# BOARD OF FRENCH EVANGELIZATION 

OF THE<br>PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA

In presenting its annual report the Board would call special attention to the fact that recent and current events show the urgent necessity of prosecuting the work of French Evangelization on a much larger scale, and with much greater faith and courage than heretofore. Romanism is nndeniably strengthening itself in many ways, and becoming alarmingly aggressive on this continent. Its wealth and various sources of revenue are being greatly augmented, and its organization perfected by the appointment of Bishops, Archbishops, and Cardinals to direct the efforts of a vast army of priests, nuns, and friars, so that its ecclesiastical and political power can scarcely be estimated. The restoration, by the reigning Pontiff, of the Society of Jesus to its original status in the Church, and its incorporation for religious and educational purposes by the Legislature of Quebec, are steps full of peril to the morality and the civil and religious liberties of the Dominion. It is matter of history that this order was suppressed in Canada, and their property taken possession of by the Crown; but since their return in 1842 they have steadily increased in numbere and influence. In 1847 they established the College of St. Mary's, in Montreal, which has now about 450 students, and they have since extended their labors to the cities of Quebec, Three Rivers and Guelph; to the shores of Lake Superior and Lake Huron, the Island of Manitoulin and the region of Temiscamingue. The power conferred upon them for acquiring and holding property in vatious forms is practically unlimited, and is sure to be used with the utmost energy and skill so as to absorb in a larger degree than ever the resources of the country. It is well known that their mission is chiefly educational; and no one conversant with their standard theological and ethical writings can hesitate to pronounce these impure and corrupting; and yet such principles are not only assiduously inculcated in Colleges and Seminaries but also made to permeate the whole system of elementary education in the Province of Quebec. And to such a degree is the influence of their teachings already felt that eminent advocates do not hesitate to ascribe to it the great and increasing difficulty in getting witnesses to speak the truth and to regard the sacred obligation of a judicial oath. Hence the recent attempt to give it additional solemnity by an Act of Parliament enforcing the use of crucifixes in court houses and elsewhere. It is to be regretted that the aggressive movements of Rome are greatly facilitated by the incessant endeavors of political parties to secure and retain the support of Romanists, and by the course followed by a large section of the nominally Protestant press in being scrupulously silent regarding all that makes against the tactics of the Hierarchy, while outspoken in commending certain of its doings and in denouncing as narrow bigotry the efforts of those who oppose them. Is been, be acknowledged that owing to ignorance of what Romanism is, and always has been, and through self-interest in various forms, Protestant sentiment has in some instances become so weak that not a few contribute funds to the support of popish institutions and openly or secretly countenance raffles and lotteries for the same purpose. Some even go the length of frankly avowing their opposition to French Evangelization, ostensibly upon three grounds, namely : first, that it breeds strife and bitterness between the French and English nationalities; second, that it hinders a great reformation movement from within the Romish Church and third, that it is an insult which we ourselves would resent were colporteurs and missionaries from Rome sent among our people.

These reasons, it is believed, viewed from a christian, patriatic or historical standpoint are untenable. As to fomenting strife and contention, that is no part of our mission. We repudiate the insinuation; but we do not forget that when Jesus and his Apostles preached the gospel, and pressed it upon Jew and Geatile, they were charged with the same offence
and declared to be guilty of stirring up sedition and turning the world upside down Our experience, therefore, is truly apostolic in this respect, and the zeal of our messengers has been so intense, in some instances, as to cause them to be stoned or imprisoned. Nor sre we dismayed by opposition; because the degree of resentment encountered is often the clearest proof of the necessity, the wisdom, and Divine authority of the work undertaken. And surely the policy of peace at any price in presence of dense spiritual ignorance and aggressive superstitions is not that which was followed by the reformers of other days, and which is to be deemed worthy of a great church and people, who claim to continue the work and honor the memory of Luther, Calvin, and Knox. "First pure and then peaceable" is the old rule, which is still in force.

As to leaving Romanism alone in the hope that a great spiritual movement will thus come from within the church, we know of nothing in scripture or history to warrant such a belief. Error does not cure itself by being allowed to enjoy unbroken repose. It is rather like sin and sinners, when not acted upon in way of restraint from without and above, it waxes worse and worse. Spain, Mexico, and other Romish countries have as mater of act been left for centuries very much in the condioniling to wait? That which is dreamed of spontaneous reformations for which some are wing to wait which is dreamed of as the right thing and certain to happen in future has not occurred in the past. Heformation has hitherto been the fruit of the gospel clearly and lovingly presented to the human heart and sent home with saving power by the Spirit of God; and the men of Luther's day were successful as reformers only in the measure in which they held forth and held fast the word of life. But is this attitude of waiting and doing nothing compatible with an enlightened appreciation of the truth, and of the dangers to which men are exposed who are destitute of it? Is it thus that we manifest our sense of the value of their souls and prove ourselves to be heralds and witnesses for Jesus Christ? Besides, those who ask us to leave Romanism ast, and is not doing so to-day throughout not leave us alone. It has not done so in the nothing of political intrigue, of which no one will venture to exonerate the Jesuits, it is notorious that priests and prelates habitually thunder against our faith and our Bibles as utterly false, and, therefore, on the ground of self defence and self preservation, we are bound to act as we do, unless, indeed, we are ready to confess before God and man that the faith which we hold is to us a matter of such little moment that we care not whether it is maintained or destroyed. Finally, as to the work of our Colporteurs and Missionaries being an impertinence. The unsupported assumption here is that they are sent to do what is unnecessary, and to do it in a wrong spirit and method, in an insulting manner; all of which we deny. How can it be an insult to offer our most highly prized possession, the Gospel, to any one? It is most necessary that superstition and spiritual bondage should be broken up by a full and clear presentation of God's message of love and freedom to all men. This is all that we charge our agents to do, and if the teaching of the simple Gospel to those who are ignorant of it is an impertinence which should be resented, then we must plead guilty; but if, on the contrary, it is a work stamped with the approval and enforced by the command of the Son of God, then instead of being blamed and censured for it, we justly expect to be heartily supported by all who love and serve Him

## COLPORTAGE.

While all the missionaries and teachers are expected to do what they can to place copies of the Scriptures in the houses of their respective districts, the Board employs a class of men whose time and services are given exclusively to this work. Specific fields are assigned to these men, generally one or more counties, and those they are expected thoroughly to canvass, with a view of supplying the French families, willing to receive it, with a copy of the Word of God, and to converse with them on religious subjects. This work has been carried on to a greater or less extent for the past forty years, so that there is not now a single county in the Province of Quebee that has not been visited by Colporteurs of our own or simitar societies. In not a few of the homes in dense Roman Catholic settlements the Bible is . is not an unusual thing for several of the neighbours to meet together on the Colporteur's visit, and to spend hours in plying him with questions and in listening to his exposition of God's truth. While fear of persecution and other motives prevent many French Canadians from severing their connection with the Church of Rome, there are not a few, scattered
throughout nearly every county, who read and love the Gospel, and to whom the visits of the faithful Colporteur are of inestimable value. R aalizing the importance of this self-denying work, the Board is most anxious to increase the staff of Colporteurs. Formerly, the great difficulty was to obtain suitable men for the work ; now, however, there are at the disposal of the Board the services of more men than they have the means to employ. During the past year eighteen Colporteurs were employed, either in whole or in part. These distributed 1,715 copies of Scripture, $\mathbf{1 7 , 1 6 0}$ French tracts and pamphlets, and visited 38,167 hopses. Adding to this the number distributed by the other Missionaries of the Board, the total distribution for the year was 3,355 copies of Scriptures, and upwards of 26,400 pamphlets and tracts, being largely in excess of the distribution of any preceding year. A gratifying feature of the circulation is the large number of copies sold, the receipts from sales by the Colporteurs amounting to nearly threefold that of any former year. Besides the Province of Quebec, four of the Colporteurs spent the whole of last summer in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, and two laboured for the greater portion of the year in Eastern $\theta$ ntario. The following were the fields occupied, together with the Roman Catholic and Protestant population in each :-

## MISSION SCHOOLS.

French Protestants in the Province of Quebec are placed at a great disadvantage in the matter of education. Comparatively few in number, and often separated from each other by a considerable distance, they are unable to comply with the conditions necessary for organizing a dissentient school, and are compelled to send their children to the public school of the district, for the support of which they are taxed. The public schools are entirely under the control of the Romish hierarchy, and are little better than nurseries for the training of children for their first communion. Under these circumstances, the Board is exceedingly anxious to establish Mission Schools for the education of the children of our converts, and such of the Roman Catholics as choose to attend. Even in districts where the Protestants are sufficiently numerous to comply with the law for the establishment of dissentient schools, they are often unable to raise the amount necessary for the erection of a school building and the maintenance of a teacher. In such cases, the Board sends teachers and makes small grants towards their support.

This important department of our work shows a gratifying improvement from year to year. Four years ago there were reported thirteen schools, with five hundred and thirtythree pupils. The number has since doubled, there being now twenty-nine schools, with thirty-four teachers and nine hundred and five pupils. There has been an increase in the past year of four schools and one hundred and one pupils. Two huitired and ninety of the pupils are the children of Roman Catholic parents, the great majority of the others being from the homes of recent converts. Four of the schools are wholly supported by the people of the district. The Board has recently been compelled for the present to decline applications from four other districts desiring teachers, because of its inability to meet the necessary expenditure connected therewith. last year the sum of $\$ 3,262$ was expended in the maintenance of the Mission Schools, exclusive of those at P'ointe aux Trembles.

## POINTE AUX TREMBLES SOHOOLS.

Owing to impaired health, it was feared that Miss Cairne, the directress of the Girl's School, would be unable to take her place last session. In the good providence of God, however, those fears were disappointed. Arrangements were made to relieve her of part of her work, and her services were thus secured for the session. The Board and the Church are most fortunate in having such a staff of earnest, faithful teachers at Pointe aux Trembles. Messrs. Bourgoin and Wotier, Miss Cairns and Miss Bouchard are an inseparable part of the Institution. Their zeal and fidelity in the discharge of their duties, their love for the work and their self-sacrifice in seeking to promote it, are most worthy of commendation. Of the other teachers-Miss and Miss Lillie Lamb-who have more recently been connected with the schools, the Bourd can also speak in terms of high praise. All havê worked together in the utmost harmony, and with a single eye to the furtherance of the interests of the schools. The session has been one of more than ordinary interest. The buildings have been filled to their utmost capacity, the pupils numbering 120, as compared with 94 the preceding session. The policy of the Board has been to induce the most promising of the pupils to continue their attendance for a number of sessions in succession, with a view to their being qualified to fill higher positions, and thus to further the work of French Evangelization. This policy is now bearing fruit. In no previous year were so many former pupils in attendance, and the schools were never, perhaps, in a more efficient and satisfactory condition than they are now. Fifty-five of last session's pupils are members of the Church, twenty-eight of these having this year professed their faith in Christ for the first time. Of these twenty-eight, twelve were Roman Catholics when they entered the schools. Fourteen of the senior pupils are this summer employed as colporteurs or Mission teachers, and four, if not five, of them purpose entering the Presbyterian College, Montreal, next Fall, with a view to study for the ministry. Four of the students (one of whom took the gold medal) who graduated at the college this spring, and were licensed to preach the Gospel last month, were French Canadians, who received their preparatory training at Pointe aux Trembles. A former pupil, now a missionary in Africa, recently wrote, asking admission to the schools for two of his converts, who desired to prepare themselves for Christian work.

The Church has good reason to thank God for the Pointe aux Trembles schools. That the work done is being appreciated by our people is manifest by the large and yearly increasing number of scholarships given by congregations and Sabbath schools, as also by private individuals. As has been stated from year to year in the reports of the Board, the average cost of each pupil is about $\$ 50$ per session. To the congregations, or schools, or individuals contributing this amount a pupil is assigned, concerning whose progress reports are sent from time to time. In this way, a Sabbath school contributing a scholarship is put directly in communication with the mission school, and the letters, if read publicly to the Sabbath school children, tend to keep alive their interest in the work. Moreover, the Sabbath school can, every Lord's day, remember in its prayers the pupil it supports, and can scarcely fail to receive benefit by being thus directly brought into contact with the pupil educated by means of its missionary contributions.

## THE ANNOAL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL.

In presenting the friends and supporters of the Pointe-aux-Trembles Mission Schools with this brief report of our labours during the past session, we desire to draw their attention to our wants and our progress, and to the importance of our mission.

Our object is to spread education among the families who, through the efforts of the Misvionaries, have been detached from the Church of Rome, and also amongothe children of Roman Catholic parents who, on account of poverty or for lack of confidence in the education given by the nuns or by the friars, are willing to send their young people to our Schools.

The French Protestants of this. Province are so scattered all over the country that it is only in a few localities that they can gather their children together in a good school taught by a Protestant teacher; many of them are obliged to pay taxes towards Roman Catholic schools where they cannot send their children, because they meet with bad treatment or have to listen to teachings entirely opposed to what they have heard at home. It is therefore of the utmost importance that the families of our converts be provided with central schools, where their children can obtain an education in harmony with the principles they cherish.

Though our mission schools have been denounced everywhere by the priesta as most dangerous places for the young people of their parishes, the number of applications for admission is increasing every year, and a large proportion of them are from young Roman Catholics who have sought in vain an education in their parish schools, where most of the time is devoted to praying to the saints and reciting their catechism.

We have thus always two classes of scholars, the first comprising those who come from homes where the light of the Gospel has already penetrated and has done its blessed work; the second composed of young people who are thirsting for education but whose minds are already full of superstitions and prejudices.

We seek to impart to those young people, by our example, our influence and our teachings, a christian education which shall place in their souls the germs of faith, of piety and of
hope, a treasury of impressions and religious knowledge they shall never lose whether they become farmers, artisans, teachers or professional men.

Our great desire is to give them an education which shall shield them against any dangerous literature or against any of those systems which strike at the foundations of morals and of religion.

Our grand object is to form intelligent pupils, pious, faithful to God and to their country, and ready at all times to defend the truth of the Gospel against error and infidelity.

The experience of every year strengthens our conviction that there is no better way to work for the prosperity of our country and the success of the cause of Christ than by spreading a christian education among our young people who, in a few years, shall be the men and women of this Province.

The work we are pursuing is a very humble one, one perhaps which does not attract nruch attention, but who can tell the influence of those three thousand pupils who have left our schools with the Bible in their hands and in their hearts, and who are scattering everywhere the good tidings of the Gospel among our countrymen?

Last Fall we received over three hundred applications for admission, about twicê as many as we used to receive five years ago.

We can but bless the Lord for this large increase in the number of those who desire to be admitted into'our schools, but at the same time, when we are obliged to refuse more than we can admit for lack of accommodation, we feel sad to see that the liberality of our christian friends is not equal to the progress of the work.

One hundred and twenty pupils have been admitted into our schodls during the last session, that is as many as we can properly accommodate. Forty-nine of them were children of Roman Catholic parents, and the others belonged to families of converts.

We are happy to state that peace, harmony and friendship have existed among our young people throughout the whole session, and that not a single case of dangerous sickness has appeared within our crowded houses.

Uur scholars have manifested an unabated diligence and earnestness in their studies, and their progress, in every respect, has been most satisfactory, as was elicited by our final examination.

In all our religions exercises we have endeavoured to show them the necessity of accepting Jesus as their Saviour, and we are glad to say that twenty-eight of them have, during the'session, given their heart to Jesus and have become members of His Church. Fourteen of those who have about completed their studies at Pointe-aux-Trembles, have been engaged to work during summer as teachers and colporteurs in our mission field. We hope the Holy Spirit will accompany and sustain our young pioneers in their hard work, and that they will be enabled to cheer many homes with some rays of the light of the Gospel.

Feeling, that enough interest has not been shown by our former pupils in Erench Evangelization, we have started a Missionary Society, which all former pupils are invted to join, and we hope that this may be a rallying point, a bond of union among us, and that by our united efforts we may be able to help our Board to spread the knowledge of the Gospel among the French Canadians who are still without the true light. The pupils of this year have already subscribed one hundred and thirty dollars to be employed in some branch of French Evangelization. Every year the pupils manifest a greater desire to pay their own way. Now we receive about ten times the amount of school fees that we used to receive some years ago ; and, considering that thirty-five of our pupils are entirely dependent on'themselves, we think it speaks well for their perseverance and their good will.

In closing this report, we bless our Heavenly Father for His protection over us, and for the success with which He has been pleased to crown the efforts of His servants during the. past session. May all the friends of this Institution, encouraged by the success of this year, realize the necessity of enlarging the buildings in order to receive within their walls all the young people who are ready to come under the precious influence of the Gospel.

## POINTE AUX TRKMBLES NEW BUILDINGS.

For the past two or three years the number of applications for admission to the schools has ranged from two hundred and fifty to three hundred, more than double the number that can be accommodated in the present buildings. This has forced upon the Board the question of increased accommodation, and at a recent meetiog the matter was discussed at length and estimates submitted by Mr. A. C. Hutchison, architect, as to the probable cost. There was also submitted an extract minute of the Presbytery of Quebec, asking for the establish-
ment of a Mission boarding school within the bounds of that Presbytery. The description of several properties now for sale in or near Quebec city, and the cost of the same, were laid before the meeting, and, after lengthened consideration, the following resolution was adopted by the Board:-
"That an appeal be made for funds to enlarge the Pointe aux Trembles schools by adding a mansard roof and a wing to the boys' building, and to effect the necessary repairs thereon, with the understanding that the expense does not exceed ten thousand dollars; that the Board approves of the establishment of a Mission boarding school in Quebec, and that in the appeal for the money necessary to enlarge the Pointe aux Trembles schools, the urgent need of the establishment of a similar institution in the vicinity of Quebec be laid before the Church, and an appeal made to secure the necessary funds; it being understood that contributors shall be free to designate their contributions to either object."

It is earnestly hoped that the friends of the work will furnish the means necessary for the accomplishment of both objects, viz, the enlargement of the schools at Pointe aux Trembles, and the establishment of asimilar school at Quebec. Of all the means employed in the past none have proved more efficacious and none have more manifestly had the Divine approval. Ten or fifteen yearo ago it was difficult to secure pupils; now that they are knocking for admission in such large numbers it is greatly to be desired that additional accommodation will be speedily provided so that none will hereafter be turned away.

## PREACHING STATIONS. .

The accompanying statistical schedule shows that two hundred and thirty-eight members were received during the year. With a few exceptions, these were received on profession of faith, most of them being converts from the Church of Rome :-

As reported last year, the Board appointed one of its ordained missionaries, Rev. I. Matthieu, to visit the several mission fields with a view to ençourage the people and to dispense ordinances in those districts supplied by students and catechists. Mr. Matthieu spent about four months in this work, and rendered good service in many of the fields, receiving forty new members on profession of their faith in Christ.

Grand Falls, N. B.-Mr. Matthieu labored here for several weeks. He found the Presbyterian cause at a low ebb, many of the families formerly identified with our church having removed to the States. He reports the field as fully occupied by other evangelical denominations, and though there are no French services, the want is not felt, as the very few French converts now in the district understand English. Two of the colporteurs of the Board spent several months in the neighborhood last Summer, and gained access to many of the homes of the people, disposing of 120 copies of the Scriptures and a large number of French pamphlets and tracts.

Quebec City.-The Rev. T. Z. Lefebvre is encouraged in his work here. He reports greater regularity in attendance on the services. Every Sabbath evening an average of twenty Roman Catholics are present, some of whom make it a point to attend the Thursday evening prayer meeting. In January last, a Mission Day School was opened, which is attended by eighteen pupils. The friends in Quebec furnished the room occupied as a school, and meet the rent of the same. One of the colporteurs of the Board has been laboring in the city for the past few months, and Mr. Lefebvre reports very favorably of his work, and of its influence on the Sabbath attendance.

Italian Mission, Montreal.-During the year Mr. Internoscia was gladdened by the reception of eight Italians into the fellowship of the church on profession of faith. Owing to difficulties in the way of securing a suitable teacher, a mission school tor the Italians has not yet been opened. During the winter, however, an evening school was conducted without expense to the Board, which was attended by twenty-six of the Italians.

East End, Montreal_-The Sabbath service is still conducted by Rev. R. P. Duclos, in the American Presbyterian Mission Chapel, at Hochelaga. Last summer a mission day school was opened on Dufresne street, under the care of Mr. Bonnenfant, and was well attended. He also conducted an evening school for adults, and was much encouraged by the interest manifested. More commodious premises have recently been secured on St. Catherine street, and the school is now taught there by Madame Wotier, Mr. Bonnenfant giving his whole time to colportage work. An attractive mission building is much required for this district, in which not only the day and evening schools would be held, but also the Sabbath services. The field is in many respects an inviting one, and with a suitable building the cause would doubtless greatly improve.

New Glasgow, Que.-The unusual severity of the winter interfered considerably with the attendance at the Rev. Mr. Boudreau's services. He reports an increasing demand for the word of God, and a more free access to the homes of many Koman Catholic families. A young French Canadian in his congregation purposes to study for the ministry.

Grenville, Que.-Our people here erected a comfortable mission school building during the year. It is only some four years since the congregation built a neat, substantial church, and though many of the young people are leaving the district, the attendance at both school and Sabbaih services keeps up well.

St. Martin, Que.-The missionary in this field last year met with much opposition, and suffered not a little at the hands of some of the Roman Catholics. One of the families connected with the mission had their barn burned down, it is supposed by incendiaries, hecause of their harbouring the missionary.

Grand Bend, Ont.-The missionary reports that there are thirty-five French families attending his services, and that although most of them were formerly connected with another church, yet he is now the only French missionary in the field, and they are all expected to fall in with his congregation. As a proof of their interest they, though poor, contributed $\$ 70.25$ towards his salary last year.

St. Anse, Illinois.- The Rev. C. Chiniquy reports that upwards of three hundred Roman Catholics last year gave up the errors of Popery through his instrumentality. He spent several weeks in Massachusetts in the latter end of the winter visiting fhe French churches there, and addressing large meetings in the various towns where congregations have of late years been established.

Namuk and Hartwell, Que.-Mr. Matthieu reports twenty-five converts from Romanism in this field during the year, and seventeen new communicants received into the church on profession of faith.

West Farnham, Que.- Some six or seven years ago the Board sent a French missionary to this field. Finding a number of English speaking Presbyterians in the town, he opened an English service for them in a small school building. Soon afterwards, through his instrumentality, an eligible lot was secured, and a handsome brick church erected at a cost in all of about $\$ 5,000$. The congregation recently called an English speaking minister, who was settled over them in January last, and towards whose salary they contribute $\$ 600$ per annum.

The Board employs a French colporteur in the neighboring district of St. Brigide, where the population is almost wholly French.

ST. John's Chyrch, Montreal.-The following is the report in full, as submitted by Rev. C. A. Doudiet :-

A few years ago Dr. R. S. MacArthur, of New York, wrote of that great city, "Romanism is almost master here in politics, in literature and religion." Here, in the Province of Quebec, we do not need the word "almost." Romanism is master here. It has all the elements that constitute power, wealth, authority and numbers. Politicians of every shade, with rare exceptions, truckle to it, merchants court its patronage, and even some Protestant ministers avoid open condemnation of its errors. Churches will give large sums for the conversion of heathen in India French mission of ours to evangelization of Romanists in Italy and France, but will suffer this French mission of ours to languish for want of means.

Let us not deceive ourselves by yfinly waiting for what might be thought more favorable times or circumstances to push the work, "Silence gives consent to error, and permits it to live. Preaching the truth makes truth omflipolant, and in its province error hides, and its power to do mischief dies. Error lives because we let it." (MacArthur.) We have heard French Protestant ministers saying that if a chag f. of government came, and the Liberals had power here,
Romanism would be crippled. Alas "Jesuits' Bill", and a Liberal Alas 2,or their hopes, a Liberal Premier has presented the "J Jesuits' Bill," and a Liberal House has passed it ! reminding one of the prophetic words : "Cursed be the man who trusteth in man, and makes flesh his arm." There is but one power that can and will eventually overthrow Romanism here and everywhere. It is that of the word of God, the spirit of His mouth ; and the more we preach the word, the more quickly will the great work of regeneration be accomplished, The preaching of the word wrought the overthrow of Paganism, at a time when there were but few written books, and no printing press ; why should it not, with all modern facilities of communication to help it, overthrow Romanism in our times ?

But some now say, "the cases are not parallel." The Church of Rome is a branch of the Christian Church; its votaries serve the same God that we worship, according to their light. They are as moral us the Protestants, and much more united. Therefore, to preach the Gospel to them is to usurp unwarrantably the functions of their priesthood, and is a waste of energy, of time, and of money. To this many add that, with all our expenditure, there have been no appreciable results, that our converts are neither influential nor rich, and that they show no interest in the Gospel, giving nothing for its support, and expecting everything to be done for them. We, who labor among them, if not considered as mere mercenaries, are deemed mistaken enthusiasts, and when, after many years' faithful work, we are overtaken by the infirmities of age, and have to leave the work to others, we have no expectation of a jubilee fund being raised for us as an acknowledgment of long, faithful services. But we do not complain of this, "Our judgment is with the Lord, and our work with our God." We cannot, however, rest quietly without contraChurch of Christ current about this work. The Church of Rome, we claim, is not now a Church of Christ. By its worship of creatures, it has been vainly puffed up by its fleshly mind, and given up its hold of "The Head." The Church that does this is no longer a living body,

- but a corpse. The Church of Rome makes a traffic of the gifts of God. If, as Peter said to Simon the magician, "he had neither part nor lot in this matter," viz. : the power to give the Holy Ghost, because he thought that the gift of God might be purchased by money, the Church that sells 'spiritual benefits for money has no share of the power of the Spirit of Christ. And in case any one should disbelieve the statement that spiritual benefits are bought and sold in the Church of Rome, we submit the following translation of a card $4 \times 3$, bought for 25 cents at the Bazaar of St. Peter's Cathedral, last Summer, in Montreal :-

Masses a year for four years ; 145, 133 Communions ; 323,808 Ways of the Cross ; 515,464 Rosaries ; 16,372 Masses heard; 4,300 Strings of Beads of the Sacred Heart ; 4,600 Offices of the Holy Virgin ; 720 Breviaries of the Precious Blood; 100 Salve Regina, chanted by the Trappists, and several thousands of other prayers, such as "Remember ......"" "Pater," Ave, \&c., and once a week the spiritual profits of seven millions of Ave Marias by the confraternity of that name. Seen and approved,

If spac allowed us, it would be easy to show further that the claims of Romanism to practice intolerance and persecution wherever and whenever it can, proves that it is not animated by the Spirit of Christ ; and above all, the undeniable fact that Romanism makes light of sin, stamps. it as anti-christian, for the Gospel of Chfist was written "that we sin not." When the Ministerial Association here, in Montreal, urged the City Council to prevent Sabbath desecration by closing tobacco and candy shóps, and stopping Sunday excursions, the Roman Catholic members of the Police Committee voted as a unit against the proposal; and one of them stated that the ministers of his faith were not opposed to sweets and other little refreshments being sold on Sundays, and that, therefore, it would be time lost to hear the deputation, \&c. If this is the result of the teaching of Romanism, tell us not that it is a Church of Christ !

It is, therefore, imperative upon believers of the Gospel to preach that Gospel to Romanists, their priests not doing it, and teaching a morality in many points opposed to that of the Gospel of Christ. If this is granted, and it now be asked, "What good has your preaching done ?" we can show, in Montreal alone, six congregations of French Protestants, of which St. John's is one. I have been an elder in St. John's when it had a roll of ten members and a revenue of about $\$ 25$ per year. The Church has now 111 communicants, 28 of which were admitted during the year, 18 by profession of faith and 10 by certificate. This last item deserves notice, showing that not in Montreal alone, but in othẹr places our Mission work is making itself felt. Whereas, as late as twelve years ago, six or seven baptisms a year was the rule, I baptized twenty-five children this year, and officiated at fourteen marriages and seventeen funerals. The Sabbath attendance on ordinances has varied from 65 to 150 , by actual count ; that of the prayer meeting has seldom been less than 24, and often much more, and the Sabbath School has averaged 40 scholars, including the Pastor's Bible Class.

Our converts and members are not in general wealthy or influential, although we have a few such, but neither are they paupers. The contributions of the people have averaged $\$ 4.85$ per communicant during the year,-no small average in a congregation where only three families have an income of over $\$ 1,000$, and where nine-tenths of the people are mechanics, earning from five to eight dollars per week. The total sum collected during the year has been $\$ 525.18$, a higher figure than any reached in previous years, and due a good deal to the introduction of the envelope system. I have no doubt that if instead of the building (Russell Hall) now used as a Church, we had more suitable and commodious premises, both for the meetings of the congregation and for the school, the roll of both would be largely increased. Would that some large hearted member of the Presbyterian church imitated on a small scale for us the munificence of the founders of the Victoria Hospital, and sent your Board a sufficient sum to erect a Jubilee French Presbyterian Church, in room of our present building. Dare we hope that this wish will be fulfilled ?

If our Province of Quebec is ever to rival Protestant countries in enterprise, wealth and education, the grip of Romanism on the masses must be destroyed. Wherever the Church of Rome has had supreme authority, it has enriched itself at the expense of the toiling masses. It is not the people who own these splendid cathedrals, immense convents and other religious structures. It is the "church," and it can dispose of them at will. Twenty million dollars' worth of such property is held in Montreal alone ; this is the published statement of a leading Montreal priest, who certainly did not exaggerate the figures. The city draws no revenue from all this real estate, and yet the City Council lacks money to keep the streets clean. Whenever we see the immense piles rearing their proud cupolas high above the humble dwellings of the people, we feel that we are looking at the gravestones of a nation. As Paul Bert truly said: "Quand un pays se neglige, les moines s'v mettent." "When a country neglects itself, Monks get into it." -

What are we, a poor band of Gospel preachers to attack such a mighty power as that of Rome? Nothing i-but we believe still that the Gospel will overcome. "Not by might, nor by power, but my spirit, saith the Lord of hosts."

## finances.

As will be seen from the accompanying financial statement, the receipts for the year amounted to $\$ 25,668.81$ for the ordinary fund, $\$ 7,512.50$ for the Pointe aux Trembles schools, and $\$ 75$ for the extension of these schools, making a total of $\$ 33,256$-fully $\$ 1,000$ in excess of the preceding year's receipts. Anong the receipts are included an unusually large number of legacies. amounting in all to $\$ 2,216$. To the Presbyterian Church of Ireland for a grant of $£ 150$ sterling, the thanks of the Board are due; as also to Mr. G. D. Fergusson, of Fergus, who generously contributes $\$ 200$ quarterly on behalf of the work, and whose contribution has enabled the Board to continue a larger number of Colporteurs in the field than in any former year. The Board also desires to make grateful acknowledgment of the continued practical interest manifested by Mr. Ignatius Cockshutt, of Brantford, in his annual gift of $\$ 400$ on behalf of the Pointe aux Trembles Schools, and of a generous and unsolicited gift of a large box of stationery, etc., for the schools from a friend in Montreal. While the receipts have been considerably in excess of the preceding year, so also has the expenditure -the balance on hand in May, 1886, for the ordinary fund, having been reduced from $\$ 848.59$ to the small sum of $\$ 29.49$. Owing to the eontinued business depression in Great Britain, the amount received by Rev. James McCaul is much smaller than under other circumstances it would have been. Mr. McCaul's engagement terminated in April, and he contemplates settling in Scotland. In his receipts is included the sum of $£ 43$, collected through the instrumentality of Mrs. Macnider, of Edinburgh, who continues from year to year to show her heartfelt interest in our work.

STUDENTS' MISSIONARY SOCIETY.
The Students' Missionary Society of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, has resglved to prosecute French evangelization work. At a meeting held in March last the Society decided to establish and maintain a French mission in St. Jean Baptiste, and a committee was appointed to secure a suitable site and to proceed with the erection of mission premises so soon as a sufficient sum of money had been received to warrant this being done. The members of the Society agreed to collect funds in their several districts this summer, and it is anticipated that a building will be erected and ready for use next winter. It is contemplated to open a Mission Day School, and to have Sabbath and occasional week evening services in the building, which, it is hoped, will prove a great blessing to the neighborhood.
cLose.
Viewing the work of the past year, as a whole, there are not a few encouraging features which call for devout gratitude to the great Head of the Church. A larger number of Colporteurs have been employed, and a greater number of copies of French Scriptures distributed than in any former year of the Board's operations ; the number of Mission schools has increased from twentyfive, with twenty-nine teachers and eight hundred and four pupils, to twenty-nine, with thirty-four teachers and nine hundred and five scholars ; the number in attendance at the Pointe aux Trembles Central Schools was as large as the buildings could accommodate, and the session was one of the most successful ever held, fifty-five of the pupils being members of the Church and twelve or thifteen of them having the ministry in view ; two hundred and thirty-eight communicants have been added to the membership of the congregations and missions under the care of the Board, and four French students finished their theological course at the Presbyterian College, Montreal, and were licensed last month to preach the Gospel of Christ. "What has God wrought ?" "This is the Lord's doings, and it is wonderful in our eyes."

To maintain in efficiency this most important department of the Church's work, the Board earnestly solicits the prayers, the sympathy, and increased liberality of all the friends of the mission, and, above all, the continuance of the Divine favor and blessing, without which all else is vain.
