HAS CHURCHILL LEARNED CAUTION?

No Information Re Australian Navy To Give PARKER ASKED FOR IT

"Admiralty Not in Position to Reply to Questions Concerning a Dominion Navy as if Were This Country's Navy"

(Canadian Press) London, July 8.—In the House of Commons yesterday, answering a question by Sir Gilbert Parker, as to whether the Australian government had accepted Admiral Henderson's naval defence scheme, Mr. Churchill said he regretted that he could not undertake to answer questions concerning matters under the control of responsible ministers of the crown in the dominions.

Sir Gilbert Parker, interposing: "Are you well understood that the honorable gentleman declines to ask information from the Australian government in reference to matters in which the whole empire is interested?" Mr. Churchill answered that he certainly would not decline to endeavor to secure proper information for the commons, but he was bound, as this was the first question of the kind during his tenure of office, to make clear that the admiralty was not in a position to reply to questions concerning a dominion navy as if it were this country's navy.

KING AND QUEEN ARE WARMLY WELCOMED TO NORTH COUNTRY

New York, July 8.—A London cable says: The king and queen received a real North Country welcome at Warrington, Lancashire, yesterday, when they were their first tour of nearly fifty Lancashire towns. Both King George and Queen Mary talked freely to the workers and accepted several gifts.

NEW WHITE STAR LINER FIRES TWO BIG GUNS

New York, July 8.—A cable from London says: The White Star line's new Australian steamship, the Ceramic, arrived in the Mersey yesterday after a successful trial trip, on which two 4.7 inch quick firing guns were tested at distances up to 1,200 yards. This is the first time big guns have been discharged from a White Star passenger steamship.

Fire Chief is Freed From Charge of Incendiarism

Matter Gone Into Fully Today and J. P. McAndrews is Cleared and Case Dismissed

After an examination which lasted three hours this morning John P. McAndrews, the district chief of Carleton Place, who was charged by Mrs. Letitia Leslie with setting a fire in her shed, was discharged from the court by Magistrate Ritchie on the ground that there was not sufficient evidence to warrant sending the case to the grand jury.

Three witnesses were called by the crown. The principal testimony was that of Mrs. Leslie, who was evidently sincere in her statements, but she left the impression that her conclusion as to the identity of McAndrews had not sufficient grounds.

Mr. Baxter said that when he had first heard the evidence he had been struck with the commissioner of safety and although he believed it very improbable that McAndrews had done it, he thought it necessary to hold an examination in view of McAndrews' character and testimony he felt it to be impossible that Mrs. Leslie could be right.

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TRADE DISPUTES IN CANADA DURING MAY

Ottawa, July 8.—The record of trade disputes maintained by the Department of Labor shows that it is usual at this season, the majority of the disputes occurred pending the adjustment of new wage schedules. These were nearly all of short duration. The mining industry on Vancouver Island was seriously interfered with, more than 8,000 men being out during the whole month through the continuance of the dispute at Ladysmith and Cumberland mines, and the closing down of the mines in the Nanaimo district.

A great number of the disputes of the month occurred among workers in the metal trades. The disputes of May affected upwards of 11,500 employees and accounted for the loss of more than 130,000 working days. Disputes affecting various classes of municipal employees in Vancouver and affecting also the boot and shoe workers in several of the factories in Quebec, were satisfactorily adjusted during the month through the instrumentality of boards under the Industrial Disputes Investigation Act.

THE WAR REPORTS DO NOT AGREE

At The Moment There is No Telling Which is Right

TURKEY MAKING MOVE Seems to Be Planning to Utilize Situation to Her Own Advantage—Makes Demand on Bulgaria to Evacuate Certain Territory

(Canadian Press) New York, July 8.—A cable to the Tribune from London says: It is stated in Belgrade that the total Serbian casualties in a week of fighting have amounted to upwards of 10,000 killed and wounded. The Greeks admit they have lost 10,000 officers and men. From the Bulgarian side there is no corresponding estimate, but presumably they were in proportion.

On the other hand, information which reached London asserts that the whole story of battles, stormings, desperate resistance and so forth, is much exaggerated, and that nearly as a real battle has yet occurred. Between two highly divergent statements, it is not more possible to judge at the moment than it is feasible to discriminate between the conflicting claim of victory put forward by the parties to this new war.

Turkey's Attitude The attitude of Turkey is becoming more clearly defined. It is tolerably evident that she means to utilize the situation to her own advantage. The Porte has formally demanded that the territory within the Enosmidia lines shall be evacuated by the Bulgarians, and there are even rumors that an effort will be made to recover Adrianople. Not too much reliance need be placed on this latter report, for it is difficult to see how the Ottoman army can advance beyond the 100 miles west of Enos.

He was standing on the cow catcher of a passenger train when it struck a log. He is being taken to the hospital. It is feared he will not recover.

HURRICANE VISITS THE BAY CHALEUR COUNTRY

Shipping Interfered With and Salmon Nets Damaged (Special To Times)

Dalhousie, N. B., July 8.—All Saturday night and Sunday a heavy hurricane here from the east. The S. S. Canada was unable to call at any port between Gaspe and Dalhousie. Considerable damage was done to salmon nets in the upper part of Bay Chaleur.

FORGOT ICE CHEST ON VOYAGE TO THE ARCTIC

New York, July 8.—The Crocker land expedition which sailed from here last Tuesday night forgot its ice box. What Arctic explorers wanted of a refrigerator was a mystery to the deck hands, who by some mistake, failed to put it aboard. The chest was forwarded today to North Sydney, C. B., where it will be awaiting the explorers on the arrival of their steamer there the latter part of this week.

BETTER TERMS FOR BRITISH COLUMBIA

Commission to Take up Matter in Course of Few Weeks

Victoria, B. C., July 8.—What Sir Richard McBride describes as one of the most important undertakings since Confederation as far as it affects this province will be commenced within the next few weeks with the opening of the session of the Better Terms Commission.

E. V. Bodwell, K. C., the provincial representative on the commission, will proceed to Ottawa this week to confer with Z. A. Lash, K. C., the dominion representative regarding the choice of a third member, the date of the opening sessions, and the planning of an itinerary.

At the initial session Hon. W. J. Bowser, attorney-general of British Columbia, will open the case for the province. Messrs. E. P. Davis, K. C., and C. E. Wilson, K. C., have been appointed counsel for British Columbia, and the First National Bank of Canada, represented by R. E. Gomer, is the receiver.

SUFFRAGETTES DESTROY COUNTRY RESIDENCE OF SIR WILLIAM P. LEVER

Valuable Paintings Are Burned in Flames Which Consume Bungalow

London, July 8.—An "arson squad" of militant suffragettes set fire to and caused the destruction of the country residence of Sir William P. Lever, the founder of Port Sunlight and the chairman of the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine, early this morning.

The damage to Sir William H. Lever's residence amounted to more than \$100,000. Miss Sylvia Pankhurst, daughter of Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, suffragette leader, was brought up in the Bow street police court today and found guilty of inciting people to commit disorders on June 28 when she led a mob to Downing street to raid the official residences of the premier and the chancellor of the exchequer.

THREE YEARS CLAUSE IN THE FRENCH ARMY BILL IS PASSED

Paris, July 8.—The chamber of deputies last night adopted the clause in the army bill embodying the principles of three years military service. The vote was 339 to 223. It now appears certain that the government will secure the passage of the entire bill without difficulty.

PIERCE FIGHTING CONTINUES IN THE BALKANS

London, July 7.—The most important news from the seat of war today is the appearance of a large Bulgarian force at Veras, threatening the Serbian line of retreat. Still more significant, as tending to confirm the belief that the Serbians are suffering defeat, is the announcement from Belgrade that only meagre reports are being received from the Serbian army headquarters and that the government has decided to publish reports only on matters of special importance.

LITTLE HEIRS TO GREAT ESTATES

Immense Fortunes Some Day For These Kiddies

BROAD ACRES, LARGE BANK ROLLS

In One Case Property Comprises 466,000 Acres, Mostly in Scotland — Another Will Inherit 720,000 Acres — A Quarter Million Real Estate

(London Tit-Bits)

Who is the luckiest youngster in the kingdom? Examination of the peerage reveals many interesting cases of boys of tender years who will one day inherit immense fortunes, and great family honours, the most fortunate, perhaps, being the five-year-old Earl of Arundel and Surrey, the son of the Duke of Norfolk, who is heir to both his father's and mother's estates.

The duke is one of London's great landowners, owning a considerable slice of the southeast side of the Strand, and according to a competent authority, his estate is valued at £2,000,000.

Scotland's Wealthiest Peer A year previous to the birth of the Earl of Arundel and Surrey a son was born to the Marquis of Blandford, who is called, whose father left the enormous fortune of £6,000,000.

Two more instances of vast fortunes which will descend to lucky youngsters, not only from their fathers, but also from their mothers, are afforded by the cases of the Marquis of Blandford, son of the Duke of Marlborough, who is now sixteen years of age.

Quite a number of heirs to large estates were born in 1894, the same year as the Prince of Wales, and such names as Lord Whitecliff, grandson and heir, after his father, to the dukedom of Buccleuch and Queensberry, occur one readily.

Among the most illustrious names of heirs born in 1895 is that of the Marquis of Hartington, son of the Duke of Devonshire. His inheritance will number some of the best-known estates in the country. The acreage the duke owns is 198,572, the annual value of which is £180,750.

DOVERS FOR POST OFFICE GIRLS Cost Britain \$125,000 Last Year for Brides

London, July 6.—When Hon. Herbert Samuel, the postmaster-general, presented his estimates to the House of Commons recently, he did not make any mention of the part that Cupid plays in the vast organization of which he is the head, and what the God of Love costs the state every year.

Every girl in the post office receives a dowry from the government when she gets married, the amount varying according to her length of service. Last year the sum spent on such dowries was £225,000. On the establishment of the post office there are upwards of 14,000 women; but a year or so ago there were at least 30,000 more filling what is called "unestablished" situations (some of them employed only for a portion of the day). Since the National Telephone Company's system was transferred to the state, however, a great many more females have become government servants, and as that evidently means more dowries the sum estimated for dowries for 1913-14 has been increased to £280,000.

Hundreds of post office girls get married every year. And why shouldn't they? In 1907, for instance, the postmaster-general's report says that the number of women who "retired on marriage" was 229, with an average age of twenty-seven years. In 1908 the marriage market was brisker, for no fewer than 418 women, with an average age of twenty-eight years, quitted the service of the post office to become wives and mothers.

LADY SACKVILLE WINS CONTEST FOR \$2,500,000

London, July 7.—The great estate which the late Sir John Murray Scott, the eccentric millionaire and art connoisseur, inherited from Lady Richard Wallace will be disposed of in accordance with the terms of his will, made in 1901, and of the five counties giving more than half his property to Lord and Lady Sackville, who succeeded the Sackville-Wests as tenants of the famous country seat, Knole Park, Seven Oaks, Kent.

The jury of the probate court, where the suit has been in progress for eight days, pronounced a verdict today upholding the will. After only ten minutes' deliberation the jury decided that Lady Sackville was guiltless of the charges of fraud and undue influence brought against her by members of the Scott family, and cast the burden of the costs of the suit, which will be extremely heavy, on the late baronet's relatives who contested the will.

Lord and Lady Sackville will obtain about \$2,500,000 of the \$5,000,000 of the testator's property, including some of his magnificent art collections.

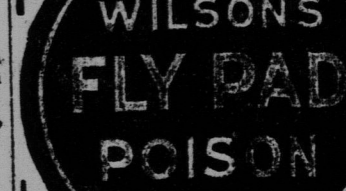

Daily Hints For the Cook

NUT GINGERBREAD Cream together 1-2 cup of butter, 1-2 cup lard and 1 cup of sugar. Add 1 cup of good molasses and 1 cup of sour cream; (1 cup of sour milk may be used in place of the cream). Beat thoroughly, then add 1 tablespoonful of ginger, 1 teaspoonful of cinnamon and a cupful of nut meats that have been cut into small bits. Dissolve a small teaspoonful of soda in a little lukewarm water and stir in. Use enough flour to make a stiff dough that can be rolled. Flour the pastry board well and roll out to the thickness of about an inch (if you do not wish a thick cake). Cut into squares and cover the top with chopped nuts and a little sugar. Bake in a quick oven. If desired an egg or two may be added to the batter, but it is plenty good enough without.

POLICE CHIEF SHOT; ACCUSES GOVERNOR

Revolver Duel in Havana Over Club Raid

HEAVY GAMBLING FINES

Chief Riva Attacked by Governor Azbert and Senator Morales at Door of Former's Club and Shot in Head and Abdomen—Coachmen and Bystanders Also Get Bullets

Havana, July 8.—General Armando Riva, chief of the national police was shot and mortally wounded during a pistol fight last evening in the most crowded portion of the Prado. General Ernesto Azbert, governor of Havana province, Senator Vidal Morales and Representative Arias were involved in the fighting, which was the outcome of a raid made by Gen. Riva on Sunday night on the Asbert Club.

On that occasion a large number of members were caught gambling. They were arrested and sentenced to heavy fines. The governor complained to President Menocal who, it is understood, sustained the action of the police in enforcing the law.

Gen. Riva, while driving last evening with his two young sons, stopped his carriage in front of the Asbert Club and caused the arrest of the doorman for illegally carrying a revolver. Asbert and Morales arrived in an automobile about the same time and a heated dispute arose. Insults were exchanged and all alighted, advancing in a threatening manner. According to the stories told by witnesses, Asbert and Morales opened fire. General Riva falling with a bullet in his head and another in his abdomen.

Seeing their chief fall, several policemen ran to the rescue and opened fire, but Asbert and his friends re-entered their car and left at full speed.

Gen. Riva's coxswain was shot in three places and two by-standers received bullets. The Prado was crowded with promenaders, many of who were women and children. General Riva was taken to a hospital, where he made a statement that he was shot by Governor Azbert. An operation was then performed but he was not expected to survive the night.

The tragedy caused the most intense excitement throughout the city. All police clubs in front of the Asbert Club and the Prado were patrolled by squads of police who prevented any assembling in groups. A strong force of rurales was held in reserve.

General Riva is an officer of the regular army. He was appointed chief of the national police by President Menocal and re-appointed by President Menocal.

GERMAN WIRELESS A SUCCESS, SAYS AGENT

Engineer Mayer at Tuckerton, N. J. Tells of Messages in Daytime

850 FOOT TOWER GOING UP

Company Declared to Have Backers—New Features Described.

(New York Sun.) Tuckerton, N. J., July 8.—Zeil Mayer, chief engineer of the German company which is building an 850 foot wireless tower here, confidently tonight the Sun's cable from London that wireless messages sent with Dr. Rudolf Goldschmidt's apparatus have been received from Germany.

The messages were sent from the company's 800 foot tower in Neustadt, near Hanover. They came in clear cut, three times a day, with hardly a missing word in the whole lot. They were sent at a slow rate.

Mr. Mayer will sail for Germany in a few days to arrange further experiments. These will consist in sending and receiving 800 words a minute.

The company back of this new transatlantic wireless believes it has mechanism that will enable it to send and receive twice as fast as the Marconi and Telefunken systems, both of which do business overseas. It expects to send at a rate as low as 8 cents a word. It promises a degree of secrecy and freedom from interference with messages hitherto impossible.

One of the remarkable features of the last few days in that the messages received here came in the daytime, the most difficult period for long distance wireless work. The many electric storms here in the past week made it inadvisable to test the tower at night, which is not in shape to send.

Dr. Goldschmidt's radiograms, all of which were short, were acknowledged by cable. They came in the form of greetings, and were in cipher. They were received by Mayer and two assistants.

The tower which received them is 650 feet high and when finished will be 850, the tallest in the world. It is being carried to so great a height solely to make possible the sending and receiving of messages not only between Europe and America but between America and Asia, South America and perhaps Sydney, Australia.

It is said that with three or four of these large masts the German company expects to belt the world. The German company is the Hoch Frequenz Maschinen A. G. of Essen, Prussia.

It has German and French backers and English and American associates. The company has succeeded quietly, but this is said to be due to a desire not to announce itself until it is ready for business. That may be in a year, hardly sooner.

A New York representative is at 150 Nassau street. On the door of that office, it is said, only his name, Mr. Lemko, appears.

The \$2,000,000 stock of the original company is in private hands and the \$5,000,000 capital of a company soon to be formed in London is said to have

How confident the backers are is shown not only by the completion of the costly German tower and plant but by the way in which more than \$1,000,000 is being spent to erect a slender steel mast in the swamps below Tuckerton.

Marsh ground was picked because water is a first class conductor. Work began last fall and has been pushed ever since. The tower itself may be complete a month hence.

Tuckerton is a village in the New Jersey pine lands. The residents have been stirred for months by the mysterious mast going up in the swamp with steel beams and other material swelling the receipts of the Tuckerton railroad beyond all precedent. They say that the German company with the same name and longer purse was a god-send last winter. When farming and other work of the town was out of the question 180 men of the neighborhood were employed in the swamp at \$2.25 and \$2.50 a day.

WHITE PLAGUE IN MILLS SPREADING

Dr. Perry in Report to U. S. Government Shows Ravages of Disease in New England.

"Tuberculosis is increasing among women and children working in the cotton mills of New England," says Dr. Arthur R. Perry of Boston, who has just made an exhaustive report on New England mills to the United States government. "I have undertaken to secure the most accurate information obtainable respect-

ing the death hazard to females and children, incident to work in cotton mills, as compared with the corresponding hazard among individuals of like age engaged in other occupations," says Dr. Perry. "The study was carried out in Fall River, Mass., Manchester, N. H., and Pawtucket, R. I. These are the three largest cotton manufacturing cities in New England."

"Upon careful investigation I have found that tuberculosis is the most prevalent ultimate or immediate cause of death among those who work in cotton mills in those cities."

"It has also been found that the Irish in each age, sex and occupation group, almost without exception, presented a higher death rate in these cities than any other race of people."

"It seems hardly open, after this study, to doubt that operative work predisposes to tuberculosis and that its effect in this direction is greater among females than among males."

Andrews' Chat About the Boxers

Johnny Coulon's Hard Luck—A Promising Featherweight—New Boxing Bill—Sad Ending of Career of Once Star Lightweight

(By T. S. Andrews) Milwaukee, July 6—Johnny Coulon, the bantamweight champion, has had his share of hard luck in the last year. The little fellow was in a position early last fall to clean up a snug fortune during the winter season, but owing to illness he was obliged to take a six months' lay-off and lose at least \$3,000, which makes a nice total gone to waste. It was not lack of courage that made the little fellow lose the coin and matches, for he is a game to the core and never comes off fighting.

Just at a time when he was getting on his feet, he was hit by a bad cold, which he has not yet recovered from. He took the match with Frankie Burns at Kenosha, Wis., to try himself out on a championship bout with Williams on the coast, and though he was not just satisfied with his condition and showing he had made some progress, he went on with the Williams match. On top of this Johnny is hiked to the hospital in Chicago and notified by the doctor to keep quiet for two weeks at least, so that the match for July 29th is impossible. Johnny now asks for a postponement until Labor Day, when he says he will be ready to meet the Baltimore boy and fight for the title with Kid Williams to see if he can meet the Kid in a championship match and settle the question.

Fighting Featherweight

There is a young featherweight down east who must be a pretty nifty boy with the gloves. His name is Joe Goldberg and he hails from Rochester, N. Y. The other night he knocked out Kid Julian, the Syracuse featherweight, in four rounds. Now any lad that can turn out a knockout like that will be pretty near the top class, for Julian is a pretty clever and husky featherweight himself. He has a right to be proud of his feat, including a knockout of Joe Coster, who was considered a championship caliber not long ago. The Goldberg boy is not an accident, for he has been fighting all the good boys around New York state, and has been showing improved form right along. His final victory being over Julian. His manager, Jack Carey, thinks he is ripe for all the big money in the class and will be he will soon be ready for a clash with the champion, Johnny Kilbane. Julian is a real contender, and he will be a real consideration come-back for the Syracuse lad to get into the running again.

Kid Graves, the former Milwaukee lightweight, who has developed into a great admirer of athletics of all kinds, regarding his alleged fight with Tommy Dixon in Nebraska. "You can say for me," writes the Kid, "that I have not been away from the east for the past eight months and the Kid Graves who has been coming out as some featherweight, as Dixon is also a 122 pound boy. The report, however, is entirely wrong. I have done no good boxing since I have written the best of the eastern welterweights and I am now out to get one in the country, including Ray Brington, for the championship. I intend to visit the middle west this coming season and will endeavor to have it out with the best welters for the title."

Wisconsin Bill

The passing of the Hedding boxing bill by both branches of the Wisconsin legislature must be gratifying to the boxing fans of the state and to J. A. Hedding himself. The latter, like Senator Frawley of New York state (father of the New York boxing bill), has been a great admirer of athletics of all kinds, including boxing, and he made the grandest kind of a fight for the passage of the bill, once he took hold of the matter. Mr. Hedding was one of the stars of the baseball nine at Wisconsin and he has mixed in all the various lines of sport, so that he knew what he was talking about when he tackled the boxing bill.

The bill which legalizes boxing in Wisconsin, is drawn after the New York bill, although there are several amendments to it—all of which should help the game. The sizes of gloves are graduated according to the weights of the contestants. For instance, boxers under the 128 pound class must wear nothing under five ounces, while those under the middleweight limit of 168 pounds, must don six ounce gloves, or over, and those above the middleweight limit must wear nothing less than seven ounce gloves. It is a sensible move and will not hurt the game in any way. BANGOR MEN AND THEIR PLANS FOR THE TEAM

As a result of a conference held by the directors of the Bangor baseball association Monday it has been decided to take steps to strengthen the local team in the Maine-New Brunswick League and to do this as it should be done. Consequently the association is sending out to the loyal baseball fans of the city an appeal for more money, which must be forthcoming before the plans of the association can be carried out.

"With the new schedule calling for games every day, the team will be practically self-supporting," said a director of the association, "and it is the responsibility of the directors to see that the team is able to meet the expenses of the season. It is the extra expense which requires the financial assistance which is now being asked. Contrary to an impression which appears to have been somewhat created, the directors draw no pay. They are giving much time and consideration to the matter and every cent that has been contributed will go directly into the treasury of the club and be accounted for."

"We have at present the nucleus of a permanent team, but it is still lacking satisfactory men in several positions. We have a number of strings drawing and believe that we can land the right men. The games on the 10th and 11th showed our weakness in the pitching department. This we are endeavoring to remedy. We have three new pitchers, possibly four, for tryouts this week. Pitcher Phinney, who for us at St. Stephen Saturday, gives good promise. Stormwetter, who undoubtedly a good man, will join the team at once and a pitcher from the provinces will join the team in St. John.

"What we want now is money to carry out our plans and if the people who have assured us that they would help, will come forward as many have promised to do, we shall be able to put Bangor on the running with the other cities. It should be a matter of local pride and for the future of the game.

"It isn't so much a question as to whether the Bangor team is winning or losing just at this particular time, but to establish baseball on a permanent footing in Bangor. We must look to the east for baseball as New England league ball or even a Maine league is out of the question. The New Brunswick and Maine league is the only solution, and I think that all the baseball-loving public will agree that this league thus far has furnished a fine article of baseball.

"We started with a big handicap. It was late in the season and the three other teams were made up and working out before Bangor signed its first man. We had less than a week to get a team
