Of Interest to Fishermen

From the Trade Review of June 24 we learn as follows:

That the price of new fish, of the catch of 1916, on the West Coast opened at \$7.00 per quintal for large No. 1.

That a few small lots of fish from settlements adjacent to St. John's were brought in here at the rate of \$6.50 per qtl.

That the market is in a very healthy condition and that there is no apparent reason why the price for merchantable fish next month should be anything under \$7.00 per qtl.

That quite a percentage of the catch of Burin and Grand Bank is likely to be marketed in France, as agents from some French ports are now on the coast buying fish at an average price of \$7.00 per qtl.

That a large quantity of fish is being sold out of both banks to Americans, at 24 cents per pound. The sellers believe that to be a good enough price and that it will equal about \$8.00 per qtl, besides doing away with the expense of "making" the fish, thus saving time. That there are quite a number of American buyers on the coast and that all are eager to get fish.

That the banking fleet of Grand Bank comprising 22 vessels, have landed a total catch to date of 20,710 quintals.

That the Burin banking fleet, 21 vessels, have landed 22,010 quintals, to date.

That there are signs of a good fishery all round the coast, and that the fish being caught are of a size and quality that indicate a good caplin school that will hold for some time.

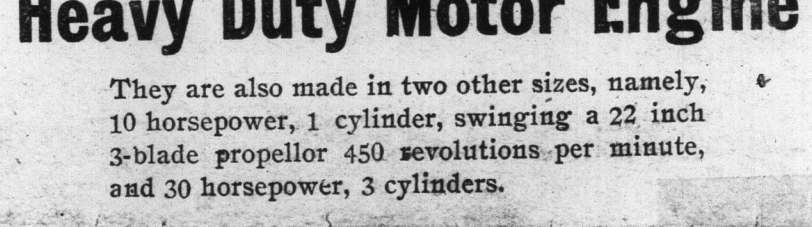

German Shell as Agent of Justice

A volume could be written on the stratagems tried by the highly-paid agents of the Kaiser in order to obtain some knowledge of the situation of the defenses of Verdun. Most of them, unfortunately, only come to light through some mischance occurring, for instance, as in the following incident.

One day a "Taube" dropped several bombs on the town, and one of them exploded in the centre of a street, killing a little child and inflicting frightful injuries on a young woman who was with it.

She lay groaning and writhing in agony in the roadway while an ambulance was being fetched to carry her to the hospital, but on its arrival a strange thing happened; she struggled with all her fast waning strength against being taken, protesting that she was not seriously hurt, and wanted to go to her home. No heed, however, was paid to her delirious ravings, as they were thought to be, and she was taken direct to the hospital, where she lost consciousness on arrival, and died shortly after.

On searching her for some clue as to her identity a number of papers were found concealed in her dress, which established beyond the slightest doubt that she was a spy; the terrible part of it, as it turned out, being that she was of French nationality, and had been living in a state of affluence for some time previously on the proceeds of her infamy.—Julius Price, in "Fortnightly Review."

Memorial to Kitchener

London, June 21.—In moving a resolution authorizing the erection of a memorial to the late Field Marshall Earl Kitchener out of the public funds with an inscription expressing admiration of the House for his illustrious career and gratitude for his services, Premier Asquith, in the House of Commons to-day, recalled the recent meeting of Lord Kitchener with members of the House which ended in the Field Marshall and his most persistent and irreconcilable critics parting on terms of mutual respect.

When Lord Kitchener said farewell to him after nearly two years of intercourse through all the strain and stress of the war, continued the Premier, there was no thought of anything more than a temporary parting, no foreshadowing of a separation which neither time nor space could bridge.

Andrew Bonar Law, Minister of the Colonies, seconded the resolution, emphasizing the fact that Lord Kitchener had the fullest confidence of the country.

The resolution for the memorial was agreed to.

Woman Leads Border Raid

Laredo, Texas, June 21.—Four Mexican boy bandits testified to-day before the District Court Grand Jury that a woman led the Mexican raid on the United States camp at San Ignacio.

They said that she was Senora Parias, wife of a Mexican colonel, who was killed during the battle. The woman escaped to the Mexican side while the battle was at its height.

Holding Power of Nails

Some very interesting tests of the holding power of nails have been made at the Government arsenal at Watertown, Mass., and the results may be briefly summarized as follows:

The tests were made in pine and spruce, with both cut and wire nails. The nails were of all sizes from 1.8 to 6 inches in length. In every case the cut nails showed superior holding strength by a large percentage.

In spruce, in nine different sizes of nails both standard and light weight, the ratio of tenacity of cut to wire nails was about 3 to 2.

With the finishing nails the ratio was 3.5 to 2. With box nails 1.14 to 4 inches long, the ratio was 3 to 2. The mean superiority in spruce wood was 61 per cent.

In white pine, cut nails, driven with taper along the grain, showed a superiority of 100 per cent. and with taper across grain of 135 per cent. Also when the nails were driven in the end of the sticks along the grain, the superiority of cut nails was 100 per cent. or ratio of cut to wire nails was 2 to 1.

The total of the results showed the ratio of tenacity to be 3.2 to 2 for the harder wood, and about 2 to 1 for the softer.

This gives a hint as to where we may use each kind of nail to advantage.

For example in laying a floor, where the travel over it naturally tends to loosen the boards, it will pay to use cut nails. Other instances might be cited, but this one will suffice.

Quick Climbing

Aviation Grounds, Squantum, Mass., June 21.—Oscar Brindley, former chief of the army aviation school at San Diego, Cal., and who is testing out the new steel biplanes for use on the Mexican border jumped towards the clouds at the rate of 500 feet a minute in his trials to-day.

Horizontal speed tests showed an 81-mile average.

Say Traitor Shot Gallieni

Passengers on the French liner La Fayette, which arrived in New York to-day, say it is generally believed in Paris that General Gallieni, "the savior of Paris," was killed by a traitor.

The story as told by the passengers is that a French officer was sent back from the front under charges of attempting to sell information of the most vital importance to the Germans. He was taken into a private room by General Gallieni for examination. Those outside the room heard a shot and rushed into the room, where they found the general fatally wounded, shot by the accused officer.

This story is known to everybody in Paris, say the passengers, but the French War Office will neither affirm nor deny it. An official from the War Office was on the liner. He is Gustav Heslous, and is here to purchase supplies. When he was asked about the death of General Gallieni he merely shrugged his shoulders and would neither affirm nor deny the story.

Another passenger on the liner was Miss Annie W. Wilson, who has been nursing wounded soldiers in a hospital at Neuilly for the last six months. She said the most terribly mangled men she had ever seen came to the hospital from the Verdun front.—New York Globe, June 19.

Items of Interest

Great Britain and France have spent more than a million dollars for eight million feet of spruce wood from Washington and Oregon for making aeroplanes, according to Robert B. Allen of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association in an address to the students in journalism at the University of Washington.

When sharpening a colored pencil be careful not to get any of the dust into the eye. Many such pencils are dyed with aniline, and several cases of severe injury to the eye have been reported. In the Archives of Ophthalmology, Dr. R. J. McCurdy tells of a young woman who not only had the white of her eye stained blue, but who had to have an operation performed to separate the lower lid from eyeball, thus having grown together in the healing of the sore produced by the aniline.

One armed persons find it difficult to eat out of ordinary plates, because they have no means of stopping the food from sliding up the sides and falling over to the table. A couple of plates invented by Dr. A. E. Shipley of Cambridge, England, and illustrated in the Lancet, are intended to help them in this respect. One is a soup plate with a depression in the centre from which the last two or three spoonfuls of soup can easily be removed. The other, which has an overhanging rim, is for solid food. Against this piece of meat or pudding can be pushed without any risk of their toppling over the edge of the plate.

Oleomargarine, when first introduced in England, was called 'boosh'. As this name repelled business, it was changed to 'margarine', a word derived from the Greek word for a pearl, because of the pearly appearance of margarine acid. There has been a great improvement in its manufacture in recent years, so great that the London Luncheon says 'the product of the present day is a triumph of the art of the refined blending of various facts, vegetable and animal, with milk.' It was originally made from the fluid part of beef fat with a trifling proportion of vegetable oil. Today some of its forms contain nothing but oil blended with pasteurized skim milk. These are perfectly wholesome.

WAR NEWS

French Gains At Thiaumoat

Paris, June 27.—The French have captured another section of trenches at Thiaumoat, in the Verdun sector. According to today's official statement the struggle for the possession of the village of Fleury is still progressing. Three Allied aeroplanes have dropped 65 shells on German ships near the Belgian coast.

Italians Advance On Trentino Sector

Rome, June 27.—Reports from the front state the Italians are advancing all along the Trentino sector, reconquering the positions which the Austrians had occupied, and capturing men, arms, ammunitions, provisions and all kinds of supplies which the Austrians had been obliged to abandon in their precipitate retreat. All Italy is rejoicing over the withdrawal of the Austrians six weeks after their offensive movement on the Trentino front began.

Austrian Transports Sunk by Italians

Rome, June 27.—An official communication regarding the Austrian transports says Italian warships entered Donazzo roadstead on the night of the 25th and sank two steamers, one 5,000 tons the other 3,000, laden with arms and munitions. The warships returned without loss to their base, notwithstanding the heavy fire of the enemy.

British Successes

London, June 27.—A British official statement issued at midnight reads: "We carried out a number of successful enterprises last night at different points and penetrated hostile lines at ten different places. Our casualties were very slight. The Munster Fusiliers and the Anzacs were particularly successful. In connection with these raids there was a good deal of artillery work by both sides yesterday evening, and during the night. Our artillery fired with great effect on hostile trenches being considerably damaged at many places. Four large explosions were caused by our artillery and damage done to hostile defensive works, notably at Longueval, Commeucourt, Civenchy, an Enghien north of Loos salient, opposite Valenciennes and east of Wicly. One hostile kite balloon, in addition to those already reported destroyed by our aircraft yesterday, making a total of 6 out of 15 balloons attacked, was seen to fall in flames.

Shackleton Has To Leave His Men.

London, June 27.—Lieut. Sir Ernest Shackleton has been unable to rescue his men, numbering 22, comprising the main body of his Antarctic Expedition, who were left on Elephant Island. This information was received in a despatch from Shackleton from Port Stanley, Falkland Island. The explorer evidently returned on the steamer which had been placed at his disposal by the Uruguayan Government for the purpose of effecting the rescue of his men. According to his despatch, ice conditions had so increased in severity that he was unable to get nearer than 20 miles of the Island. He thinks there is still a hope for the men as there is an excellent chance that they will be able to survive on short rations, supplemented by penguins, until another rescue party provided with an ice breaker can push through to them. The steamer Infinitesima provided by the Uruguayan Government left Montevideo, June 8, with Lieut. Shackleton aboard to succor the men on Elephant Island.

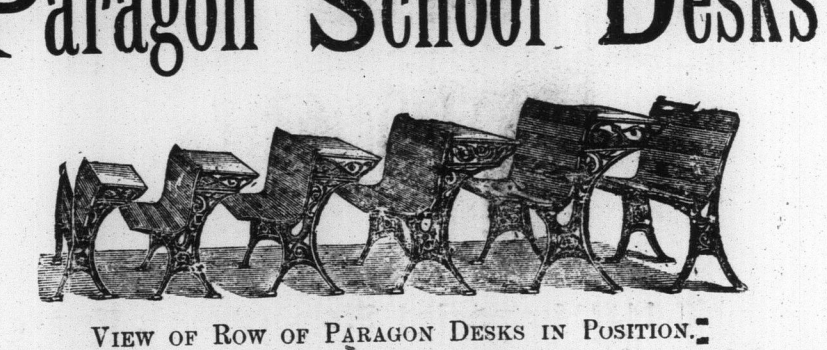

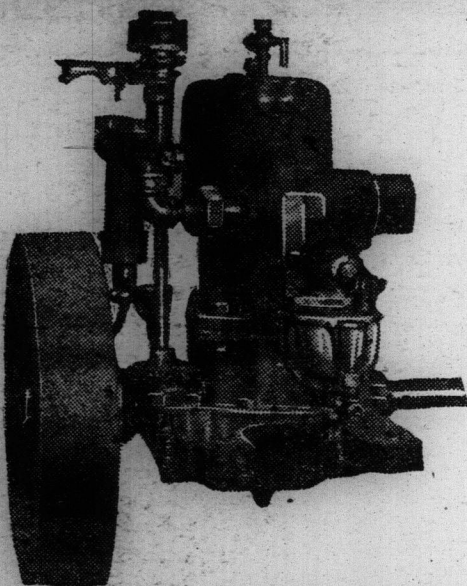

The St. John's Civic Election

Before we go to press this week the municipal election in St. John's will have passed into history, and the Mayor and Councillors who are to control the destinies of the city for the ensuing term will have been chosen.

While we who reside in the smaller towns are not directly interested in the matter, yet, as public-spirited citizens of one commonwealth we cherish a desire to see governmental affairs of the capital city of Newfoundland in the hands of men instead of a public and philanthropic spirit—men who are willing to devote time and ability, for little, if any, pecuniary remuneration, being ambitious, simply, to make St. John's a clean, model and up-to-date city in every respect.

Such a Mayor and Council, we believe, could not be better chosen than by the election to office of the present Chairman and Commissioners—Messrs. Gosling, Withers, McGrath, Ayre, Bradshaw, Mc Namara and Morris.

While it is, and should be, the privilege and aim of every citizen to aspire to the highest honor his city offers, it is also the bounden duty of every other citizen to carefully consider the candidates who offer themselves for election, to lay aside political, party or personal differences, and to be a solid unit in supporting the men who pledge themselves to labor for ideals as set forth above.

If there is one affliction more than another from which a city should endeavor to free itself, it is the cheap, civic political grafter, and we feel certain the intelligent voters of St. John's will exercise sober judgment and discrimination in the present emergency, and honor themselves by honoring, in electing, the men who have proven themselves willing to work freely and indefatigably for the welfare of St. John's.

Russia's Come Back

The steady and successful offensive by the Russian forces still continues to attract the attention of the world. Their come-back seems to be masterful and complete. Just a year ago they were in full retreat before the seemingly superior Austrian and German forces, and although their retreat was conducted in a strategic and effective manner, pessimists were croaking their doleful lay that the Russian was a failure as a fighter, and that the story of countless thousands of men to back up the stand taken by the Allies was a delusion.

But time has proved that Russia has the men and that they are fighters. What they needed was equipment and munitions, which owing to that country's lack of open seaports it was hard to accumulate.

The Allies however, have overcome these obstacles, and have simply poured arms and accoutrements into Russia, and behold a rejuvenated army comes forth, led by a brilliant military strategist, and steadily grinds its way through the Austro-German lines.

It is a revelation, but we had it as a master-stroke, which if sustained will prove a big factor in hastening the end of the war.

In the Supreme Court, St. John's, on Wednesday the matter of the appeal of Walter Crosbie from the judgment of Mr. Justice Johnson in his case against the Downing Cook Co. for breach of contract was heard. On Thursday the Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Kent expressed their concurrence with the judgment, and the appeal was dismissed with costs.

Latest War News

On all Fronts

New York, June 28.—The Austrians in the region of Trent are still falling back before the advance of the Italians who have recaptured numerous important points of vantage. The Austrians, according to the Italian War Office, vainly attempted to hold back the Italians who would not be denied.

There has been again slackening in the intensity of the bombardment on the various sectors around Verdun. Only an infantry attack was attempted on Tuesday. This was launched by the Germans at part of the Village of Fleury, north west of Verdun which is held by the French. It was repulsed. The Germans also essayed an attack against the British southeast of Ypres but this also was without result.

In patrol points engagements the British at many points entered the German trenches inflicting casualties on the defenders and making some prisoners. Four German aircraft have been brought down by the British airmen in aerial fights; the British lost one machine.

On the front of northwest Russia, the Germans have bombarded the Russian positions and followed them up with infantry attacks. Petrograd says that all attacks were put down by the Russian fire.

An official statement issued by the Russian War Office places the number of prisoners captured by General Brusiloff's army between June 4th and 23rd at 198,972 officers and men. The number of heavy guns, machine guns and bomb throwers has reached more than 1,000.

110 Killed in Raid On Karlsruhe

Berlin, June 27.—A report on the aeroplane raid on Karlsruhe of June 22 shows 110 persons, including 5 women and 75 children killed, while 145 persons were injured, including 20 women and 79 children.

Italy's Determination

Rome, June 29.—The Chamber of Deputies today held the first session since the selection of the new Cabinet. Premier Roselli in a speech outlining the policy of the Government said that Italy would continue the war with her Allies until victory was attained.

British Successes

London, June 29.—A War Office communication issued to night says: During last night there were raids, and patrols entered the enemy trenches at several points bombing the enemy and inflicting casualties near Agnes. One of our raiding parties found the enemy trenches badly damaged by the Highland Light Infantry at Vermelles on the La Bassée road, when forty six prisoners and two trench mortars were captured, and two enemy mine shafts destroyed with the loss of only two men.

Germans Repulsed

Paris, June 29.—After a violent bombardment which lasted the entire day the Germans attacked the French position northwest of Thiaumont in the Verdun sector but were repulsed with heavy losses, according to an official statement published by the War Office today. French machine guns and gun fire are declared to have devastated the attack

France Confident

London, June 27.—The French press and public is intensely interested in the simultaneous forward movement by the Italians and Russians, and current expression is assuring a tone of elation and confidence. The Temps, summing up the military situation, says: It is now the turn of the Germans to be harried ceaselessly with explosive shells. To day they are no longer masters.

If in doubt of the whereabouts of a member of the Regiment, use same address as above. Never address a letter in care of the War Office or in care of the G. P. O., London.

With regard to parcels, they should be carefully packed and bear a Customs declaration specifying contents. The outer cover should be of strong linen, calico, canvas or other textile, and must be securely sewn up. Packing in cardboard or paper is not sufficient.

(a) The address must be written in bold letters on the covering in ink or indelible pencil and not on a label, whether tied or pasted on. The name and address of the sender must be shown on the cover.

(b) Wooden or metal boxes with square corners should not be sent unless well padded, as such boxes are liable to damage other parcels in transit.

(c) No perishable articles may be sent, and anything likely to become soft or sticky, such as chocolate or sweets, must be packed in tins well fastened down. Bottles, padding basins, and the like are prohibited and will not be accepted for transmission.

(d) Cigarettes and Tobacco should be packed in tin boxes, soldered to make them airtight, and these should then be placed in wooden boxes, otherwise they are liable to be spoiled by damp.

Parcels must not exceed 11 lbs in weight.

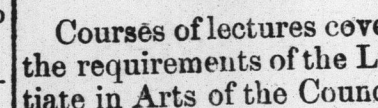
College Extension Lectures
