Oct. 9th.—The meeting was held in the Baptist Church. The chair was occupied by J. W. Young, Esq., an ardent worker of the Society. The choir of the church led in the praise of God. The pastor of the church gave a short but appropriate address, after which the agent spoke on the "Object and Work of the Society." The officers and collectors were appointed. The gathering was fair regarding numbers, good regarding spirit, and will give a good account.

Fort Erie and Victoria, Oct. 10th and 12th.—I spent Saturday in the vicinity of International Bridge, and succeeded in arranging for a meeting in the Methodist Church, *Victoria*. On Sunday I preached at *Fort Erie* in the morning, and drove nine miles and preached in the evening at *Ridgeway*, in the interests of the Society. The meeting was pretty well attended. They decided to call the branch *Fort Erie and Victoria*. An influential committee was elected and collectors appointed.

Ridgeway, Oct. 13th.—The meeting was very well attended. The efficient choir helped to make the meeting a success. H. N. Hibbard, Esq., president, occupied the chair. Rev. C. Stringfellow gave an excellent address. The officers and committee were elected and collectors appointed. *Ridgeway*, I believe, will give a faithful report of its work.

Cayuga, Oct. 14th.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, and was pretty well attended. Dr. Baxter, M.P.P., the faithful president, was at his post of duty. Rev. D. Chalmers gave a very fine address. Your agent addressed the audience on the "Claims and Influence of the Bible." The secretary's report was very encouraging. The subscriptions were in advance of last year. Officers and committee elected and collectors appointed.

Selkirk, Oct. 15th.—Here the anniversary was held in the Baptist Church. Hearty singing by the congregation, which was large, the choir leading. Dr. Boulter occupied the chair until his successor, David Duff, was appointed. The collectors were appointed and will no doubt do good work. Rev. Messrs. Wright and Phillips gave short addresses.

South Cayuga, Oct. 16th.—This was the largest of all the meetings, about 200 present. The united choirs of the Methodist and Evangelical Association Churches gave a number of selections. The meeting was held in the Evangelical Association Church, the president, V. Honsberger, was in the chair. The faithful secretary-treasurer for thirty-eight years, A. Nash, gave a very good report. Addresses were given by Revs. Hauch and Truax. The officers and collectors were re-elected. Total number of Bibles sold during existence of branch, 1,336.

Nanticoke, Oct. 26th.—We had a very good meeting. It was held in the Church of England. The Rector, Rev. Mr. Bonnie, rendered very valuable service. The choir of the church led in the service of song. The president, A. R. Low, presided. The secretary gave a very hopeful report. Short addresses were given by Mr. Ladman and the rector. Your agent addressed the meeting on the "Work of the Society at Home and Abroad." The officers were re-elected and collectors appointed.

Cheapside, Oct. 27th.—A good attendance greeted the agent. Dr. Sherk in the chair. He remarked that the number present was an improvement upon the few who were at the last two meetings. The pastor of the church, Mr. Ladman (Methodist), gave a good address. Officers elected on the committee. Collectors re-appointed.

Canfield, Oct. 28th.—A very fair audience was present in the Methodist Church. We succeeded in re-organizing this branch on a better basis. The meeting decided to have a depository. Robert Mills, merchant, was requested to take the office. This will help the branch in many ways. Rev. D. Chalmers was present and helped by his advice and address.

Dunnville, Oct. 29th.—A large gathering of friends and supporters of the Society met in the Presbyterian Church. N. Lockie, president, occupied the chair. The choir prepared some very fine music in the way of anthem, etc. Suitable addresses were given by the president, and Revs. J. Hazelwood (Methodist) and Mr. MacKnight (Presbyterian). The officers were elected.

REV. J. CARSWELL—*Evening and Banda*.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church at *Evening Corners*, and was presided over by the pastor of the church, Rev. W. Nixon, who, with the Rev. J. K. Henry, of Creemore, rendered valuable assistance. *Evening* was separated from *Creemore* last year and formed into a branch with *Banda*, but no organization had been effected. A full staff of officers and collectors were appointed, and the secretary instructed to obtain a book case and a supply of books for the depository.

Creemore.—This was one of the best meetings held in the district. It was in the Episcopal Church, of which the Rev. Mr. Owen is the incumbent. There was a good attendance, the best of attention and a good collection. An increased contribution may confidently be expected. On the Sabbath following I preached in the Presbyterian Church in the morning, the *Fourth Line* in the afternoon, and *Dunedin* at night, pressing the claims of the Bible Society at all these services.

Maple Valley and Badjeros.—The agent was deeply indebted to the Rev. J. K. Henry, of Creemore, for conveyance and help at the meeting, and for the kind hospitality extended to him. The Rev. T. T. Johnston (Presbyterian) was also present. The attendance was small, as the night was dark and the roads bad. All the officers, however, were in their places, and collectors were carefully selected and appointed.

Singhampton.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The attendance was not large owing to the state of the roads, but the spirit manifested was excellent. The President, the Rev. Mr. Trollope, presided in a happy manner, and brief addresses were made by the agent and Rev. Mr. Johnston. After the re-election of officers, a subscription was circulated and collectors appointed to complete the canvass.

Thornbury and Clarksburg.—There seems to be a lack of interest here in the work of the Society, as evinced by the small attendance and absence of the resident pastors; still, it has a number of warm friends in the office-bearers and others who were present. A union meeting on the Sabbath would probably be the best thing for the branch.

Meaford.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, and was presided over by the pastor, the Rev. J. A. Ross, who was elected president, and who will,

doubtless, do what he can to produce an increased interest in the Society's work. The attendance was small. No meeting had been held last year, and nothing contributed towards the Society. From the organization effected and the interest manifested by those present, *Meaford* will doubtless render a good account this year.

Lefroy and Bell Ewart.—This, though a small branch, possesses considerable life, and always has a good meeting. The attendance this year, it was said, was smaller than usual, but the interest shown was encouraging. The services of a good choir added much to the success of the meeting. Last year a very small sum had been realized on account of the failure of some of the collectors to go round. This, it is hoped, will not occur this year.

Churchill.—The meeting, composed largely of young people, was held in the Presbyterian Church, which is at present without a pastor. A new departure is here introduced, which seems to work well, in the appointment of young men as collectors. The best of attention was given to the agent's address, and the branch will continue to do its duty.

Craigvale and Stroud.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, *Craigvale*. The pastor, the Rev. J. McConnell, was unavoidably absent, through family sickness, but the Rev. Mr. Washington was present and rendered valuable assistance. Considerable effort has been put forth by the secretary, R. G. McCraw, to secure a good attendance and good music. The music was excellent, and the attendance, though not large, was of an inspiring character.

Painswick.—This branch was re-organized last year, and it is favoured with a thoroughly live president and secretary in the persons of C. T. Hunter and J. C. Morrison, respectively. In the hope of increasing the contributions, it was agreed that, this year, the members of the committee do the collecting.

Angus.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, and two of the local ministers were present, Messrs. Clarke and Leishman. There was quite a large number assembled and considerable interest manifested in the work of the Society. A large proportion of the officers elected are ladies, who will, no doubt, do their work with their usual zeal and success.

Stammer.—Here a special request was made for a united service on Sabbath evening in the interests of the Society, and it was held in the Presbyterian Church, on Nov. 1st. Four congregations, with their respective choirs and pastors, were present. The church was filled, the best attention given, and a good collection received. On Monday evening the annual meeting was held. All the resident ministers were present, and an excellent feeling prevailed. Instead of taking up a collection in the various churches, as was done last year, collectors were appointed to canvass the village and neighbourhood, and, no doubt, this will result in a much larger sum being realized this year.

Collingwood.—Owing to the absence of the secretary, no meeting was arranged for at the time the other branches were visited, but a meeting was held some weeks later, in the schoolroom of the Methodist Church. The ministers of the town were present, except one. The Rev. Mr. Luskins had been appointed, along with the agent, to address the meeting, and he did so earnestly and effectively. The old officers were re-elected, and will, no doubt, do their work with the efficiency they have displayed in the past.

REV. J. W. CHARLTON—*Millbank*, Dec. 9th.—Meeting held in the Methodist Church. Thos. Magwood, M.P.P., president, in chair. Also present Rev. Messrs. McKibbin (Presbyterian) and Rupert (Methodist). Beautiful evening, good congregation and successful meeting.

Shakespeare, Dec. 10th.—Meeting held in G. T. hall. Rev. Mr. Pyke, president, in the chair. The Rev. Mr. Stewart (Presbyterian) gave an earnest address. Fine evening; large congregation. Your agent presented the claims of the Society. Shakespeare takes an interest in Bible work.

Elimville, Dec. 14th.—We were unfortunate in having a very wet night. Congregation small. In the absence of the president, the Rev. C. Fletcher, pastor of the Thames Road Presbyterian Church, in which the meeting was held, presided; we did the best we could under the circumstances. Good collection.

Hilbert, Dec. 15th.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, Staffa. In the absence of the president, the Rev. P. Scott, Presbyterian minister of Cromarty, presided. The Rev. N. S. Burwash, pastor of the church, gave an interesting address. The congregation was good considering the wet night. Had an enjoyable meeting.

Kirkton, Dec. 16th.—Meeting held in the Woodham Methodist Church. In the absence of the president, Rev. Mr. Leech, pastor of the church, presided. Very stormy. Small congregation. Your agent in this as in every other case endeavoured to present the claims of the Bible Society. Sunday, 13th, preached in Staffa in the morning and in Kirkton in the evening. Good congregations, and by permission asked and received collections for the Society.

REV. W. H. CLINE—*Fonthill*.—The meeting was held in the Baptist Church. Pastor C. W. Cook, president of the Society, occupied the chair and conducted devotional exercises. After this the time was given to the agent who had an attentive hearing. Collectors representing the various evangelical denominations were appointed, and exhorted to make a thorough canvass of the country. The secretary now informs me they are doing well.

North Pelham.—Preparation was made for a meeting of this branch on Wednesday evening, Oct. 7th, but the rain began to fall heavily about seven o'clock, and when the secretary, Mr. Cross, and I reached the church we found no one else there; however, we drove over to the house of the president where we held an earnest consultation. Arrangements were made for a systematic and vigorous canvass for funds, and I have no doubt this branch will give a good account of itself.

Niagara-on-the-Lake.—I went to Niagara on Monday, Oct. 12th. Meeting was held in the schoolroom of the English Church, and was presided over by Mayor Paffard, the honoured president of the Society. The ministers of the Episcopalian and Presbyterian Churches were present and lent substantial aid to the meeting. After the necessary business was duly transacted, the agent was called upon and was listened to with much apparent interest. The collection amounted to five dollars. This society will do itself credit.

Niagara Falls.—Through some misunderstanding it was announced that the agent would be at Niagara Falls, Oct 7th, the same evening I was at *North Pelham*. A number of people accordingly met in the English Church. Canon Houston, who is president of the Society, conducted the service and gave a short address. The election of officers and collectors was then proceeded with, after which the meeting adjourned. A second meeting was called Oct. 13th, at which I was present. This meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, and I had the cordial assistance of the Rev. Messrs. Crawford and Kohl. The attendance was not large, but I had an attentive audience and spoke at length of the Society's work in giving the Bible to the world. This branch did very well last year and gives good promises for this year.

Niagara Falls South.—Of all the societies I visited, none is more vigorous or better organized than this. I found the collectors had been appointed and the work nearly completed before I arrived. The amount collected this year is a little short of last year, but the interest in the cause is not abating. The officers of the Society are all thoroughly in sympathy with the work. Our meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, under the charge of Rev. Mr. Young, the newly elected president. Rev. Mr. Woodsworth, pastor of the Methodist Church, also helped us much. The Society has staunch friends and supporters here.

REV. ALEX. CURRIE.—On the 10th of February the meeting at Wawanesa was held. The officers of the branch were all there, with the exception of Mr. Brent, who since his appointment had left the district. Rev. Mr. Wilson, of Methvin, was present and took part in the meeting. A number of collectors were appointed to canvass town and country. The depository we found in good condition.

The following day, Wednesday, 11th, I was announced for *Souris*, which is thirty miles distant. It was a cold drive over a heavy trail, and took me all the afternoon to accomplish it. When I got there I found a good audience and all the ministers resident in the town present. The meeting was presided over by the genial and courteous president, Mr. Hugh McDonald, whose guest I was while in the town.

The following week I endeavoured to overtake the work on the N.P.R.R. east of Wawanesa. The week was an excessively stormy one, and I was only able to reach two of my four appointments on that line. Our line of roads was so frequently blocked by storms that no reliance could be placed on it. On Tuesday, 17th, it was arranged that I should be at *Morris*, but the town was completely swept by a blizzard, rendering it impossible to get about. We had a meeting of the officers next day and transacted the business of the branch, and re-appointed with slight change the officers who had been appointed for last year. The following night I was at *Miami*, where we had a very good meeting and organized a branch. Rev. Mr. Penman, Presbyterian missionary, presided and gave an address. Rev. Mr. Johason (Methodist) was present and was made president, with Mr. Wm. Thompson as vice-president, Mr. Wm. Carson as secretary and treasurer, and Mr. Monro as depositary. Everything indicates a live society.

On the 11th of March I visited *Carman*, and we had a fair audience. The depositary submitted his report, showing that quite a considerable business had been done during the year.

REV. C. DUFF—*Alton*.—I visited Alton on Monday, the 9th of November. The attendance at the meeting was very considerable. The Rev. Wm. Madill, of the Congregational Church, in which church the meeting was held, rendered valuable assistance. The Presbyterian and Methodist ministers were attending another of the Society's meetings that evening in *Charleston*, where they both reside. The business of the branch was well managed by the officers, and they were all re-elected. The collection was in advance of last year.

Camilla.—The 10th of November threatened rain all the forenoon, and in the afternoon it came steadily on, and in the evening one of the worst storms of the season prevailed, the wind blowing furiously and the rain falling heavily. At the time for the meeting it was quite clear that only those who reside in the immediate vicinity of the Presbyterian Church, in which the meeting was to be held, could be present. A few—perhaps a dozen—assembled, and, after speaking to them for half-an-hour, I advised them to adjourn till some future time to be named, which advice they followed. Being within eleven miles of them again on the 8th of December, I visited them, when we had a good meeting, attended to the business of the branch, and started the work of another year. The Rev. Mr. Ballantyne, president, filled the chair.

Mono Centre.—On the 10th of November we held the annual meeting of this branch, in what is called the Relessey Church. The Rev. Mr. Woodger and the Rev. Mr. Ballantyne, Methodist and Presbyterian ministers, were both present and rendered valuable assistance. The latter retired from the presidency, and the former succeeded him for the ensuing year. The gathering was large and attentive; the friends of the cause are in earnest, and are encouraged in their work.

Whitfield.—This, as are the two preceding branches visited, is purely a rural one. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The Rev. Mr. Boyd, Episcopal minister of *Horning's Mills*, was present, and made a good speech on behalf of the Society. This is a young branch, scarcely fully fledged; but the friends are doing good work, however, and are feeling their way in a wise and cautious manner.

Horning's Mills.—Here the attendance was good. Rev. Messrs. Boyd and Wilson, the former president and the latter secretary, were both present and gave hearty co-operation. While here I shared the kind hospitality of my young and earnest English Church brother, whose whole heart is in his work for the Master, and in whose hands the Bible Society finds a most devoted and intelligent president. The work of the year was provided for and will be pushed with vigour.

From this place I was kindly conveyed to *Dundalk*, on Saturday, by my friend Mr. Huxtable. Here I spent the Sabbath, preaching in the Methodist Church in the morning and in the Presbyterian Church in the evening, in the afternoon driving to *Proton Station* and preaching there. The morning and evening congregations were good, and the day, though filled with labour, was a happy and, I trust, a useful one. The annual meeting of the *Dundalk* branch was held on the evening of the 16th. The attendance was not as good as could be desired, but the meeting was enthusiastic. The Rev. Mr. Hudson, president, occupied the chair, and the Rev. Geo. Cobbledick was chosen his successor. Both are warm friends of the Society.

Corbetton.—This was my next place of operations, but the secretary had been removed to another station, and no provision had been made that night, but I persuaded the friends to hold themselves in readiness for a meeting when I should again be in the neighbourhood. Accordingly a very respectably attended meeting was held on the evening of the 9th of December, when officers and collectors were appointed, and it was determined immediately to open a depository. The Rev. Mr. Sanderson, Methodist minister, aided, and spoke in favour of the work.

Shelburne.—It was a pleasant contrast to come from the former place, after my first visit, to this one. The urbane and accomplished president, Rev. Mr. McTavish, Methodist minister, met me at the station and conducted me to his own residence. We had a very well attended meeting in the Church of the "United Brethren." The Rev. Dr. McRobbie, Presbyterian minister, and Rev. Mr. Magee, U. B. minister, were also present and gave us their hearty support.

REV. J. MCD. DUNCAN—*New Hamburg*, Monday, October 26th.—The annual meeting of this branch was held in the German Evangelical Church. The attendance was fair, and the audience seemed interested in the work of the Society. The chair was occupied by the Rev. S. R. Knechtel. The Rev. Mr. Olivant, of the Methodist Church, took part in the meeting. The agent spoke for nearly an hour on "The Relation of the Bible and of the Bible Society to Foreign Missions." The depository is admirably kept by Mr. Boulee.

Linwood, Tuesday, Oct. 27th.—This morning I drove to this place from New Hamburg, and called upon the officers of the branch Bible Society here as well as upon the Rev. Messrs. Grandy and Schultz of the Methodist and Lutheran Churches respectively. The meeting for the evening was announced in the school. In the evening the meeting in the Methodist Church was presided over by Mr. A. Boomer, the energetic president of the branch. Assistance was given by the Rev. C. Armstrong, of the Presbyterian Church, and Mr. Grandy.

Hawkesville, Oct. 28th.—The meeting was held here in the Methodist Church, with the president, Rev. W. C. Armstrong, in the chair. Valuable assistance was rendered by the choir of the church. The audience listened attentively to your agent's address.

Elmira, Oct. 29th.—In the afternoon I had the privilege of preaching in the Presbyterian Church at a pre-communion service. An examination of the depository showed that it is being admirably managed by Mr. George Klinck. The collections of this branch had all been made before your agent's visit, and were largely in excess of the contributions of last year. The evening meeting was held in the Evangelical Church. Addresses were given by the Rev. Messrs. Deirlam, Hamilton and Hall, and by your agent. The Bible Society has a warm place in the affections of the people of Elmira.

Winterbourne, Oct. 30th.—This morning I examined the depository here. Under the careful supervision of the Rev. A. M. Hamilton, M.A., this branch seems to be in a prosperous condition. The secretary, Mr. Durrant, is a most painstaking officer. The meeting in the evening was attended by an audience of fair size, and evidently much interested in the operations of the Society.

East Puslinch, Monday, Nov. 2nd.—On Saturday I returned to my home, where I spent the Sabbath. This morning I came to East Puslinch. In the evening a most successful meeting was held in the Methodist Church at *Aberfoyle*. Addresses were given by Rev. Messrs. Robertson and Hogg and by your agent.

Bloomingtondale, Nov. 3rd.—Owing to the absence of the depository your agent was unable to inspect the depository. The meeting in the evening was small, but the necessary business was transacted and the address of your agent attentively listened to.

New Dundee, Nov. 4th.—The depository was found to be in a most satisfactory condition under the care of Mr. J. G. Wing. The secretary, Mr. J. A. Clemens, is a most efficient officer. An enthusiastic meeting was held this evening. Besides the collection, \$17 was subscribed to the funds of the Society.

Preston, Nov. 5th.—Mr. Wing, of New Dundee, very kindly drove your agent to this place. The meeting here was a small one, held in the Methodist Church. The Rev. Mr. Pomeroy, the pastor of the church where the meeting was held, rendered important assistance. It is hoped that this branch will do better next year.

Hespeler, Nov. 6th.—Here your agent found that the collections for the year had been made prior to his visit. A meeting, thoroughly representative of the various denominations, was held in the Evangelical Church. All the local Protestant clergymen were present. The work here is in good hands.

I went to *Kilbride* on Jan. 19th, but owing to a very severe snowstorm there was no meeting held. I suggested to the local officers that a meeting might be held at a later date, and this may be done.

At *Burlington* I found the people of the Presbyterian and Methodist Churches engaged in special union evangelistic services. Your agent was allowed to advocate the claims of the Bible Society at one of these union meetings to an interested audience of fair size. Valuable assistance was given by Mr. Whyte, evangelist.

At *Waterdown*, on the 20th of Jan., the meeting was smaller than was expected. This was owing to the severity of the weather and the prevalence of influenza. The venerable president of this branch was not at the meeting, being confined to bed by the prevailing disease. The Rev. P. M. McEachern presided, and the address of your agent was attentively heard.

Kilbride.—A meeting was held on Monday, March 21st, in the Presbyterian Church. Officers were elected and collectors appointed. Your agent gave an address. The Rev. R. Haddow, B.A., of Milton, assisted in the meeting. There is no reason why there should not be a strong branch at Kilbride, and it is hoped that it will now be revived.

REV. J. DYKE—*Gretna.*—A very interesting meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The Rev. Messrs. Avert and Forvens were present and took part in the meeting. At the close of the agent's address the Rev. Mr. Avert gave a synopsis of the agent's speech in German for the benefit of that part of the audience which could not understand English. The purchase account amounted to \$29.96; and the collection was \$6.86. The necessary officers were elected at the close of the meeting.

Morden.—The meeting at this point was held in the Methodist Church. The pastor, Rev. W. Bridgeman, occupied the chair. The meeting was favoured with brief addresses from the Rev. Messrs. Borthwick and McLatchy, and Mr. G. Copeland, provincial secretary of the Y.M.C.A. At the close of the agent's address the collection was taken up and the usual officers were elected. Mr. Fraser, the secretary, presented an encouraging report, and all are hopeful that increased interest and benefit will result from the work done.

Manitou.—The meeting was held in the Baptist Church. The attendance was not so large as heretofore, which was a disappointment to the agent and officers. The Rev. Messrs. Caven (Presbyterian), McClung (Methodist), and McArthur (Baptist), took part in the meeting with the agent. The business meeting was held, officers and collectors appointed, and earnest resolutions made to secure a larger audience next annual meeting.

Crystal City.—The day set for the annual meeting was exceedingly cold and the night very stormy, so that only eight or nine persons assembled. But on Sabbath afternoon the agent preached in the Methodist Church and laid the claims of the Society before the people. The officers at their meeting appointed a number of collectors, and as the harvest is very good it was hoped large returns would be made in a few weeks.

Pilot Mound.—By arrangement of the Rev. Messrs. Farquharson, Lawson, and Auvache the usual services on Sabbath evening were merged into a Bible Society meeting in the Presbyterian Church, where the agent had the pleasure of speaking to an audience of between three and four hundred persons. Great interest was apparent in the meeting, and the collection amounted to \$15.55. The officers of last year were unanimously re-elected.

Cartwright.—This thriving village was visited by the agent for the first time. By the kind permission and assistance of the Rev. J. H. Riddel, B.A., a meeting was held in the Methodist Church. At the close of the agent's address the question of forming a branch was discussed by the audience, and it was unanimously resolved that a branch be formed at once. The audience elected their usual officers and entered upon the work with great earnestness.

Killarney.—The annual meeting of this branch was held in the Methodist Church. The Rev. Mr. Lewis presided, and brief addresses were given by the Revs. J. Johnston and A. Whyte. At the close of the agent's address the collection was taken up and the necessary officers elected. Collectors were appointed not only for the town but at each preaching station in the country. It is expected that by this means large returns will be made.

Boissevain.—The agent had a cold drive of twenty miles to this point. He found that the energetic officers held their business meeting the previous day and he was very gratified to find everything in such good condition. The annual meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church; the Rev. G. H. Long presided. The Rev. W. Kinley assisted in the devotional exercises. The report showed the branch to be in a prosperous condition.

Deloraine.—The agent met the officers of this branch in the free reading room of the W. C. T. U. at 16 o'clock. A most excellent report was read by the secretary. The meeting was held in the town hall, the president, Rev. Mr. Munro, in the chair. A large audience was present. The audience manifested great interest in the meeting and responded to the agent's appeal by giving a liberal collection.

West Selkirk.—The annual meeting of this branch was held in the Presbyterian Church. The genial president, Rev. G. Sutherland, occupied the chair. A brief address was given by the Rev. Mr. Craig. The agent presented the work and claims of the Bible Society. Mr. J. G. Dagg, the secretary, read an interesting report, at the close of which the usual officers and collectors were appointed.

Stonewall.—The agent visited this town on Sabbath, preached in the Methodist Church, and by arrangements of the pastors a mass meeting of the different congregations was held at the close of the usual services. The agent had the pleasure of speaking to a very large audience. At the close of his address it was unanimously agreed to form a branch. The usual officers were elected.

Emerson.—The annual meeting at this point was held in the Baptist Church. The Revs. J. Laurance, S. Colwell and J. Hall gave great assistance in the meeting. The audience was large and most enthusiastic in the work. At the close of the agent's address the officers and collectors were appointed and a collection of \$12.25 taken up.

Whitemouth.—The audience at this point was very small, owing chiefly to sickness in the village, and a stormy night. The agent, in addition to the annual meeting, sought to make the most of his visit by distributing Bible Society literature in public places and private houses of the people.

Rat Portage.—The Rev. A. L. Fortin, rector of St. Albans, presided at the annual meeting, which was held in the Methodist Church. After an admirable address he introduced the agent, who urged upon the people the importance of circulating the Scriptures all over the world. The necessary officers and collectors were appointed for Rat Portage and Norman. The president, Rev. A. L. Fortin, strongly urged the organization of a branch at Keewatin.

Your agent visited *Port Arthur*, February 17, and during the afternoon met the directors in the rooms of the Mechanics' Institute. Nearly all the officers were present and manifested a deep interest in the work of the Society. An excellent public meeting was held during the evening in the Baptist Church. The Rev. Messrs. Roberts, Pringle, and Ross were present and ably assisted the agent in the meeting. The president, Mr. James Meek, occupied the chair, and Dr. Law, the secretary, read an excellent report. This branch is very efficiently managed, and Bible Society work has a warm place in the sympathies of Christian workers in the town.

Keewatin (New Branch).—Is a picturesque place; has a population of 700; is growing rapidly; has large flouring and saw mills in the vicinity. During winter there are several lumber and tie camps, affording a good field for Bible Society work. Last year the friends at this point took up a subscription list and remitted through Rat Portage branch. This year there was a general desire for a branch to be formed. Arrangements for the meeting had been made by the Rev. A. L. Fortin, rector of St. Albans, Rat Portage, who occupied the chair, and made an effective speech when introducing the agent. At the close of the meeting it was unanimously resolved to form a branch. The necessary officers were elected and lady collectors appointed to canvass the town. Rat Portage and Keewatin depositories will doubtless do good work.

Fort William.—The first meeting of the Bible Society in this growing town was held in the Presbyterian Church. The attendance was fairly good. The pastor, Rev. J. L. Simpson, conducted devotional exercises and made a brief address, after which the agent laid before the audience the claims of the Bible Society. A collection of \$5.85 was taken up, and the meeting unanimously resolved to organize a branch at once. The necessary officers were appointed, and no doubt the work will be prosecuted with vigour.

REV. J. B. FRASER—*Riversdale*.—A fair meeting in the Presbyterian Church on a wet night. Rev. Mr. Gray, pastor of the church where the meeting was held, a steadfast friend of the Society, in the chair; officers efficient; depository well kept.

Pinkerton.—A large meeting in the Presbyterian Church on a very wet and stormy evening. Rev. Mr. Campbell (Presbyterian) in the chair. Interest in the work of the Society on the increase. The local committee had business in good shape for the meeting.

Glamis.—An average meeting in the Baptist Church. Evening showery and roads bad. Excellent music and close attention to agent's address. The secretary and depository are both efficient and devoted officers. Business in good shape for the public meeting.

Paisley.—A fair evening, and a large and enthusiastic meeting. The Methodist Church filled with an interested audience. The Rev. J. Johnston (Presbyterian) in the chair. Rev. Messrs. McAllister (Methodist), and Van Sickle (Baptist) gave short addresses. Sales at the depository encouragingly large. The branch is well officered, and the interest in the work of the Society will be maintained and increased.

Hanover.—A fair evening and a good meeting in the Presbyterian Church. In the absence of the president the chair was ably filled by Dr. Landerkin, M.P. The business of the meeting was promptly and efficiently transacted. The secretary is interested and devoted. The ministers of the village are cordially interested. Revs. Messrs. Snowdon and Lake were present and took part.

Tara and Invermay.—A fair meeting in the Presbyterian Church on a wet night, with bad roads. Most excellent music. The president enthusiastic and efficient. Business in better shape and more promptly disposed of than in any other branch in the district. Local ministers all present. A thriving and fruitful branch.

Burgoyne.—A purely country branch. A raging snow storm, without sleighing. Bad wheeling, and worse walking. A very small meeting. No business transacted. The secretary, who is interested, and had come a mile through the storm, will see that collectors are appointed, and, if possible, arrange for a public meeting before long. The impression of last year's successful meeting is still fresh.

Arkwright.—A country branch. Roads of soft snow and mud. Meeting in Methodist Church. Attendance and collection small. Room for and promise of improvement.

Warton.—A fair evening and a good meeting in the Methodist Church. Officers efficient and devoted. Business in good shape and promptly transacted. Local ministers present and in hearty sympathy with the work. The interest manifested is very creditable to the growing village which has its hands so full of other important work—church and school building, etc.

Allenford.—A favourable night and a full house. Meeting in the Methodist Church. Excellent music. Officers efficient. A most attentive audience and a good collection. Prospects encouraging. I visited *Kemble* on the 15th of Feb., 1892, and organized a branch of the Society there. The day was stormy and bitter cold, the drifts in some places very deep. The attendance at the meeting was small, but both the Presbyterian and Methodist ministers were present and cordially in favour of organizing. All present also heartily approved. *Kemble* is twelve miles north of Owen Sound on the road to Wiarton, and is most easily reached from Owen Sound, from which place there is a stage tri-weekly.

Desboro.—A severe snowstorm and a small meeting. In absence of the president who had left the place the chair was taken by Rev. J. Hamilton, Keady. Business promptly despatched. Improvement may be looked for.

Kilsyth, Jan. 19th.—An extremely cold night and an epidemic of "la grippe" combined to make a small meeting. Branch well officered and business well arranged. Prospects encouraging. Collecting for the year nearly completed. Depository efficiently managed.

Holland Centre, Jan. 25th.—A stormy night and as usual a small meeting. Those present apparently much interested. Collectors will be appointed without delay, and large contributions may be looked for. An efficient secretary has been appointed. Very acceptable help at the public meeting from Rev. Mr. Perry (Methodist), who is in hearty sympathy with the work.

Chatsworth, Jan. 26th.—Extremely cold with the usual result, a thin meeting. Much sickness in the place prevented some from attending who are seldom absent. Rev. Mr. McCullough (Methodist), the president, in the chair. A short but effective address from Rev. Mr. McAlpine (Presbyterian), and good music from the church choir, added to the interest of the meeting. An efficient secretary-treasurer, and the business of the branch well managed.

REV. J. W. GARTON, *High Bluff*, Dec. 2nd.—This branch was established on Jan. 28th of this year (1891). Although the weather was fine we had a very poor attendance at the meeting. Those friends who were present took an interest in what was said. The Presbyterian minister promises to take up a collection at each of his churches for the work of the Society.

Yorkton, N.-W.T., Jan. 27th, 1892.—This is a small place of recent growth; as yet there are no churches, but the Presbyterians and Methodists are represented by two earnest students who work hand in hand together. The chair was occupied by Mr. J. R. M. Hamilton, who was ably supported by Mr. Byres. We had a nice meeting, at the close of which a branch was formed with president, secretary, treasurer and depository.

Saltcoats, N.-W. T., Jan. 28th.—My efforts to form a branch at this place were very energetically supported by the Rev. J. Peters, who met me at the train. Together we visited a number of the inhabitants and solicited their co-operation. The meeting was in the schoolhouse as at Yorkton. The Rev. J. Peters occupied the chair and gave a very able address. On motion of the Rev. T. A. Teitlebaum (Church of England), it was resolved to organize a branch.

Neepawa, Jan. 29th.—This is one of the most flourishing towns on the M. and N.-W. Railway. The branch was very unfortunate in having its able president laid aside by a very severe illness; in his absence the Rev. C. S. Murray presided. The meeting was held in the handsome Methodist Church. At the close Rev. T. Argue was re-elected president and Mr. T. Whitehead sec.-treas. The executive decided upon meeting on the following Thursday to appoint collectors and set them to work at once.

Rapid City, Jan. 30th.—Your agent was met at the station by the Mayor, J. A. Ovas, Esq., who very kindly entertained him. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church with the Rev. T. B. Beynon presiding. Great interest was taken in the work of the Society by those present, and it is confidently expected that this branch will do even better in the future than in the past. The depository was visited and a great improvement was noticed in the way the Bibles were kept.

Minnedosa, Feb. 1st.—As was expected last year this branch has made great strides—notably in collecting nearly as much this year for the Society as in the two previously combined years. The meeting was in every way a success. Rev. Messrs. August, Lister and Gill were present; the latter occupied the chair and spoke very feelingly on behalf of the work. The Rev. F. A. August led in prayer, and said a few words at the close of the meeting. All the officers proved themselves well fitted for their posts, and the meeting, recognizing their fitness, re-elected them all.

Russell, Feb. 3rd and 4th.—Arriving at this place late on Tuesday night, it was no use thinking about holding a meeting. On the following day, the Rev. W. G. Rogerson drove me to *Minniska*, where we had a very successful gathering in the Presbyterian Church. *Minniska* is simply a settlement trading at *Russell*. At the end of the addresses a committee was appointed to work with the executive at *Russell* if a branch were formed there. On Thursday evening we held our meeting in *Russell*, in the neat little Presbyterian Church, Rev. Mr. Rust (Methodist) presiding. At the conclusion of the agent's address, Rev. W. G. Rogerson spoke some stirring words, setting forth in very forcible language the adaptability of God's Word to all mankind. Ere we separated it was unanimously agreed to establish a branch in *Russell*. Officers were elected.

Birtle, Feb. 9th.—Meeting in the Methodist Church, Rev. Mr. Somerville, pastor, in the chair. A good attendance. This branch has done excellent work during the past year. All the ministers take a deep interest in the Society, and the natural consequence is good work. The Rev. Messrs. Somerville and Mitton each paid an eloquent tribute to the Society, the result of personal experience and observation. Your agent followed with his address, which was listened to with manifest interest. Too much praise cannot be given to all the officers for the very admirable way in which they fulfil their duties.

Newdale, Feb. 10th.—This place, although small, has a large heart, as the result shows. This branch, established last year, has already made itself felt. The meeting was very well attended, Messrs. Holling and Steel rendering valuable assistance; the former, in the absence of the president, filled the chair. It was anticipated last year that the work of the Society would be appreciated, and this anticipation has been agreeably fulfilled.

Shoal Lake, Feb. 11th.—Our friends in Shoal Lake have been fully alive to the needs of the Society. The sale of Bibles was small, but the contributions were large. The meeting was held in Thompson's Hall—a fair attendance. The pastor of the Methodist congregation occupied the chair. After the opening exercises came the agent's address, and then the treasurer's report, which was entirely satisfactory. Mr. Geo. Bellamy was elected president for the ensuing year, in place of the Rev. R. Gow, who has left the town.

Portage la Prairie, Feb. 23rd.—Meeting in the Methodist schoolroom. Considering the size of the town, only a small number was present. W. W. Miller, Esq., as in former years, ably occupied the chair. The ministers were well represented by Rev. Messrs. P. Wright, S. MacMorine, R. McDonald and A. C. Garrioch. Rev. R. McDonald conducted the devotional part, Rev. P. Wright gave a very instructive address, and the Rev. A. C. Garrioch, from Peace River, gave a very interesting address on Indian work, and spoke of the kind assistance he had received from the parent Society in printing portions of the Bible in the Beaver language, which he had translated. The report of the treasurer showed a very marked increase in contributions. The sales were not so large as in the previous year.

Gladstone, March 10th.—The Rev. P. Wright, from Portage la Prairie, kindly assisted me in the meeting at Gladstone. We had a large and appreciative audience, and Mr. Wright's address was listened to with every sign of approval. The secretary and treasurer each presented his report, and undoubtedly the branch is to be congratulated upon the work done. Dr. B. M. Walton was elected president for the ensuing year.

REV. J. M. HARRISON—*Saskatoon*, Jan. 25th.—I was met by the Rev. A. E. Roberts, missionary of the Methodist Church, and entertained at the home of Mr. Dulmage. *Saskatoon* is still a very small hamlet. The stock carried by our depositary forms the only supply of Bibles for ninety miles, Prince Albert being the nearest

point. Our stock is in the hands of a good man. I preached on Sabbath, the 24th of January, and then held the Bible Society meeting on Monday evening. The night was stormy but the audience was good, and your agent spoke for over an hour on "The Relation of the Bible to the Progress of the British Empire." We took a collection of over \$12. Rev. Mr. Roberts gave a short address, and the president, T. Copeland, Esq., rendered efficient service.

The next point visited was on Friday, Jan. 29th, at *Prince Albert*, where I was met at midnight by Rev. F. B. Stacey, and entertained at the parsonage. I found that very little had been done, but I waited on the president at an early hour, and we had a very good meeting indeed. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. Mr. McTaggart was in the chair, and very excellent addresses were given by Rev. T. B. Stacey (Methodist) and Rev. Mr. Rochester (Presbyterian). The sales are good, and the free contributions will, I think, be very creditable for this new branch. The depository is in good hands, and the books are well kept.

Wolsley.—I was accommodated at the Wolsley House. The night was fearfully cold, the thermometer creeping down to fifty-four degrees below zero. I could not perform my toilet the following morning because the water was frozen so hard in my room. The meeting was held Monday, the 8th of February. The evening was somewhat stormy and the audience small, but we had a good meeting. We met in the Presbyterian Church, with the president, Rev. Mr. Campbell, in the chair. Good work has been done by this branch during the last year. The contributions are double those of last year, and we remit from this branch this year \$61.98. We re-elected all the officers, as we felt quite sure we could not do better. I found the stock well cared for.

Our next point was *Whitwood*, where we held our meeting on Tuesday evening, the 9th. Here we were met by Rev. Mr. Hamilton, and entertained at the manse. The evening was very cold and the audience not so large as usual. I spoke for some time on general topics, but the friends requested me to return and give the address I had prepared, at a later date, which I consented to do. This is one of the most vigorous branches on the line, and a great deal of the credit is due to the thoughtfulness of Rev. Mr. Hamilton and the energy of Mr. C. E. Baldwin, secretary. The returns from this branch will, I think, be the largest in the district. Rev. Messrs. Hamilton and Musselman addressed the meeting.

Moosomin, Feb. 10th.—Our meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The president, Mr. Smith, was in the chair. Owing to the illness of Rev. Mr. Leach we were deprived of the pleasure of his presence. The Rev. Mr. Douglas, Presbyterian minister, made the speech of the evening. He gave us a chapter from his experience while a missionary in India. We had a good audience, and the givings are considerably in advance of last year. The sales were fair, and the books are well kept.

Our next point was *Grenfell*, which we reached at 2.30 a.m. on the 11th of February. The work done at this point is a little behind hand, but I hope to be able to report good returns from this branch. We have good officers who are certainly interested in the work. The sales have been good for so small a village. The stock is well kept. The meeting was held in the new church built by our Methodist friends since my last visit. The audience was fair, and the Rev. Messrs. McLeod (Presbyterian) and Dickenson (Methodist) did us good service. R. Garret, Esq., occupied the chair, and his services have been so acceptable that he is elected for the third time.

Broadview, Feb. 12th.—We arrived at this point at 6 a.m., and were welcomed in the home of Mrs. Joslyn. The depository has changed hands during the past year, and is now in the charge of A. G. Thorburn, Esq., who has the books in a good position. A severe storm had been blowing all day and towards evening it greatly increased. Ladies could not possibly reach the church, which is a little out of the village, so that there was no meeting. The sales have been fairly good, and the subscriptions a little in advance of last year. The committee met and appointed officers for the next year. The committee desire to express their gratitude for the generous donation of Bibles to the C. P. R. freight conductors' vans.

Qu'Appelle, Feb. 15th.—Here I was the guest of Rev. Mr. Tozeland. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, the president, Rev. J. Ferry, in the chair. Our

friends departed a little from the usual custom this year and appointed lady officers for the Society. Funds will be a good deal in advance of receipts last year. I advised the making of a book-case as there is none, and the stock will certainly depreciate in value.

February 16th, I drove to *Indian Head* and held the meeting in the Presbyterian Church, with the president, R. Crawford, Esq., in the chair. A severe storm blew from the north-west, and, as the church is quite out of the village, we had a meeting of men only. Your agent spoke for one hour and a-half. The funds, I trust, will be in advance of last year. We have the best secretary-treasurer that we could secure. There has been too much apathy here. During my visits the weather has been very cold and occasionally stormy, yet there is every prospect of increased givings.

On reaching *Moosejaw* we were met by H. Neelands, Esq., and taken to his home. Moosejaw has received a fiery baptism recently, and the giving at this point will be a little below their usual amount. Last year this branch gave the largest amount in the Territories, but will scarcely reach the same point this year. We have excellent officers and collectors. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, with Rev. Mr. Clay, the president, in the chair. The whole evening was given to your agent, and we pressed the claims of the Society. This is one of our best branches.

REV. R. HAY—*Drayton*.—It happened that the evening was very dark and wet, hence the attendance at the meeting was small, so small that it was thought best to postpone it for a week; and, as I could not be present, I arranged with some of the clergymen of the place to be present and to help in the work of the branch. On passing through the village a week later I learned that the meeting had been held, and the officers of the branch elected, and arrangements made to have collecting done. Rev. Messrs. Chown and Willoughby assisted in this work.

Rothsay, Oct. 8th.—Here I was kindly received by the Rev. Mr. Edmison of the Presbyterian Church. We had a very good meeting at this branch. The attendance was not large, but the spirit of the meeting was good. A favourable report was given and the branch put in good working order. Collectors will be sent out immediately.

Garafraxa, Oct. 9th.—There is a good branch here, with very efficient officers. Their report for the year was a good one. The Rev. Messrs. Webb, of the Congregational Church, and Kennedy, of the Methodist Church, gave much help at the meeting. It was arranged that I should present the claims of the Society on Sabbath evening, October 11th, in Belwood, and as there was no other service at that hour in the village I had a very large congregation in the Congregational Church. I spent Saturday with Rev. Mr. Webb, and on Sunday morning preached for him to a good congregation. In the afternoon I drove about ten miles and preached for Rev. Mr. Kennedy, returning eight miles to Belwood as noted above.

Mimosa, Oct. 12th.—We had a small meeting at this branch, but with the aid of the active president of the Society, Mr. Leslie, and the Rev. Mr. Harris, Methodist minister, we had a fairly good meeting.

Moorefield, Oct. 13th.—Here I met good friends of the Society in the Rev. Mr. Smith and Mr. Geo. Mahon, secretary of the branch. The work done here promises well for results when the collectors report.

Hollin, Oct. 14th.—Here we had another wet evening and hence a small meeting, yet a very good meeting. The work of the branch was taken up and promises given that more would be done than was done last year.

Glenallan, Oct. 15th.—Here I was the guest of Rev. Mr. Morris, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, who gave me much help in arranging for the better working of the branch. Had help also from Rev. Mr. Hamilton, of the Methodist Church.

Palmerston, Oct. 16th.—Where I got a very kindly welcome. Here we had an excellent meeting; we had a good congregation, a good report from the Society showing the meetings of the committee had been held during the year. Able addresses were made by Rev. Mr. Smith, of the Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. Aull, of the Presbyterian Church, and the Captain of the Salvation Army.

REV. DR. HODGKIN—*Amberley*, Tuesday, Oct. 13th.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The attendance was good; the meeting interesting. The accounts were fully presented by the attentive secretary and depository, and the hope was entertained that this branch would have a larger territory assigned to it. The contributions would fairly represent the numbers and abilities of the Christian families within its bounds.

Ripley, Wednesday, Oct. 14th.—The following day I reached Ripley just before sunset, when a violent rain and wind storm commenced, and, while the severity of it passed over, the rain continued and materially affected the attendance of the meeting. This was held in the English Church and was at least as good as could be expected. The depository was visited and is well kept, needing some "sorting up," for which arrangements were made calculated to meet the wants of the locality.

Bervie, Thursday, Oct. 15th.—The next evening found me at Bervie, wending my way to the meeting through a drenching "summer shower," which affected unfavourably both the attendance and the collection. The Church of England minister was present. The Presbyterian minister lives several miles off and was engaged specially preparatory to the communion season.

Armow, Friday, Oct. 16th.—The following day Armow branch was visited. The depository was away from home, and no information could be obtained. The meeting this year was held in the Presbyterian Church on the 7th concession, between one and two miles south, whither we went. At the manse we met a hearty welcome. The weather was all that could be wished. The attendance was very good, the audience evinced genuine and hearty interest. The collection was good, and both ministers and people afforded subject for many pleasant recollections.

Tiverton, Oct. 19th. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The evening was wet and dark, owing to which the attendance was not large. Tiverton, considering the large congregations of Baptists and Presbyterians, should come up well in Bible society work. I hope that another year everything will be arranged for awakening as far as possible a greater interest in the cause.

Underwood, Oct. 20th.—The next day my kind friend Mr. McInnes sent me in the afternoon to Underwood, where I received a warm welcome at the manse from my old friend the Rev. James Little. Here the depository is well managed and the accounts clearly presented. The night was dark and threatening. The only local minister present was the Presbyterian; the Methodist minister in charge resides five miles distant, at Tiverton. The church (Methodist) was full, and there was a lively interested meeting, everything passing off well.

North Bruce, Oct. 21st.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, and this had for several weeks been closed for repair and no general notice of the meeting had been given. The evening was damp; a few gathered. Some true friends are anxious for the continuance of the branch, but are very much discouraged. The secretary suggested appointing new officers which was done, although the persons so appointed were not present. Since my return I have written to each of them a letter soliciting their co-operation, and enclosing copies of the recently published statement of the work of the U. C. B. S., asking them to circulate the much needed information.

Southampton, Oct. 22nd.—My last meeting was at Southampton and held in the Presbyterian Church, and there was a good representation of the ministers of the village, all of whom took their share of the work. The meeting was very bright and lively and the collection very good. The branch will do well if the interest manifested at the meeting is sustained.

REV. A. F. MCGREGOR—*East Williams*.—A sound branch; first-class officers *McGillivray and Biddulph*.—The work here is to be revived and improved. *Watford*.—A living branch. Most interesting meeting. *Ravenswood*.—A change of officers. Work to be revived. *Mooretown*.—The meeting was considered exceedingly encouraging. *Sombra*.—No report furnished; improvement hoped for next year. *Corunna*.—A small but thrifty branch. Good annual meeting. *Sarnia*.—A very satisfactory meeting. Senator Vidal (Presbyterian) presiding. The work placed on a solid basis.

Camloch Branch.—The annual meeting of this branch was held on the 3rd of February. The attendance was fair considering the state of the weather. The

collections were in advance of previous years, and the interest of the friends in the work of the Society very commendable. The collectors had not quite finished the work of collecting at the date of the annual meeting, but the greater part of it was performed. The meeting was addressed by your agent and by President Rev. G. McLaren, Presbyterian minister. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church.

Theford Branch.—Stormy weather and bad walking conspired to lessen the attendance at the branch meeting in Theford. Forty-six dollars and forty-three cents had been collected for the work of the Society. Addresses were given by the agent and by Rev. Messrs. Marshall and Currie. More might be accomplished by this branch, and hopes are entertained that the coming year will prove to be one of better work. The depository has been put into better shape. The annual meeting was held in the Methodist Church, February 10th.

Forest Branch.—The annual meeting of this branch was held in the Congregational Church on Wednesday evening, 20th February. The weather was unusually cold and affected somewhat the attendance. The address of the evening was given by Rev. W. Hayhurst, of the Methodist Church. Collections so far as completed were reported by the secretary-treasurer to be in advance of those of last year. Dr. Hutton, the honoured president of the branch, was in the chair. We purpose a greater development of the work of this branch this year, if possible.

MR. ROBERT MCQUEEN—*Jerseyville.*—On Friday evening, November 6, the annual meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The president, the Rev. Mr. Bridgman, in the chair. The evening was fine, the attendance good. The choir furnished appropriate music. The Rev. Messrs. Gee and Bristol gave short addresses on behalf of the Bible Society. The annual report was then read, received and adopted; officers were elected and collectors were appointed. Your agent then addressed the meeting, advocating the claims of the Society. A collection was taken and the meeting closed.

Copetown.—The annual meeting of this branch was held in Zion Hill Church on Wednesday evening, November 11. The night was wet, hence the attendance was not large. The Rev. Mr. Cookman presided. The secretary, Mr. Fry, read a very admirable report, after which officers were elected, a committee and collectors appointed. Your agent addressed a small but very attentive audience, pressing the claims of the Society. A collection was taken up and the president closed the meeting.

Lynden.—The annual meeting of this branch was held on Wednesday evening, November 18, in the Methodist Church. The evening was clear, the meeting good. The president, the Rev. Mr. Hall, presided. Officers were elected, a committee and collectors appointed. Your agent addressed the meeting on behalf of the Society. A collection was taken up and the president closed the meeting. This branch, through the officers, promises to give a good account of itself in the matter of contributions for the current year.

Strabanc.—The annual meeting of this branch was held in the Methodist Church, Freulton. The president, Rev. Mr. Gay, presided. The Rev. Messrs. Cohoe and Cameron were also present. The night was very dark. The attendance was the largest of the meetings held. The choir of the church rendered appropriate music. Officers were elected, committee and collectors were appointed. The annual report was read by the chairman. Messrs. Cohoe and Cameron gave short addresses. Your agent addressed a large and attentive meeting on behalf of the Society.

Glenmorris.—The annual meeting of this branch was held on Friday evening, Dec. 11, in the Presbyterian Church. In the unavoidable absence of the president, the Rev. Mr. Pettigrew presided. The attendance was good. Good music helped to enliven the meeting. The annual report was read. The chairman gave a short address. The officers were re-elected. A committee and collectors were appointed. The report showed an advance on the preceding year, and better things still were promised for the future. Your agent addressed a whole-hearted and earnestly attentive meeting on behalf of the Society. A collection was taken up and a most encouraging meeting brought to a close.

Alberton.—The annual meeting of this branch was held in the Presbyterian Church on January 15. In the absence of the president the Rev. Mr. McLung pre-

sided. The annual report was read, officers elected, a committee and collectors appointed. Good singing enlivened the meeting. Your agent addressed the meeting, receiving an earnest and attentive hearing as he advocated the claims of the Society. A collection was taken up and the meeting closed. Your agent met with a most cordial welcome and kindly treatment.

West Flamboro.—The annual meeting of this branch was held in the Presbyterian Church on Monday evening, February 1. The night was a mixture of darkness, rain, snow and sleet, which made the attendance small. The Rev. S. W. Fisher presided. The secretary read a very excellent report. Officers were elected, a committee and collectors were appointed. Your agent addressed a small but appreciative audience, in advocacy of the claims of the Society, and is confident that this branch will maintain its good name and liberal record. A collection was taken up and the meeting closed. Your agent retains a graceful remembrance of the kindness shown him by the office-bearers of branches visited.

REV. JNO. MILNER—*Bolton.*—Preached three times on Sunday; attended meeting October 27, in Methodist Church. Local causes not favourable for attendance. Rev. Geo. Walker and Rev. Peter Nicol took an active part in the meeting and rendered good service. This is a live branch, with excellent officers.

Caledon East and Mono Road.—On the following night, the Rev. H. Harper, the active president, in charge of the meeting, and the Rev. R. H. Johnston, gave a timely and thoughtful address. The attendance an improvement on former years, and the manifest interest hopeful for progress.

Mono Mills was our next meeting. The president, Rev. James Long, drove a long journey over the mountains to reach the meeting in due time and give his efficient aid. Attendance small but interested, and the work satisfactorily arranged. Here for the first time we found the object of the Society was not fully understood.

Charleston.—Meeting in Presbyterian Church on Nov. 9th. The Rev. Andrew Wilson, in the absence of the president, occupied the chair and was a tower of strength for the occasion. The church bright and cheery, the choir excellent, and attendance good, making this meeting a thoroughly good one.

South Etobicoke.—Meeting in the Methodist Church, Islington. The night dark, roads bad, and the rain came in torrents. A fair congregation of warm friends of the Society faced the storm to be at the annual meeting. The pastor, Rev. T. H. Stevenson, gave an admirable address. The excellent choir enlivened the proceedings, and the results were encouraging. This branch is well managed.

Weston.—Meeting in schoolroom of Presbyterian Church. Larger attendance than in former years. Officers and resident ministers present. The pastor, Rev. Walter Reid, conducted devotional exercises, and Rev. S. C. Philp and Rev. R. H. Harris presented the claims of the Society very effectively. Here we also had the services of a good choir, and with the excellent management of the officers, the annual meeting was pleasant and interesting, and the financial prospects good.

Humber Summit.—Meeting in Congregational Church. Roads almost impassable, but good attendance; meeting one of the best in the series.

North Etobicoke.—On several occasions this branch has had the worst of roads and weather for their annual meeting, and this was no exception. We met the honoured president and other tried friends of the Society in Sharon Church, and after a brief talk parted, hoping for better days.

Toronto Junction.—Meeting held in the Baptist Church was fairly well attended. The pastor, Rev. Mr. McKay, presided. After the agent's address, the Rev. J. A. Grant, president, earnestly and effectively urged the claims of the Society. All the other ministers were absent through illness and other causes. The meeting was a thoroughly good one. For this success Mr. P. Wilson, the indefatigable secretary, must be largely credited.

Woodbridge and Pine Grove.—A large meeting on the following night in the Presbyterian Church, Woodbridge, Dr. Thom presiding. The Rev. Messrs. Reid, Pearson, and Swallow gave effective addresses. The secretary presented a favourable and encouraging report, and the choir aided in making this an excellent meeting.

Lloydtown and Schomberg.—Meeting in Methodist Church, Schomberg. As the night was extremely cold the attendance was small. The Rev. W. P. Brown presided over the meeting. The pastor, Rev. A. Bedford, spoke a few words of encouragement, and Rev. E. W. Sibbald at the close gave an effective and spirited address. This branch, having made a new departure, promises well for the future.

REV. T. ALBERT MOORE—*Winona.*—The interest in the Bible Society at this place has been very greatly increased, the agent being greeted at the annual meeting by an audience three times as large as last year. As usual the meeting was held in the Methodist Church, efficient help being given by the minister, Rev. J. E. Hockey. The choir of the church was present and sang several times to the delight of all present. Undoubtedly the finances here will increase.

South Saltfleet.—The meeting here was a very small one, owing somewhat to the unpleasant weather, but largely to lack of interest. Rev. D. Ecker was present and did all he could both for the benefit of the Society and the comfort of the agent. After a brief address the officers were all re-elected. They all promise better things and greater interest in the future.

Beamsville.—The annual meeting held in the Methodist Church was better attended than for a number of years. All the ministers of the town were present and did their utmost to make a successful meeting. The synopsis of a year of Bible work given by the agent was listened to very attentively. I am sure this branch will greatly increase its contributions.

St. Ann's.—The president, Rev. Mr. Cruikshank, was unavoidably absent, but the efficient secretary, Mr. J. S. Nash, very acceptably presided. The choir of the Presbyterian Church, where the meeting was held, added to the pleasure of the meeting. All the officers were re-elected. There is much interest here in the work done by the Bible Society.

Wellandport.—A small audience. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, Rev. Mr. Ockley, pastor, presiding. There have been no collections here for two years, but with some change in the officary, and the benefits of the Bible Society work pointed out, we are hopeful of much better reports from this branch.

Smithville.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, and owing to a heavy snow storm was not well attended. Rev. Messrs. Cruikshank and Wright, resident pastors, were both present and added to the interest of the meeting. The agent's address upon colportage work and Bible translation was well received. The Society has loyal friends here who will not overlook its claims.

Caistorville.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Rev. J. T. Davis proved himself a warm friend of the Society. The choir of the church added interest to the meeting. This branch loses a very warm friend in the removal of the president, Adam Spears, senior, who after retaining his office for thirty-one years now resigns. Mr. James Asher, who was elected to fill the vacancy, will not allow the interest in the Bible Society to wane.

Caistor.—This branch is entirely rural. A heavy wind made the roads almost impassable with snow-drifts, but nearly forty people were present at the annual meeting. Rev. Mr. Taylor rendered every assistance possible. The interest in the work of the Society was apparent. Good reports may be expected.

REV. J. H. MOOREHOUSE—*Princeton.*—Meeting held here on evening of February 15th. Collection double that of last year, attendance also better. Rev. Mr. McCartney (Methodist) was present and gave an interesting and instructive address. Collectors were duly appointed. The officers here are faithful men, and the branch appears to be progressing. A quantity of literature favouring Bible Society work having at my request been forwarded from Toronto, I distributed a portion of it at the meeting, and also left a liberal supply in the hands of the officers for further distribution. Let us hope that the sowing of this good seed will produce a profitable harvest.

Drumbo.—Small attendance—twenty-two. The president was, I am sorry to write, absent through illness. Last year the plan was adopted of taking up a collection in each of the churches instead of appointing collectors. This year, however, collectors were appointed, and there is reason to hope that better work will be done. Both resident ministers were absent, but Rev. Mr. Bailey (Methodist), having reached

home before the close of the meeting, kindly came and spoke a few words in favour of the Bible Society. Drumbo is a thriving village of some 600 inhabitants, and being surrounded by a good country it ought to do well.

Plattsville.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. Colling (Methodist) conducted the devotional exercises and warmly commended the work of the Bible Society. The president, Mr. Hunter, occupied the chair and made a suitable address. All business was thoroughly carried through. This branch appears to be in a healthy condition.

Washington.—A warm meeting. Interesting items in the history of the branch were mentioned. It has been established thirty-seven years. The secretary, Mr. Dunn, has held office for twenty-seven years. This last year shows an advance in contributions of \$7.73. A subscription list being circulated at the meeting, \$11.00 were subscribed as a start for the collectors. Washington is a very small village, and the territory of the branch is small, but the people are warm friends of the Society. Rev. Mr. Miller (Methodist) was present and spoke helpful words on behalf of the Society.

St. George.—A stormy night and snowy roads made the attendance small. Collectors had been already appointed. The officers and committee were appointed at the meeting. Through an oversight the collecting here was omitted last year. This is much to be regretted, the more so because the branch had done so well the year before. However, amendment was promised this year.

Burford.—This is the banner branch of the district assigned me. The meeting was held in the Baptist Church; attendance fifty-nine. Three of the resident ministers were present. The amount contributed by this branch last year (\$87.47) was more than double that of the preceding year. The officers are hopeful that good work will be done again this year.

Mount Pleasant.—Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church. We regretted the absence of the president through illness. Three resident ministers were present. Spirit of the meeting good. Business received thorough attention. The contribution of this branch (\$48.79) shows an encouraging advance over the preceding year.

Scotland.—An attendance of sixty-two at the meeting. Rev. Mr. Hay, pastor of the Congregational Church, where the meeting was held, was present. In speaking on behalf of the Bible Society he stated that he had been connected with the work for forty years. It is pleasant to meet these veterans in the work. This branch could profitably make a decided advance in its support of the Bible Society. I was glad, however, to find that although it appears blank in the report it had last year contributed \$22.47, the amount having been remitted too late for publication.

New Durham.—Here I was glad again, as last year, to meet the warm friend of the Bible Society, Mr. Walker, president. The attendance at the meeting was fair and the interest good. This branch almost doubled its contributions last year over the preceding year, and bids fair this year to make a still further advance.

REV. SAMUEL NASH MOYER—*Tavistock.*—A good meeting. Officers say that for several years they have not had so large an attendance and such a lively interest manifested in the Society's work. The Rev. Mr. Pike of Shakespeare aided your agent nobly. He gave an excellent address. The agent spoke mostly in the German language. Collection, \$5.00.

Crediton.—Our audience was nearly three times as large as last year. Your Society has some devoted workers and contributors here, but the number and the amounts ought to be largely increased. The sales were much larger than for some years previous.

Dashwood.—This was the first Bible Society meeting ever held here. The attendance was good. A branch was organized with eight enrolled branch members as a beginning. There have been some liberal contributors here for years in connection with the Zurich branch. This branch has a large territory for collecting funds and for sales.

Zurich.—Our audience here was chiefly composed of ladies and young people, which, however, augurs well for the future success of this branch, as it is to the

devoted and earnest lady collectors and supporters that your Society owes very much of its success. All the local pastors gave your agent efficient help to make the meeting and work a success.

Mildmay.—Here your Society has a noble band of branch officers and workers. Special praise is due the ex-secretary, H. N. Schmidt, who, when the appointed lady collectors failed to do their work, himself collected nearly fifty dollars. The sales were greater than those of the two years previous put together, which we owe to our wide-awake newly-appointed depository. We had a fine meeting. The outlook for the future is good.

Elmwood.—The meeting here was fairly well attended after due announcement. The Rev. Mr. Burton, chairman, and other local clergymen aided nobly and did much to make our efforts a success. The people here take a great interest in the Bible Society's operations, as is manifest by the amount of their free contributions annually. Last year this branch had twenty-two enrolled branch members.

Ayton.—This branch keeps steadily moving on in the Scriptural line of "let us not be weary in well-doing; for in due season we shall reap if we faint not." There are some denominational barriers in this district which seem to be difficult to overcome; yet we hope the time may soon come when all will do their duty in helping to give the Word of God to all the inhabitants of the globe. We had a nice audience out at the meeting.

Milverton.—Had an interesting meeting here in the new Methodist Church. Attendance was reasonably fair. This branch through the special efforts of the local pastors has renewed its youthful vigour, and about doubled the amount of its free contributions last year. The pastors think that your agent another year ought to take the morning and evening Lord's Day services here in the two largest churches, to advocate this cause to two full congregations. Collection, \$4.10.

Sebringville.—Notwithstanding that the day as well as the evening turned out very rainy and unfavourable, we had a large and attentive audience, and the officiating pastors of the village out with us. The pastors gave your agent noble aid in making the meeting a practical success. This branch has a working secretary who will come to the aid of the collectors if need be. You may expect a good report from them soon. Collection, \$4.83.

Waterloo.—The meeting was held in the new Methodist Church. I. E. Bowman, Esq., M.P., in the chair. In view of the slush and the stormy evening, we had a reasonably fair attendance. All the local clergymen were present, gave suitable addresses, and aided your agent in presenting to the people both in German and English languages the claims of the Bible Society, and of the perishing millions who are calling on us to send them the Word of Life.

Morrison.—The weather was fiercely cold, and the evening excessively blustery and stormy, yet we were not disappointed in a fairly large audience here, which speaks well for this small branch. Although but a small territory to work, yet you have here a live and working branch doing good service for the Society.

Brestau.—This branch has a fine rural territory, and one which, if it were successfully worked up, would do still more noble service to your Society in the future. Its past records are good, but the work has been almost exclusively done, and the free contributions chiefly given, by one denomination. This ought not to be so. We had a reasonably successful meeting here.

REV. JOSEPH PHILP, B.D.—*Ancaster.*—Our first meeting was held in the town hall of this village. A heavy rain prevented a large congregation from assembling. All of the officers were at their posts, and an excellent staff of collectors was appointed to canvass for subscriptions. The books of the depository were in good condition. Glanford.—At the request of the officers we arranged to spend a Sunday with this branch. We were cordially welcomed and assisted by the Rev. J. H. Kennedy, Methodist minister, and we preached in the three churches of his charge. We had large audiences and a profitable day. Collectors were appointed for each locality, and subscriptions solicited in the public services. We expect a good financial report for the year.

Binbrook.—The night was wet and the roads muddy, but a fair-sized congregation assembled in the Baptist Church. All of the officers of the Society and ministers of the village were on hand. The address was listened to with eager attention. This veteran branch has not lost the fire or zeal of earlier years.

REV. J. W. RAE—*Eramosa.*—A very stormy night, a fair-sized audience, and an interesting programme were the marked features of the meeting in Eramosa. The veteran president, Mr. Thomas S. Armstrong, presided over the meeting. The Rev. Messrs. Marsh (Presbyterian) and Margrett (Congregational) delivered addresses. The report of the collectors was quite satisfactory.

Rockwood.—We met in the Methodist Church. Rev. D. Strachan presided. Music was furnished by a combined choir. The officers of this branch are earnest and capable men. The financial showing of this year is considerably ahead of last.

Everton.—Meeting was held in the Disciple Church. Rev. Mr. Strachan presided. Good singing and deep interest were the encouraging features. Rev. Mr. Baker (Disciple) aided us here and at Rockwood. The general tone of the work here is inspiring.

The president, Mr. H. P. Moore, presided, and by timely remarks helped much to make the meeting a success. The Rev. Messrs. Edge (Methodist) and Charton (Disciple) gave short addresses. All present seemed to be deeply interested in our Society's work. The Rev. S. B. Cook (Baptist) closed the meeting with prayer.

REV. J. H. SIMPSON—*Blake*, Oct. 26th, 1891.—The meeting, which was a very earnest one, and large for the very stormy night, was held in the Presbyterian Church. This branch, only a year old, shows good work done—and has a bright future.

Bayfield, Oct. 27th.—Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church. Stirring but short addresses were given by the president, Rev. T. G. Newton, and Revs. R. Henderson and C. Thibaudeau. Mr. W. A., whose name appeared last year as the giver of \$20, being very ill, was visited by your agent and the minister of the town the next morning; his gift was again ready, and in his will he has ordered \$1,000 to be thus given. Since the meeting he has passed to his reward above.

Varna, Oct. 29.—The meeting was much larger than last year, and far more enthusiastic; it was held in the Episcopal Church. Your agent was ably assisted by the Revs. F. G. Newton and R. Henderson of Bayfield. This branch is doing much better, having largely increased their stock of books.

Brucefield, Nov. 13.—The agent being the president of the branch, Rev. Jas. Walker, vice-president, occupied the chair and very ably assisted by address and otherwise in the meeting. The attendance was good and meeting very interesting; it was held in the Methodist Church.

Nile, Nov. 16.—The weather was very stormy, yet the meeting was well attended. The veteran president, Mr. Hetherington, occupied the chair. Your agent was again ably assisted by the Rev. E. A. Fear, pastor of the Methodist Church, in which the meeting was held.

Dungannon, Nov. 17.—A very heavy storm of snow was raging, roads and streets blocked, your agent being the only passenger by stage, yet a business meeting was held in the English Church, chair occupied by the pastor, Rev. Mr. Carey, Revs. Fairbairn and Potter being present. It was thought best for the agent to again visit the branch, which on account of three attacks of La Grippe, he was unable to do, yet a good work has been done.

Auburn, Nov. 18.—Mr. Wilson occupied the chair. The meeting, which was well attended and very earnest, was addressed by the Rev. Jas. Puller and the agent. Rev. Mr. Swan was elected president. There are very earnest workers for the Society here.

Kinburn (Constance P.O.), Dec. 8th.—Mr. J. W. King, the popular teacher, ably occupied the chair. The choir of the Methodist Church, in which the meeting was held, did good service. The meeting was an excellent one—all reports satisfactory.

Clinton, Dec. 15.—Mr. D. Tiplady, retiring president, occupied acceptably the chair, Mr. W. Robb being elected for this year. The meeting was held in Willis' Church; your agent was ably assisted by the Revs. W. Craig, B.D., A. Stewart, B.A., and J. Galloway. Emondville, March 3rd.—The aged president, Rev. Wm. Graham, ably occupied the chair; meeting held in the Presbyterian Church, well attended; reports very satisfactory. Rev. Geo. Needham, B.A., newly elected president, ably assisted your agent.

Bluth, March 8th.—In the absence of the president, Rev. A. McLean presided. The meeting held in the Methodist Church was largely attended, and ably addressed by the Rev. Londesboro, March 17th.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, very well attended. Your agent was assisted by the pastor, Rev. J. Ferguson, who in the absence of the president ably occupied the chair. Mr. Robert Scott was elected president for this year. The reports given by Mr. Adams, who is so attached to the Society, were very satisfactory.

Goderich, March 22nd.—The meeting was held in Knox Church, and by request the pastor, Rev. J. A. Anderson, B.A., presided, and ably assisted in the interesting meeting. A good spirit prevailed, and a deep interest was manifested in the work of the Society. Mr. Wilmot Smith was elected depository.

Kippen, March 24th.—This was the second visit of your agent to this branch this year, the first being on November 10; there was no meeting held the first visit on account of the very stormy evening; on the second visit the meeting was held in the Methodist Church, and very well attended, Rev. Your agent made extraordinary exertions to reach Belgrave, hoping that towards evening the weather would clear up. The energetic secretary, Mr. Bengough, entertained me very kindly. He is a strong friend of the Society, and through his laborious exertions the branch is kept in a healthy condition. The depository is in good condition and reports fair sales.

Bluevale, Nov. 24th.—The annual meeting of this branch was held in the Methodist Church. The attendance was small on account of the heavy snow-storm which was raging. The president, the Rev. Mr. Walwin, occupied the chair. The secretary read the reports, which were adopted. A new president and secretary were appointed, both laymen and ardent friends of the Society. Rev. Mr. Hartley was, as usual, the genial host of your agent, and in many ways helped to make his visit a pleasant and profitable one. A good financial report may be expected. The depository is well kept and reports good sales.

Langside, Dec. 10th.—A beautiful evening brought out a good number to the annual meeting which was held in the Presbyterian Church. In the absence of the pastor of the church your agent officiated at the opening exercises, after which the

reports were read, showing that faithful work is being done here. The depository reports small sales, but the income from collections is good.

Lucknow, Dec. 11th.—The annual meeting of this thriving branch was held in the Anglican Church. Notwithstanding other meetings were being held in the town, we had a good congregation. The Executive are wide awake men, and, with the help of a union choir, the meeting was a grand success. The ministers of the town are loyal friends of the Society. The Rev. Bernard Bryan, of Toronto, a director of the Society, was present, and by request gave a pointed and inspiring address. Your agent was hospitably entertained by the genial and efficient secretary, R. D. Cameron, Esq.

Molesworth, Dec. 15th.—To-day a heavy rain made the roads almost impassable, yet a goodly number turned out to the annual meeting which was held in the Methodist Church. The president, the Rev. Mr. Stevenson, occupied the chair. The reports were read by Mr. Watson, the faithful secretary, who has held this position for seventeen years. The records show a continuous increase in free contributions. The depository is well kept and reports fair sales.

REV. W. W. SMITH—*Elmvale*.—The collectors did moderately well last year, and two collectors were again appointed. The meeting was very small. The secretary and the treasurer are active men and much interested, but neither of the ministers were able to be present. But the branch is improving.

Minesing.—A model village; no liquor has ever been sold in it. Some fine Christian people there. A flourishing branch; \$46 collected last year. Twelve collectors appointed so as to make the work light; visit all parts of the settlement and interest a large band of workers. Meeting in Baptist Church. Rev. Mr. Baker (Methodist) and Mr. Standen (Baptist) helped us much. A good meeting.

Edgar.—In the absence of the president, Rev. Mr. Goffin (Congregational) presided. People seemed interested, but more might have been out. Wyebridge.—Here we held an extra meeting, auxiliary as it were to Midland. A very good meeting in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. Mr. Currie (Presbyterian), of Penetanguishene, who preaches at Wyebridge, also helped us. The agent surveyed the wide field of the world for nearly an hour, and the people were interested and appointed two collectors who will work in concert with the branch at Midland.

Coldwater and Waubauskene.—The meeting was in the English Church, Coldwater, with an interested audience. Rev. R. Arthur.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The attendance was good. Rev. L. W. Thom, pastor, occupied the chair. The reports read show that this branch is working up to be one of the most active branches of the Society, through the energy of the office-bearers.

Durham.—The meeting was held in the Baptist Church, Mr. J. H. Brown, president, in the chair. Rev. Mr. Bone, pastor of the church, conducted the devotional exercises. Rev. Mr. Stewart (Baptist, retired) and Rev. Mr. Burke (Episcopal) also took part in the meeting. This branch promises to give a good contribution this year.

Fordwich.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church opened since my visit there last year. The church is a credit to the congregation. Mr. P. Hepinstal, president of the branch, occupied the chair and delivered a short address. Rev. Mr. Pring, minister of the church, and Rev. Mr. Wright, minister of the Church of England, made some appropriate remarks. The meeting consisted chiefly of young people, who will no doubt become in future active members of the Society.

Newbridge.—Mr. P. Hepinstal, Fordwich, kindly accompanied me to this branch. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The night was unfavourable but the attendance larger than we expected. Mr. Adam Spence, president, occupied the chair. Mr. Hepinstal made some appropriate remarks. The returns were late in coming in last year, but they will be sent in with this year's contributions.

Holstein.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The attendance was good. Mr. Thomas Brown, president, occupied the chair and made a few opening remarks. I found that since last year Mr. G. R. Gilroy, an active officer of the Society since its establishment, has removed to Mount Forest. This branch is in a live state as the contributions show.

Mount Forest.—Your agent preached in the Presbyterian Church morning and evening, and addressed a mass meeting in the Baptist Church in the afternoon. Mr. Brownlee, president of the branch, presided at the mass meeting, and Rev. Mr. Walker, pastor of the church, and Rev. Dr. Williams (Methodist) took part in the exercises. This branch made a great advance in its contributions last year.

Waldemar.—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. It was not large, but the remarks of the president and others showed a deep interest in the work. Mr. W. P. Tolton, president, occupied the chair. It was agreed to establish a depository in connection with the branch.

REV. C. W. WATCH—Tilsonburg.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, but was not largely attended. The president, the Rev. E. Bosworth, delivered a short address. Mr. A. W. Reavely, B.A., makes a splendid secretary. This branch has one of the best kept depositories, and in this way is doing a good work. Our home was with Mr. J. Garnett, one of the oldest friends of the Bible Society in Ontario.

Burgessville.—This branch has been known as the East Oxford branch, and now wishes to be called the Burgessville branch. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The officers were re-elected with the exception of the depository. Mr. S. R. Wallace, the secretary, has held office for over twenty years. The Rev. Mr. Harryet (Baptist) delivered a short address, and the meeting was a profitable one.

Beachville.—This branch has a good president in Mr. A. Shann. The meeting in the Methodist Church was fairly attended. The depository made a good report. The Bible Society has a few good friends in this place.

Corinth.—Bad roads and sickness interfered with the meeting. The president and secretary were both sick and unable to attend. Mr. Evans, the depository, presided; an interesting meeting was held, and every arrangement made for the collecting.

Dereham.—The meeting was held in the Culloden Presbyterian Church. A very stormy night and a small attendance. There is a good staff of officers here. Mr. J. D. Freeman, president, and Mr. T. R. Wood, secretary and depository, gave good reports. I was entertained by Mr. Wood.

Kintore.—A very good meeting. The president, Rev. Mr. Munro, gave an address, also Rev. Mr. Sabine (Methodist), in whose church our meeting was held. Mr. E. J. Pearson retired from the secretariat, and Mr. J. Whetstone was appointed in his place. This branch will show a good return.

Lakeside.—Meeting in Brown's Methodist Church on a very stormy night; I was surprised to see so good an attendance. The choir greatly added to the interest of the meeting, and we had some short but excellent addresses. Mr. Sutherland, the secretary, is very active with his work. This is a good branch for a country neighbourhood.

Harrington.—Another stormy day, but we had a fairly attended meeting in the new Presbyterian Church. I found a good staff of officers at work here and an appreciative people. They are much interested in the work the Bible Society is doing in China.

REV. J. C. HERDMAN—*Nelson, B.C.*, June 6, 1892.—Nelson is the distributing point for the little mining towns, and the large mining and prospecting areas of West Kootenay, B.C. I visited this important centre on the 4th to 7th June, 1892, and found the project of having a branch of the Bible Society started there favourably received. The meeting for preliminary organizing was held in the Presbyterian Church. Mr. G. O. Buchanan, lumber merchant, was appointed president, Rev. J. A. Reid, Episcopal clergyman, vice-president, Mr. James Gilker, postmaster, secretary. May the word of God accomplish great things in Nelson.

Revelstoke, 8th June, 1892.—Times have been somewhat depressed here of late. A well attended meeting was held in the Methodist Church on 8th June, Rev. Mr. Ladner in the chair. Addresses were given by Messrs. Ladner (Methodist), Paton (Presbyterian), and your agent. A good deal of interest was manifested in the good work of the Society, and the business pertaining to the branch taken up with vigour.

Donald, B.C., June 9th.—According to instructions from the Society, I paid a visit to this little railway town, near the first crossing of the Columbia. A meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, Rev. Mr. Way in the chair. The workings of the Society were explained, but the opinion of the meeting seemed to be adverse to the forming of a branch at the present time. A good deal of interest in the important work of circulating the Scriptures was nevertheless manifest. Should mining interests develop in the vicinity, there should be an opening for a branch Bible Society at some centre in the East Kootenay country. Collection of \$3.45 taken up, and received here.

REPORT OF THE REV. J. G. MANLY, PERMANENT AGENT, FOR 1891-92.

The visitation of the westerly section was pleasant and encouraging. *Alliston*, emerging from her calamity (a disastrous fire), gave a good meeting. *Ivy, Thornton, Cookstown, Rosemont* and *West Essex* as before. *Becton* better. *Bradford*, bereft of its excellent and faithful friend, Mr. T. Driffil, and deprived by removal of its efficient secretary, Dr. Forrest, has suffered some interruption.

In the *Kingston* sections two new societies have been formed, at *Wilton* and *Wolfe Island*, and *Inverary* better formed with good attendance. Three sermons and twenty

miles' travel on the first Sunday for good congregations at *Glenvale*, *Harrowsmith* and *Wilton*; two sermons on the second on *Amherst Island*, and two on the third at *Cataraqui* with better attendance, and at *Odessa* with large. Week-day meetings at *Pittsburgh*, *Battersea*, *Inverary*, *Sunbury*, *Parham*, *Harrowsmith*, *Garden Island*, *Wolfe Island* and *Bath*, with good attendance generally. Much improvement at *Parham* in attendance and in spiritual things generally. The whole field, for the most part, brighter throughout.

Mara attendance fair; *Beaverton*, not large; *Eldon*, excellent; new life at *Sandford*; co-operation at *Frankford*; not many at *Wellington* on a wedding evening; better at *Bloomfield*. Good Sunday congregations and collections at *Cherry Valley* and *Milford*. *Trenton* a disappointment for want of audience. *Percy* good and constant. *Castleton* better organized. Pleasant meeting at *Vernonville*. *Grafton*, better than before.

Coldsprings good with ministers and people. Capital meeting at *Fenella*. *Colborne*, small but good. *Picton*, small but hearty. *Pickering*, small. *Dunbarton*, not convened for once. *Highland Creek's* time of Bible help seems not yet come. *Brooklin*, prevented by rain. Snow-storm at *Ashburn*. *Columbus*, not large. *Kinsale* and *Brougham*, the same. Good meeting at *Tottenham*, organizing a society where a former one has long been extinct. *Unionville*, good.

Stirling always good. *Madoc* small but earnest. *Moir* better. Incessant rain at *Roslin*. Good Sunday congregations at *Brighton*. Good meeting at *Shannonville* and at *Melrose*. *Deseronto* attendance small but spirited and assuring. Right good meeting at *Newburgh*. *Greenbank* good in rainy weather and heavy roads. *Prince Albert* alive and active. *Port Perry* meeting well ministered. Good meeting at *Manilla*.

Capital meeting at *Laskay*, with three ministers, and still advancing. *Keswick*, hindered by weather, requests Sunday services next year. *Temperanceville*, better announced would probably have been larger.

In the *Pontypool* branch three services, large audiences and good collections. *Flinton* meeting, reached by a hundred miles of travel, small (in not the best season as now known), but genial and interesting. *Tweed*, after calamities, promises collections. *Tamworth* attending and promising well. *Norwood* meeting good. At *Warsaw* good congregations, kind reception and good collections. *Springville* good. *South Monaghan* audience was expected to be large, but a tempestuous day of snow and wind made it small, yet very attentive and appreciative. Good audience at *Mt. Pleasant*, and at *Millbrook* increased attendance and a better collection. *Garden Hill*, at my first visit, fairly attended.

Campbell's Cross meeting hindered by political canvassing and gathering. *Goodwood*, much as usual. From cold weather but not cold hearts at *Cannington*, in colder to good *Glenarm*. Good congregations and collections at *Cambay*. Good meeting at *Fenelon Falls*. *Bobcaygeon* well attended (including all its ministers) and well reported. Better attendance at both *Janetville* and *Bethany*. Excellent at *Omemee* (after suffering from fire), and *Keene*, as always, first-class. Good congregations at *Hastings*. Good *Hope* meeting at *Welcome*. *Cartwright* affected by cold and drifts. Neither *Eaniskillen* nor *Hampton* large, but *West Darlington* better.

Good meeting at *Thornhill* and at *Richmond Hill*. Few at *Eglinton*. *Woodville* evening a severe snow-storm. *Cananville* not large. *Little Britain* good. *Oakwood* suffered from the decease of its excellent president, Mr. Jesse Weldon. *Sonya* meeting small in time of sickness. *Oshawa* better than last year, and business well transacted under efficient presidency. The *Barrie* meeting has probably not been excelled there in any respect; the audience (including several co-operating ministers) filling the large lecture-room and listening most attentively to the addresses, one from the venerable Dr. Fraser; a good collection, and collectors appointed who have done their work speedily and well.

ANNIVERSARY MEETING.

The Fifty-Second Anniversary of the Upper Canada Bible Society was held in Knox Church, Toronto, on Thursday evening, May 26th, 1892.

The chair was occupied by Sir Daniel Wilson, LL.D. Accompanying him on the platform and surrounding it were the Reverends Dr. Fawcett, of Chicago ; E. J. Stobo, General Secretary of the Quebec Auxiliary Bible Society ; Dr. Gregg, Dr. Thomas, Canon Sanson, Dr. Parsons, H. Grasett Baldwin, B.A. ; J. Burton, M.A., B.D. ; Robert Wallace, F. H. The meeting was opened by singing the hymn, "Jesus shall reign where'er the sun," after which the Rev. Dr. Parsons, pastor of the church, read a portion of Scripture, and led in prayer.

The venerable CHAIRMAN, on rising, said that he found himself in a very unexpected position this evening, having been asked by the Secretary, at almost the last moment, to preside at this meeting in the unavoidable absence of the esteemed President of the Society, Hon. Geo. W. Allan, whose letter of apology he held in his hand, stating that he had been called away from the city to-day, to pay a last tribute of respect at the funeral obsequies of a life-long friend, Sir Alexander Campbell, Lieutenant-Governor of this Province.

He expressed the great pleasure it gave him as a Vice-President, of long standing, to once more attend and preside at the annual gathering of the Upper Canada Bible Society. The Bible Society was doing a noble work, and was deserving of every encouragement. He congratulated the meeting on the work done by the Society in the past, and hoped that the efforts to be put forth in the coming year would be even more productive of good than that which had come to a close. As there were two gentlemen who had come long distances to address them this evening, he would not take up further time.

DR. GEIKIE then moved the first resolution : "That the Report as printed and distributed be adopted, and that the following gentlemen be Officers and Directors for the ensuing year : " (See page iii. for list of names). Dr. Geikie spoke of the efforts which had been made to organize District Branch Societies in this city. Seven meetings had been held, several Branches had been formed, and a few of them had so far progressed as to make collections of funds in aid of the grand object of disseminating the Scriptures in all languages at home and abroad ; and closed by making an earnest appeal to the citizens for their active co-operation in the years to come. The resolution was seconded by N. W. Hoyles, Esq., Q.C.

The meeting then joined in singing the hymn, "How precious is the Book Divine."

The second resolution was moved by REV. WM. FAWCETT, D.D., of Chicago. It was: "That the Holy Bible, as a work of literature, is worthy of the consideration and respect of the greatest intellects of earth. As a Divine revelation, it claims the acceptance of everyone into whose nostrils God has breathed the breath of life." Dr. Fawcett, in addressing the meeting, referred in eloquent terms to the greatness of the Gospel. He said that the inspiration of the greatest minds in the world had been drawn from the Holy Book. Its influence in uplifting nations and men everywhere had been sufficient testimony of its Divine origin and of the sacredness of its truths. Many men, the speaker said, had tried to do without the Bible; they had discarded its teachings, and had clung rather to so-called scientific discoveries than to Divine truths. The doctrine of evolution was cited by the speaker as an attempt of man's mind to go beyond the Scriptures, but that attempt, the speaker claimed, was utterly inadequate to explain the great questions which arise as to the origin of the soul and the existence of God. Dr. Fawcett then referred to a great convention which he had attended at Omaha a short time since, at which representatives from every land under the sun came together to testify to the greatness of God's Word. But although the Bible had spread, and would continue to spread, still it was beset on all sides by enemies who were seeking its downfall. Scepticism, infidelity, and anarchy waged incessant war against it, and used every weapon which ingenuity and malice could suggest against it. That it had for centuries withstood these insidious attacks witnessed to the Divine strength of which it was possessed.

The REV. DR. THOMAS seconded the resolution in a few eulogistic and felicitous remarks, which were heartily approved by the audience.

The third resolution was moved by the REV. EDWARD J. STOBO, District Secretary and General Agent of the Quebec Bible Society, viz.: "That this meeting devoutly recognizes the good hand of God in the evergrowing success which attends the efforts of the British and Foreign Bible Society, through its Auxiliaries, to give the Holy Scriptures a world-wide circulation; and desires to express the hope that Christians of all denominations will continue to meet the responsibility of adequately supporting this noble institution."

MR. STOBO, in speaking to this resolution, said:—

"Sir,—I esteem it a very great honour indeed, to be requested to come all the way from Quebec to share in the Fifty-Second Anniversary Service of the Upper Canada Bible Society, and also to speak to the resolution which I have just read to this meeting. We stand, sir, identified with a noble institution, engaged in a God-like and gigantic enterprise, that of giving the Gospel to every creature, no matter what be the colour of his skin or the language he speaks, and uniting Christians of all denominations in the common work of giving the Holy Scriptures a world-wide circulation.

"Eighty-seven years ago the Bible was a scarce and costly book to the labouring classes of Great Britain and Ireland, but through Christians of all denominations uniting as a Bible Society, it is now a book easily obtained, and so cheap that the poorest in the land need not be without a copy of the Holy Scriptures. Three generations ago the greater part of Europe, Asia, Africa, and the Islands of the Sea, had no open doors for the saving message—to-day the British and Foreign Bible Society is at work in every country in Europe, Asia, Africa, Australasia, the islands of the sea, and in our own fair

Dominion of Canada ; and amongst its many Auxiliaries the Upper Canada Bible Society occupies no mean place, as to the contributions made to aid the common cause, and the work done within our own wide domain. The Book of Books, through the faith and enterprise of the Bible Society, can now be obtained in 330 languages and dialects, and is circulated every year by millions by our Society and kindred institutions. In three generations there has been more done to give the Gospel to every creature than there was in the preceding eighteen centuries, and nations have been born in a day. This is emphatically the Missionary age, and the Bible Society is the loving ally of every evangelical missionary organization, and a help and a comfort to every missionary. When we review the past, and make an estimate of the present undertakings of the British and Foreign Bible Society, through its many Auxiliaries, we may, to-night, well render thanks to Almighty God for the ever-growing success of the parent Society, in its work in all lands, for to-day it belts the world ; but, sad to say, with all this success, two-thirds of the human family are still without the Gospel of the grace of God. After eighty-seven years abundant in labours, the Bible Society only stands on the threshold of its work in behalf of the world's perishing millions. I regret, sir, that I have been called upon at this late hour to address this audience, as I am expected to tell the story of Bible work in Quebec, and have come a very long distance to do so ; a big subject has been allotted me, and would require much more time than I have, on this occasion, at my command, to do it justice. But, as the Upper Canada Bible Society is our loving and generous ally in this work, its members, in annual meeting assembled, have a right, even at this late hour, to hear something about our Bible work, in what may be termed Darkest Canada.

"The Quebec Bible Society's field of operations is on either side of the mighty St. Lawrence, and on the south shore extends from the county of Nicolet to the Magdalene Islands, a distance of 800 miles ; on the north shore, it extends from the county of St. Maurice to the boundary line of Labrador, a distance of 1,100 miles ; and then, in breadth, from the State of Maine and New Brunswick on the south, to James' Bay, in the far north—a vast territory to occupy for the Lord Jesus Christ. The population of this great district is 507,076 ; of this, the Protestant population numbers 27,002, or less than five per cent. of the whole, and is to be found in little groups all over this wide district.* Their lot is cast in the midst of a people foreign to them, both as to language and religion, and who refuse to assimilate, except on the hard conditions of giving up the Bible and the English language, and, sad to say, numbers of the Scotch race have yielded to what they in their isolation have regarded as the inevitable. And now the boast is made, that Scotchmen make good Frenchmen, and good Roman Catholics, too.

"It will be seen from what I have stated that the Quebec Society has a very limited constituency to draw upon for funds to do its Bible work, even if all approved of an aggressive Gospel. If the work of Bible distribution is to be done in the district, Quebec must be helped by the parent Society, or sister Auxiliaries in Canada. The work is left almost entirely to the Quebec Bible Society, there being as yet, in the opinion of the different missionary

organizations, but few centres that offer any encouragement to a resident missionary.

"The Upper Canada Bible Society throughout nearly its whole history has aided Quebec in its Bible work, and, during the last three years, it has done this on a much larger scale, through its numerous branches, and for this increased help the Committee of the Quebec Society is deeply grateful to you, and I am here to say so. Four years ago the parent Society desired us to push the French work, and as we had not the means at command to do it, offered to supply them, if we would consent to a forward movement, and the Secretary devote his whole time to planning and supervising the work. We could not refuse the parent Society's generous offer, and this led us to make known our case to your directors, and in response we received the increased aid which your reports now chronicle; and let me here say, that for every extra dollar contributed by you, we endeavour to take one less from the parent Society, and would be delighted to have all the funds raised in Canada, and the parent Society relieved of the support of the French work in Quebec Province. I am of opinion that it would prove a real blessing to the people of both Provinces, and tend to the unifying of the races now so far apart. And the funds of the parent Society would not suffer by this patriotic effort. During the past three years and a-half the Quebec Society has employed six missionary Colporteurs and a Bible-woman in its French work, the Secretary, along with his other duties, taking charge of the English work. During this time, not to speak of our large English sales of the Scriptures, these workers have sold to French Roman Catholics 421 Bibles, 3,932 New Testaments and 2,508 Gospels, and have loaned about one-half as many copies of the Book of books.

"In a district like ours, it is not always possible to sell or loan the Holy Scriptures. The Church's authority, on the one hand, stands in the way, saying to those who would have the Book and use it, "Thou shalt not have it"; on the other hand, it is the people's ignorance that stands in the way of a larger circulation, for thousands of the population are unable to read any book, and so the only door of usefulness open is to read the Holy Scriptures to them, explaining to them God's way of peace, pardon and eternal life. The value of the Bible-reading lies in this, where it can be done, that those who have Scriptures read to them get to know how to use them, catch the sense of what is read, have the privilege of asking questions, and come to the light of the Gospel; and if they do not at once quit Rome they are lifted above Romanism. The Book placed in the family may be burnt at the Church's mandate, but its teachings received into the mind live on. The Priest cannot destroy the work of the Spirit of God through the Scriptures. The singular thing in many parts of our district is that those who know the Scriptures best are, as a rule, unable to read them, yet they understand them, and in defence of a pure Gospel can correctly quote them. Even in the British Province of Quebec, and amongst a people so polite and docile as the French people, the work of Bible distribution is no easy task, and Bible burning is no rare thing, and it is to minimize it that we now loan rather than grant the Scriptures to the poor habitant. God alone knows the hardships and petty persecutions the workers have to undergo at the hands of their compatriots, and always at the instigation of their priests, in the prosecution of their labour of love. Even in midwinter they are sometimes denied food and shelter. The people are made believe that the colporteur is Satan's agent to subvert their souls; that he offers them a bad book, a

corrupted version of the Scriptures, a translation tainted with error, a book that always makes Protestants, a people without any religion—pagans! So to save their souls they drive away from their doors the man who brings them glad tidings of good things. Three of our men this year in mid-winter in different parts of the Province, at the close of the day found themselves without food or shelter, and had to keep on the move all night to prevent themselves being frozen to death. And yet we say that there is no persecution in our day on account of the Gospel! Just try to spread the light in Quebec! Four years ago Joseph Rodrique, farmer, of the parish of St. George in the county of Beauce, through our Bible work was led to the Saviour; he then took a Christian interest in his neighbours and placed the Scriptures in about thirty-six families, the members of which he was wont to gather together in his own home for Bible study and prayer. The Curè heard of it, the families were visited by him, the Scriptures taken from them, and on a Sabbath morning after Mass, in the square in front of the church he caused a bonfire to be built, and on this he laid the pile of Bibles, the Book of books was cursed and publicly burnt, and all that remains materially of that pile of Bibles is one solitary charred leaf, driven away by the wind to be a souvenir of that disgraceful transaction in the name of the one true religion. Poor Rodrique was denounced and given the *triple* curse. His friends were forbidden to visit him or in sickness to give him aid, if they met him on the road they were not to look at him, but to turn their heads the other way, and to avoid him as they would the plague. They ham-strung his cattle, they battered the head of his poor horse so that you could not tell its shape, they threatened to place poison in his well so that he was afraid to use it. They drove him from his farm and out of the district, financially ruined, but not vanquished, for to-day he is in the United States, a successful missionary to his own people. In Quebec they burn the Bible, but thank God they dare not burn the Bible readers and those who circulate it, and yet after all it might be more endurable to suffer burning than such mean, devilish persecution. That is the dark side of the picture, but there is no picture without its dash of dark paint. In the same parish to-day there are men who witnessed that scene and have the Bible anew in their possession, and who would rather suffer death than part with it. The Bible was not burnt for naught, neither did poor Rodrique suffer in vain. In Ancienne Lorette, of the Huron Indians, thirty-six families have the Scriptures, besides several French families, and Chief Tzioui, a child-like Christian man, leads them in Bible study, and more than half the people have come over to the Gospel. In St. George de Cacouna, Temiscouata Co., more than twelve families have the Scriptures, and dear Joseph Beaulieu, a farmer, in the absence of a missionary, is their leader. In St. Germain, Kamouraska Co., the Book has found a place and is doing its blessed work, and people are desirous of being saved by way of the Gospel; and two of our men have told the saving message in the handsome new parish church, which the Bishop refuses to consecrate because the people have dared to vest their property in trustees for the church. You have all heard, no doubt, of the wonderful work of grace at Maskinonge, where my good brother Burwash is labouring, and where a Redemptorist Father last summer cursed the temporary chapel in which the people worshipped because they dared to differ with their Curè as to the site of the building. The people have met in that *chapelle maudite* for worship without any priestly leader. About forty families now have the Scriptures. About twenty heads of families have been led to the Saviour and are forever

done with Rome, and desire to make an open profession of their faith in Christ and to be organized into a Gospel Church. This work under God has been done by one of *ourselves* who has acquired the knowledge and use of the French tongue for this work, and is a revelation. We see now that if we would evangelize successfully in Quebec the Anglo-Saxon must stoop in Christ's spirit to do it.

"This work of Bible distribution, in a province like Quebec, has its secular as well as its spiritual gain. Our first work, it is true, is to lead men to Christ; but in doing that we are rendering patriotic service and saving our young country and conserving our civil and religious liberties, for the Bible in the hands of the common people is the safeguard of our liberties. It is a question, with me, whether we can appreciate salvation ourselves if we remain indifferent to the salvation of our friends and neighbours. I here hold in my hand a book which should serve as a revelation to the Anglo-Saxon mind of this Canada of ours, as discovering the accepted, divine destiny of the French race in North-East America. According to Père Hamon, S.J., the writer of this book, the French is God's chosen race on this continent, to save the other races from paganism and restore them to the bosom of the Church of Rome. The women of Montcalm, by their religious devotion and by virtue of God's blessing made prolific mothers, are to avenge the defeat of the plains of Abraham 133 years ago. Then British prowess and skill in the use of arms wrested Canada from France, now religious devotion and fertile mothers are to win it back for France from a haughty, irreligious people and effeminate race, and so redeem the land for God. In this book of 500 pages of beautiful French we have a story, a speculation and an argument—an argument sustained by authenticated facts to show that if the French Canadians increase in the same ratio that they have done during the last twenty-five years, in twenty-five years more they will be the dominant race in North-East America, and Rome's standard will float in the very cradle of Puritanism. Eastern Ontario, New Brunswick and the New England States, with Quebec as their centre, will form an independent Roman Catholic French State in a second Europe. The French at the time of the conquest only numbered 60,000; to-day they number from natural increase alone over 2,000,000. He argues that in their language and customs they conserve their nationality, and in their nationality they conserve their religion, and God means them to be a separate people to christianize this pagan country—paganized by Protestantism's Bible Societies. Hence the pertinacity of the French in seeking to retain their language as official and also the Separate Schools. In the second part of this book we have geographical, numerical and economic statements to establish the argument that the French-Canadian race is likely within a generation to form an independent State and to hold the whole of North-East America for Rome. From the parent beehive, he says, the race goes out in swarms, they infiltrate themselves into Eastern Ontario and continue onward their Western march to their divinely-ordained destiny. They cover the land. New England is conquered by the hardy sons of the North, who sweep over the boundary line as a resistless flood to establish the parish system of Quebec, the parochial school and the national societies, with the insignia on their banner, "Our religion, our language and our customs," "We are French and French always!" As under the old regime there was a chain of forts from Louisburg, in Cape Breton, to the Gulf of Mexico, so, to-day, under the regime of the Oblat, Redemptorist and Jesuit fathers, there

is a chain of French Roman Catholic strongholds, or swarms from the parent hive, all along the line of the nation's great highway, from Ottawa to Winnipeg, and on to the Pacific, manned by men of prayer, faith and fortitude, determined to hold and win the land for their race and for Rome. Every point of vantage has been seized for the Church and made a religious and political centre, and the faithful in leaving Quebec are advised as to where they should settle to find people of their own race and religion, and so they are aided in every way to work out what they believe to be their God-appointed destiny in America. You may smile and say, 'This is all a dream.' But to the French race in Canada, from their mother's knee on, it is regarded by them as a grand possibility, and every throw of the shuttle on the loom of time is completing the web of destiny, and it is to them and us a solemn reality. Under priestly education, training and guidance, they have a plan of action and the will to perform. They have religious devotion and the spirit of self-sacrifice—the patriotic spirit—and believe themselves to be God's Israel in Canaan to establish the true religion and spread the light. If they are in the right assuredly we are wrong, and if we are in the wrong the sooner we get right the better will it be for us. But we believe, as enlightened by the Spirit of God through the Scriptures, that we are in the right and Rome in the wrong, and our duty is to set her children right. We cannot easily settle things by statute, or by a trial of strength like that of the Plains of Abraham, but we can change them by giving the people a pure Gospel. If we would conserve our liberties, which our forefathers purchased at the cost of the block, the faggot, imprisonment and cruel exile, we must give them the Bible. If we of another race and another language, with an open Bible and a pure Gospel, would safeguard our liberties and hand them down unimpaired to our children's children, we must evangelize our own land from the Atlantic to the Pacific. We must share with the French race the wealth of our Christian affection, as well as give of the abundance of our means. We must make them feel that they are men, and that we are brothers, and that we love them for Christ's sake and would not rob them of religion, but bring to them more of it in its purity. If we would obliterate the strongly-marked race cleavage and unify the races, and build up in our young country a Christian nation and have a homogeneous people, we must, at any sacrifice, give them the Scriptures. If we would be saved from a religious system which is a blight to every country where it prevails, we must secure for them an open Bible, and, with God's help, win them for Christ our Lord. We must give them this Book with our heart's love and earnest prayers for their conversion to God.

'We are not our own, to live and die,
Snatching at pleasures as they fly;
We are not our own, while a mighty crowd
Cries with a voice all deep and loud:
We perish, we perish; Oh, give us bread;
Fill us and feed us, as you have been fed.'

I thank you for your patient hearing at this late hour."

After votes of thanks were passed to the speakers, and to the trustees of the church for the use of the building, the dismissal hymn was sung, and the benediction was pronounced by the Rev. Canon Sanson.
