(Continued from page 3) provincial debt, the obligations in, a very short time upon both of these accounts will be over \$700,000 annually, or almost is much as our total territolial revenue and in excess of what is now received from Dominion subsidies. There is a very general opinion that the province cannot afford to pay the interest upon the construction cost of the Valley railway out of ordinary revenues, and unless the effort to have the federal government take over this read interest. ment take over this road is soon successful, it will be necessary in the very near future to consider what further steps should be taken to meet this large interest charge.

Motor Vehicle Tax.

There is one expenditure of \$33,462.24 opposite the words "Motor Vehicle Law," a meaningless phrase, from which Law," a meaningless phrase, from which the public can derive no information. The explanation is, however, that this \$88,467 is part of the motor vehicle tax paid by the automobilists and \$8,467 was paid in interest upon the permanent road bonds issued, while the balance \$30,600 was pa'd into the sinking fund to retire the principal. This is the result of the new legislation to provide for permanent roads out of the motor vehicle tax, and the very first yeer \$30,000 was set aside to pay the principal. As the road bonds to pay the principal. As the road bonds which have been issued, and no doubt those which will be issued in the future, are not what might be termed "long term bonds" this wise provision for repayment will be considered the best of

men composing this commission evidently could not keep the expenses down, and when a proposal came from the hospital commission of the federal government to take over the institution for five years for the use of soldier patients, permitting the province of New Brunswick the opportunity to pay for such patients as it felt should be provided for, it was somewhat eagerly accepted, no doubt in view of the very large annual expenses, and yet with some reluctance because of the generous gift of Mrs. Jordan could not be utilized to advantage at a cost which the province could afford.

The other item is the Provincial Hospital and the proportion of cost levied upon the municipalities is of much smaller percentage than it was some years ago, because of the increased cost for each patient in these later days.

Public health.

There is a new item under the heading of "Public Health" calling for an additional expenditure of \$5,000. No one will dispute the great benefit to the publishers.

Printing cost about \$1,000 more—much less than might have been expected owing to increased wages, cost of paper, etc., to the publishers.

Two items of expenditure call for very serious attention. One of them was for the Jorden Memorial Sanitarium, \$68,036. This is more than \$20,000 in excess of what the cost was last year. 

There is an interesting item of \$1,065 for vocational education. This no doubt is but the entering wedge. It is hoped, however, that the plans of the federal government for the expenditure of millions of dollars to assist vocational education, will lighten the burden upon such provinces as New Brunswick, whose revenues can ill afford adequately to provide for such an important object.

Turning to the receipts—there is no change, of course, in the item of \$637,-976 from Dominion subsidies, and territorial revenue has already been dealt with. The fees in the provincial secretary's office were a little more than usual, while taxes from incorporated companies show a flattering increase of more than \$9,000. This is due in part, to the increase of telephone taxation, but is also due to a system of inspection and a sharper attention paid to incorporated companies than heretofore.


