



President of Austrian Chamber of Deputies Testing Electrical Machine

London, July 8—The president of the Austrian Chamber of Deputies has decided to make a trial of an electric voting machine for use in the house.

Each member will have two electric buttons on his desk, one marked "Pro" and the other "Contra." On the wall opposite the president's chair an indicator is fixed, consisting of 516 glass tablets, numbered 1 to 516. These tablets are normally dark, but when a vote is taken each shows either a white light, for "Pro," or a red light for "Contra."

Each member has a number corresponding to one on the board, and can therefor personally check the accuracy of his vote. An automatic apparatus counts the vote, and the totals are shown on another indicator. If names are required, they are shown on the glass tablets in either white or red letters. In case of a secret vote, the glass tablet indicator is switched off, and only the counting apparatus remains active.

When the train which comes from Point du Chene and connects with the Ocean Limited at Moncton arrived in the city last evening there were more than a score of persons whose indignation regarding the treatment they had received had not cooled off even after a three hours run from Moncton.

The cause for the complaint lay in the fact that they arrived from Prince Edward Island via Point du Chene, and reached Moncton in plenty of time to connect with the C. P. R. express, but were not notified of the fact and had no means of learning until after the C. P. R. had pulled out and they were condemned to a wait of an hour and forty minutes until their own train left.

Although the time of the arrival of this train at Moncton is dependant upon the time of the arrival of the island steamer and therefore does not always connect with the C. P. R., it frequently does so, and complaints to the same effect have been made frequently in the past. In the case of through passengers to connect with the C. P. R. west bound express from St. John it has been very irritating for passengers to learn that by walking across the platform at Moncton and taking another train they could have reached St. John in time to make connections and save themselves the wait of a whole day here.

It is recognized by the passengers that the railway is under no absolute obligation to advise them of such connections, but the opinion has frequently been expressed that it would be a simple matter for the officials to take this course in a case where it is of considerable importance to their patrons. the patrons of the road are not growing





POLICE CHIEF SHOT; **ACCUSES GOVERNOR**

Revolver Duel in Havana Over Club Raid

HEAVY GAMBLING FINES

Chief Riva Attacked by Governor Azbert and Senater Morales at Door of Former's Club and Shot in Head and Abdomen-Coachmen and Bystanders Also Get

Havana, July 8-General Armando liva, chief of the national police was hot and mortally wounded during s pistol fight last evening in the most crowded portion of the Prado. General Ernesto Azbert, governor of Havana province, Senator Vidal Morales and Representative Arias were involved in the fighting, which was the outcome of a raid made by Gen. Riva on Sunday night on the Asbert Club.

On that occasion a large number of members were caught gambling. They were arrested and sentenced to heavy fines. The governor complained to President Menocal who, it is understood, sustained the action of the police in enforcing the letter fo the law.

Gen. Riva, while driving last evening with his two young some steepped his

Gen. Riva, while driving last evening with his two young sons, stopped his carriage in front of the Asbert Club and caused the arrest of the doorkeeper for illegally carrying a revolver. Asbest and Morales arrived in an automobile about the same time and a heated dispute arose. Insults were exchanged and all alighted, advancing in a threatening manner. According to the stories told by witnesses, Asbert and Morales opened fire, General Riva falling with a buled fire, General Riva falling with a bul-let in his head and another in his abdo-

men.

Seeing their chief fall, several policemen ran to the rescue and opened fire, but Asbert and his friends re-entered their car and left at full speed. Gen. Riva's coachman was shot in three places and two by-standers received bullets. The Prado was crowded with promenaders, many of who were women and children. General Riva was taken to a hospital, where he made a statement that he was shot by Governor Asbert. An operation was then performed but he was not expected to survive the night.

The tragedy caused the most intense excitement throughout the city. All political clubs were ordered closed. Central Park and the Prado were patrolled by squads of police who prevented any assembling in groups. A strong force of rurales was held in reserve.


