QUESTION XXVII.—What are the Reports of the several Committees?

ANSWER:

REPORT OF THE STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee on Statistics beg leave to present the following summary of the returns :--

(1) The total membership is 24,794, an increase of 233. The present membership is made up of 1,146 on trial and 23,648 full members. During the year 2,453 persons were received on trial.

(2) The statistics of the composition of the Quarterly Official Boards show 114 effective ministers, 10 probationers for the ministry, 30 superannuates and 4 supernumeraries; 199 local preachers, 61 exhorters, 881 class-leaders, 269 Sabbath-school superintendents;—net total of membership of Quarterly Boards, 2,680.

(3) The returns show the following contributions to our Connexional Funds:-

(4) Amount raised for Circuit and similar purposes, \$104,271.23; for Sabbath-school purposes, in addition, \$12,262.24.

(5) Raised by Circuit for ministerial support, \$80,311.74; increase, \$2,111.70. Total Circuit deficiencies, \$5,396.02; total received for ministerial support from all sources, \$83,311.64;—net deficiency, \$3,446, an average of \$156 for each of the 22 brethren who suffer from deficiencies.

(6) Grand total for all purposes, \$233,636.

Your Committee are pleased to note on the whole greatly increased accuracy and painstaking in the preparation of statistics, but there is still great room for improvement. To this end we recommend-

(1) That Financial Secretaries should accept no figures of collections

except from the authoritative Circuit schedules.

(2) That the District Secretaries should be made responsible for the harmonization and revision of the Circuit schedules, especially the depart-

ments of membership and ministerial support.

(3) That the Financial Secretary and one other member of the District meeting be appointed by the District Meeting a committee to review the statistics of the District, and their summing up after they have been entered on the District Book, and certify to their correctness; and also, that after the statistics have been thus certified to, no changes whatever shall be admitted.

REPORT OF THE TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committeee on Temperance desire to report as follows:-

Whereas the influence of the liquor traffic is shown by the undoubted evidence of the records of the courts, prisons, and other statistics to be causing the loss of thousands of lives annually, as well as a large proportion of the poverty and crime of our Dominion; and having observed the beneficial effects of prohibition in diminishing drunkenness and crime and promoting the general prosperity of the people in those counties where the Scott Act is properly enforced; and

Whereas we are apprehensive that the Dominion Legislature may introduce measures which will seriously impair if not destroy the efficiency

of the Scott Act; therefore be it

Resolved,—That the members of this Conference do hereby memorialize the Dominion Legislature against passing any measure that would in any wise lessen the present stringency of the Act.

Resolved,—That we the ministers and laity of this Conference do solemnly pledge ourselves to oppose by all constitutional methods any Government, or political party, or individual member of Parliament who shall directly or indirectly oppose existing prohibitory legislation.

Resolved,—That as the ultimate power of the people to influence the Legislature is found in the ballot-box, we declare our unalterable purpose to use every legitimate means to inculcate upon all Christian men and good citizens the duty of subordinating political party alliances to the great work of securing the entire prohibition of the liquor traffic, and we further promise to endorse the above sentiments by our individual action.

Resolved,—That while we recognize that there are several noble men in the Senate who have been unswerving in their efforts to advance prohibitory legislation, we affirm our utter want of confidence in the majority of the members of that body on this question, and lament the action of the Government in filling the vacancies which occur with men who are, with few exceptions, the declared and determined opponents of the temperance reform.

Resolved,—That this Conference will unite with all other Churches and organizations favorable to our object, to demand from the Passiament of the Dominion, legislation which will give us total prohibition, and we will not cease to make this demand until we have obtained our wishes.

of those in operation are open only six months in the year. In this direction there is evidently some room for improvement, and your Committee would urge pastors to plant schools at each appointment where practicable, according to the Discipline.

2. There is an increase of 85 teachers over the preceding year, but a decrease of 97 scholars, showing that our schools are more efficiently officered; but while 286 of the teachers are not members of our Church we cannot flatter ourselves that we have reached the highest degree of excellence.

3. We rejoice to find that 770 conversions are reported as having taken place in connection with our Sabbath-schools to swell the ranks of the Lord's host; but would suggest that it would aid in the development of religious life, and establish and strengthen Christian character, if more attention were paid to the doctrines of Methodism as taught in our Catechism. We would also emphatically reiterate the advice of former years concerning the great importance of getting our teachers and scholars to sign the total abstinence pledge.

4. We are pleased to find an increase of 1,538 in the number of our own periodicals taken by our schools, and this is more noteworthy when we remember the large increase of 2,334 the preceding year; but we regret that there are still 4,003 copies of other papers taken by our schools—one school alone taking 250 copies, while none of our own are taken.

5. We also find that the increase in the amount raised for missions this year is \$318.24, the total amount being \$2,276.92. The large sum of \$12,297.42 expended for school purposes shows a deepening interest in the efficiency and proper equipment of our schools. The Sabbath-school Aid Fund shows a slight decrease.

6. Your Committee would also earnestly recommend that the schedules of each District, in detail, be incorporated in the Minutes of Conference; and would urge that greater care should be manifested in the keeping of the records of our Sabbath-schools, and would suggest the advisability of appointing godly and enthusiastic secretaries for this purpose.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Your Committee to whom was referred this subject beg leave to report as follows:—

The law of God is unchanging. It has set apart a certain portion of time for rest—a seventh of the whole period of earthly existence. "The seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord thy God; in it thou shalt not do any work." Ex. xx. 10. We are convinced that neither nations, communities nor individuals can long prosper who wilfully disobey this command.

1. The sacredness of the Lord's day is often invaded, not only by corporations and companies for gain, but also by private parties and

families for pleasure and recreation, or for the doing of those works which are neither of mercy nor necessity. We cannot favor these things and do all our duty as followers of the Saviour.

2. Street cars, and in some cases railroad trains and steamboats, are run ostensibly for the benefit of church people, but observations show that but few of these passengers enter the house of the Lord. Brethren, refuse all opportunities so afforded. Honor God and He will honor you.

3. The practice of social visiting on the Sabbath day is too prevalent even with some of our Methodist families. Especially is this the case in many of the rural sections of our work, interfering with regular attendance upon Divine service, while it consumes hours in unnecessary work and care—hours that should be spent in reading the Scriptures and in other devotional exercises. This is a deplorable evil, and calls for increased effort on our part to teach the families of our congregations that it is an intolerable perversion of the Lord's day.

4. Another evil is prevalent in cities and towns of keeping stores and shops open close up to midnight on Saturday. If there were no customers at these late hours there would be no open shops. If shopkeepers would unite and close at a reasonable hour there would be no late customers, and business men would be rested and ready for the enjoyment of the delightful privileges of the Lord's day; as it is, they can scarcely drag themselves to His house on that day.

We therefore, in conclusion, recommend a continued effort with all sister churches and organizations for the preservation of the sanctity of the Lord's day.

Further, we must keep these things continually before our own people. "Stir up their pure minds by way of remembrance."

Also, that sermons be preached in all our congregations during the ensuing Conference year on this important subject, so that, as the resolution of the late Hamilton District Meeting says, such laws be enforced and respect given as will secure to the people in all departments of life their inalienable rights in the day of rest."

to this day, never having asked nor received a cent of aid, or a subscription, or even a free advertisement in our Church paper. It has thus left the Church free to exercise its generosity and benevolence in the endowment and equipment of Victoria University; and we feel not a little pride in the fact that the first chairs endowed in that noble institution were endowed by two of our presidents, the revered Edward Jackson and Mr. Dennis Moore.

The College is well known to most of you. In accommodation it surpasses all others in the country. It has educated thousands of our young women; it has graduated over two hundred in the full College course. It has prepared a great many teachers of music and art. Its graduates are teaching both in the United States and in the colleges of our own country, even in colleges of other Churches.

The Course of Study fully prepares the student to appreciate the standard works of the day in science, literature, languages and philosophy, and the work done in the College is of the most thorough character. The Faculty have been selected for their ability to teach, and important additions will be made for next year's work.

A healthy religious influence should always pervade such institutions, as the recollections of College days are vivid all through life. In this respect we have been highly favored. Prayer-meetings and class-meetings have been well attended, and have been made a great blessing to the young ladies.

The health of the students has been remarkably good; no institution in the country has a better health record, in none are the conditions of health more completely furnished or more carefully guarded.

We graduate a very fine class this year in the full College course, and have excellent classes in music and art also. Our examination papers are prepared by outside scholars, and valued by them also.

We rejoice in the privilege of laboring with you in the great work of spreading true Christian culture, and trust that we may mutually strengthen each other's hands.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT AND TRUST FOR ALMA COLLEGE.

Through the blessing of a benign Providence we are again permitted to report to you a year of prosperous school work in Alma College. The attendance, drawn from all parts of Ontario, from New Brunswick on the east to Nebraska on the west, and representing, as heretofore, all the evangelical Churches, will reach 180—120 residents and 60 day students.

The four departments of work—Literary, Music, Fine Arts, and Commercial—each having a thorough course of study to graduation, are each receiving a large patronage from the public and affording practical as well as ornamental training to the young women who throng our halls. In the Literary Department are taught all the subjects of the public and high

school courses, the junior and senior matriculation of the Universities, and in addition selected work in Christian Evidences, Mental and Moral Philosophy and Biblical study. In this department a class is prepared each year for public school teachers' certificates and the local examinations for women.

In the Music Department young ladies are prepared by strictly classical courses of study to enter with advanced standing the leading conservatories of the old world.

In Fine Arts all the subjects of the Ontario School of Arts are taught, and in addition all varieties of painting in oil and water colors, and various kinds of ornamental work.

In the Commercial Department, in addition to book-keeping, commercial arithmetic and penmanship, instruction is given in phonography and type-writing.

The capacity of the building, so far as dormitory and class-room accommodation is concerned, has been fully tested during the greater part of the year, and the need of increased accommodation for the present attendance, as well as for future growth, urgently felt. The sum of \$8,000 has been raised in cash or subscriptions for the new building; but as the cost of building has increased since the project was launched, it was thought advisable at a recent meeting of the Board of Management to defer the commencement of building operations till the fall, giving opportunity to increase in the meantime the amount of subscriptions sufficiently to meet the increase in the proposed expenditure, and thus keep the College debt within manageable proportions. It is expected that with a successful canvass during the summer the Board of Management will feel fully warranted in beginning building operations this fall and prosecuting the work to early completion next season. school year showed the largest receipts and attendance since the opening, and it is hoped that the present year's report will be equally favorable. Steady progress has been made in the collection of outstanding notes and subscriptions, and the debt of the school will be materially reduced this season.

For rules, regulations, rates, courses of study, and staff of instructors, we refer you to our annual announcement.

We desire the Conference to elect according to the provisions of our charter a representative on the Board of Management and Trust.

GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND.

TREASURER'S INTERIM REPORT.

Requested to be laid before the several Annual Conferences, and published for information in their Minutes.

Although this Fund has been in existence since the time of the formation of a General Conference in 1874, it has never had a written constitution.

The object of the Fund, as gathered from its history, and found in the Journals of the General Conferences and in the Discipline of the Church, is to pay the travelling expenses of delegates to and from the General Conference, and of representatives to other churches and bodies who are appointed by the General Conference; to meet the salaries and expenses of our General Superintendents, and of all General Conference committees that have no funds of their own; as also to pay the expenses of transfers in certain specified cases.

The different departments of the Church, up till the meeting of the last General Conference, paid one-half of the salaries and expenses of the General Superintendents, leaving only the other half to be paid by the Fund.

The income for this moiety was derived from collections taken up from year to year in the several Circuits and Missions in the entire Church, and yet that income has always been insufficient to meet the demands, and hence the Fund has always been in debt.

The present Treasurer was appointed at the last General Conference, and the whole amount necessary to meet all the above claims in full was thrown on the Fund, without aid from any department of the Church.

Nearly all the collections for the year 1886 and 1887 had been paid to the former Treasurer, and yet at the close of the General Conference the Fund was in debt about \$5,000. The present indebtedness of the Fund is between \$6,000 and \$7,000, with large quarterly payments and other heavy special claims to be met as they arise.

The Finance Committee of the General Conference, seeing the very great responsibility involved and the large amounts to be raised, took the following action, viz. (Journal, p. 251): The estimated amount required during the quadrennium, less cash on hand, was \$30,000, or an average of \$7,500 per year. This amount was divided by them as follows: Toronto Conference, \$1,430; London, \$1,000; Niagara, \$1,000; Guelph, \$875; Bay of Quinte, \$875; Montreal, 1,125; Nova Scotia, \$400; New Brunswick, etc., \$400; Newfoundland, \$125; and Manitoba, etc., \$310. These amounts will therefore be required annually, in the estimation of the Finance Committee, to meet the claims on the Fund. The amount paid by the several Annual Conferences last year, up to the 1st of September, was about \$5,200. Now the Discipline (see p. 50) directs the officers of the General Conference "to disburse only the amount on hand for General Conference expenses," etc. I understand from this clause that the Fund is not to go into debt beyond the quadrennium. As the matter is now carried on, the largest expenditure is incurred in the payment of General Conference expenses at the beginning of the quadrennium, thus involving heavy payments for interest. What is to be done? I suggest1st. That every Circuit and Mission shall take up a large all-day Sabbath collection, and forward it immediately, through its proper officer, to the Treasurer. This will reduce the interest account.

2nd. Should there be any deficiency at the close of any year in the amount expected from any Conference, let prompt and energetic measures be adopted to meet such deficiency. It will be found easier to do this annually than to raise the whole amount at the end of the quadrennial term.

Our brethren throughout the entire Church will see that it will require united, vigorous and prompt action to save the Fund from financial embarrassment, and to enable it to pay in full the amounts needed successfully to carry on our work.

UNION CHURCH RELIEF FUND REPORT.

The Secretary-Treasurer of the "Union Church Relief Fund" respectfully reports as follows:—

The Committee, after a most painstaking examination of all claims on the Fund under the rules laid down by the General Conference, reported the net amount of such claims at \$49,010. It was decided "that the Committee had no authority to release any security now held until the money was in hand to pay the sum appropriated."

The most pressing cases were to be relieved first, and a few brethren have had small sums paid them on account of interest long past due. Others will be helped as fast as funds come in. Up to the 20th of May, 466 Circuits have contributed the sum of \$2,573.59, an average of about \$5.50 each; and when the balance of the Circuits report, we hope to have about \$6,000. It will take nearly \$2,750 of this to pay interest on loans and debts, and the balance can be applied on some of the most pressing debts. Prescott Church has been sold for \$2,700, and the balance of \$5,800 had been borrowed at 6 per cent. to pay off the mortgage, the trustees being still liable for \$1,466 on notes over the sum mentioned. Your Treasurer would most respectfully urge the appointment of a Conference Treasurer in each Conference, as it would lighten the burthen very much and advance the interest in the Fund generally.

Your Treasurer would also remind the brethren that according to the rule of the General Conference, "the collections and subscriptions must be taken in the month of October" in each year till next General Conference. There was some excuse last October, as the General Conference did not order the collection till the end of September. But there is no excuse now. ('annot we therefore do something special in October next, and reduce the liabilities at least one-half?

Let us honor God, Methodism, and ourselves by so doing.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Report of the Treasurer for the year ending July 31st, 1886, for publication in the Minutes of the Annual Conferences.

The full Balance Sheet, having been properly audited and accepted by the Board, is published in the Journal of the General Conference.

The Fund is divided into two accounts—the Capital and the Annual. The Capital Account is made up of legacies, donations, and other amounts given for the purpose of investment, the interest only being used. This account amounted at the above date to \$167,956.23, less certain unproductive assets valued at \$8,355.14, and leaving as productive capital the sum of \$159,601.09, being nearly \$5,000 over the Capital Account of the previous year. This amount is invested in mortgages, debentures, and other reliable securities, and yields nearly 6 per cent. per annum.

The Annual Account amounts to \$70,918.44. The following are the principal sources of income and expenditure at the date above specified :-

A combination of circumstances which the Board could not control left the Fund in debt at the end of the year, as may be seen from the above statement, over \$2,700.

As the financial year does not close till the 31st July, no definite report can be made for the current year. This report will be presented at the next Annual Conferences. The Book Room grant has been increased this year to \$6,000, a result that must be very gratifying to all concerned, and which furnishes an additional reason why our Book Room should be liberally patronized and loyally sustained by both ministers and members. With the assessments from Circuits all paid in full in accordance with our present law, as passed by the late General Conference, we expect to be able to meet all legitimate claims in full, and to reduce, if not extinguish, the deficiency of the previous year. True, genuine loyalty to Methodism and its institutions, and united and persevering effort on the part of our ministers and people, will place the Fund in a position in which it will be a lasting boon and blessing to the Church, and to the aged, the widow, and the fatherless.

THE SUSTENTATION FUND.

To the Conference Special Committee of the Niagara Conference:

Dear Brethren,—In accordance with your instructions to us we have, through the kindness of the Rev. J. S. Ross, M.A., obtained the following facts setting forth the amounts necessary to create a Sustentation Fund from which the salaries of ministers and probationers in the Conference may be so supplemented as to make them as follows:—

1. Superintendents of Circuits, married but without children, proposed minimum \$500.

2. Superintendents of Circuits, with a child or children, proposed minimum \$600.

8. Probationers, proposed minimum \$300.

4. Children of superannuated (not deceased) ministers—24 children, \$20 each, \$480.

The accompanying schedule shows the sum of \$4,464 will be required to bring the salaries up to the minimum proposed, and if missions are abolished in the Conference we shall require \$6.705. This would include \$20 per child of superannuated ministers. Hoping that you will place these facts before the Conference, and that some plan will be devised by which, in the near future, no minister or probationer within the bounds of the Niagara Conference shall receive less than the modest minimum proposed, and no grants shall be asked from the General Board of Missions, we respectfully submit this report.

Your Committee respectfully submit the following report: --

St. Catharines.—That the request of the Trustees of the St. Paul Street Methodist Church, to sell a right of way from the rear of their church lot, be granted.

St. George Circuit.—(1) That the request of the Trustees of the Glenmorris Church for permission to sell the same and apply the proceeds to the payment of whatever is due the Sheffield Circuit on account of Parsonage Fund, and the balance, if any, applied to the erection of sheds and improving the yard at the St. George Church, be granted.

(2) That the request of the Trustees of the cemetery at St. George,

who, in view of a Union Cemetery movement, desire permission to sell or transfer their cemetery, be granted.

Brant Circuit.—That the request of the Trustees of the Brant parsonage, for permission to sell the parsonage property situated at Jerseyville, and apply the proceeds to secure a suitable parsonage property at Onondaga, be granted.

Lynden.—That the request of the Trustees of the old parsonage for permission to sell the building, but not the stone, and apply proceeds to a new parsonage, and to add the lot to the burying-ground, be granted.

Stoney Creek.—In regard to the memorial of the Stoney Creek Circuit, your Committee submit that inasmuch as the principals in the dispute between the Stoney Creek and the Grimsby Circuits did not receive due notification of the time and place of the meeting of the Board of Arbitrators, the Conference should direct what action shall now be taken in the case.

With respect to the above it was moved by the Rev. John Kay, seconded by the Rev. C. O. Johnson, and

Resolved,—That the case of the Grimsby parsonage be remanded to the proper officers of the Districts concerned, to settle the dispute in the matter between the Stoney Creek and Grimsby Circuits under provisions of the Discipline.

Woodstock District.—In reference to the memorial of the Woodstock District, your Committee recommend the Conference to direct the immediate payment of the funds derived from the sale of the late M. E. parsonage, Princeton, to the Eastwood Circuit, to which it has been legitimately given by the properly constituted court.

Ingersoll.—In regard to the request of the Trustees of the King Street parsonage property for permission to transfer the same by sale to the Trustees of the King Street Methodist Church, to be held in trust by them for parsonage purposes, we recommend that the request be granted.

Humberstone.—(1) That the Trustees of Port Colborne Church be allowed to sell their church property and apply the proceeds towards the erection of a new church.

(2) That the Trustees of the Humberstone Church be given permission to sell their church property and apply the proceeds towards the building of a new church.

Rainham.—That the Trustees of Bethel be given permission to sell the church and apply the proceeds towards repairing Mount Olivet Church.

Fenwick.—That the Trustees of the frame church at Fenwick be granted permission to move the church to another part of the Circuit, and place it on a lot secured to the Connexion in accordance with the provision of the Model Deed.

Plattsville Circuit.—That the Trustees of the Hayesville Church be allowed to sell their property and apply the proceeds to liquidate the debt; the balance, if any, to be divided between the Bright and Plattsville Circuits, in proportion to the amount paid in by each, to be applied to their respective parsonages.

OBITUARIES.

REV. THOMAS BROCK.

The Rev. Thomas Brock was born in Bellech, in the county of Fermanagh, Ireland, in the year 1837, and with his parents came to Canada in the year 1842, settling in the township of Enniskillen. When about seventeen years of age he was soundly converted to God under the ministry of the Rev. Thos. Crews, and began immediately to use his gifts

of exhortation and prayer in leading sinners to Christ.

In the year 1858 he was received on trial as a candidate for the ministry in the then Wesleyan Methodist Church, and appointed to the Mount Brydges Circuit. In the year 1861 he was permitted to attend Victoria College, but owing to the necessities of the work at that time, remained only one year. In 1862 he was received into full connection with the Conference, and ordained for the work of the ministry. Associated with that public service of the Church there was the inner work and richer baptism of the Holy Spirit upon his heart and soul that prompted to a fuller consecration of himself to what had now become a passion and a thoroughly recognized life work, viz., the preaching of Christ and Him crucified. Henceforth, for a quarter of a century, unbroken by sickness or any other disability, he was found in labors more abundant. A diligent pastor, not merely where refinement and wealth attracted, but wherever poverty or suffering or death appealed for sympathy and help; and in the pulpits of such important stations as Kingston, Brantford, Guelph, Galt, Paris and others, a gifted, acceptable and earnest man of God. His theology was thoroughly Methodistic, biblical and never called in question. Gifted of God with a fine personal appearance, a rich and sonorous voice, great physical strength, and a large amount of energy and zeal, these gifts were all dominated and directed by the most unselfish and ardent piety. The confidence of his brethren in his integrity and uprightness was expressed by their appointment of him to the treasurership of important funds for many years; while his administrative abilities were recognized by his election to the chairmanship of important Districts for the last five consecutive years of his life. Never apparently stronger or healthier than a year before his death, he began the second year of his ministry in Paris with the most encouraging prospects; but in January, 1886, his health suddenly and mysteriously An affection of the throat (pulmonary phthisis) intrenched and seated itself so firmly as to set at nought the tireless ministry of a most devoted wife and loving daughter, and defy and baffle the united wisdom of the most eminent and skilful physicians.

The delegates who attended the Conference of 1886, in the town of Woodstock, will well remember the emaciated form, the sunken eye and hollow cheek of the once portly and vigorous Thos. Brock; but withal the hopefulness and trust that forbade to murmur, and the beautiful spirit

We parted from him there, lingeringly shaking hands with him, as across the grave, and were not surprised to hear a few weeks after of his somewhat sudden death in the home of one of his best friends in the town of Mount Forest.

Bro. Brock was a true and kind husband, and the heart of his wife safely trusted in him; an affectionate father, whose children loved and honored him. Most at home in his own home, his friends ever found a cordial welcome, and the people of his various charges, among whom his name will ever be as "a precious ointment poured forth," a wise and judicious counseller. He abhorred deceit and was outspoken in his denunciation of all shams and fraud; but his confidence, once won, was not easily shaken, and his friendship was lasting and true. Loyal to his Queen, his country and his God, he has left behind him the good man's inheritance of a stainless character and life, and "though dead yet speaketh." Such a life could mean nothing less than a happy and triumphant death. During his illness, towards the last his sufferings at times were intense; but his patience abounded and his loving trust never Expressions of praise, of confidence and joyous hope were upon his lips and in his eye to the very last, and when, on Sabbath morn, July 18th, 1886, the Bridegroom came, his lamp was trimmed and burning, his loins were girt about, his worldly affairs were settled, the rod and staff of God was in his hand, and leaning heavily upon it as he cast one long, last look of love upon his wife, his children and dear old friends he entered into rest, and "was clothed upon with his house which is from

"The voyage of life's at an end,
The mortal affliction is past,
The age that in heaven he spends
For ever and ever shall last."

REV. JOHN TOWLER.

The Rev. John Towler was a native of Yorkshire, and entered the Primitive Methodist ministry when 22 years of age. In 1843 he was sent as a missionary to Toronto. Since his arrival in this country he regarded it as his home. He labored earnestly and successfully in Brampton, Walsingham, Guelph, and other stations. The hardships of his early days were great, and it is not surprising that in 1851 his health completely broke down, and he was compelled to superannuate. For nineteen years he resided in the county of Waterloo, and then he removed to Brantford, where he lived till last fall, when he and his aged companion went to Wingham to pass their remaining days beside their son and daughter, Dr. Towler and Mrs. R. McAdoo. For the past two years his health had been gradually failing, but a stroke of paralysis was the immediate cause of his death. He passed away in happiness and peace, one of his last utterances being, "It is all peace within." The funeral sermon at Wingham was preached by the Rev. Robert Boyle, of Brampton, an old-time associate of Mr. Towler in the mission field, the text being the appropriate words: "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints." Psalms exvi. 15.

REV. FRANCIS G. WEAVER.

Francis Gorley Weaver was born in 1821, in the township of Grantham, county of Lincoln, and passed to his reward on the 19th of May, 1887. He was converted to God in his nineteenth year, through the instrumentality of the late Rev. James Spencer, in 1840, in St. Catharines, and having given evidence of progress in Christian life and Christian usefulness in the Church, he was recommended and received as a probationer for the ministry in 1843. During 1844 he was laid aside from the active work on account of sickness—the only year that he was superannuated during the forty-four years of his ministry. In 1847 he was received into full connection and ordained in the late Methodist New Connexion Church, after having given manifest evidence of his gifts, graces and fruits.

He travelled extensively as a pioneer Methodist preacher on various and extensive fields of labor, some of which were the following: Malahide, Norwich, Cayuga, Clinton, Caledonia, Meaford, Arran, Holland East, Durham, Crowland, Ravenswood, and New Credit. In his pioneer work he was eminently successful in kindling the revival flame in various places, resulting in quickened members and conversion of souls.

He had the confidence of his brethren as a lover of discipline. This was shown by his appointment to the position of Chairman of District on three occasions, in 1866, 1868, and 1874.

During the latter part of his ministry he was appointed to labor on Indian missions. He possessed certain qualities that enabled him so to adapt himself to this form of work as to succeed in this important department of mission work. His last appointment in the Church militant was the New Credit Indian Mission, on which he labored successfully for nearly five years, and from which he was called suddenly to his reward. An official meeting of the Quarterly Board of the New Credit Mission was arranged by Bro. Weaver for Saturday, May 14th, in which the Indian brethren gave him a cordial invitation to return for another year. On going to his house he intimated to his family that he was quite weary and somewhat unwell. He then made some hopeful references to his trust in the Lord, and his anticipation of and readiness for the rest that remaineth for the people of God. During that same evening he was stricken with paralysis, and sank rapidly until summoned home by the Master, May 19th, 1887, in his 67th year, and in the forty-fourth year of his ministry.

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

NIAGARA CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

TO THE

CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,-

"Grace and peace be multiplied unto you through the knowledge of God and Jesus our Lord; according as His divine power hath given unto us all things that pertain to life and godliness, through the knowledge of Him who hath called us to glory and virtue." We devoutly thank God for the prosperity which has favored our Zion during the past year. The Master's promise, "Lo, I am with you always," has been graciously fulfilled in our midst. We record with gratitude the blessed manifestations of the Divine presence, as seen in the edification of the churches and in the many trophies won for Jesus. We rejoice to know that the spirit of revival abides with us still, and that the churches, "walking in the fear of God and the comfort of the Holy Ghost, have been multiplied."

We expect you, as witnesses for Christ, to cultivate more deeply the spirit of consecration to God, and faith in the all-healing remedies of the Gospel; so that, being clothed with Pentecostal unction, it may be truly said of us, as of the primitive Christians, "The people magnified them, and believers were the more added to the Lord-multitudes, both of men

and women."

We rejoice in the fact that so few of our ministerial brethren have tallen in the field during the year, and that they, leaving behind a record of faithful service, in peace and joy were gathered home. Though affliction has rested heavily upon some of our homes and persons, we have invariably proved the abounding solace of the truths we preach, and gratefully recognize the merciful favor of Divine Providence in restoring once again to the work some beloved brethren who had been laid aside from active service,

Our harmony has not been marred by discensions, but loyalty to the decisions of our late General Conference has found few exceptions, which is a pleasing feature in the records of a Church where independence of thought and individuality of character are so strikingly manifest.

In aggressive energy our Conference is marked by a healthy increase in our Connexionial Funds, the erection of a number of commodious and beautiful places of worship, the acquisition of several suitable ministers' residences, and a large reduction in burdensome incumbrance on many of the churches. But while our successes both cheer and stimulate our

hearts, we find cause for humiliation in the fact that our increase in membership falls considerably short of that of last year, and some of our Circuits are compelled to report a decrease. Let us see to it that these exceptional cases become no more than receding wavelets of a constantly incoming tide. Our missionary income still fails to measure up to the amount necessary to give each of our missionaries already in the field a comfortable support, while many a cry for the Gospel of Jesus Christ from the North-West and Japan must remain by us unanswered for another When in contrast with this we place the growing wealth of Methodism and increasing comfort and beauty of our homes and churches, the words of the Israelitish lepers seem applicable to us: "We do not well; this day is a day of good tidings, and we hold our peace." Dear brethren, let us join in the earnest prayer that the Master may baptize us each and all with His own missionary zeal. Further, this crisis in the history of the educational institutions of our Church calls for prompt and liberal action on the part of both ministry and laity. And the scheme of College Federation decided upon by the last General Conference, after careful and protracted consideration, claims our individual and united support, even unto self-denial. We trust the growing interest among our people in the higher education of our youth, coupled with sound moral and Methodistic teaching, will empathically assert itself in a most hearty and generous response to the appeal of our Educational Secretary. With no little satisfaction have we noted the more hopeful attitude of the Temperance cause, and a stricter enforcement of the Scott Act in those counties and cities where the vote of the electors has made it law. And we trust that our people will present an unbroken front to the dastardly tactics of the accursed liquor traffic, which contends so desperately for its ursurped position as a ruler in our country and legislative halls

We sincerely hope and pray that not one of our members will so disgrace the Methodist Church as to be found directly or indirectly in league with those forces of evil which are engaged in a widespread and bitter conspiracy against the success of the Gospel in this and every land.

At this time, when so many and such plausible attempts are being made to obliterate the distinctions between the Church and the world, we cannot too carefully guard ourselves against every doubtful transaction and amusement, unhesitatingly denouncing, both by precept and example, everything approaching trickery in business, and urge the enforcement of our Discpline concerning card-playing and dancing, together with all questionable forms of entertainment; and furthermore, strongly recommend the old-time class-meeting as the best antidote to these encroachments of the world. Nor can we afford to give any uncertain sound in our disapproval of every form of work or recreation that tends to lessen the quiet and sanctity of our Canadian Sabbath.

We do not hesitate to commend once more to your patronage our most excellent Connexional papers and periodicals, feeling assured that while cheap as any of equal merit in this country, they are of incalculable benefit to our young people in confirming their affection and fidelity to the great principles and doctrines of Methodism.

But while we seek to make the Methodist Church in the future, as she has been in the past, a flaming evangel for God, let us not forget that conversion is but the beginning of Christian life, and that it is the sacred

duty and privilege of the believer to be filled with all spiritual blessing in Christ Jesus, "till we all come in the unity of the faith unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ." We beseech you to suffer the word of exhortation; be persuaded to aspire after a higher and more scriptural type of religious life. Let no interpretation of modern infidelity rob you of your vested rights and privileges in the marvellous promises of this Pentecostal dispensation. Accept, we intreat you, a whole Christ,—Christ in all His offices as your Prophet, Priest and King,—Christ as your wisdom, righteousness, santification and redemption. "We beseech you, brethren, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world, but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect will of God."


