The four candidates in the field were John Quincý Adams, Massachusetts, secretary of state; Henry Clay, Ken-tucky, Speaker of the House of Rep-tresentatives; William H. Crawford, Georgia, secretary of the treasury, and hero of the war of 1812. In the bitter campaign that followed the country was split in sections, and, as a result, none of the quartette was able to poll a majority of the electoral votes. The House in such an emergency must pick a president from the three persons receiving the most votes. Clay thus was eliminated. When Jackson arrived in Washington from his Tennessee home, he found that Crawford and Adams had a start in the post-election campaigning. Pres-ident Monroe had thrown his support to Crawford and was conferring daily with congressmen. Adams was enter-taining political leaders lavishly. Fight in the Open.

Fight in the Open. But "Old Hickory" refused to follow the same methods. Always an apostle of direct action, he instructed his sup-porters in Congress to bring the fight into the open. Then at once inaugurat-ed a fiery campaign on the floor of the House, demanding Jackson's election. Jackson, they said, had received the most votes--congressmen were in duty bound to respect the wishes of their constituents. Next, they attacked Speaker Clay. The direct charge was made that Clay, whose constituents were urging that he throw his support to Jackson, was selling his votes to Adams with the post of secretary of state as his prom-ised payment.

Famous Hockey Star Dies Suddenly in Hospital After Operation.




